Baker Retires from Bolivar PD

The City of Bolivar will be looking for a new Chief of Police as Pat Baker informed the city November 28 of his decision to retire after a meeting with Mayor Julian McTizic.

"I want to thank Chief Baker for his years of service to the city as both an officer and as chief," said Mayor McTizic. "The city wishes him the best in the future."

Replacing Baker in the interim is Assistant Chief David Sipes. A

more than 30-year veteran of the force, Sipes will serve as Chief of Police until a replacement is named.

Resumes will be accepted by the city until December 17, with a goal of early 2019 for his replacement to assume the position, according to McTizic.

Baker was named Chief of Police by then-Mayor Barrett Stevens in July of 2011, replacing Bill Irons.

Baker served 30 years in law enforcement, with the Bolivar Police Department beginning in 1990 and was Assistant Chief of Police from 2007-2011.

Baker ran for Sheriff of Hardeman County in 2018 against incumbent John Doolen. Baker, in a three-way race, finished second getting 34% of the votes to Doolen's 45%. Toone Police Chief Jerry Siler was third with 21% of the vote.

The Luez to Open with *The Grinch*

The Luez Theatre in Bolivar will officially open its doors to the public on December 14 with the 2018 movie *The Grinch* (see A7 for movie review), ending the more than six years the circa 1948 theatre has been closed in Bolivar.

Purchased by the Bolivar Downtown Development Corporation in 2013, the theatre has hosted a half-dozen events over the years, but plans to run movies four days a week beginning with the December 14 opening night.

Tickets for opening night will be available beginning December 13 at 9:00 a.m. at the Hardeman County Chamber of Commerce. Any of the approximately 220 seats not sold at the chamber over the two days of pre-sale will be available at the Luez Theatre beginning at 6:30 p.m.

The theatre plans to run movies Thursday through Sunday each week after opening night.

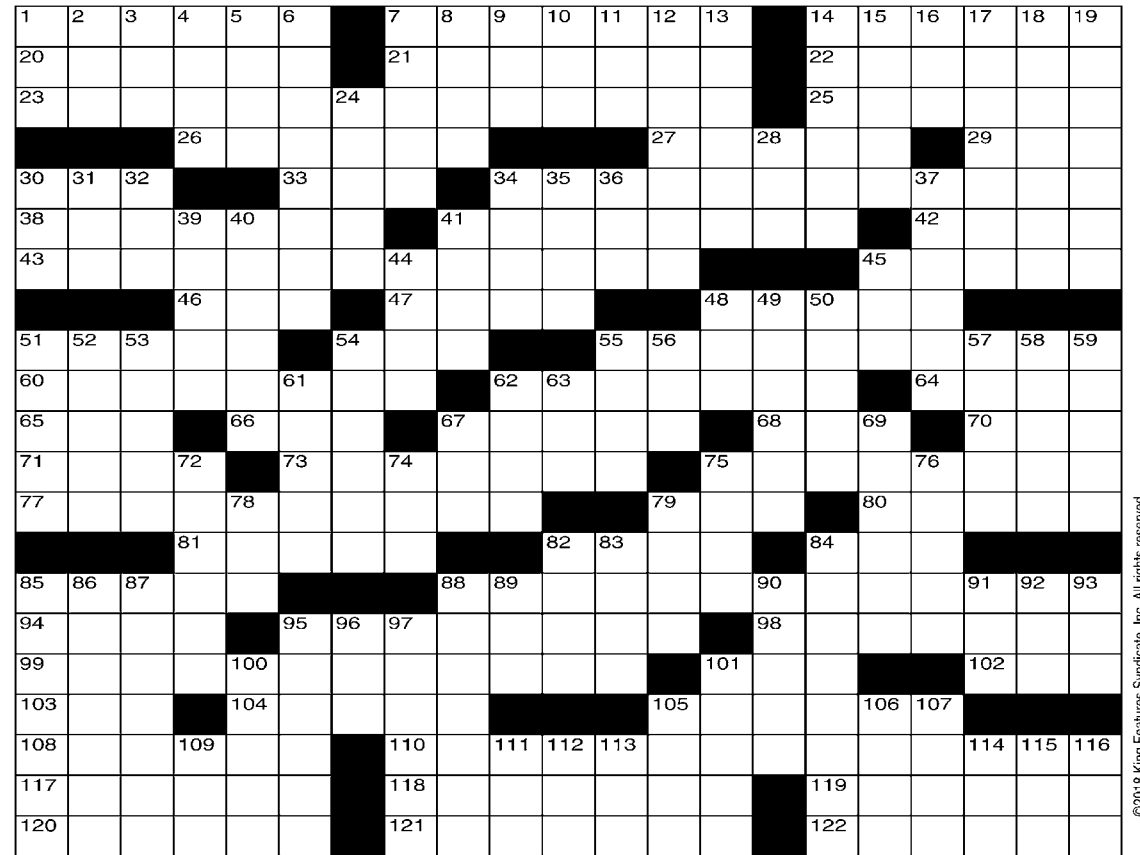

The Maxwell's Stay-at-Home Gourmet

Quiche Lorraine

Ingredients

- 1 recipe Pastry for a Single-Crust Pie
- 6 slices bacon or turkey bacon
- 1/2 cup chopped onion (1 medium)
- 5 eggs, lightly beaten
- 1 1/4 cups half-and-half or light cream
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- Dash ground nutmeg
- 1 1/2 cups shredded Swiss cheese (6 ounces)
- 1 tablespoon all-purpose flour
- Chopped fresh tomato (optional)
- Snipped fresh parsley (optional)

Directions

Preheat oven to 450 degrees F. Prepare Pastry for a Single-Crust Pie. On a lightly floured surface, use your hands to slightly flatten pastry. Roll pastry from center to edges into a circle about 12 inches in diameter. Wrap pastry circle around the rolling pin. Unroll into a 9-inch pie plate. Ease pastry into pie plate without stretching it. Trim pastry to 1/2 inch beyond edge of pie plate. Fold under extra pastry even with the plate's edge. Crimp edge as desired. Do not prick pastry. Line the un-pricked pastry shell with a double thickness of heavy foil. Bake for 8 minutes. Remove foil. Bake for 6 to 8 minutes more or until pastry is golden brown. Remove from oven. Reduce oven temperature to 325 degrees F. (Pastry shell should still be hot when filling is added; do not partially bake pastry shell ahead of time.) Meanwhile, in a very large skillet cook bacon until crisp or cook turkey bacon according to package directions. Drain, reserving 1 tablespoon of the drippings. Crumble bacon finely; set aside. Cook onion in the reserved drippings over medium heat until tender; drain. In a large bowl stir together eggs, half-and-half, salt, and nutmeg. Stir in crumbled bacon and onion. In a small bowl combine shredded cheese and flour; add to egg mixture. Mix well. Pour egg-cheese mixture into the hot, baked pastry shell. Bake in the 325 degrees F oven for 50 to 55 minutes or until a knife inserted near the center comes out clean. If necessary, to prevent over-browning, cover edge of crust with foil for the last 10 to 20 minutes of baking. Let stand for 10 minutes before serving. If desired, garnish with tomato and parsley.

Tradition and Church by Jeff Capshaw

Growing up in rural Hardeman county, Church was a significant part of my upbringing. At the time, I didn't often realize the value or significance of the Church and the Gospel. I was also ignorant of the value in some Ancient traditions.

My experience of the customary, public worship service--as enacted by numerous American Churches then and now--fell on the liturgical rung toward the bottom: "lower liturgy" versus a "higher liturgy." Of the latter type, I am thinking of traditions like Orthodox, Lutheran, Episcopal, Catholic, some Presbyterian, Anglican and so on.

The way people "do" public worship is driven by tradition, and tradition isn't necessarily a bad thing. In fact, all Churches inescapably practice in the context of a tradition. Some Christians draw more heavily on Ancient traditions and religious symbolism. Others prefer the relatively contemporary--more or less--and rely on symbols minimally.

The design of buildings, religious

art and other accoutrements are incorporated to a greater or lesser extent. In more formal, liturgical traditions; these and the structure of corporate worship intend to impact the senses of worshipping participants: sight, hearing, touch, and even the sense of smell.

Also characteristic of Churches falling on a higher rung of the liturgical ladder is the Church calendar. It consists of the cycle of liturgical seasons that determine when feast days . . . are to be observed, and which portions of Scripture are to be read either in an annual cycle or in a cycle of several years. Some traditions follow it strictly, while others use it selectively. Many simply ignore it.

The Church calendar is an especially helpful aid, especially during extended festive times like Christmas (Advent) and (Lent) leading up to Easter Sunday. The selected Scripture readings narrate the anticipations and fulfillments of Jesus' Birth, Life, Death, Burial, Resurrection and Ascension. They

But in this version, more than any other, it seems the Grinch needs to count his blessings and chill, just a bit.

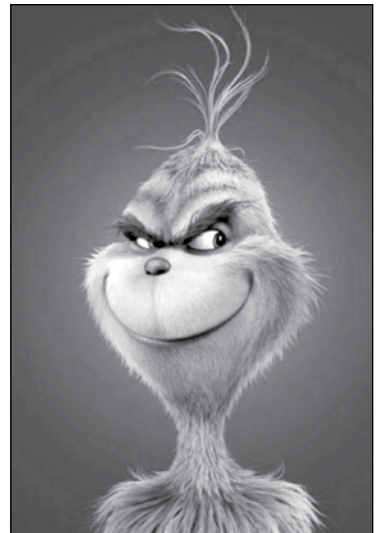
