From the Other Side of the Desk

It's about basketball again. It's about a five-foot tall basketball machine: Hailey Hardaway.

From her freshman year forward, she led her team in scoring. She led them in assists. From time to time, she would lead them in rebounding. And this year especially, she has led them in attention, with the opponents putting two or three defenders on her almost every night.

And even with all that, she scored more than 27 points a game, led the team in assists, steals, and was in the top three in rebounding, leading her team to a second place finish in the district. It was the definition of an MVP season, even if there was no trophy. It seems District 15AA thinks the MVP is only to be found on the first place team. Yeah, whatever.

But this isn't about one great year. It's about 2,000 points. It's about averaging more than 19 points per game for FOUR years.

A few notes: She didn't get her points in "garbage time" or in blowouts. In the nine games decided by 12 points or less this season, she has averaged THIRTY POINTS per game.

She doesn't disappear in losses, averaging 26.2 points. In wins, it's 27.0.

She isn't selfish. Along with leading Bolivar in assists, she has scored 47% of Bolivar's points in 2018-2019, while taking only 38% of the field goal attempts.

It's happened before. But only twice. Two others have scored 2,000 points. Linda McKinnie did it in three years, when the girls played three-onthree half court. And Kendra Williams, who has more points than anyone ever at Bolivar Central, accomplished it in 2011.

When Kendra Williams passed the 2,000 point barrier, I wrote that it probably wouldn't happen again for a long time. I'm glad I was wrong.

Two Thousand Points!!

With a free throw in the second quarter of Bolivar Central's loss in the district championship game to Covington, senior Hailey Hardaway accomplished something only two players had done before: two thousand points.

"If we would have played more games or a tougher schedule, she would have gotten it earlier," said Bolivar Central Head Coach Rick Rudesill.

Bolivar (14-11) has won nine games by more than 20 points over the course of the season.

Hardaway, who has at least one game remaining in her career, has 2,015 points after a 25-point effort continued on A12

Hee Haw to Open Ticket Sales Next Week

Ames Plantation: It's Not Just for the Birds by Bill Stone

March through January the focus at Ames Plantation is local history, archaeology, wildlife biology, cattle, row crops, forestry, and research into unexpected subjects such as ticks. In February, however, virtually all attention is on the National Championship for field trailing bird dogs. Although this event occupies only a fraction of the year, it is by far the best known publicly and, in fact, the most important.

Ames Plantation exists as it is today because of Julia Ames' desire to memorialize her husband, Hobart. She established the Hobart Ames Foundation. Her will directed the Ames Plantation operate under the ownership of the Trustees of the Foundation to benefit the University of Tennessee and to provide grounds and administrative support for the National Championship for field trailing bird dogs.

What is "field trailing"? Simply put, it's "hunting" quail without shooting them. Long time owner, participant, judge, and bird dog enthusiast, Captain Garrette Lockee, USN (retired) describes it as "a step up from hunting". "Participating dogs are true athletes. They have to be in great physical shape since, regardless of weather conditions, they must be physically active and totally focused for three hours," he said.

The long road to the final championship begins months earlier as hopeful owners/handlers enter their candidates in one of many trials sanctioned by the National Field Trial Championship Association. In order to participate at Ames, a dog must win two sanctioned championships during the year. If a dog has previously run in the championship, it may re-qualify by simply placing in one of the sanctioned events.

The final begins by assigning each participating dog to a "brace". A brace is made up of two dogs. They will hunt at the same time but not as a team. They are competitors.

They are simply on the course at the same time and may or may not be in approximately the same place at the same time. Typically there are thirty or more dogs entered each year. For this 120th trial there are 34 participants divided into 17 braces. Each dog will run in only one brace. Each day there is one morning brace and one afternoon brace. Each lasts three hours.

During his life, Hobart Ames set 6,000 acres of the plantation aside as what he called "Hallowed Ground". This acreage was specifically for field trailing and is still used for that purpose today. Each brace of two dogs and their handlers enters the course with their first goal being to find as many coveys of quail as possible in the allotted time. Finding birds is only the first, and probably not the hardest, step in a sequence of require-

When the dog finds birds and comes to point, its handler calls for the judges. They are on horseback and may be a half mile or more away from the dog's location. The dog must hold steady. If it breaks point it has, in all probability, lost the final. Once the three judges are on the scene and have observed the dog's posture and steadiness, the handler is given permission to flush the birds from hiding. The dog must not break point. The handler next simulates a kill by firing a pistol into the air. The dog must not break point. The handler then returns to the dog and finally releases it from point.

During this sequence of events the judges are observing and scoring the dog for posture and steadiness.

Actually the dogs are constantly monitored by the judges throughout the hunt. They are graded on attitude, stamina, eagerness, and even physical appearance as they go about their search for birds. Did the dog demonstrate excellent manners?

There are no number scores in the final. The winner is declared by the judges through agreement with each other. If there is any question, particular dogs may be recalled for another run. There is only one winner. No place. No show. There is a minimum \$20,000 prize to the winner.

Financially the field trials are an asset to Ames Plantation providing income which helps keep the operation self supporting while continuing the wishes set forth by Hobart Ames and later, his wife, Julia.

Ames Plantation. No, it's not just for the birds but the birds make everything else possible. The Ames staff maintains a great web site. It contains information about all aspects of the Ames operation. You may find amesplantation.org to be eye-opening as well as interesting.

Case in point, one hunter walked on foot from where I knew he was at, in seconds, he was lost::: I found him in a nice bed of swamp briars (similar to concertina wire). All swamp hunting has its ups/downs. The turkeys are for the most part:::: MEAN!! Just the way I like em::: as always:::: SAFETY FIRST:::: HOOT



Mexican Chicken Soup

Ingredients:

1 1/2 lbs. raw boneless skinless chicken breasts, halved

1/8 tsp. black pepper 1/2 tsp. salt

1 cup plust 2 tbsp. chopped cilantro 4 cups reduced-sodium chicken broth

2 cups chopped tomatoes 2 cups chopped carrots

2 cups chopped onion

1 cup chopped celery

1/4 cup seeded and chopped jalapeño pepper (about 1 pepper's worth)

2 tsp. chopped garlic 1 tsp. chili powder

1 tsp. cumin

1/2 cup plus 2 tbsp. fat-free plain Greek yogurt or sour cream 5 oz. (about 3/4 cup) chopped avocado (about 1 medium avocado's worth) Optional garnish: lime wedges

Directions:

Place chicken in a slow cooker, and season with pepper and 1/4 tsp. salt. Top with 1/2 cup cilantro. Add all remaining ingredients except yogurt, avocado, and remaining cilantro. Stir well.

Cover and cook on high for 3 - 4 hours or on low for 7 - 8 hours, until chicken is fully cooked. Transfer chicken to a large bowl. Shred with two forks -- one to hold the chicken in place and the other to scrape across and shred it. Return shredded chicken to the slow cooker, and mix well.

Top each serving with 1 tbsp. cilantro, 1 tbsp. yogurt or sour cream, and 1/2 oz. (about 2 tbsp.) avocado.

Makes 10 one cup servings.



Fixing the Heart: Sermon on the Mount-Part 5 by Jeff Capshaw

In prior articles, I discussed how the Sermon on the Mount is organized, for whom it is intended and its purposes. I also emphasized the importance of how Jesus read and applied the Scriptures of his day: the Old Testament.

Beginning with Matthew 5:21, the sermon turns to several connected teachings. In past articles, I referred to these as "simple-Jesus-stuff." prohibits a deep dive into any of them; however, in today's and coming articles, I will briefly comment on selected ones.

The sermon's topics serve as poignant reminders that our personal problems start with the innermost aspect of our being: the heart. At their root, behavioral problems are mere symptoms of deeper maladies. Jesus knows that, so he wants our hearts to be in line with Scripture. Yet, just knowing what Jesus taught isn't enough; Christians need divine grace to follow them, because Jesus' ethics demand right actions from a right heart.

Consider his first topic: anger toward a brother. Jesus equates deep hostility toward another with murder. This is a striking comparison, but according to Jesus, both make one equally "liable to judgment" (5:21). From a human perspective, the consequences of capital murder certainly are greater than an attitude of anger.

Yet, capital murder stems from festered, "heart anger." That is the crux of the problem. The solution here, as in the rest of the sermon, is to get at the "heart of the matter." Thus, right thinking in accordance with Scripture will produce a right heart which, in turn, will deter wrong behavior.

Recognizing and repenting of sinful thinking and attitudes is the first step toward righteousness, the kind which exceeds the external

showmanship of the Scribes and Pharisees (5:20). Fixing the heart problem is urgent. So much so that Jesus said, ". . . if you are offering your gift at the altar and there remember that your brother has something against you, leave your gift there before the altar and go. First be reconciled to your brother, and then come and offer your gift" (5:23-24).


Taking the initiative to reconcile with a another who "has something against you" requires humility and grace. That demonstrates a heart which is not angry, a heart not "liable to judgment" and a heart certainly not capable of murder. Let's allow God's grace and the Gospel to work fix our hearts.

It is generally believed that children as well as adults mourn consistent with their personality, cognitive and emotional development, their relation to whom or what they lost, the value they placed on their loss and their life experiences that has brought them to this time in their life. An interesting characteristic is children often will mimic what they observe in their guardian. Is the adult in their life comfortable in expressing grief before their children? Children do notice if parents or guardians isolate themselves from expressing and sharing with their children when they are hurting. When they do not share with their children then their children learn to bury their expression of their grief as well.

Sometimes young people experience a traumatic event in their life in a first hand eye witness fashion that potentially could scar them for a lifetime. This of course depends upon whether they have been prepared for the common life experience that touches us all, traumatic loss. Then when sorrow comes they may use anger to cover their helplessness in coping with their emotions. Denial also may be used as a coping mechanism if they feel their emotions are getting out of control then they could lead to depression. Thus, they will need guidance and support from wise adults around them.

Communicate with them in clear, honest, realistic, straightforward language they can understand and do not hide your own sorrow as you would naturally express it. They in turn will learn to freely and comfortably express their own grief and guide and share the journey with others. Repeated question are for reassurance not for factual information. Do not hide anything from them, but include them.

I have heard several conversations recently about modern day medical procedures compared to the "old wives' tales" that was the only medical care that many in my generation experienced. Following are a few of those tales that I experienced as a child. My generation spent more time outdoors than we did indoors, so unlike today's children. When we were stung by a red wasp, our grandmother always put some snuff from her mouth on the sting. It did seem to decrease the pain. Summer time caught a lot of children bare foot so, of course, we occasionally stepped on a rusty nail. Roger Hatch remembered that his mother would set a wool sock on fire and he had to hold his foot over the smoke. When a child had a sore throat or congestion, most mothers would rub Vick's salve on their throat and chest and place a warm wool cloth over the salve. For earaches, we received a drop of warm clove oil in our ear. A lot of households kept a supply of whiskey to be mixed with honey so it could be used to combat a cold or a bad cough. Others mentioned that castor oil was a good remedy for constipation. Roger mentioned his mother dug blackberry vine roots and boiled the roots and then strained the solution for a remedy for diarrhea. Boiling willow tree bark was a good medicine for headaches. Clove oil rubbed on the gum seemed to be a good solution to ease a toothache. Hog lard was known to stop a deep wound from bleeding. With the inflated cost of prescription drugs and the danger of many side effects, today many are turning to essential oils to treat medical problems. Joe Stack shared many positive results of the essential oils he uses. He stated that there are no side effects of oils when used according to direction. He and his wife, Trudy, have been able to eliminate many high-priced drugs because of their success with oils. "Of course, some oils will not work the same way for everyone", he said. He uses a blend of thieves, clove, and cinnamon for head colds, congestion, stuffed up nose, and headaches. Lavender oil helps them to sleep better. Frankincense is good for skin problems. Wintergreen oil has alleviated a lot of the pain he was experiencing. He feels much better knowing that with the oils he doesn't have to suffer the side effects of pain medication. With all the talk of the essential oils, it does seem that people are finding good solutions just as our parents did.





Market Outlook for 2019: Uncertainty is Certain

To say the financial markets were a bit bumpy in 2018 may be an understatement. The S&P 500 was down 6.2 percent for the year, the first time this key index fell since 2008, during the financial crisis. So what can you anticipate in 2019? And what investment moves should

Let's review the causes for last year's market volatility. Generally speaking, uncertainty was a major culprit. Uncertainty about tariffs, uncertainty about the continued trade dispute with China, uncertainty about Brexit - they all combined to make the markets nervous. Furthermore, the Federal Reserve raised interest rates four times, and even though rates remain low by historical standards, the increases caused some concern, as higher borrowing costs can eventually crimp the growth prospects for businesses.

And now that we're into 2019, these same uncertainties remain, so markets are likely to remain volatile. Although the Fed has indicated it may be more cautious with regard to new rate hikes, there are indications of slower growth ahead, particularly in China, the world's second-largest economy. And after strong 2018 earnings growth, helped by the corporate tax cuts, corporate earnings may grow more slowly – and, as always, earnings are a key driver of stock prices.

Nonetheless, the U.S. economy is showing enough strength that a recession does not appear to be on the horizon, which is also likely to be the case globally - and that should be good news, because an extended "bear" market typically does need to be fueled by a recession. Ultimately, the projected continued growth of the U.S. economy and the possible resolution of some uncertainties could help markets

As investors, we cannot control the everyday ups and downs in the markets, but we can control our decisions, look for opportunities and keep a long-term perspective within our investment portfolios. Consider these actions for 2019:

Be prepared for volatility. As mentioned, many of the same factors that led to the market upheavals of 2018 are still with us, along with the impact of the partial government shutdown – so don't be surprised to see continued volatility. The more you're prepared for market turbulence, the less startled you'll be when it arrives.

Stay diversified. At any given time, different financial assets may move in different directions: stocks up, bonds down, or vice versa. To help dilute risk and take advantage of different opportunities, you should maintain a broadly diversified portfolio containing stocks, international stocks, bonds, government securities and so on. TORNADOES

Tornadoes can destroy buildings, flip cars, and create deadly flying debris. Tornadoes are violently rotating columns of air that extend from a thunderstorm to the ground. Tornadoes can:

- Happen anytime and anywhere;
- Bring intense winds, over 200 MPH; and
- · Look like funnels.

IF YOU ARE UNDER A TORNADO WARNING, FIND SAFE SHELTER RIGHT AWAY

- If you can safely get to a sturdy building, then do so immediately.
- Go to a safe room, basement, or storm cellar.
- If you are in a building with no basement, then get to a small interior room on the
- Stay away from windows, doors, and outside walls. • Do not get under an overpass or bridge. You're safer in a low, flat location.
- Watch out for flying debris that can cause injury or death.
- Use your arms to protect your head and neck. HOW TO STAY SAFE WHEN A TORNADO THREATENS

Prepare NOW

- Know your area's tornado risk. In the U.S., the Midwest and the Southeast have a greater risk for tornadoes.
- Know the signs of a tornado, including a rotating, funnel-shaped cloud; an approaching cloud of debris; or a loud roar—similar to a freight train.
- Sign up for your community's warning system. The Emergency Alert System (EAS) and National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) Weather Radio also provide emergency alerts. If your community has sirens, then become familiar with the warning tone.
- Pay attention to weather reports. Meteorologists can predict when conditions might be right for a tornado.
- Identify and practice going to a safe shelter in the event of high winds, such as a safe room built using FEMA criteria or a storm shelter built to ICC 500 standards. The next best protection is a small, interior, windowless room on the lowest level of a sturdy building.
- Consider constructing your own safe room that meets FEMA or ICC 500 standards.

Survive DURING

- Immediately go to a safe location that you identified.
- Take additional cover by shielding your head and neck with your arms and putting materials such as furniture and blankets around you.
- · Listen to EAS, NOAA Weather Radio, or local alerting systems for current emergency information and instructions.
- Do not try to outrun a tornado in a vehicle.
- If you are in a car or outdoors and cannot get to a building, cover your head and neck with your arms and cover your body with a coat or blanket, if possible.

Be Safe AFTER

- Keep listening to EAS, NOAA Weather Radio, and local authorities for updated
- If you are trapped, cover your mouth with a cloth or mask to avoid breathing dust. Try to send a text, bang on a pipe or wall, or use a whistle instead of shouting.
- Stay clear of fallen power lines or broken utility lines.
- Do not enter damaged buildings until you are told that they are safe. Save your phone calls for emergencies. Phone systems are often down or busy after
- a disaster. Use text messaging or social media to communicate with family and
- Be careful during clean-up. Wear thick-soled shoes, long pants, and work gloves.




