Voters in Hardeman County will have three mayoral candidates and three sheriff candidates to choose from in the General Election in August as the deadline to vie for public office in the county passed with 21 incumbents hoping to keep their offices.

Running for mayor is incumbent Mayor Jimmy Sain, who will run as a democrat against republican Calvin Howell and independent candidate Kandy Shackelford. Howell ran for mayor in 2006, finishing second in a three-way race that was won by Willie Spencer.



Cash Flows into Bolivar Sewers



The City of Bolivar will receive \$389,197 for Sewer System Improvements through Community Development Block Grant (CBDG) funds administered by the Tennessee Department of Economic and Community Development (ECD). The Bolivar community received a check presented by ECD Commissioner Bob Rolfe and Deputy Governor Jim Henry.

"This grant is a great investment into the City of Bolivar and will strengthen the community by improving its infrastructure," said Senator Dolores Gresham. "Though improvements to our sewer system are not the most exciting projects, it is crucial for community health and safety. I appreciate the work of local officials in Bolivar to secure this grant."

The grant will be used to improve sewer service through the rehabilitation of a sewer lift station, manholes, and sewer lines.

"With the assistance of the CDBG funds, each grantee is taking the initiative to enhance their community, which will in turn create more economic development opportunities for the members of those communi-


Baker Announces Candidacy

Last week I received notification from Nashville that I have met all the requirements needed to run for the office of Sheriff. I have spent nearly 30 years of my life serving the citizens of Hardeman County. I began my career in 1989 when Sheriff Delphus Hicks offered me a position on his team. I continued my career when I was hired at the Bolivar Police Department. In 2011, I was promoted to chief of police and hold that position today. My accomplishments as an officer, investigator, assistant chief and chief are well documented. During my tenure as chief, crime in Bolivar has been reduced by 30 percent. My department's crime solve rate is one of the highest in the state. Through aggressive traffic enforcement my department has placed over \$2 million into the city's general fund. Due to recent tragedies involving police officers such as the Ferguson incident, body cameras are issued to every officer in my department. This has instilled trust within

Fire Department Adds Services, Changes Name

Bolivar Fire Department Chief Lynn Price and Mayor Julian A. McTizic, Sr., announced today that the Bolivar Fire Department would begin providing rescue and extrication services within the city limits of Bolivar. As such, the name of the department will officially be re-titled to Bolivar Fire and Rescue.

According to Chief Price, the department has been working closely with the Hardeman County Rescue Squad to obtain the necessary training, certifications, and equipment to provide this service which has been in the works for over 16 months. "The Hardeman County Rescue Squad has been invaluable to us as we have worked toward the addition of rescue services. They provided many hours of classroom and hands-on training to our personnel to ensure that we were certified to perform basic and advanced extrication operations, said Chief Price. The Hardeman County Rescue Squad is a topnotch organization that has provided a tremendous amount of support to us, and we simply can not thank them enough."

Chief Price added that the equipment received to provide extrication services includes tools donated by a private individual and the Bolivar Police Department's



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LESO program, with minimal purchase and start-up costs. With the donation from the Bolivar Police Department, we were finally able to make this service a reality for the citizens of Bolivar. In addition, Bolivar Salvage and Statewide Towing also provided assistance through the provision of supplies and services during the training.

Chief Price reiterated that the addition of rescue services for the department applies to the geographical city limits of Bolivar. The Hardeman County Rescue Squad will still be the responsible jurisdiction for rescue services in Hardeman County. We continue to have a very close relationship with the rescue squad and other neighboring departments and stand ready to assist each other in every way possible. The organizations will continue to provide mutual aid assistance to each other as necessary.

"Last, but not least, I would like to thank my staff and volunteers. They have attended many hours of training to become certified and will have to maintain their certification through continuing education in the years to come. They have been completely supportive in this endeavor and strive to provide an exceptional level of service to the community," said Chief Price.



To know what a man aspires to be, look at his reading material. If you want to know his heart and passions, listen to his music. If those two are too much at odds, then listening to him speak is of little consequence. The self-defended conscience is a mortal enemy to wholeness. Songs reach deep into our memories, flood through our entire being as we are often enraptured in their spell. I think it is crucial to align our goals and our heart's longings. The synergy between what I long for and what I crave will make or break my faith.

These thoughts typically come to me during weddings. I've weathered many wedding days as a photographer. Some of those, I also officiated. I realize that is nearly impossible, but you do that for family! I've only left a few wedding receptions in the same spirit that existed during the ceremony. It seems we often go from celebrating a holy, consecrated, innocent union to a celebration of hedonism. People who were praying for the union are later gyrating to whatever the DJ drops, and it's often shocking. Now, before you label me a prude, try to let go of that defensiveness we all throw up when it comes to socializing.

For a moment, think about the picture of Christ and the Church being played out in the details of the ceremony. Recall the sacred joy in the celebration and the solemn sincerity of the vow. How is that best celebrated? Dancing, yes. It's a gift I think God gave us in the same box as music. But what are we dancing to? What have we resorted to celebrating just an hour or so after this beautiful ceremony of lifelong promise?

understand I am in a Ι magnificent minority on this. I am glad you get to celebrate with old friends to music that takes you back. I honestly do leave in sadness, though, sometimes having to stop the photography because the bride asks me to stop because she is drunk. This literally happened once.

The real tragedy is when this happens on a weekly basis. When we celebrate the sacredness of worship, of communion, or even confession. We open our hearts wide for what God has done and is doing, for an hour or two. The rest of the week is our reception. We welcome every influence that has held us from childhood and are clueless to how it ends. We get drunk on ambition, greed, lust and anger. We look like something very different from Sunday morning worshipers humbled by the grace of an almighty God.

"These people honor me with their lips, but their hearts are far from me" (Matthew 15:8, NIV).

I'm not asking you to stand up on a stool at receptions with a megaphone, yelling "repent!" I'm not trying to make you feel guilty either. I am exhorting myself as much as anyone. Let's just step up to the beautiful path God has created for us, every single day. Let's all be a bit more mindful in those times of celebration. Let's make our goal to celebrate the people in our lives as opportunities for God to move in us and also in them.

As we conclude our study of God's silence, let us never forget the words of those in the past who saw modern innovations coming into vogue among digressive churches. Most notable would be N.B. Hardeman, who said,

"Again I say to you, with caution and thought, that it is not the work of the church to furnish entertainment for the members. And yet many churches have drifted into such effort. They enlarge their basements, put in all kinds of gymnastic apparatus, and make every sort of an appeal to the young people of the congregation. I have never read anything in the Bible that indicated to me such was a part of the work of the church. I am wholly ignorant of any Scripture that even points in that direction."

(Hardeman's Tabernacle Sermons, Volume V, N. B. Hardeman, Page 50)

"For the church to turn aside from its divine work to furnish amusement and recreation is to pervert its mission. Amusement and recreation should stem from the home rather than the church. The church, like Nehemiah, has a great work to do; and it should not "come down on the plains of Ono" to amuse and entertain. As the church turns its attention to amusement and recreation IT WILL BE SHORN OF ITS POWER AS SAMSON WAS WHEN HIS HAIR WAS CUT. Only as the church becomes worldly, as it pillows its head on the lap of Delilah will it want to turn from its wonted course to relatively unimportant matters."

Silerton Mary Lynn Lambert 609-6455

Jimmy Garrett forwarded a memory to share in response to the recent article about Catherine Siler. He writes, "When I was Pastor in Silerton from 1986-1990, Miss Catherine Siler lived in a small house not far from the church. She was a sweet and very kind lady. She never learned to drive. She lived very simply on a fixed income. She did not hold any office in the church. But Miss Catherine changed her

young pastor's life. When it came time for the annual Lottie Moon Christmas offering for missions that first year she gave \$500. I was amazed at the sacrifice and generosity of her gift. I immediately tore up my \$25 check and increased my gift. Every year for more than 30 years when the Lottie Moon offering rolls around, I always remember Miss Catherine."

Gilbert Lee and Frances Stack traveled last week through Kentucky and Indiana, stopping at a few historic sites. First stop was the Shaker Museum near Auburn, KY. This neat authentic village was established by the Shakers in 1807 and closed in 1922. It is filled with original artifacts exemplifying the Shakers' craftsmanship and unique way of life. They spent some time at Abraham Lincoln's boyhood home at Knob Creek, near Hodgenville, KY. They commented that it was a nicely restored historic place with well-maintained buildings. 

Good Advice You Don't Want: Tennessee Saves Week

There are those people among us-the ones who have the discipline and presence of mind to make detailed plans and document their day-to day financial activities with precision. You may know one or two, and if you happen to have one in your household, that person may know-to the penny-what you spent last month on gas, food, and groceries.

Then there are the others. They struggle to find either the time or the wherewithal to get a spending plan down on paper, much less track their monthly spending to make a comparison. If you are one of those persons-and many of us are-all is not lost. According to Dr. Dena Wise, Consumer Economics Specialist with The University of Tennessee Extension, you can still keep a grip on your finances if you crunch some numbers initially, and keep some basic information in your head. There are two basic steps to simple budgeting:

Step 1 - Calculate your bottom line. First of all, you should determine the minimum amount you need to

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get by every month. This number is the approximate total of your usual monthly cost for housing, transportation, dependent care, food prepared at home, out-of-pocket health care, paying down debt, charitable or church commitments, and contributions to emergency and long-term savings. Subtract this number from your monthly take-home pay. You don't have to make decisions about how you will spend this amount--consider it gone when you get your paycheck. The amount you really have to make choices about is what is left from your monthly take-home pay after you've subtracted what it takes to live on. Experts call it your "discretionary income."

Step 2 - Allocate your discretionary income. You can be flexible with your discretionary income. It's available for extra expenses such as eating out, entertainment, clothes or household purchases; for extra saving or investing; or for extra giving. In fact, allocating this amount to weekly or monthly cash makes it easy to tell when you are reaching the limit of your discretionary spending.

Wise says that the system is simple and flexible, while requiring minimal time for writing a monthly spending plan and recording spending. But, she says, you do need to be aware of some issues that might arise. You need to give extra thought to being prepared to handle expenses that are necessary, but that don't occur on a monthly basis. Examples of these periodic expenses are car insurance, auto maintenance, school expenses, and holiday spending. Wise recommends estimating the yearly cost of all these expenses and stashing a monthly contribution toward covering them into your emergency or regular savings.

The other risk of using the system, according to Wise, is that if you have enough income to provide a large amount of discretionary spending, you may be tempted to live lavishly rather than stashing it away for your financial future. "Particularly when you are young and your investments have potential to grow over a number of years, it's always wise to spend frugally," Wise says. "Early savings can pave the way to a lifetime of financial stability and a secure retirement."

Is a Managed Account Right for You?

As an investor, you'll face many decisions over the years. How much should you invest? Where should you put your money? When is it time to sell some investments and use the proceeds to buy others? Some people enjoy making these choices themselves - but not everyone. Consequently, the type of investor you are will influence your thinking about whether to open a managed account.

As its name suggests, a managed account - sometimes known as an "advisory" account - essentially is a portfolio of stocks, bonds and other investments chosen by a professional investment manager who makes the buy and sell decisions. Typically, each managed account has an investment objective based on your goals, and you may have some voice in investment choices - for example, you may be able to request that the manager avoid certain investments. Or, you might still work with a personal financial advisor who can help you identify and quantify your goals, define your risk tolerance, and track changes in your family situation - and who can then use this information to help guide the investment manager's choices.

Beyond this basic structure, managed accounts can vary greatly in terms of administration, reporting, fees and minimum balance.

So, assuming you meet the requirements for a managed account, should you consider one? There's really no one right answer for everyone. But three factors to consider are cost, control and confidence.

Cost - Different managed accounts may have different payment arrangements. However, it's common for a money manger to be paid based on a percentage of assets under management. So, if your manager's fee is 1% and your portfolio contains \$100,000, the manager earns \$1,000 per year, but if the value of your portfolio rises to \$200,000, the manager earns \$2,000. Because the manager has a personal stake in the portfolio's success, this arrangement could work to your advantage. Be aware, though, that other fees may be associated with your account.

Control - With any managed account, you will give up some, or perhaps all, of your power to make buy-and-sell decisions. If you have built a large portfolio, and you're busy with work and family, you may like the idea of delegating these decisions. And, as mentioned above, you can still oversee the "big picture" by either working through a financial advisor or, at the least, having your goals, risk tolerance and investment preferences dictate a money manager's decisions. But you will have to decide for yourself how comfortable you are in ceding control of your portfolio's day-to-day transactions.

Confidence - It's essential that you feel confident in a managed account's ability to help you meet your goals. And the various elements of a managed account may well give you that assurance. For example, some managed accounts include automatic rebalancing of assets, which, among other things, can help you achieve tax efficiency. Other features of a managed account - such as the experience and track record of the manager - also may bolster your confidence.

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

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



Every February, Americans celebrate National African American History Month. African Americans have made many notable contributions to the United States over the years, and those achievements are a focal point of celebrations throughout the month of February.

Despite the many contributions of African Americans, black history was largely overlooked until the 20th century. National African American History Month, once known as Black History Month, is the result of an idea from noted historian Carter G. Woodson and other prominent African Americans.


While the concept of a time devoted to honoring African American history evolved as early as the mid-19th century, when the 13th Amendment abolished slavery in the United States, more formal celebrations started as "Negro History Week" during the 1960s civil rights movement. Such celebrations ultimately grew and became more widely recognized.

February was chosen to be the month to commemorate African American history because it already featured the birthdays of Abraham Lincoln and Frederick Douglass, two individuals instrumental in furthering the antislavery movement. In 1976, President Gerald R. Ford officially recognized Black History Month, calling on the public to "seize the opportunity to honor the too-often neglected accomplishments of black Americans in every area of endeavor throughout our history."

OUR SCHOOLS

Hardeman County Remembered by Lisa Coleman

Schools and teachers have been on our minds and in our hearts over the past week. Whether you are educated in a big school or a small one, somewhere in life a teacher or two has made an impact on your life that has never been forgotten. Teachers and schools are often intertwined in the history of a community and its people; Hardeman County is no exception.

Schools were some of the first things to be built in our county. Many one and two-room schools could be found in all parts of our county for many years. Teachers would board with either one or several families for a school term, which could be as short as several weeks or as long as several months. In some of the towns, there were either church-sponsored or locally organized academies, usually separated into male and female schools. Laws passed in Tennessee in 1891 caused a decline in the academies, as public schools were organized. The Bolivar Central Class of 1919 was the first group of students to attend school from start to finish in a public school setting.

This week's photo is one of those teachers from the late 1800's/early 1900's who taught in some of the last of the old-style schools. Miss Fannie Norment was one of the county's early teachers. While teaching schools for several terms in Hickory Valley, she boarded with the David W. McAnulty family. Miss Norment helped nurse area children who had typhoid fever in the winter of 1889. She later taught at Black's Academy near Bolivar as well as in several other county schools.

I remember some of the great teachers and educators who helped me to learn and provided a positive school experience. Mrs. Hurd and Mrs. Searles were great in kindergarten; and Mrs. Reynolds was, I will always believe, one of the world's greatest first grade teachers. My second grade teacher, Miss Heischman got a bunch of second graders involved and interested in history (we restaged the Nixon-McGovern debate 2nd grade style); and she was so cool that she brought her guitar to school some days to sing and play when the weather was too bad to play outside. She made



studying history so exciting and planted a seed for learning and history in me that continues today. Others like Mrs. Stevens (who encouraged reading), Mrs. Leitschuh (who helped me have better penmanship), Mrs. Randall (who always had kind, encouraging words), Mrs. Clifft (I use those office skills every day), Mrs. Owens (who was patient with someone for whom math did not come easily), Mrs. Powell (who encouraged my writing), and Mrs. Browder (who always let me check out all the books I wanted from the library) had a profound and lasting effect on me, for which I am most eternally, humbly grateful.

So if you see someone this week who is in some way educating our children and youth, tell them thank you. If you see a teacher who taught you, give him or her a hug and tell them thank you. Or, if you happen to have a column in the paper, use it to say a big thank you to people who always encouraged (and still do) the nerdy girl who loved history and loved learning and school (and still does).

Thanks, all you educators for your influences that reach far beyond the classroom, wherever that happens to be. We all know that you are heroes in our lives and in the lives of your students and we are better people for having come under your tutelage.

TNReconnect.gov;

• Apply to a local community college or eligible Tennessee Reconnect institution;

• File the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) at http://FAFSA.ed.gov; and

• Enroll in a degree or certificate program at least part-time.

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
