Chief Jones is no stranger to the police department or to the citizens of Bolivar. He has been an active member of the Bolivar Police Department for 28 years. Chief Jones has served the citizens of Bolivar in several positions for the department including canine officer, drug investigator, patrolman, sergeant, lieutenant, and has served the last 10 years as a captain. He has worked corroboratively on investigations with the Tennessee Bureau of Investigation,

Packed House for TWRA Meeting continued from A1



Hunting enthusiasts from all over the region attended the meeting, filling the gymnasium at Bolivar Middle School to capacity. TWRA officials accommodated them with in-depth presentations that informed about such topics as which species are considered infectious to CWD as well as those which are not, and that there is no known treatment for animals infected with CWD. In addition, they also explained how symptoms of CWD can be observed in the appearance and behavior of the deer, yet they also noted that some symptoms can be attributed to other diseases as well. This, according to TWRA officials, is why it is crucial to have the deer samples tested.

Each of the TWRA officials that presented were adamant in letting the concerned hunters know that they feel the same anxieties as the hunters and told them: "We are all in this together." According to the data presented in the meeting, there have been 24 deer that have tested positive, so far, in Hardeman and Fayette Counties. According to Jenifer Wisniewski, Chief of Communication and Outreach, the TWRA has the hunters to thank for their cooperation and contribution to the data collected. The Will of God: Part 1 by Jeff Capshaw

Some scholars suggest the debate over free will is as old as the early forerunners of Western Philosophy (e.g. Plato and Aristotle, circa 4th Century BC). Moreover, a long history of the debate between free will and determinism begins as a significant theological debate most famously with St. Augustine (354-430 AD).

Philosophers and theologians still haggle over whether our choices are entirely free or entirely determined (by God, genetics, laws of nature, evolutionary processes, etc). Another position suggests that

free will and determinism are somehow compatible with one another. Compatibilists believe that free will and determinism are mutually compatible and that it is possible to believe in both without being logically

What is not debatable, however, is whether God has His own free will. Certainly, on the Orthodox, Christian view, God does have free will. What is hard for us to grapple with is God's absolute sovereignty over his creation, including us humans. According to John Piper, "God forbids some of the things he brings about. And he commands some of the things he hinders. Or to put it most paradoxically: God wills some events in one sense that he does not will in another sense." That aside, what, therefore, are some things we KNOW that God wills?

Years ago, I discovered a simple book written by Pastor John MacArthur, Found: God's Will. I believe it was either a sermon or series of sermons he preached at his church. In that book, he explains the handful of times the Testament says, "X is God's will." For example, God wills the salvation of mankind (1 Timothy 2:4). God wants believers to be set-apart from sin (1 Thessalonians 4:3), Spirit-filled (Ephesians 5:18), submitted to human authorities (1 Peter 2:13) and, finally, giving thanks (1 Thessalonians 5:18).

Most every Bible believing Christian can understand and affirm these five scriptural propositions, though surely there is disagreement on what these mean and look like for Christians. These five texts alone are worth careful reflection and serious adherence. Yet, there are many situations in life where the will of God is not spelled-out so clearly in the Bible. What do we do then?

How shall we determine the answers to questions like: whom should I marry? Were should I live? What career track should I take, or should I make a major purchase of a house, a car and so forth? Does scripture have any guidance for believers in these "gray areas" of decision making and the will of God? I think so. Stay tuned for part two.

Sunrise: Love & Support by David Coy

William Shakespeare said, "Everyone can master a grief, but he that hath it." It truly is not about trying to master our grief no more than we can run away from our sorrows by changing our location. Changes can be healthy when they are productive and purposeful. They can also be harmful when executed for the wrong reasons. That is why it is usually advised to wait a year at least before making any major changes, yet this is also just a general rule of thumb, not a concrete law to be followed absolutely. There are principles that make one's journey easier when implemented.

Geese are amazing creatures. As each goose flaps its wings it creates an "uplift" for the birds that follow. By flying in a "V" formation, the whole flock adds 71% greater flying range than if each bird flew alone. When a goose falls out of formation, it suddenly feels the drag and resistance of flying alone. It quickly moves back into formation to take advantage of the lifting power of the bird immediately in front of it. When the lead goose tires, it rotates back into the formation and another goose flies to the point position. The geese flying in formation honk to encourage those up front to keep up their speed. When a goose gets sick, wounded, or shot down, two geese drop out of formation and follow it down to help and protect it. They stay with it until it dies or is able to fly again. Then, they launch out with another formation or catch up with the flock.

Roth vs. Traditional 401(k): Which Is Right for You?

For many years, employees of companies that offered 401(k) plans only faced a couple of key decisions - how much to contribute and how to allocate their dollars among the various investment options in their plan. But in recent years, a third choice has emerged: the traditional versus Roth 401(k). Which is right for you?

To begin with, you need to understand the key difference between the two types of 401(k) plans. When you invest in a traditional 401(k), you put in pre-tax dollars, so the more you contribute, the lower your taxable income. Your contributions and earnings grow tax-deferred until you begin taking withdrawals, which will be taxed at your ordinary tax rate. With a Roth 401(k), the situation is essentially reversed. You contribute after-tax dollars, so you won't lower your taxable income, but withdrawals of contributions and earnings are tax-free at age 59-1/2, as long as you've held the account at least

So, now that you've got the basics of the two types of 401(k) plans, which should you choose? There's no one right answer for everyone. You essentially need to ask yourself these questions: When do you want to pay taxes? And what will your tax rate be in the future?

If you're just starting out in your career, and you're in a relatively low income tax bracket, but you think you might be in a higher one when you retire, you might want to consider the Roth 401(k). You'll be paying taxes now on the money you earn and contribute to your Roth account, but you'll avoid being taxed at the higher rate when you start taking withdrawals. Conversely, if you think your tax rate will be lower when you retire, you might be more inclined to go with the traditional 401(k), which allows you to avoid paying taxes on your contributions now, when your tax rate is high.

Of course, you can see the obvious problem with these choices – specifically, how can you know with any certainty if your tax bracket will be lower or higher when you retire? Many people automatically assume that once they stop working, their tax liabilities will drop, but that's not always the case. Given their sources of retirement income from investment accounts and Social Security, many people ee no drop in their tax bracket once they retire.

Since you can't see into the future, your best move might be to split the difference, so to speak. Although not all businesses offer the Roth 401(k) option, many of those that do will allow employees to divide their contributions between the Roth and traditional accounts. If you chose this route, you could enjoy the benefits of both, but you still can't exceed the total annual 401(k) contribution limit, which for 2019 is \$19,000, or \$25,000 if you're 50 or older.

You may want to consult with your tax advisor before making any decisions about a Roth or traditional 401(k) - or Roth and traditional 401(k) – but in the final analysis, these are positive choices to make, because a 401(k), in whatever form, is a great way to save for retirement. Try to take full advantage of it.




