Robertson, adding that voting in the Democratic Primary three of the last five chances was the baseline requirement. Robertson then said anyone that might not fit that criteria would have a chance to address the panel.

Incumbent County Commissioner Mike Madden, who ran as a Democrat in 2014, said he has been registered as a democrat since his return from Vietnam.

"If we go three out of five, I don't think I pass that. But if you go the last thirty years, I've probably got a 15-3 democratic vote. County government is doing great right now and I want to stay there," said Madden who added he voted against Marsha Blackburn and Lamar Alexander each time he had the chance. Madden also said he has never voted against a local democrat.

Madden's voting record shows him voting in three Republican Primaries and two Democratic Primaries in his last five opportunities.

Hardeman County Chief Deputy Sheriff Billy Davis, who has pulled a petition to run for the position of Circuit Court Clerk, said that he usually just votes in the General Election without declaring a party affiliation due to his position at the Sheriff's Department, led him to believe he should take a bi-partisan approach to politics.

"I've worked for three democratically elected sheriffs (Jeter, Hicks, Doolen) and I have always supported the Democratic Sheriff," said Davis. Hardeman County Sheriff John Doolen and Circuit Court Clerk Linda Fulghum both spoke on Davis' behalf.

According to voting records, Davis did not vote in three of the last five primaries, but voted democrat in the other two.

Hardeman County Highway Department Assistant Superintendent Casey Swift, who pulled a petition to run as a democrat for the position of Highway Superintendent said his decisions were based on the choices continued A14

Hardeman County Remembered by Lisa Coleman

First of all a disclaimer - this week's column is going to be a story about the University of Alabama and Coach Bear Bryant, but please do not think I am becoming a 'Bama fan; my roots still run Tennessee orange. (I have, when Alabama has played someone like Notre Dame or Michigan, cheered for them; those situations are, as Southern writer Lewis Grizzard so eloquently said, "our way of life against theirs").

I learned a love of football from my Mom and she was a great, great fan of the sport. She and my Dad spent a lot of hours watching football and she always enjoyed the college bowl season. She would have loved the college championship this year because she was an Alabama fan; she loved Tennessee, but in later years she became, despite my best efforts, a bona-fide Crimson Tide fan.

Mom and Dad were present for what may have turned the tide (no pun intended) for her becoming an Alabama fan. For many years, Mom and Dad went to the Liberty Bowl in Memphis and sat through every imaginable kind of weather. I have always loved this photo of her at a Liberty Bowl game, probably taken around 1970 or so. They were present at the 1982 Liberty Bowl, which turned out to be the last game that Coach Bryant ever coached. It was a bitterly cold night that only got colder as the game went on. Mom said she knew the cold was bad when Coach Bryant went from his fa-



mous checkered hat, to a ball cap, and finally to a ski mask. That was some serious cold. In the end Alabama defeated the University of Illinois 21-15, so Coach Bryant went out with a win. Retirement was short-lived for Coach Bryant who passed away just a mere four weeks later.

While I never have been an Alabama fan, I always had great respect and admiration for Coach Bryant. He was a one of a kind individual and coach, who lived and loved the game of football. He also happened to have made one

of my all-time favorite television commercials. In the late 1970's, he was asked to do a commercial for South Central Bell. As the story goes, the script was decided on to talk about how important it is to stay in touch with family, but at the end, in typical Bear Bryant fashion, he added the now famous line, "Have you called your momma today? I sure wish I could call mine." Priceless.

Like I said, y'all, Mom loved football, Alabama, and Coach Bryant; and, like him, I sure wish I could call momma.





Slaying Giants by Jimmy Sadler

When I was younger, there were a select few kids who wanted to pick on me. I was "four eyes" to the less creative bullies. I was a shy, extremely quiet kid. The doctor asked my father if I had a developmental disorder, because I didn't say a peep during office visits. I was a prime target, a scrawny kid with an awkward persona. Initially, my brother stepped in to save me. One particular kid got a threat of "no more messing with my brother, or else.'

By fifth grade, I had enough. I left class to go to the restroom, and this kid soon followed. He stopped me in the hallway on the way back to class. "Where you going, punk?" When I tried to pass, he punched me on the shoulder. My face grew red with anger, and for the first time in my life, I punched back. For the next five minutes, we had a gentleman's war of shoulder punches, each one increasing slightly in power.

My teacher came to find us and jumped in the middle. He wanted to know if I wanted the other kid to go to the office, but I declined. That day I somehow earned respect from the giant. sincerity, laughed it off and basically welcomed me to high school. It was the last time I was bullied. This giant was slain by calling his bluff. I rolled around the idea of adding him on Facebook. After about three days of considering, I noticed an obituary for him the day it was posted. I was saddened. I wanted this giant to go out a different way. I believe he had a great heart and I hoped we could reconnect. This giant was ultimately claimed the same way every bully is,

I'm not sure who the giants are in your life, or what way is appropriate for you to overcome them. There are two simple truths I've found along the way. One, to defeat an ongoing threat to someone, you must come to a point of dismissing the consequences of standing your ground. Secondly, you must allow God to be the one to judge. You might just find that the next giant you slay becomes a friend.

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Essentially, if we want to be the church that Jesus built on Pentecost (Acts 2:41-47), we must look to the Bible to see if we have the same organization of the church that you can read about in the scriptures. The Bible clearly teaches us how the church is to be organized with: Elders, Bishops, or Overseers (I Tim. 3:1-7; I Peter 5:1-3), Deacons (I Tim. 3:8-13; Phil. 1:1); Teachers (Eph. 4:11; Acts 13:1); Preacher, Minister, or Evangelist (I Tim. 4:6; II Tim. 4:1-5), and Saints, Believers, Christians, or Disciples (Rom. 1:8; Acts 5:14; Acts 11:26). We have no living Apostles or Prophets (Ephesians 4:11) in the Lord's church today— as their work concluded at the laying of the foundation (Eph. 2:20) and when direct inspiration being "in part" ended (I Cor. 13:9-11). As we know from church history, the first apostasy (falling away- Acts 20:29-30) began with seemingly small changes to how the church is organized. Men began to make distinctions where their should not have been— as the presbyters (elders) recognized one of their number as the "presiding Bishop" with more authority than the rest. Later on, other changes resulting into the formation of foreign terms such as, "Arch-Bishop, Cardinals, and the Pope (606 AD). And after several hundreds of years began the Reformation—where men saw what was practiced was NOT scriptural and attempted to go back to the Bible. But the results were more changes in organization with the establishment of Denominations with their Church Councils, Moderators, Presidents, Youth Ministers, Ministers of Music, Missions Board Directors, Choir Directors, and "One-Man-Pastors." All we would ask is, where is the Bible way of doing things?

In recent years research was published on an increase in violent youth activity, and with each individual

Civil Rights Leader Remembered for Non-Violence

Martin Luther King, Jr., was an American Baptist minister and activist who was a leader in the Civil Rights Movement. He is best known for his role in the advancement of civil rights using nonviolent civil disobedience based on his Christian beliefs.

King became a civil rights activist early in his career. He led the 1955 Montgomery bus boycott and helped found the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC) in 1957, serving as its first president. Dr. King also helped to organize the 1963 March on Washington, where he delivered his famous "I Have a Dream" speech. There, he established his reputation as one of the greatest orators in American history.

In 1968, King was planning a national occupation of Washington, D.C., to be called the Poor People's Campaign, when he was assassinated on April 4 in Memphis, Tennessee.



King was posthumously awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom and the Congressional Gold Medal. Martin Luther King Jr. Day was established as a holiday in numerous cities and states beginning in 1971, and as a U.S. federal holiday in 1986. Hundreds of streets in the U.S. have been renamed in his honor, and a county in Washington State was also renamed for him. The Martin Luther King Jr. Memorial on the National Mall in Washington, D.C., was dedicated in 2011.

The Creation of the Holiday to Celebrate Dr. King



and U.S. Senator Edward Brooke (a Republican from Massachusetts) introduced a bill in Congress to make King's birthday a national holiday. It failed in 1979, but in 1983 it was introduced to congress Indiana House of Representatives member Katie Hall, where President Ronald Reagan signed the holiday into law. It was first observed three years later. At first, some states resisted observing the holiday as such, giving it alternative names or combining it with other holidays. It was officially observed in all 50 states for the first time in 2000, as the state of Utah joined the other 49 states in observance. The last state to


make it a paid holiday for all state employees was South Carolina, also in 2000.

The holiday is observed (in various ways) in Japan, the Netherlands, and the city of

Only two other figures have national holidays in the U.S. honoring them: George Washington and Christopher Columbus. The holiday to honor Washington was first observed in 1879, while Columbus Day was first celebrated as an official holiday in 1937.

With the addition of opioids like Fentanyl and Carfentil, people are dying daily across the state of Tennessee. Fentanyl can be transmitted by inhalation, ingestion, or even absorbed through the skin therefore, just touching the drug can kill someone.

In order to prepare for possible opioid overdoses in the future, the Hardeman County Sherriff's Department took part in training to be able to receive Narcan (the generic name is Naloxone), which is an opioid antagonist for opioid overdoses.

The training was given on behalf of the State Targeted Response (STR) and West Tennessee Healthcare with a grant through the State of Tennessee.

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he had in each year's election. "In 2012, I don't mind explaining to anyone what I voted for, I voted for Delores Gresham. I don't agree with all of her beliefs, but she helped with the Improve Act at the Highway Department, and she helped get the asphalt company in Hardeman County which has helped save the county millions of dollars already. But also in that term, I also voted for Obama. I believe I'm a Democrat, I've always had Democratic views, I believe in the party. I love helping people, I'm glad to help people, I live to help people. You can ask anyone, I've always been a very nice guy. You can call on me and I'm willing to help you do anything I can."

Swift also received support from both Assessor of Property Josh Pulse and current Highway Superintendent David Sipes, who both spoke to his credentials as a democrat.

According to the Hardeman County Election Commission, Swift's voting record shows him voting in three Republican Primaries and two Democratic Primaries in his last five opportunities. The committee also wished to hear from Ocie Wallace, who pulled a pe-

tition to run for county commission, but Wallace was unable to attend due to a family conflict. According to voting records, Wallace has not voted in three of the last five primaries, but voted Democrat in the other two. Wallace failed to vote in the 2014 County Election.


