Can Bolivar Come Over and Play?

With the newly built and opened EMS facility on Lucy Black Road in Bolivar in operation, Hardeman County is waiting on the City of Bolivar to occupy the south end.

At their monthly council meeting on January 14, city council members said that there were many issues that have to be resolved before any vote concerning funding of the building can take place.

A report from The University of Tennessee Municipal Technical Advisory Service, or MTAS, was submitted in December of 2018 that outlined the issues that some council members have with the building as a prospect for a city fire department.

The detailed report, which is 20 pages in length, points out issues with the construction of the building. Some issues include: the lack of a safe room in the building, the lack of floor drains, the durability of the bay floors where fire engines will be parked most of the time,



and the lack of hose connections in the bay. There are more items of concern in the report, as well, and explanations for each of them.

As a step toward resolving the funding issue, the council appointed an ad hoc committee of Melvin Golden, Suzanne Rhea, Page Walley, and Todd Lowe to see to each of the areas of concern found in the report. Due to the experience of Bolivar Fire Chief Lynn Price, the committee has also requested his guidance as they move toward a resolved position.

In 2015, the city council voted to

participate in the project to create a fire station annex in the building which was primarily proposed to create new facilities for the ambulance department. The building was officially opened in December of 2018. Story and research by Paul Steinsultz.



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

Berry Trifle

Ingredients

14-serving-size package instant vanilla pudding mix 2 cups milk 18-ounce package cream cheese, softened 16-ounce container vanilla yogurt 110 3/4-ounce frozen loaf pound cake, thawed and cubed (3/4-inch cubes) 6 cups strawberries, quartered 2 cups blackberries, blueberries and/or raspberries 1 recipe Berry Sauce (below)

Directions

Prepare pudding mix according to package directions using the milk; set aside. In a large mixing bowl beat cream cheese and yogurt with an electric mixer on medium speed until smooth; stir in pudding.

To assemble trifle, in a 2-1/2- to 3-quart glass bowl layer one-third of the cake cubes, one-third of the pudding mixture, and one-third of the strawberries, blackberries and blueberries. Repeat layers twice. Cover and chill 4 to 24 hours. Spoon Berry Sauce onto individual serving plates; top with trifle. Makes 8 to 10 servings.

Berry Sauce

Ingredients

2cups fresh or frozen (thawed) strawberries or raspberries

- 2-3 tablespoons sugar
- 1 tablespoon orange juice (and/or raspberry liqueur, and rum)

Directions

In a blender or food processor combine fresh or frozen (thawed) strawberries or raspberries, sugar, and raspberry liqueur, rum, or orange juice. Cover and blend or process until smooth. If desired, press sauce through a fine-mesh sieve to remove seeds. Cover and chill until serving time or up to 24 hours.

The Will of God: Part 2 by Jeff Capshaw

What God intends for individuals comes within a cluster of more fundamental questions. For example, "Does God exist"? If so, "what is God like"? "Can we know God"? Even people with nominal Christian or quasi-god beliefs seem curious about the Creator's desires for the world and the humans in it.

I introduced the subject of God's will last week. It isn't difficult to understand. M. Erickson's Concise Dictionary of Christian Theology defines it simply as, "God's intentions for humans" (p. 182). Although the definition is simple, knowing what His specific will is for certain, mundane situations may belie and even confuse Christians.

I also shared the main points of Pastor, John McArthur's book, Found: God's Will. He explains the few times where the New Testament explicitly says, "this is the will of God" (e.g. salvation, sanctification, Spiritfilled, submission to authority and thanksgiving).

But how shall we determine the answers to questions like: whom should I date or marry? In what place should I live? What church should I attend? Should I start a business? What job should I take, or should I make a major purchase of a house, a car, and so forth? Does Scripture have any guidance for believers in these and other "gray areas" of decision making and the will of God?

Romans 12:1-2 is instructive. Paul writes,


I appeal to you therefore, brothers, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual worship. Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewal of your mind, that by testing you may discern what is the will of God, what is good and acceptable and perfect (ESV).

Here is the application. (1) If

11:00-12:00 12:30-1:30 a believer has committed his or her life (all of it) to the spiritual worship of the Lord, and (2) if they are not conforming their thinking to the world's thinking, then there is one final step: (3)

ongoing, personal transformation by constantly renewing their minds. I would urge that happens through the spiritual practices of scripture mediation and prayer.

Here is the result: Believers can, in fact, discern (know for sure) what God's will is for their lives in those "gray areas." How so? Because, when a believer in compliance with the above, makes choices, then those choices will be good (right), acceptable (to them and God), and *perfect* (complete) in line with God's will. Try it.





The Creation of the Holiday to Celebrate Dr. King



After King's death, U.S. Representative John Conyers (a Democrat from Michigan) and U.S. Senator Edward Brooke (a Republican from Massachusetts) introduced a bill in Congress to make King's birthday a national holiday. It failed in 1979, but in 1983 it was introduced to congress by the Indiana House of Representatives member Katie Hall, where President Ronald Reagan signed the holiday into law. It was first observed three years later. At first, some states resisted observing the holiday as such, giving it alternative names or combining it with other holidays. It was officially observed in all 50 states for the first time in 2000, as the state of Utah joined the other 49 states in observance. The last state to make it a paid holiday for all state employees was South Carolina, also in 2000.

The holiday is observed (in various ways) in Japan, the Netherlands, and the city of Toronto, Canada.

Only two other figures have national holidays in the U.S. honoring them: George Washington and Christopher Columbus. The holiday to honor Washington was first observed in 1879, while Columbus Day was first celebrated as an official holiday in 1937.



DON CLIFFT APRIL 20, 1943 ~ JANUARY 11, 2019

Mr. Clifft passed away Friday, January 11, 2019, at Bolivar General Hospital.

He was a native and life-long resident of Hardeman County, the son of the late Earnest Roland and Tressie Pauline Hunt Clifft. Don was a 1961 graduate of Bolivar Central High School where he was center on the football team. Mr. Clifft received his bachelor's degree from Lambuth College in 1966 and while at Lambuth was a member of Kappa Sigma fraternity. He also pursued hours toward his master's at Memphis State University.

On November 28, 1975, he married Carla Stafford and they were married 43 years at the time of his death. Mr. Clifft was principal and teacher at Whiteville High School from 1967-70 and principal at Whiteville Elementary School from 1970-86. He was elected Mayor of Hardeman County in 1986 and served three consecutive terms. He was again elected from 2002-06 for a total of 16 years as County Executive.



During his time in public service, Don was instrumental in bringing many improvements to Hardeman County. Things such as a new public library, remodeling of the county courthouse, the Hardeman County Community Health Center, a new county health department (which was named in his honor), and, along with John Wilder, bringing Corrections Corporation of America to the community.

Mr. Clifft served as president of the Tennessee County Services Association and had been chairman of Southwest Human Resources Agency. He also was president of Southwest Developmental District, served on the Quinco Board of Directors and was owner of the Whiteville Farmers Market. For several years, he helped entertain folks as part of the cast of the local "Hee-Haw" show. He had been a member of Bolivar Presbyterian Church serving as elder and clerk of the sessions until 2004. He had presently been attending Bolivar Cumberland Presbyterian Church.
