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Doolen Gets Primary Oppone

Bolivar City Councilman Larry McKinnie picked up petitions from the Hardeman County Election Commission with the intention of running for the democratic nomination for sheriff in Hardeman County against incumbent John Doolen. McKinnie last ran for sheriff in 2010.

The winner of the primary will still have work to do however, as independents Pat Baker and Jerry Siler also picked up petitions to run in the August election.

The most hotly contested race in the county became even more crowded in the past two weeks as Bolivar Fire Chief Lynn Price picked up a petition to run for Circuit Court Clerk as an independent. Price is the sixth potential candidate, joining five others who picked up petitions to run in **Important Dates for 2018 County Election February 15: Qualifying Deadline**

the Democratic Primary: Hardeman County Chief Deputy Sheriff Billy Davis, Tonya L. Perry, Nena K. Moss, Jasmine N. Perry, and Charles Butch Gatlin, Jr.

The six candidates are hoping to replace the retiring Linda Fulghum, who has been the Circuit Court Clerk since 1968.

The race for Hardeman County Mayor has remained a two-candiddate contest with three weeks left in the filing deadline as incumbent Jimmy Sain will face Hardeman County Chamber of Commerce Director Kandy Shackelford in the August General Election. Another contested county office

is for Superintendent of Roads, which has democrats Dale Dixon and Casey Swift facing off. The winner will run against independent Eddie Vandiver.

County departments with only

one candidate at press time were County Clerk Jerry Armstrong, Register of Deeds Lily D. Barnes, and Trustee Mary W. Powell.

Contested races for the county commission include District 2, Position 2, which has three candidates: Donna B. Pinner, Gary W. Barber, and Mauriceo P. Beaure-

The remainder of the contested races for county commission are two-way races in District 5, Position 2 (incumbent Mac Vaughan vs. Ocie Wallace), and District 7, Position 1 (incumbent Bobby Doyle vs. Larry Minter).

"Elise has the knowledge, diligent work ethic and public



Cheesy Mashed Potato Pots

Ingredients

2 pounds red skinned or Yukon gold potatoes, peeled, if desired and cut up

1/2 teaspoon salt 1/8 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper

Milk (optional)

1/2 cup whipping cream 1/3 cup shredded American or cheddar cheese

Directions Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. In a covered large saucepan, cook potatoes in enough boiling water to cover for 15 to 20 minutes or until tender. Drain. Mash with a potato masher or beat with an electric mixer on low speed. Season with the salt and 1/8 teaspoon pepper.

If necessary, add a small amount of milk for desired consistency.

Grease four 10- to 12-ounce individual casseroles or custard cups or a 1- to 1-1/2-quart casserole. Spoon potato mixture into prepared casserole(s). In a chilled medium bowl, beat whipping cream with chilled beaters of an electric mixer on medium speed until soft peaks form (tips curl over); fold in cheese. Spoon cheese mixture over potatoes. Place casserole(s) on a baking sheet. Bake, uncovered, about 20 minutes or until lightly browned and heated through. If desired, sprinkle with additional black pepper. Makes 4 servings.

In addition to his parents, he was preceded in death by his sister, Audrey Lee Watson and his brother, Lawrence Edward Gooch.

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

by Jimmy Sadler Ages and birthdays have never really bothered me. I actually enjoyed turning 40. That birthday was like an odometer reset. Fifty,

however, is different. I understand that something fifty years old can be a classic. I don't want people to look at me like they do an antique and exclaim "Hey, honey, remember this, that's a Jimmy. He doesn't look bad, wonder if he still functions?" I'm way past the automobile age to be antique. It's messed with me a bit, mostly because it marks what I have left more than what is behind me. I don't worry as much about a legacy, those are God's not mine to make. I just wonder how I can make use of this time I have to make the lives of others better, to point them more fully to Jesus. If you are reading this, don't get ticked that I'm talking like fifty is nearing the finish line. My hope here lies in relinquishment. It's just I'm heading into the other fifty yards, moving toward the goal post. It's a time to reflect. You have

moment. I do think about what my absence would mean for my daughters. I have never shied away from showering them with affection. I don't want them to be without one of their coaches and cheerleaders. My peace here comes from relinquishment.

I wish I hadn't worried so long about dying really young. I've stopped worrying about that now. If you have been around more than a few decades, you realize the value of experience. Experience comes only with time. God ascribes value to those years, as we are reminded in Proverbs 16:31 "A gray head is a crown of glory; It is found in the way of righteousness" (NASB). We have an opportunity to grow closer to God. The limber youthfulness gives way to seasoned understanding. If we will relinquish our need to stay young, we can focus our energies on becoming wise. Mitch Albom wrote, "If you're always battling against getting older, you're always going to be unhappy, because it's going to happen anyhow."

I think another concern comes from observing our culture's treatment of older people. We tend to marginalize the older workforce

As we conclude our study on the need for authority in all we do, let us be reminded of what Jeremiah the prophet said to his own brethren, "Thus says the Lord: "Stand in the ways and see, and ask for the old paths, where the good way is, and walk in it; Then you will find rest for your souls...." (Jeremiah 6:16). Whenever Men get away from the Bible way of doing God's will, it is time to go back to the source and start over. That is what men attempted to do in the Reformation and Restoration Periods in our history (1400's—1900's). When the worship and work of the church gets so corrupted and strays far from the Biblical pattern, we need to look back to the early church for our example of what we need to be today.

We say we do all things in Bible ways, but where is the Bible authority Church Kitchens, Fellowship Halls, Gymnasiums, Family Life Centers, TV Rooms, Pool Tables & Air Hockey (game rooms for Youth Ministers), and adding a Starbucks chain in the church building for those who like premium coffee at a premium? "And He found in the temple those who were selling oxen and sheep and doves, and the money changers seated at their tables. And He made a scourge of cords, and drove them all out of the temple, with the sheep and the oxen; and He poured out the coins of the money changers and overturned their tables; and to those who were selling the doves He said, "Take these things away; stop making My Father's house a place of business." (John 2:14-16) We need to cast out everything that is NOT the work that God gave the church to perform. Cast out the church sponsored and paid for: recreation, entertainment, fun, food, and frolic that only distracts us from our true purposes. The church should be like Nehemiah and NOT detract, "I am doing a great work and I cannot come down. Why should the work stop while I leave it and come down to you?" (Nehemiah 6:3)

The Greek root word pathe can mean either "feeling" or "disease," "suffering" or "depraved passion." This word root is the word origin of a number of English vocabulary words, including sympathy, apathy, pathological, and sociopath. An easy way to remember these different meanings is that a sympathetic person 'feels' pain with another, whereas a psychopath does twisted things because he has a "diseased" mind. This meaning is understood when we read Philippians 2:1-2, as Christians are to be of the same mind, and that like as Christ in verse 5, thus becoming humble obedient servants. When we are willing to serve to fulfill the needs of another in their journey with grief, we will share their sufferings and thus sympathize with them

To Understand the depth of true sympathy, not just verbal accolades, we must go back to Christ's impending death on the cross. He asked his disciples if they were able to drink from the cup which he would drink (Matthew 20:22-23). Jesus confirmed their "yes they would". Even the apostle Paul expressed that all things he might gain in this life was counted as refuse compared to the excellency of knowing Christ, and the power of his resurrection and the joint participation of his sufferings, becoming conformed to his death (Philippians 3:8, 10). This meant not merely undergoing physical death like Christ, but conforming to His spirit and temper; that is humility, submissiveness, love and devotion to others.

Put a Trusted 'Quarterback' on Your Financial Team

On February 4, the eyes of most of the country – and much of the rest of the world – will be on Minneapolis, site of the most-watched football game in the U.S. As a fan, you can admire the way quarterbacks in the Big Game direct their teams. It's essential that you and your financial advisor provide your attorney with a list of all your financial assets - IRAs, 401(k)s, investments held in brokerage accounts, insurance policies and so on. Your attorney will need this information when preparing your important legal documents, such as your will and living trust – after all, a key part of your estate plan is who gets what. But it's imperative that you and your financial advisor convey some often-overlooked details that can make a big difference in the disposition of your estate. Gerald Andrew Shelton of Bolivar was elected to represent local administrative area (LAA) #2 and Patsy Forrest of Hickory Valley will serve as the first alternate.

"County Committee members are a critical component of the day-to-day operations of FSA," said Barkley. "They help deliver programs at the county level and work to serve the needs of local producers. All recently elected County Committee members will take office in January 2018, and will be joining the existing committee." Every FSA office is required to have a County Committee, and they are made up of local farmers who are elected by local farmers.

Nearly 7,800 FSA County Committee members serve FSA offices nationwide. Each committee has three to 11 elected members who serve three-year terms of office. One-third of County Committee seats are up for election each year. County Committee members impact the administration of FSA within a community by applying their knowledge and judgment to help FSA make important decisions on its commodity support programs, conservation programs, indemnity and disaster programs, emergency programs and eligibility.

County Committee members impact producers through their decision making and help shape the culture of a local FSA office. They also ensure the fair and equitable administration of FSA farm programs in their counties and are accountable to the Secretary of Agriculture. Members conduct hearings and reviews as requested by the State Committee, ensure socially disadvantaged (SDA) farmers and ranchers are fairly represented, make recommendations to the State Committee on existing programs, monitor changes in farm programs and inform farmers of the purpose and provisions of FSA programs. They also assist with outreach and inform underserved producers such as beginning farmers and ranchers about FSA opportunities.

There are many questions you can ask someone that start those conversations of "remember when", and a favorite one seems to be sharing school stories and memories. My senior photo was an experience as it was taken only two days after I got smacked in the face with a volleyball during church music camp. That may have also been the last time I played an organized sport, but again, a musing for an-

For many years school photos were a group shot, usually made a by a traveling photographer. Students and usually the one teacher would line up outside of the school and have photos made. I always love to look at all those sweet little faces and wonder where life took them; occasionally I know the person or the family and have a little information, but more often I'm left to wonder.

There are also sweet memories of Mrs. McClintock and of going outside to the old well for a good drink of cold, clean well water.

It's always good to remember our days of readin', and writin' and 'rithmetic shared here in Hardeman County, y'all.



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Tales from the Yellow House by Lee McAlpin

I have been asked if the Tales From The Yellow House are truth or fiction. They are definitely the truth. I am proud of my country heritage and not ashamed in the least of my country upbringing. It has made me thankful for the little things in life.

Now to January at the Yellow house. It seems like every winter all of us kids would come down with a bad case of the croup, crud, or bad cold as we called it. I don't know exactly what it was, but it made us feel terrible. I always felt as though I had been run over by a team of mules



pulling a wagon load of Bo-Doc logs, or the fancy name Bois d'arc. My nose would run like Niagara Falls, and be as red as Rudolph's. One minute I would be so hot that I had to change my hippens every so often, and the next minute so cold that I had to put on all of my wardrobe to keep warm. I didn't comb my hair for days and it looked like a stump full of sick grand-daddies. I tried eating everything from raw sauerkraut

to dried apples, and nothing tasted no better than if I had been chewing on an old truck tire. Mom had a lot of remedies that she forced down our throats during these times of sickness. One of the remedies was that awful smelling, dreadful tasting Castor Oil. She would tell us to hold our noses with our fingers while we were swallowing it. Usually as soon as it reached my stomach, and most times before, it would come back up. I still can't see how it helped our illness, unless there was some remedy in our repeated marathon races to the outhouse down in the cotton patch. At night, Mom would put a few drops of turpentine, and sometimes coal oil in a spoon of sugar and give it to us. She would get a wool cloth, rub hog lard on it, heat it and place it on our chests at night. We never went to the doctor when we were sick. We depended entirely on home remedies for anything that might beset us. For our coughs, Mom would go into the fields and pull the leaves from a plant that we called rabbit tobacco. She would make a tea from it and we would drink the potion for our coughs. We would also hide and roll us a cigarette with the leaves and smoke it. I do not know the botanical name of the weed. I believe that the Indians called it Life Everlasting. I do know that it helped our coughing. I still go into the fields in the fall and gather a bag or two.

One of the chores, or I should say necessitiy, that I recall in the winter was the daily treks to the outhouse, or outdoor toilet. We were blessed with a rather sturdy one, even though it leaned somewhat to the north, about on the angle of the leaning Tower Of Pisa, or catty wampus as the old folks use to say. Some people called them outhouses, johns, privies, necessary houses, etc. Some were one holer's, some were two holer's, and the fancy ones had two holes on a split level to accommodate both adults and children. Ours at the Yellow House was very simple and was a one holer.

I have never been in one of the things in the summer when there wasn't at least one spider, a red throated lizard, or a sand-streaker. Our little building didn't have any of the squeezable soft, double quilted tissue, but we did have a well-worn issue of the Sears and Roebuck catalog. There was no half-moon cutout in the door, but there was cracks in the wall that you could throw a grown cat through, and the cold winters wind coming through those cracks would turn your backside into a bright hue of scarlet in a New York minute.

Holmes have picked up petitions to run for the three available spots on the Whiteville City Council. Robertson and Johnston are incumbents, while Holmes is newcomer.


The Hardeman County School Board, which has six positions up

gie Jackson; and step-brother, Michael Timothy Hall, Jr.



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






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
