Deer Population Endangered


The Tennessee Fish and Wildlife Commission (TFWC) has made regulatory changes in response to the confirmation of Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) in deer in Fayette and Hardeman Counties. The changes came at a special called meeting of the TFWC on Thursday at the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency headquarters.

The commission voted to establish a CWD management zone which currently includes Fayette, Hardeman and McNairy counties. The commission took action to create deer carcass exportation restrictions and a restriction on feeding wildlife within the high risk area of the CWD management zone, exceptions apply. The high risk area of the CWD management zone includes counties within a 10-mile radius of the location of a confirmed CWD positive deer.

Another regulation change for the CWD management zone is the creation of a new deer hunting season. An archery/muzzleloader/gun deer season was established there for January 7-31, 2019. The bag limit for the season is one antlered deer and unlimited for antlerless deer. All wildlife management areas and other public land on which deer hunting activities are permitted within the three counties will be open during this newly-established season.

On or after December 29, all hunters harvesting deer on weekends (Saturday-Sunday) are required to check the deer in at a physical check station. The TWRA will publish the locations of these stations on its

Bolivar PD Gets Break in Case



The City of Bolivar's investigation of the three-person "smash and grab" at the Q-Mart on December 12 has gotten help from the video surveillance equipment in the store and from the Memphis Police Department.

With video from the scene and other law enforcement agencies involved, one has been arrested and is in custody in Memphis, a warrant has been issued for a second, and a third is still being sought.

At approximately 2:45 a.m. on December 12, a truck backed into the front of the Q-Mart at 629 W. Market, with the thieves grabbing an ATM Machine and cash from the office.

According to the Bolivar Police Department, the city will have to wait its turn on prosecution of the suspects, as they are believed to be involved in other crimes.



The TWRA is continuing its efforts of targeted sampling for CWD outside of the CWD management zone. Emphasis will be placed on those counties surrounding the CWD management zone.

With the positive confirmation, Tennessee became the 26th state to have documented CWD. There have also been three Canadian provinces to have CWD.

The TWRA enacted the CWD Response Plan last week following the preliminary positive detection. The response involves a coordinated effort between TWRA, Tennessee Department of Agriculture, and other partners.

Although CWD has no known risk to the health of humans or livestock, it is a contagious and deadly neurological disorder that affects members of the deer family. It is transmitted through animal-to-animal contact, animal contact with a contaminated environment, and with contaminated feed or water sources. It is the most significant threat to the deer population nationwide, as it is 100 percent fatal to deer and elk. Wildlife agencies across the country are working to inform the public about CWD, its deadly results and possible impacts to economies.

Nashville--- The Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency will host a public meeting to discuss Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) at the Bolivar Middle School gymnasium, located at 915 Pruitt St., Bolivar, TN. The meeting is Tuesday, January 8 at 7 p.m.

A short presentation will be made with any updates and planned monitoring activities in the area. Following the presentation, TWRA staff, along with representatives from the Tennessee Department of Agriculture, will answer any questions from the public in regard to CWD.

CWD was recently confirmed in 13 deer in Fayette and Hardeman counties. On December 20 in a special called meeting, the Tennessee Fish and Wildlife Commission voted to establish a CWD management zone, which also includes McNairy County as a CWD positive deer was confirmed within 10 miles of that county's border.

- 4 cups shredded kale, stems removed (4 ounces)
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 4 cups shredded savoy cabbage
- 1 cup shredded purple cabbage
- 1 cup shredded carrots (2 medium)
- 3/4 cup packed finely snipped Italian (flat-leaf) parsley
- 1/3 cup mayonnaise
- 3 tablespoons sour cream
- 2 tablespoons sliced green onion (1)
- 1 tablespoon white wine vinegar
- 1 tablespoon snipped fresh tarragon or 1/4 teaspoon dried tarragon, crushed
- 1 teaspoon sugar

In an extra-large bowl combine the kale, salt, and olive oil. Using your hands, rub the kale to help soften it and brighten its color. Rinse the kale in a colander under cool running water; drain well and return to the bowl. Add the savoy cabbage, purple cabbage, and carrots; toss to combine. Set slaw aside.

For the dressing, in a food processor or blender combine the parsley, mayonnaise, sour cream, green onion, vinegar, tarragon, sugar, and garlic. Cover and process or blend to combine.

Church Break-In Evidence Sent to Crime Lab

DNA Evidence has been collected and sent to the state for analysis in an attempt to determine if there are similarities with several break-ins at churches in Hardeman County around Thanksgiving, according to a Hardeman County Sheriff's Department source.

Between November 14 and November 22, four churches in the county were broken into and robbed.

The latest, on November 22, was at Shandy Baptist Church, where audio and video equipment were stolen after the thieves gained entrance by breaking a window.

The day prior, audio equipment and a copier were taken from Ebenezer Baptist Church. Officers at the scene were able to collect blood evidence, which appeared to be a result of the break-in at the side door of the church.

On November 21, Cloverport Baptist Church reported a televi-



sion, DVD player, and seven Boston Butts were taken as the thieves entered by breaking a door and a window.

The Middleton Police Department confirmed there was a break-in at the Middleton church of Christ on November 14, but at

press time, no report of the incident had been made available.

An attempt was made to break into Toone Baptist Church, but was unsuccessful, according to Toone Police Chief Jerry Siler.

Tennessee Governor Bill Haslam and Tennessee Department of Labor and Workforce Development Commissioner Burns Phillips released unemployment statistics that show the seasonally adjusted statewide jobless rate dropped by 0.1 of a percentage point in November 2018 to 3.6 percent.

Job creation is critical in maintaining a strong economy across the state," said Haslam. "For more than a year and a half, we've experienced historically low unemployment, while Tennessee businesses added tens of thousands of new employees to their payrolls."

During the last 12 months, Tennessee's workforce has grown by 60,700 nonfarm jobs. The state's leisure/hospitality sector, along with its trade/transportation/utilities and professional/business services sectors experienced the most growth.

When comparing 2017 to 2018, Tennessee's November unemployment rate increased from 3.3 percent to 3.6 percent, while the national rate declined from 4.1 percent to 3.7 percent.

"Even though Tennessee's unemployment rate is slightly higher than it was this time last year, 3.3 percent was the state's all-time lowest jobless rate," Phillips said. "We've hovered around that historic low rate for many months and that proves Tennessee currently has a very healthy economy."

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Middleton CAD Class Makes a Difference

When Middleton High School CAD students began working with their new 3-D printer, they didn't know they would make such a difference so quickly.

"We started by making spinners. We measured and worked on it and made spinners," explained Middleton High School CAD Instructor Zeke Craft.

But while the spinners were fun, the use of the printer got more meaningful when the class took on a bigger project.

"My son works at the Co-op. He had a spinner that we had made and was talking to someone who had lost a finger and he said he had read online that prosthetic fingers could be made with a 3-D printer," explained Craft. "We took a design he sent us. We catered it to his finger and made it fit to him."

Craft said after a lot of work, the final product has been a success. "It gives him back that digit motion."

Craft said about fifteen kids are involved in the program that uses the printer, but hopes that all his kids can use it.

"Kids get an idea of how industry works. They create a product and can then improve the prototypes," he said. "In my CAD 2 and CAD 3 classes, the students make their own designs."

"We are excited about the classroom technology improvements at our schools," said Hardeman County Superintendent of Schools Warner Ross. "There's definitely a value-added component of pride when our students use this technology to benefit our community and citizens. Mr. Craft and his team have done just that!"

Ross added that he had received word that Jacob Lumpkin, who was heavily involved in the prosthetic project, has received a full academic scholarship offer from Vanderbilt University.

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
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Year-end: Put This Year's Investment Performance in Perspective

How can you assess your investment portfolio's performance in 2018? The year was full of wild swings in the financial markets, so your own results may well have bounced around quite a bit, too. But you can still get a clear picture of how you did if you keep your investments' returns in the proper perspective – by making sure your expectations are relevant, realistic and reviewed.

Let's look at how these terms can apply to a meaningful evaluation of your investment progress:

Relevant – Many investors compare their portfolio returns to a popular market index, such as the S&P 500. But this comparison is not really valid for a variety of reasons. For one thing, indexes are typically not diversified across different types of investments – the S&P 500, for instance, only tracks large U.S. companies. But your portfolio should consist of a broad range of investments: domestic and international stocks, bonds, mutual funds, government securities and so on, appropriate for your goals and risk tolerance. Also, your portfolio's performance will be affected by your contributions and withdrawals, while market index returns are not. So, instead of measuring your results against an index – and possibly worrying about underperformance – you're better off establishing relevant expectations of your investment returns, based on your specific goals. So, for example, if you want to retire at age 62, you'll need to know the rate of return you need to achieve this goal – and then compare that desired return with your actual results.

Realistic – Ideally, of course, you'd like really high returns with really low risk – but that's really not feasible. To get high returns, you'll need to invest aggressively, which means you'll need your portfolio to be heavily weighted in stocks. However, stocks are also riskier than more conservative investments, such as bonds or government securities. So, you'll need to be realistic in what you can anticipate from your portfolio. You can shoot for high returns and accept the higher level of risk, or you can lower your expectations in exchange for greater stability.

Reviewed – The performance of the financial markets – and also your own portfolio – will fluctuate from year to year. Consequently, it's important to review your portfolio's results and the progress you're making toward your goals on a regular basis, possibly with the help of a financial professional. In these reviews, you may conclude that you're doing fine, or you might discover that you need to rebalance your portfolio by realigning your investments with your goals and risk tolerance, or perhaps make other adjustments – such as changing the amount you invest – to get you back on track. In addition, you may even need to re-evaluate these goals in response to changes in your life – a new job, marriage, new child, and so on – as these changes could affect the rate of return you need from your investments.

As you look back on 2018, and look forward to 2019 and beyond, take a holistic approach to how you evaluate your investments' performance. By looking for relevance, being realistic about what you can expect, and reviewing your portfolio in the context of your goals, risk tolerance and changing circumstances, you can gain a thorough understanding of where you are, where you want to go – and how you can help yourself get there.



Looking for a Few Good Mentors

For the first time in the history of the tnAchieves mentoring program, Hardeman County is not meeting the challenge. With slots for mentors 13 short this year, tnAchieves reports that Hardeman County is at only 73% of the quota needed to help. Tennessee Achieves has been working to make sure everyone who wants to go to college can, but right now, they need volunteers. For just an hour a month, mentors check in on students to provide encouragement, answer questions, and remind them of upcoming deadlines.

"A lot of the things our students and mentors work on are not really classroom related, it's not financial aid related, it's a lot of those things going on in our students' personal lives outside the classroom that can cause some problems," said Graham Thomas with Tennessee Achieves. The group tries to make it easy for mentors by hosting a training sessions and sending mentors updates monthly on things they should check in with their partners about. In the spring, mentors and high school seniors will be partnered, and they'll stay together for a year. "They're that person they can call or text, they can go to when they don't know that next step or they get a letter from financial aid and they don't know what it means," said Thomas.




