o Weeks for the Tax of No

An anticipated yearly getready-for-school time for local businesses and customers alike will be twice as nice this year with the old standbys and a new twist designed to help an industry hurt by the COVID-19 virus pandemic.

For 2020 only, the Tennessee General Assembly has approved two separate sales tax holiday weekends. During these weekends, certain goods may be purchased tax free.

The first tax-free holiday weekend focuses on clothing and other back-to-school items. It begins at 12:01 a.m. on Friday, July 31 and ends Sunday, August 2 at 11:59 p.m. During this time, clothing, school supplies, and computers Tax Free Stuff July 31-August 2 Clothing

Exempt:

General apparel that costs \$200 or less per item, such as shirts, pants, socks, shoes, dresses, etc.

Not exempt:

Apparel items priced at more than \$200 Items sold together, such as shoes, cannot be split up to stay beneath

the \$200 maximum Items such as jewelry, handbags, or sports and recreational equipment

School Supplies

School and art supplies with a purchase price of \$200 or less per item, such as binders, books, backpacks, crayons, paper, pens, pencils, and continued on A2

and other qualifying electronic devices may be purchased taxfree. Certain price restrictions ap-

ply to purchases. See inset above and on A2.

Exempt items sold online are

also eligible. Items must be purchased for personal use, not for business or trade.

The second tax-free holiday weekend focuses on restaurant sales in an effort to help an industry negatively impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic.

It begins at 12:01 a.m. on August 7 and ends Sunday, August 9 at 11:59 p.m.

During this time, the retail sale of food and drink by restaurants and limited service restaurants, as defined in Tenn. Code Ann. § 57-4-102, is exempt from sales tax.

Jesus on Anxiety by Jeff Capshaw

According to the Anxiety clothing? Consider the lilies of and Depression Association of America (adaa.org), "anxiety disorders are the most common mental illness in the U.S., affecting 40 million adults in the United States age 18 and older, or 18.1% of the population every year."

underlying There psychological, physical, or even chemical causes for anxiety. But these may not always be the root cause. Sometimes the root cause is spiritual or attitudinal. One thing is for certain. Looking at things from a different perspective can help. Listen to the words of Jesus.

"Therefore I tell you, do not be anxious about your life, what you will eat or what you will drink, nor about your body, what you will put on. Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothing? Look at the birds of the air: they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not of more value than they? And which of you by being anxious can add a single hour to his span of life? And why are you anxious about

the field, how they grow: they neither toil nor spin, yet I tell you, even Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these. But if God so clothes the grass of the field, which today is alive and tomorrow is thrown into the oven, will he not much more clothe you, O you of little faith? Therefore do not be anxious, saying, 'What shall we eat?' or 'What shall we drink?' or 'What shall we wear?' For the Gentiles seek after all these things, and your heavenly Father knows that you need them all" (Matthew 6:25-32).

First, don't worry about things you should not worry about, such as food and clothing. The point is learning to trust God for the simplest necessities. God provides food for birds and clothes for flowers (6:26-30). And Jesus says that human lives are much more "valuable than these" (v. 26).

Secondly, don't worry about the things you cannot control. Being revved-up about little things or the things beyond our control is futility. When we find

this true of ourselves, then we immediately know the source of the problem; we have "little faith" (v. 30). We are acting like unbelievers (the Gentiles) who trust in their own abilities or blind fate instead of trusting God. Rather than worrying, try to "seek first the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be added to you (v. 33). That is a promise from God.

Finally, think about it this way. Worrying about the future is, as a friend of mine puts it, "presuffering." Try honestly trusting in the Lord and His promises for today. "Therefore, do not be anxious about tomorrow, for tomorrow will be anxious for itself. Sufficient for the day is its own trouble" (6:34).

What do you have to lose but, perhaps, your anxiety?

Protect Yourself Against Financial Scammers

It's unfortunate, but true: During this period of economic uncertainty, one of the busiest "industries" has been financial scamming. But it goes on even during normal times, too, so you'll want to know what to look for, and how to defend yourself.

For starters, just how widespread is financial fraud? Consider this: In 2019, more than 3.2 million fraud cases were reported to the Federal Trade Commission, with identity theft being the most common type of fraud, accounting for about one-fifth of the overall cases. And fraudulent new accounts (mortgages, student loans, car loans and credit cards) amounted to about \$3.4 billion in 2018, according to a study by Javelin Strategy & Research.

To help yourself from being victimized, consider the following suggestions. They are certainly not an exhaustive list, but they should prove useful.

Watch out for unsecure websites. Make sure a website is secure before entering any payment or personal information. Look for sites that start with HTTPS, rather than those with just HTTP, which are not secure and can be hacked. But even a site with HTTPS can still be used by scammers, so, if you don't recognize the name of the company or group that's requesting your information, do some research to make sure it's legitimate.

Review your credit reports. As mentioned above, the fraudulent opening of new accounts is a big source of financial scams. To be sure nobody has opened new accounts under your name, try to review your credit reports at least once a year. You can get them for free at AnnualCreditReport.com.

Follow up on fraud. If you've already been victimized by having new accounts opened in your name, contact one of the three major credit reporting agencies (Experian, Equifax or TransUnion) and place a 90-day fraud alert on your credit file. You might also want to file a complaint with the Federal Trade Commission, print it out and file it with your local law enforcement agency. And it's also a good idea to contact the fraud department of the financial companies where the thief has opened a fraudulent account in your name.

Be alert for suspicious links. "Phishers" have gotten quite good at sending out messages that look like they're from reputable businesses. But if you examine these messages carefully, you can usually determine if there's something off about them. For example, no legitimate business will tell you, via this type of message, that you have to "correct your account" by providing additional information. And if you do hit the link provided, and it takes you to a third-party site, you can be pretty sure it's bogus.

Resist "act now" offers. If you get an offer, via phone or online, urging you to "act immediately" on an investment opportunity, discontinue the communication. No reputable financial advisor will ever try to force you to take such swift action, and if an investment is legitimate, it will be available tomorrow, next week and next year.

Use your shredder. You probably have the option to "go paperless" with all your banks and financial services providers, but, if you still do receive paper documents, be sure to shred them when they're no longer needed.

You save and invest for years to help achieve your long-term goals. Don't let any of your efforts be undone by financial fraudsters.

During early voting and on Election Day, Tennesseans are encouraged to do their part. This includes wearing a face covering and maintaining a six-foot distance from poll officials and other voters. Voters should expect to see signs with further safety instructions at their polling locations. All poll officials will be wearing face coverings and will be trained on social distancing

"County election commissions have been planning for a safe and secure election for months," said Coordinator of Elections Mark Goins. As part of our commitment to safety, the state is provid-



ing masks, social distancing resources, gloves, gowns and face shields for poll officials."

Tennesseans can find early voting and Election Day polling locations, view and mark sample ballots and much more with the GoVoteTN app or online at GoVoteTN.com. You can download the GoVoteTN app for free in the App Store or Google Play. Reviewing your sample ballot and deciding how you will vote will reduce your time at the polls.

Voters who have moved within the county or have had a name change since the last time they voted can update their registration online at GoVoteTN.com. By making sure your registration is up to date, you can shorten the time you will need to spend at your polling location.

Tennesseans voting early or on Election Day should remember to bring valid photo identification with them to the polls. A driver's license or photo ID issued by the Tennessee Department of Safety and Homeland Security, by Tennessee state government or by the federal government are acceptable even if they are expired. 

Tales from the Yellow House by Lee McAlpin



With temperatures hovering near 100 degrees the past few days, I am amazed at how we survived temps like these at the Yellow House. No refrigerator, no AC, no fans other than the kind that businesses like Shelly's Hardware, Bank Of Middleton and Shackelfords Funeral Home gave out. One of our Aunts, (who had plenty as we used to say), came for a visit, she had one of them fancy fold-out accordian-type fans with all the colored flowers on it. I remember that Mom folded her one out of colored paper one time.

Mom seldom ever fired up the wood cookstove in the afternoon hours in the summer. She would cook the daily meals in the early morning hours before it got so hot. Whatever we had for lunch, we knew we would have the same thing for supper. After our noon meal, Mom would cover the bowls on the table with a white table cloth. She didn't have to warm it up at suppertime, for it was already warm. Nothing seemed to spoil. We never got food poisoning.

I read something interesting lately about food items. It said that you do not have to refrigerate mayonnaise. The Ph balance is such that it is impossible for bacteria to grow in it. I guess that the Ph balance was such in Mom's cooking.

When we did have milk in hot weather, Mom would put the jug in the well bucket and lower it into the water in the well at night. This kept the milk from clabbering.

On really hot days, if you walked out near the railroad tracks, you could see what we called Heat Devils dancing above the tracks. It was hot air movement that you could see above the rails. I've seen a few of these while hoeing cotton on a hot day.

We spent most of the hot days and early evening hours on the front porch. Mom would have a fan in one hand and a fly swatter in the other. She made the fly swatters out of screen-wire and sewed cloth around the edges and attached it to a section of cane. We would stay on the front porch until the sun went down and it cooled down some in the house.

At night, all the windows were raised and all the doors left open. We had screen doors and screens on the windows. Our doors were never locked or latched at night. Even on rare occasions when we went for an overnight stay our doors were not locked. It sure was nice when a cool southern breeze blew through the windows at night.

At that time, we had never heard of the Walton family, but after the coal-oil lamps were blown out and everyone was settled in bed, all of us kids would tell each member of the family goodnight. Just some happy hot memories of the Yellow House.





Perry Named TSWA Player of the Year

Former Middleton Lady Tigers and University of Tennessee at Martin women's basketball standout Chelsey Perry garnered yet another postseason recognition by being named the Tennessee Sports Writers Association Women's Basketball Player of the Year, as announced this week by the


Perry adds this prestigious honor to her already loaded trophy case which includes WBCA Coaches' All-American honors along with claiming the Ohio Valley Conference Player of the Year Award and UT Martin Bettye Giles Female Athlete of the Year Award. The All-OVC first team selection also served as a finalist for the Beck Hammon Mid-Major Player of the Year Award while claiming a league-record eight OVC Player of the Week honors.

Perry burst onto the national stage with a record-setting junior campaign. Perry scored 740 points on the season to rank second in the NCAA (all Divisions) and first amongst all collegiate scorers in the State of Tennessee. She ranked first nationally in field goals made (286), second in total points (740) and third in both points per game (23.1) and field goal attempts (386). She also finished 11th nationally in blocks (86) and 17th in blocks per game (2.69).

Perry scored in double figures in the final 30 games of the season while posting 20 games with at least 20 points and nine games of 30 points or more. Her best game came against in-state foe Lipscomb where she scored a career-high 42 points which tied for the sixth-most points in the NCAA this season and marked an OVC season single-game high.

Other highlights from the year include joining the 1,000-point club against Austin Peay while tying the program record with eight blocks against IUPUI. She also posted six double-doubles while scoring 479 points in OVC to mark the most points scored in league play over the last 20 seasons en route to a league championship.



The Exchange Club-Carl Perkins Center for the Prevention of Child Abuse opened its doors in October 1981. The Center was the first Child Abuse Prevention Center in the state of Tennessee and the fourth in the Nation. It is now one of the largest of its kind. Last year, the Center helped 16,809 individuals in West Tennessee, serving all counties outside of Shelby.

The mission of the Center is to provide support to families in preventing and dealing with child abuse in West Tennessee and to help both parents and children meet the practical needs of preserving and improving the quality of family life. Many services are provided by the Center such as forensic interviews, group and individual counseling, emergency services, 24 hour hotline services, therapeutic visitation, relative caregiver support services, child advocacy services and community education programs. The Center works collaboratively with law enforcement, district attorney offices, juvenile court systems, the department of children's services and many other child-serving organizations to protect children and keep their best interest at heart.
