Foone Gets Broadband Grant

Residents in parts of Hardeman County will soon have access to broadband service thanks to a grant awarded by the state to Aeneas Internet and Telephone. The \$190,000 check was presented at Toone City Hall, with representatives from the Tennessee Economic Development Commission, state and local dignitaries on hand.

The grant is the result of the Tennessee Broadband Accessibility Act, Tennessee Governor Bill Haslam's 2017 legislation to increase broadband to more Tennesseans and offset the capital expenses of deploying broadband in areas that currently lack access.

"In communities across Tennessee, broadband is an essential service that will increase economic investment and growth to help businesses, families and individuals thrive," Haslam said.

Upon receipt of the grant, Aeneas will begin working with Toone officials to begin the improvements needed to bring broadband services to the area.







The Maxwell's Stay-at-Home Gourmet

Baked Parmesan Yellow Squash Rounds

Ingredients

2 medium-sized yellow summer squash Garlic salt & freshly ground black pepper 1/2 cup freshly grated Parmesan cheese

Instructions

Place an oven rack in the center position of the oven. Preheat the oven to 425°F. Line a baking sheet with foil (lightly misted with nonstick cooking spray) OR parchment paper.

Wash and dry the squash, and then cut each one into 1/4-inch thick slices. Arrange the squash rounds on the prepared pan, with little to no space between them. Lightly sprinkle the squash with garlic salt and freshly ground black pepper. Use a small spoon to spread a thin layer of Parmesan cheese on each slice of squash.

Bake for 15 to 20 minutes, or until the Parmesan melts and turns a light golden brown. (Watch these closely the first time you make them and pull them out of the oven early if the Parmesan is golden before 15 minutes. Alternatively, you may broil them for a minute or two at the end of the cooking time to speed up the browning.) Serve immediately.





Defending the Faith: Part 2 by Jeff Capshaw

Two weeks ago, I began writing on defending the Christian faith: also known as Apologetics. An apologist defends the faith from two stances: either positive arguments substantiating the claims of Christianity and/or rebutting criticisms against Christianity.


In the prior two weeks, I briefly commented on 1 Peter 3:15 and Paul's Sermon at Mars Hill (Acts 17:16-34). While I Peter provides a mandate for defending the faith, Paul demonstrated a thorough-going, biblical defense of Christianity. Paul's main points are the Christian God's existence and the reality of the resurrection of Jesus from the dead. He assumed (presupposed) the truth of God's existence and asserted the historical reality of the resurrection of Jesus. Interestingly, at Mars Hill Paul provided no "scientific proof" or sophisticated arguments for either claim. Moreover, he explicitly drew upon on the Hebrew Scriptures.

This isn't to say that there isn't a place in Christian Apologetics for providing certain kinds of evidence, proofs or logical-philosophical arguments. Nonetheless, those types of weapons need to be wielded wisely. Additionally, an apologist should probably first learn to proclaim God's truth from Scripture before advancing to more sophisticated and extra-biblical strategies.

For example, Acts 17:1-3 says, "now when they had traveled through Amphipolis and Apollonia, they came to Thessalonica, where there was a synagogue of the Jews. And according to Paul's custom, he went to them, and for three Sabbaths reasoned with them from the Scriptures, explaining and giving evidence that the Christ had to suffer and rise again from the dead, and saying, 'This Jesus whom I am proclaiming to you is the Christ'."

Several things are evident from the passage. First, Paul "reasoned from the Scriptures." That means (for Paul as it should be for the Christian apologist) God's Word is ultimate evidence, whether palatable for the unbeliever or not. Paul also "reasoned." The original word Luke used here is dialogizomai. It means "to think or reason with thoroughness and completeness." Thus, Paul was both thoughtful and prepared to engage his specific audience.

Unlike Paul's Sermon on Mars Hill, the audience here were at least believers in the one God of the Hebrew Scripture. Their issue wasn't the existent of the living God; rather it was whether Jesus of Nazareth was the Messiah: crucified, buried and raised from the dead. The take away for the Christian apologist is this. Know well the audience or opponent and utilize the proper sources and methods.



OPINION The Editor's Inbox...Letters to the Editor

The recent debates and articles surrounding the present county Mayoral election has generated personal concern for our county's future and the proper leadership required to lead it out of our state's distressed rating for the county (based on rankings of unemployment rate, per capita market income and poverty rate - source is Center for Economic Research in Tennessee). 17 of Tennessee's counties (Hardeman included), all in rural areas, are in the bottom 10% of the nation. Also data recently presented suggests a slight drop in our county population with the resulting drop in property values. Zero or negative economic growth is obviously most undesirable. The idea of a Lake Silerton is admirable and if done in accordance with 2008 Governors Directive may prove valuable. Lakes in the south part of our county have innumerable lots for sale and foreclosures.

Economic growth is centered around bringing profit and employment to the community. Avenues for this growth in our county can unfortunately not be gained from the two major highways, I-40 and 72 which do not directly pass through our community. Highway 18 serves to connect the two interstates but remains a 2 lane road.

A county asset that has basically suffered little use the past 4 years is our airport. Recently rehabilitated so as to accept corporate jet traffic, any calls for continued growth has seemed to fall on deaf ears. Promotional advertising has not occurred and our aviation websites have only just been updated from 4 years ago. Full time professional staff has been removed and replaced by an airport business owner attending to the facility on an as needed basis. All of this has resulted in the loss of a flight school attempting to relocate to our airport and elimination of any corporate jet traffic except for an occasional Tennessee state turboprop.

An opportunity exists that has been capitalized on by the airports surrounding our county. Memphis Airport maintains jet fuel prices around \$2 to \$3 per gallon above local general aviation airports prices. Fayette County is a prime example of a general aviation airport capitalizing on this price differential. Many of the Memphis Airport's corporate aircraft refuel at Fayette Airport which offers the full time professional service necessary to win the confidence of corporate pilots and their valuable passengers.

Our airport had the same capabilities 4 years ago with professional full time staff and had begun to attract the desired corporate traffic. Why is this important- we are trying to sell our county to industry leaders in hopes that a few of them will see the potential of investing in Hardeman County. That investment can be in the form of offices, manufacturing, logistic facilities, etc. - all leading to growth and jobs for the local community. It is the same as trying to sell your home. If you have consistent potential qualified buyers going through your home it will eventually sell. No buyer traffic and your home will never sell.

Another 4 years of neglect may negate the progress that was set in motion prior to the present county administration's desire to keep our airport small. Catering to local single engine propeller aircraft does nothing for the county in advancing from its distressed rating. It does portray an undesirable image to the citizens as to who the airport usage is for. All, (and I emphasize all) surrounding general aviation airports (Fayette, Selmer, Millington, Paris, etc.) all far exceed Hardeman Airport in total aircraft traffic, fuel sales, professionalism, and have definite visions for the their future in order to generate economic growth for themselves. It wasn't that long ago that Bolivar Aviation (William Whitehurst) had established our airport as the most active and productive general aviation airport in the state.

The county administration needs to capitalize on the distressed rating as this allows a tremendous advantage in procuring funding. That advantage is 90 to 95% of funding for projects being paid for by Federal and State agencies as they desire to help our county to succeed. Following the professional airport development plans developed by our architectural firm, reviewed by our engineering firm, ratified by our airport committee, and welcomed by the Aeronautics Division of the Tennessee Department of Transportation is a defined path for success. Micro-managing and modifying professionally developed plans with one individual's ideas is a recipe for disaster.



What Should You Do With an Inherited IRA?

Individual Retirement Accounts (IRAs) are quite popular. At the end of 2017, investors owned nearly \$9 trillion in IRA assets, according to the Investment Company Institute, a trade association of U.S. investment companies. Given these numbers, it probably wouldn't be surprising if you inherited an IRA someday. But what should you do with it?

First of all, you'll need to be aware of some basic rules. If your parent, or anyone other than your spouse, leaves you a traditional IRA - one in which contributions are typically tax-deductible and earnings can grow tax-deferred - you can transfer the money into an "inherited IRA," from which you'll need to take at least a minimum amount of money - technically called a "distribution" - each year, based on your life expectancy. These distributions are taxable at your regular income tax rate. If you've inherited a Roth IRA, you also must take these minimum payouts, but the amounts won't count as taxable income, because your parents, or whoever left you the IRA, already paid taxes on the contributions that went into it. (To make sure you fully understand all the guidelines on distributions and taxation of inherited IRAs, consult with your tax advisor.)

It's also important to understand how your inherited IRA will fit in to your overall financial strategy. Consequently, you'll need to address these questions:

How much should I take out each year? As mentioned above, you must take a distribution of at least a minimum amount from your inherited IRA each year - if you don't, you may be subject to a 50% penalty on the amount you should have taken. But you can take out more than the minimum. In deciding how much to take, you'll need to evaluate a few factors. First, of course, is whether you need the extra money to help support your regular cash flow. It's possible you have other pools of income from which to draw, and, in some cases, it may be advantageous for you to tap these sources first. Another consideration is taxes - if you've inherited a traditional IRA, the more you take out each year, the bigger your tax bill may be.

Should I keep the same investments? Inheriting an IRA doesn't mean you're stuck with the original account owner's investment choices. You can change the investments to align with your goals and risk tolerance, both of which may change over time.

How does the inherited IRA fit in with my overall financial strategy? You'll need to consider how your newly inherited IRA fits in to the "big picture" of your financial strategy. Are you adding redundancies? If you keep the inherited IRA largely intact, how will it affect your current investment mix? Could the added income from required distributions change your retirement calculations or even enable you to retire earlier? You may want to consult with a financial professional about these and other questions related to your inherited





County Schools, or the administration of the Criminal Justice Center. He explained the role of the mayor's office and the county commission in passing the tax rate each year and what agencies are designated to receive money collected and that money is not shared by the funds or agencies.

Sain explained his role in the refinancing of the Criminal Justice Center through bonds and his belief in the necessity of and a description of the work he and the county commission has done to bring a recreational lake to the area, stating "If anyone has a better idea to bring thirty million dollars a year to the county let us know."

He also explained his position on expanding the number of service days for convenience centers in the county and how the landfill fee would need to go to "14-15 dollars a month" in order to have each convenience center open six days a week.

Sain talked about the expansion of Chemring/Kilgore and the county's role in keeping one of the biggest employers in Hardeman County for the forseeable future.

Sain took no questions from the public during the meeting, which was attended by approximately 40 people, but did offer to answer any questions posed one-on-one afterward.

The meeting was attended by several candidates for offices in Hardeman County including Hardeman County Mayoral Candidates Kandy Shackelford and Calvin Howell.


