More Candidates=Less Voting?

Apparently, democracy isn't as popular as it used to be in Hardeman County, even when there are lots of choices.

So far this year, voting pales to numbers in 2010, as 6,613 went to the polls for the General Election, with 3,534 voting early. There were only six competitive races that year in August.

In 2014, with 11 competitive races in the General Election, 2,785 voted early, adding to a total of 4,812 in August.

This year, through July 25, 2,332 have voted. Of the total, 1,110 voted in the Democratic Primary and 1,034 voted in the continued on A12

The Hardmen County UT Extension sponsored the yearly Best Tomato Contest at the Bolivar Farmers Market on July 21.





Last week I noted Paul's custom of reasoning from the Scriptures with his opponents. Specifically, Luke says that Paul's evidence for the resurrection of Jesus was the Scriptures of Ancient Israel: commonly called the Old Testament.

The conclusion that it (OT) isn't relevant for today is a relatively recent view in Church History. A more proper view is akin to Saint Vincent of Lérins' (d. 445) famous maxim: "moreover, in the Catholic Church [Universal Church] itself, all possible care must be taken, that we hold that faith which has been believed everywhere, always, by all" ("universal" added).

Only a false bifurcation of God's economy or an arbitrary, artificial division of time periods yields such a conclusion. For Jesus and the Apostles, however, there was a continuity between the Scriptures of Ancient Israel and the words He and they produced. It is hard to overly emphasize this point, because the Bible (all of it) is the Christian apologist's ultimate authority.

Furthermore, I also suggested that Paul was thorough, complete, thoughtful and prepared to engage his opponents. Thus, the Christian apologist must also know well the subject, the opponent and, accordingly, use the proper methods and sources.

Another Apostle's view on the significance of Scriptural authority and the confidence in it the apologist must possess is also instructive: Peter's in 2 Pet. 1:16-21. This is one of the most interesting and powerful statements in all of Scripture on the authority and reliability of Scripture

Peter claims that he nor the other Apostles had followed clever myths and claimed to be

eyewitnesses of Jesus' glory on the Mount of Transfiguration (Matt. 17). So, they heard; they saw; they experienced with their senses Jesus' transfiguration. Even so, Peter makes an astounding statement in v. 19. He wrote, "and we have the prophetic word more fully confirmed" This means that the Bible is more certain than its readers' senses or experiences.

Why? Because of vv. 20-21, ". . . knowing this first of all, that no prophecy of Scripture comes from someone's own interpretation. For no prophecy was ever produced by the will of man, but men spoke from God as they were carried along by the Holy Spirit."

Although surely there are other methods for defending the Christian faith, it is hard to overemphasize the role Scripture must play in both the apologist's life and defense method.

USDA Announces Deadline

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) Executive Director for Hardeman County, Mary Van Barkley, today reminded farmers and ranchers that they have until August 1, 2018, to nominate eligible candidates to serve on local FSA county

County committees are made up of farmers and ranchers elected by other producers in their communities to guide the delivery of farm programs at the local level. Committee members play a critical role in the day-to-day operations of FSA.

"The August 1 deadline is quickly approaching," said Barkley. "If you know of a great candidate or want to nominate yourself to serve on your local county committee, visit your FSA office before the deadline to submit the nomination form. I especially encourage the nomination of beginning farmers and ranchers, as well as women and minorities. This is your opportunity to have a say in how federal programs are delivered in your county."

Committees consist of three to 11 members and meet once a month or as needed to make important decisions on disaster and conservation programs, emergency programs, commodity price support loan programs, county office employment and other agricultural issues. Members serve three-year terms. Nationwide there are over 7,700 farmers and ranchers serving on FSA county committees.

To be eligible to serve on an FSA county committee, a person must participate or cooperate in an agency administered program and reside in the local administrative area where the election is being held. A complete list of eligibility requirements, more information and

nomination forms are available at http://www.fsa.usda.gov/elections. All nominees must sign the nomination form FSA-669A. All nomination forms for the 2018 election must be postmarked or received in the local FSA county office by August 1, 2018. Ballots will be mailed to eligible voters by November 5 and are due back to the local USDA Service Centers on December 3. The newly elected county committee members will take office January 1, 2019.

There's no single cause for suicide. Suicide most often occurs when stressors and health issues converge to create an experience of hopelessness and despair. Depression is the most common condition associated with suicide, and it is often undiagnosed or untreated. Conditions like depression, anxiety and substance problems, especially when unaddressed, increase risk for suicide. Yet it's important to note that most people who actively manage their illness, are still susceptible to the danger of suicide.

Something to look out for when concerned that a person may be suicidal is a change in behavior or the presence of entirely new behaviors. This is of sharpest concern if the new or changed behavior is related to a painful event, loss, or change. Most people who take their lives exhibit one or more warning signs, either through what they say or what they do.

Talking about killing themselves, feeling hopeless, having no reason to live, being a burden to others, feeling trapped and/or unbearable pain are some of the warning signs to look for.

If behavior changes take place, such as increased use of alcohol or drugs, looking for a way to end their lives, such as searching online for methods, withdrawing from activities, isolating themselves from family and friends, sleeping too much or too little, visiting or calling people to say goodbye, giving away prized possessions, aggression, and fatigue, can be other indications of someone who is contemplating sui-

In addition, people who are considering suicide often display depression, anxiety, loss of interest, irritability, humiliation/shame, anger, and even relief or sudden improve-

Those warning signs along with the health, environmental, and historical factors, will increase the chance that a person may try to take their life.



I recently attend a town hall meeting at the old court house about local finances. At the end of the presentation the lake project was brought up.

There are two proposed sites, Spring creek and Pleasant Run creek. These two proposed sites are going through a permitting process, and studies are being done in Nashville. We were told that no one knew who might be affected by or stand to gain from these lakes because a they haven't decided between the two. I find this troubling. Not long ago another group tried to jump start the Spring creek lake project and the land owners who might be affected by it were contacted. An open meeting was held where they were allowed to ask questions. It stands to reason that if they are doing all of this planning they should know whose property is going to be affected at both sites.

The projection of a 30 million dollar revenue is only half of the equation. How much is it going to cost? How are they going to acquire the land? How long will it take to complete project? How many years will it take before we see that kind of return on our investment?



This is one (of many) reason that it is so important to spay/neuter your dogs and to not let them roam. As a reminder, Hardeman County has an at large ordinance, so your dogs are not legally allowed to roam. They should be kept in a fenced area or indoors for their own safety.



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
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Where You Live as Retiree Can **Affect Financial Strategies**


