The City of Bolivar passed a balanced budget with no tax raise and a three-percent pay increase for employees during the June 27 meeting at the Bolivar Municipal Center.

The tax rate stayed at \$1.1542.

"I'm happy we were able to provide a cost of living increase without raising taxes on the citizens," said Mayor Julian McTizic.

The vote on the budget was the final vote for councilpeople Tracy Byrum and Tommy Woods, who chose not to run in the 2019 election.

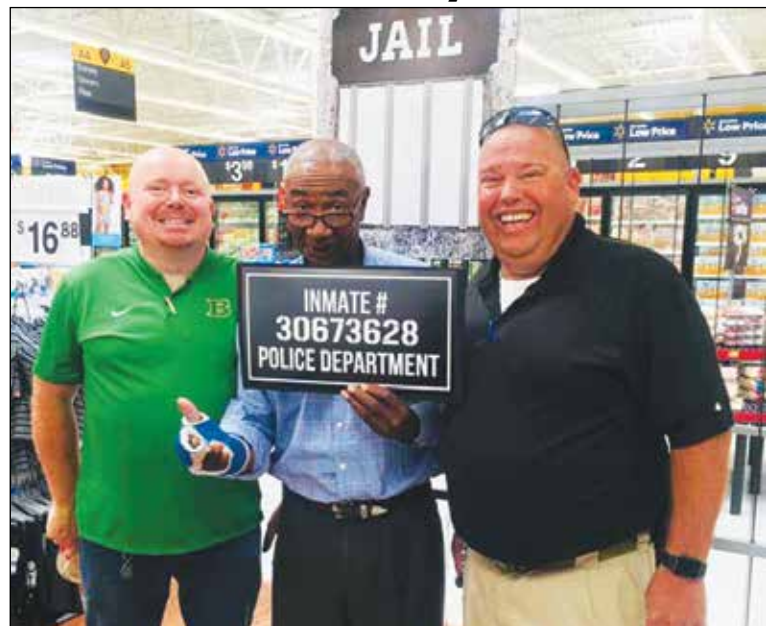

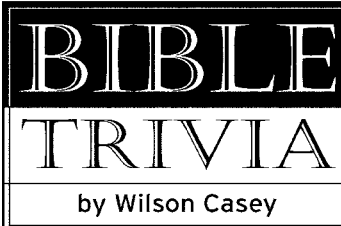

Classic Pork Tenderloin Sandwich

- Ingredients: 6 center cut pork loin chops (about 3/4-inch thick), trimmed of fat; 2 sleeves saltine crackers or ritz crackers, processed into fine crumbs (about 2 1/2 cups); 1 teaspoon garlic powder; 1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper; 2 cups flour; 1/2 cups buttermilk; Vegetable oil; Salt 6 hamburger buns; Leaf lettuce, tomato slices, pickle slices, mustard

Directions: Butterfly each pork chop by cutting horizontally to, but not through, the other side. Lay open the chops. One at a time, cover each piece of pork with plastic wrap and using the flat side of meat mallet or a small frying pan, pound until 6 to 8-inches wide. Lightly pound each chop with the tenderizing side of the meat mallet. Add at least 1-inch of oil to a large skillet. Heat oil to 375°F. Meanwhile, in a shallow dish combine cracker crumbs, garlic powder and black pepper. In another shallow dish place flour. In a third shallow dish place buttermilk. One at a time, dip pork into flour and then into buttermilk. Evenly coat with cracker crumb mixture. Carefully lower breaded tenderloins into hot oil one at a time and fry about two to three minutes or until an instant-read thermometer inserted in the center reads at least 145°F, turning once. Place fried pork tenderloins on a cooling rack and sprinkle with salt. Repeat with remaining tenderloins. Place fried pork tenderloins on the bottom half of the hamburger buns and if desired top with leaf lettuce, tomato slices, pickle slices and/or mustard.

Collectively, we enjoy many liberties, but some freedoms can be elusive – and financial freedom is one of them. 
Liberate yourself from oppressive debts. The cost of living is certainly not cheap, so it's hardly surprising that so many people incur significant debt. 
Unleash the potential in your retirement plan. Your 401(k) or similar employer-sponsored plan is a great way to save for retirement. You can contribute pre-tax dollars, so the more you put in, the lower your taxable income, and your earnings can grow tax deferred. (With a Roth 401(k), you put in after-tax dollars, but your withdrawals are tax-free, provided you meet certain conditions.) But despite these tax advantages, your 401(k)'s full potential won't be realized unless you fund it adequately. Try to contribute as much as you can afford each year and increase your contributions as your salary goes up. Another way to unclog your 401(k)'s potential is by choosing appropriate investments. Your 401(k) likely contains a dozen or more investment options, so you'll want a mix that offers the greatest possibilities for growth within the context of your personal risk tolerance.

Gaining your financial independence requires time and commitment. But once you've achieved this freedom, you'll know it was worth the effort. And who knows? You might even want to wave a sparkler or two to celebrate.

Changes in Hardeman County Bus Routes

Hardeman County Schools is making some changes in our bus routes for the 2019-2020 school year. Below are the schools and routes that will be affected. We ask that you review this information carefully and call us at 731-658-3444 if you have any questions about which bus your student will be riding and the approximate time for pick up in the mornings. We also ask that you be patient with our drivers as we implement these changes to our routes. These changes are also posted on the district website at: www.hardemancountyschools.org Thank you.

Below are changes in bus routes for the Toone and Bolivar zones that may impact your students.

- Buses #1 and #5 are being eliminated.
- Bus #31 will pick up current route plus students zoned for Toone on Pine Top, Harris and Isaac Jordan Roads
- Bus #9 will cease to pick up on McNeal Street, which runs in front of the Columns. Bus #9 will pick up Hwy 125 North, Fitts-Ross Rd, Ebenezer Rd, Hwy 100 toward Bolivar from Pine Top Rd, Naylor Rd and Cloverport Rd, which are zoned for Bolivar. Bus #9 will continue to pick up students on Main Street, entering Bolivar on Hwy 18 North. This includes most of Bus #1's old route.
- Bus #58 will cease to pick up on Elmview Street. Bus #58 will pick up the rest of its current route, adding McNeal Street, Madison Street, Butler Street, West Jackson Street and the area around Bolivar Municipal Center, North Washington Street and the area around the Bolivar Library. These areas include parts of Bus #1's and Bus #9's route in Bolivar.
- Bus #60 - Current Route and add Elmview Street, which is off of Sain Rd.
- Bus #6 will keep current route and will add Walton Road and Vildo Road, between Old Hwy 64 and New Hwy 64. Bus #6 will not pick up students north of New Hwy 64. These are students that were a part of bus #5's and bus #13's old routes.
- Bus #13 will no longer pick up on Vildo road between Old Hwy 64 and New Hwy 64, the area beside/ behind the Hardeman County Fairgrounds and will no longer pick up on Jackson Street or Lee Street. Bus #13 will pick up all of Vildo Road, north of New Hwy 64, and Walton Road, North of Hwy 64. This is part of Bus #5's old route. In addition, Bus #13 will pick up on Pleasant Creek Lane, which is across from Joe's Restaurant.
- Bus #11 will continue its current route and add Jackson St. and Lee St.
- Bus #25 will cease to pick up students behind Jervis, Young Road and Roger Avenue. Bus #25 will pick up all students in the Country Club Area, including Hines Blvd, Stevens Road, Lucy Black Rd, Nuckolls Rd, Janet Rd, Blue Bonnet Ln, Karen Drive and El Capitan. This includes parts of Bus #5's old route
- Bus #56 will pick up all students for BCHS, BES & BMS on Tate Rd, Young Rd and Roger Avenue, including all the area behind Jervis.

Below are changes in bus routes for the Grand Junction zone that may impact your students.

- Buses #18 and #53 are being eliminated.
- Bus #61 will pick up the area around Grand Junction Elementary School, west side of Grand Junction, area around the Grand Junction Library, west of Grand Junction on Hwy 57, Hwy 18 to Hwy 368, Hwy 368, area around CO-OP, Smith Drive and Holder Road.
- Bus #41 will pick up in Saulsbery, south of College Street, Indian Creek Road and Park Swain Road.
- Bus #42 will pick up the area on and around Van Buren Road from Lake Hardeman Road to Hwy 57 in Saulsbery. Bus #42 will not pick up/drop off on Hwy 57.
- Bus #45 will pick up on Hwy 18 South to Hwy 368 and will pick up on the roads adjoining Hwy 18 between Hickory Valley and Hwy 368, which are zoned for Grand Junction and/or Middleton High School.
- Bus #47 will pick up all students on Hwy 57, who are zoned for Grand Junction Elementary/Middleton High School and live in the Grand Junction Zone.

- All Students will transfer at Grand Junction Elementary School at 7:15 AM.
- Buses #19, #45 and #47 will transfer students to Middleton High School.
- High School students from Bus#42 will transfer to Bus #19, Bus #41 will transfer to Bus #45 and Bus #61 will transfer to #47.

FAITH

Jesus as God, Part 7 by Jeff Capshaw

In the past two week's articles, I commented on Colossians 1:15-20. Although barely skimming the surface, several profound statements concerning the person of Christ emerged.

First, Jesus is the icon of the invisible God, an exact representation of God. Next, Jesus is the cosmic creator. Third, he sustains all of creation. Fourth, he existed "before all things" which he also created. Fifth, he is the preeminent one, the "valedictorian," as it were, above all created things. Finally, Paul said that the fullness of deity is embodied in Christ.

In this week's passage (Philippians 2:5-11), Paul teaches that Christ is divine but from a different perspective. Thus, Christ's self-humbling, his laying aside of his divinity, presupposes he possessed a divine nature to shed. Note, however, with this—as with other passages combining the divine and human natures in the single person of Christ—comes a mystery to embrace.

In previous columns, I provided examples from contemporary physics, cosmology, and other scientific disciplines which also entail profound mysteries.

There are hundreds of known phenomena in nature for which there is no scientific explanation: only theories. Thus, theological mysteries ought not overly to trouble us.

The primary point of this week's passage is Christian humility. "Let each of you look not only to his own interests, but also to the interests of others. Have this mind among yourselves, which is yours in Christ Jesus" (2:5-6). Accordingly, Paul goes on to provide the theological rationale for Christian humility in the verses that follow (2:7-9).

First, Paul claims that Jesus was "in the form of God" (v. 6). According to the early 20th century New Testament scholar, J.B. Lightfoot, the word "form" in this phrase "implies the essential attributes" of divinity. Lightfoot goes on to compare the phrase to "expressions used elsewhere of the divinity of the Son" (e.g. 2 Corinthians 4:4; Colossians 1:15). Paul then says that Jesus "did not count equality with God a thing to be grasped, but emptied himself, by taking the form of a servant, being born in the likeness of men" (2:6b-7). Theologians refer to this "emptying" by Christ,

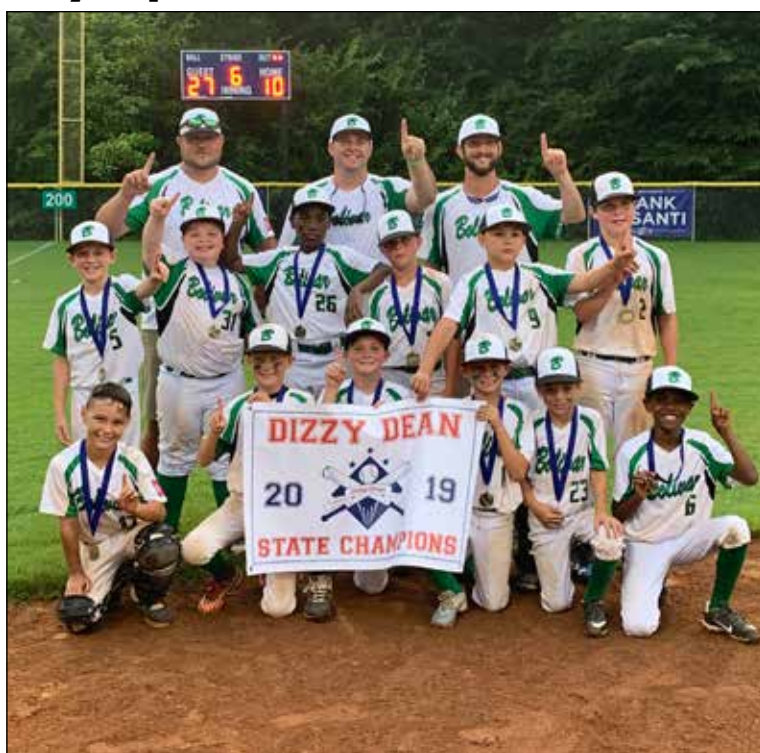

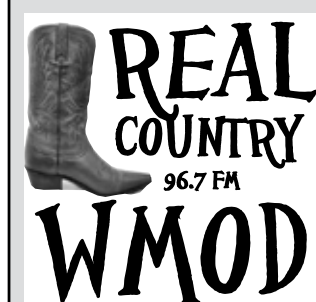
