## Restoring Bolivar Icons

Two Bolivar historic sites are on the way to being brought back to their previous glory as work has begun on the Pillars and is about to begin on the the Little Courthouse Museum in Bolivar.

“The Little Courthouse (see photo right) was built almost 200 years ago in 1824 on our Court Square. It is one of only three such log courthouses in America still standing, and the only one with a jail,” said Ken Savage, a former Association for the Preservation of Tennessee Antiquities (APTA) President.

While the work on the Little Courthouse is waiting on the release of grant money in August, the work on the Pillars is currently underway under the direction of Brad Grantham, who said his work is a labor of love for the city and he is not taking payment for it. Grantham sits on the Historical Commission Board and is the President of the APTA.

“We’ve begun looking at it, and there is a lot of rot and

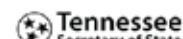

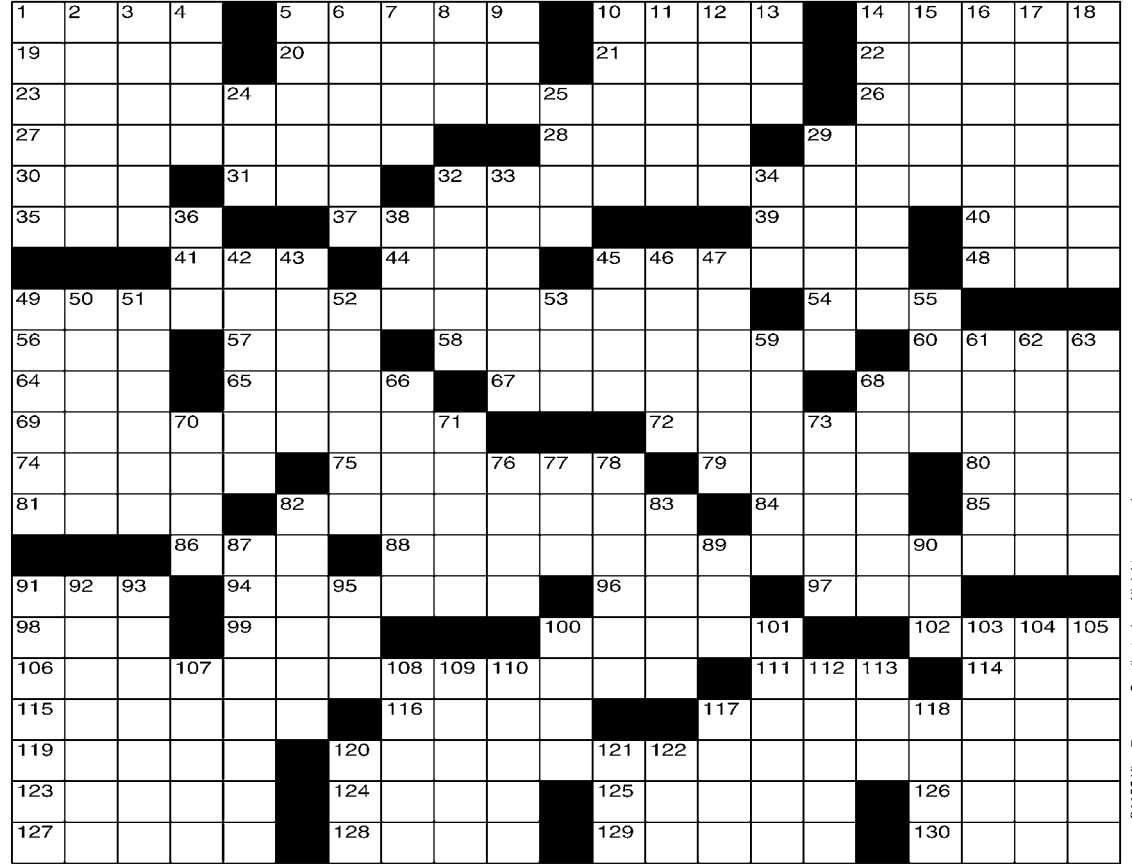

## Beyond our Control

The global pandemic, job uncertainties, economic hardships, and social unrest are events and circumstances beyond our control.

Consider one Christian blog's perspective. "If we were honest with ourselves, most of us would admit that we think we are captains of our fate and masters of our destiny. We do what we can to control our circumstances, sometimes in godly ways and sometimes in an ungodly manner. (www.ligonier.org).

Two prevalent views among scientists and philosophers today are materialism and physicalism. "Materialism is a form of philosophical monism that holds that matter is the fundamental substance in nature, and that all things, including mental states and consciousness, are results of material interactions." "Materialism is closely related to physicalism—the view that all that exists is ultimately physical." Therefore, there are no such things as souls, consciousness, supernatural beings, etc.

Given that either materialism or physicalism or some admixture of the two is true, then everything in the universe is already hard set with pre-determined outcomes. For example, the French scholar Pierre-

Simon de Laplace (1749–1827), once quipped that "if someone (the demon) knows the precise location and momentum of every atom in the universe, their past and future values for any given time are entailed; they can be calculated from the laws of classical mechanics."

But this only holds for big things in the universe: the macro world of galaxies, planets, stars, and so on. On the other hand, one interpretation of Quantum Mechanics (the study of the microscopic, sub-atomic particles of nature) suggests there is an indeterminacy at work on the universe. Observers can only know probably outcomes of a Quantum Mechanical system. Closely related is the view called Chaos Theory. It is a "branch of mathematics focusing on the study of chaos—states of dynamical systems whose apparently-random states of disorder and irregularities are often governed by deterministic laws that are highly sensitive to initial conditions."

All the above views leave one feeling fairly helpless and bleak, and renders life purposelessness and meaningless. It amounts to trusting fate. The Christian cannot deny that certain laws of nature—at

At the end of the July 21, 2020 county commission meeting, a public forum, one of the county commissioners made an effort to get information on the landfill situation. The county mayor refused to discuss the landfill in the public forum insisting that the commissioners call him by phone - apparently insisting that it be discussed privately. The Hardeman County landfill continues to be closed by the state to receiving waste. Instead, it is operating as a transfer station - unloading local trucks and reloading solid waste onto another truck to be hauled to another landfill - understood to be near Walnut, Mississippi. It is understood that this is added cost to the citizens of Hardeman County. Information on landfill inspections is available online at the Tennessee Department of Environment & Conservation - Solid Waste Management Dataviewer [On March 9, 2020 the state sent a letter by certified mail laying out requirements for a corrective action plan and giving 30 days for response. A response was not received until May and excluded one of the required action items. An email dated May 29, 2020 indicates the site continues to be in non-compliance, that landfill personnel are not informed, that no corrective work has been performed since March 2020, and the landfill is lacking a solid waste director or project manager. Why is this situation being kept from the public? Why does the county mayor refuse to discuss it in a public forum? The commissioners received the landfill information prior to the meeting. Any commissioners who spoke up and made an effort to be informed along with the public should be commended. Any commissioners who sat silent should be questioned.](http://environmentonline.tn.gov:8080/pls/enf_reports/f?p=19035:34202:0:::::Clicking on 'County' column heading and then selecting Hardeman - then clicking on 'Inspection_Type' column heading and selecting Solid Waste Facility Evaluation will filter down to list of monthly inspections for the Hardeman County landfill going back to February of 1998. One will also find that the Hardeman County landfill has received an inspection status of 'Major Violations Found' every month since May of 2016.</a></p>

## Faithful Families Thriving Communities Meeting Set

University of Tennessee Extension's Hardeman Healthy Outreach (H2O) will begin offering Faithful Families Thriving Communities this fall and early 2021. The program's mission is to inspire faith communities to be health champions for individuals, families and communities. The program is free and open to all faith-based organizations in the county.



Faithful Families promotes personal and environmental changes to support good health and prevent chronic disease. The program's nine lessons include information on eating smart at home and on-the-run, and moving more each day with an emphasis on the faith and health connection. Lessons include recipes, activities, discussions, and goal setting for leading healthier lives.

The program began in North Carolina and has spread throughout the eastern and southern United States and has been accepted as a "practice-tested intervention" by the Center of Excellence for Training and Research Translation at University of North Carolina Chapel Hill. Data from 2017 show that 93 percent of participants made at least one positive nutrition change; 78 percent made positive change related to food research management.

"Lay leaders are a key component to the success of Faithful Families as we collaborate to insure the goals of enhancing access to better nutrition and physical activity are reached," said Stephanie Middleton, UT Extension program assistant.

Faithful Families will kick off on Thursday, August 27 at 6 p.m. at the Hardeman County Agri-Business Center, 210 Vildo Road, Bolivar. To ensure space is available for social distancing, those interested should register by calling UT-TSU Extension (731-658-2421) or emailing Stephanie Middleton, [smiddle6@utk.edu](mailto:smiddle6@utk.edu). A Zoom link will be made available to those who prefer an online option.

"Even through these times of trying to maintain social distancing to keep people safe and healthy, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recognizes the continued need to reduce or prevent the incidence of chronic disease," Amy Elizer, UT Extension specialist, said. "People with increased risk of severe illness from COVID-19 include people with underlying medical conditions such as cancer, chronic kidney disease, COPD, obesity, serious heart conditions and type 2 diabetes."

This project is funded by the CDC's High Obesity Program (HOP) and is working with The University of Tennessee Extension to improve access to food and physical activity opportunities throughout Hardeman County. "As trusted voices, they help get the word out about the importance of responding to the 2020 Census and how results impact the allocation of billions of dollars in federal funding for critical public services in their communities like hospitals, health care clinics, schools, education programs, roads, bridges and emergency response for the next 10 years."

"We are glad to be working with the Census Bureau and their local partners in support of a complete count for the 2020 Census," said Rev. Edwin C. Sanders II of Metropolitan Interdenominational Church in Nashville. "The 2020 Census means more than appropriate funding for our schools and infrastructure, it means our communities are seen, served, and our voices heard."

When more people respond on their own on the internet at [my2020census.gov](http://my2020census.gov), by phone at 844-330-2020, or through the mail, the number of homes that have to be visited is reduced.

The U.S. Constitution mandates a census of the population every 10 years. The goal of the 2020 Census is to count everyone who lives in the United States on April 1, 2020 (Census Day). Census statistics are used to determine the number of seats each state holds in the U.S. House of Representatives and informs how billions of dollars in federal funds will be allocated by state, local and federal lawmakers annually for the next 10 years.

## Wallace Turns 75

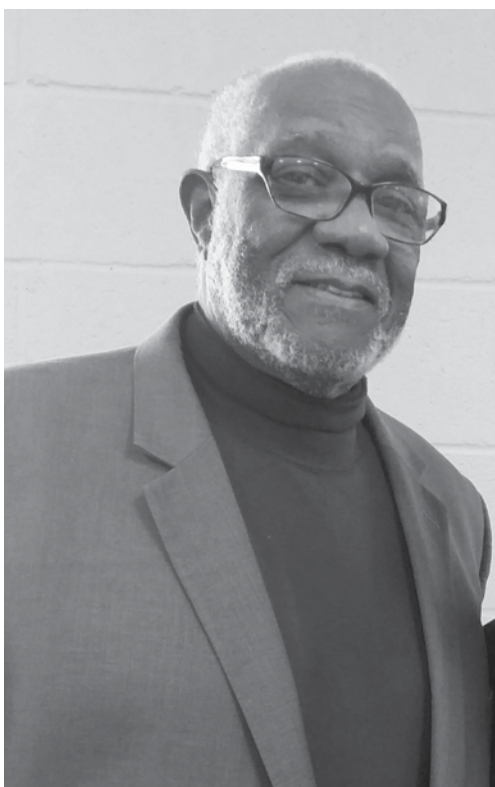

work to do," said Grantham, who is a certified restoration professional authorized by the United States Department of the Interior and whose work included the Luez Theatre.

The Pillars (see photo right) was built in 1826, with the original furnishings coming to Bolivar via steamboat on the Hatchie River. The modest original home was purchased in 1837 by regional cotton magnate Major John Houston Bills and enlarged it to its present-day style and size.

The county has plans to negotiate a lease with the APTA after the Little Courthouse is repaired, but Hardeman County Mayor Jimmy Sain says it needs to be finalized after the restoration was completed.

"The APTA is a very worthy organization in the County to lease the Little Courthouse to, but the building under the care of the group became in critical disrepair. Grant funding was applied for, but not awarded. There was no need in discussing a new lease until funding could be acquired for the renovations. The county employed a person to oversee the building monthly during this time. That person is a member of the APTA. Funding has been acquired for the renovations, but will not be available until August 1, 2020. APTA President Brad Grantham is aware of the funding and will be a principal person to oversee the renovations," said Sain.

# Are We Ready for Some Football?

In the words of Saturday Night Live's Gilda Radner as Emily Littella, never mind.

In a press conference on July 28, Tennessee Governor Bill Lee announced that he would soon sign Executive Order No. 55, which will include TSSAA member schools in an exception to contact sports restrictions, ending the suspension of practices, game schedules and more and putting back sports schedules to business as usual.

"We appreciate being able to work with Governor Lee and his staff on this," said Bernard Childress, Executive Director of the TSSAA. "I am pleased that we were able to develop some very specific guidelines for every sport that will allow our kids to get out on their fields and fully participate in football and girls' soccer this fall."

Although contact practice is now permissible, the regulations and requirements for practice and competition adopted by the Board of Control at their July 22 meeting are still in place for all sports and must be followed.

"Children across the state are counting on us--school administrators and coaches--to proceed with practices and competitions safely while being very mindful of the requirements and modifications that we have put in place," Childress added. "Our return to play is a partnership, and

it's important for everyone to do their part."

Football teams were allowed to begin heat acclimatization on July 20. Each athlete must complete heat acclimatization (2 days of helmets only, 3 days in helmets and shoulder pads) before practicing in full equipment, which is now permitted.

No changes to the 2020 football schedule, regular season or otherwise, will be made. The contingency plan for football passed by the Board of Control last week stated that if contact practice could resume prior to August 4, then no contests would be rescheduled. Therefore, the Date of First Contest for football remains as August 21 with state championships December 3-5 in Cookeville.

"This is good news for many kids and their families," Childress added, "but the reality is that the virus will continue to be with us and we have to be smart about taming the spread. Every adult and every participant in every sport must do their part and follow the guidelines set forth by TSSAA and the governor's office to help mitigate these risks."

Bolivar is scheduled to open the season at home versus Freedom Prep on August 21, while Middleton is scheduled to face Collinwood at T.D. Owens Field in Middleton. Mid-



dleton's schedule may be effected by two games scheduled against Mississippi schools, who won't begin games until September. Middleton is scheduled to face Alcorn Central on August 28 and Walnut on September 11.

Earlier in July, the TSSAA had announced no practices would be held until late August, with the season perhaps beginning in mid-September. Lee's order had given the right for professional and college governing bodies to make decisions, and this order now appears to extend to the TSSAA.
