A Fight for the Ballot Box

Voters in Hardeman County and Tennessee are waiting to see how and where they might vote in the coming months.

On June 4, Davidson County Chancellor Ellen Hobbs Lyle ordered state government to abandon long standing requirements for in-person voting, challenging Republican Secretary of State Tre Hargett's office that fear of catching or spreading the COVID-19 virus at the polls wouldn't qualify someone to vote by mail. Hargett cited lack of money, personnel and equipment for increased voting by mail, among other concerns in his reasoning.

Tennessee is one of 15 states in the country that requires voters to have a "qualifying excuse" to obtain an absentee ballot, with more than a dozen categories, from being sick to being 60 and older.

Democrats in the area were quick to call on Governor Bill Lee to keep open the absentee ballot process to all Tennesseans without requiring an excuse.

"This is a matter of public safety. More than 70 people were infected with COVID-19 after voting or working the polls in Wisconsin in April. No voter should be forced to choose between their health and their voice in our democracy," said Willie Spencer, Chair of the Hardeman County Democratic Party.

Spencer said the Hardeman County Democratic Party also asks the county/city mayors of Hardeman County to support the plea to Governor Lee.

"We are in the midst of a pandemic that prompted the

Response from the Tennessee Attorney General

Tennessee's election officials consulted with experts from the Tennessee Department of Health and county health departments to create a comprehensive COVID-19 election plan that conforms to the CDC's guidance and makes Tennessee's polling places safer than the general community.

The court's ruling, while rightly taking into account the safety of Tennessee's voters and poll workers, failed to appropriately consider the extensive safety measures of the COVID-19 election plan, and, more importantly, gave little weight to the unanimous expertise of state and county election officials that hastily expanding absentee voting is impracticable and risks disenfranchising Tennessee voters.

The court's order has taken this important decision away from Tennessee's state and county election experts and unnecessarily risks voter confusion, potential voter fraud, and election disruption.

"It is yet another court decision replacing legislation passed by the people's elected officials with its own judgment, largely ignoring the practicalities of implementing such a decision, and doing so in the midst of a pandemic and budget crisis," said Slatery.

governor to declare a state of emergency in March and now has killed more than 400 Tennesseans," Spencer said. "Moving to authorize absentee voting on demand for the

remainder of the 2020 election season would be another responsible gubernatorial step to prevent a substantial risk to public health. Tennessee ranks 49th in the nation for voter turnout and that's not going to improve if residents are afraid for their lives."

A spokesperson for the Hardeman County Republican Party said they would wait for a ruling on the appeal before making comment on the issue.

According to the press release from the Hardeman County Democratic Party, 29 states are allowing any voter to request an absentee ballot without preconditions. Another five states have the possibility of conducting their elections entirely by mail.

With Lyle's ruling, it is unknown if the mandate will be implemented in a timely fashion but all voters can ask for applications for absentee ballots online at sos.tn.gov/products/elections/absentee-voting.

Historically, Tennessee has historically seen less than 2.5% of votes cast by mail.

Both the Republican controlled Tennessee Senate and the Tennessee House of Representatives have, in the past few months, rejected attempts to vote in the expansion of absentee voting.

Details on six Hardeman County Municipal Elections, scheduled for November 3, 2020, are on A11.

State Primaries and County Elections are scheduled for August.

Davis Takes Reins at Hardeman County 911

Assistant Connie Davis will lead the Hardeman County 911 Office as the interim director after a week of changes in directors.

Davis was tabbed to take the spot after the resignation of interim director Chris Bell, who also chairs the 911 committee for Hardeman County.

Bell had replaced Mary Henderson, who left the post after approximately 20 years of service to the county on May 29.

Bell now will return to chair the committee along with newly appointed Gary Byers of Middleton, Whiteville City Administrator Mark McCrory, and Bolivar Police Chief Mike Jones, who were added on June 2. They will join Commissioner Gary Barber, Bell, Bolivar City Councilman Larry Crawford, Virlene Brown, and Hardeman County Trustee Mary Powell on the 911 committee.

The committee is scheduled to meet Friday, June 12.

Savage Promoted to Commander in the U.S. Navy

Kenneth E. Savage, Jr. has been promoted to Commander in the U.S. Navy Reserves.

The son of Kenneth E. Savage, Sr of Bolivar and Janelle Wourle of Savannah, TN and stepson of Debra Savage, LCDR Savage was born in Mobile, AL then grew up in Bolivar, Tennessee. He graduated from Bolivar Central High School in 1989, enlisted in the Navy, and attended basic training in San Diego February 1990. After graduating Aircraft Electrician "A" School in Millington, TN November 1990, assigned to Sea Control Squadron 29 the Dragonfires S-3B Vikings out of NAS North Island, CA. He deployed twice onboard CVN-72 Abraham Lincoln during Operation Desert Storm (1991) and Southern Watch (1993). After VS-29, he spent two years on shore duty with the Shamrocks of VS-41 before deploying again onboard CVN-72 with VS-35 the Blue Wolves in 1998.

AE2 Savage transferred from Active Duty Navy to the Naval Reserves in November 1998 requiring him to cross rate to Boatswain's Mate (BM) assigned to a submarine unit in Kings Bay, GA. Determined to stay in the aviation, he earned a Bachelor of Science in Professional Aeronautics from Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University in October 2003 and commissioned one year later as an Aerospace Maintenance Duty Officer (AMDO).

After his commissioning and until December 2009, he worked in Millington, TN with Navy Casualty's POW/MIA division. After this rewarding tour, LT Savage reported to the Revelers of Fleet Logistics Support Squadron 54 C-130T Hercules out of NAS New Orleans, LA. During his eight-year tour, he served as MMCO, QAO, and AMO then in 2011, served in Operation Tomodachi after the Tōhoku earthquake and tsunami destroyed the Fukushima Daiichi nuclear power plant as the AMDO in charge of the Forward Repairable Inspection Activity. This assignment entailed processing, decontaminating, to within acceptable limits or quarantining, documenting, and shipping all potentially radiological contaminated Navy and Marine Corps aviation and maritime depot level repairables for return to wholesale and retail supply system. In November of 2017, he transferred to the River Rattlers of Strike Fighter Squadron 204 F/A-18 out of New Orleans, LA where currently assigned as the AMO.

In his civilian career, he works as an Aviation Safety Inspector with the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) the Aviation Safety Action Program (ASAP) Manager with direct oversight of Federal Express's Airworthiness Maintenance departments.

LCDR Savage's personal awards include Navy Commendation Medal (two), Navy Achievement Medal (four), Humanitarian Medal (two), as well as numerous unit, campaign and individual awards. He resides in Memphis, TN, with his wife, Michelle, and has two grown children, stepdaughter Kathryn Luckman Kline and son Quentin.

LCDR Savage was #2 of 3 members selected out of 9 potential Aerospace Maintenance Duty Officers (AMDO) candidates within the entire Naval Reserves.

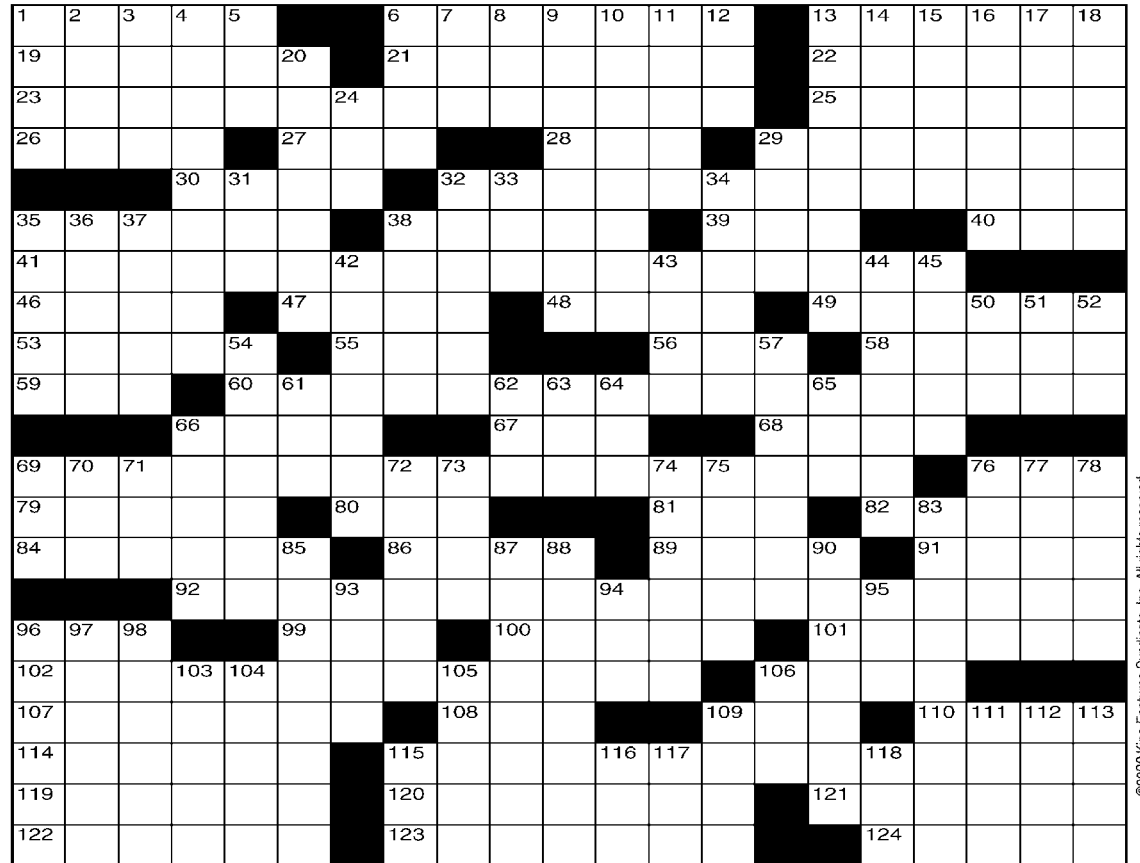

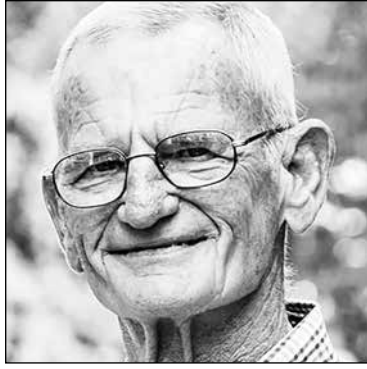

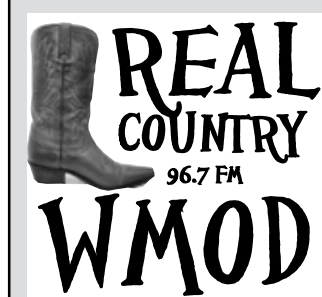

They are hired on a project basis - the US Census Bureau needs this information every ten years so that they can create this demographic profile which is why census enumerators may not be hired on a regular basis.

It is very important for census enumerators to know how accuracy will affect the outcome of their work.

This is why there is much emphasis placed on how well they are trained; census enumerators must know how residents are defined in an official capacity and how they need to be counted.

A mistake in counting 100 people less in a city may mean a significant amount of loss of state revenue!

It is important for census enumerators to be good conversationalists as they interview people on a daily basis during the span of a census project.



Perhaps you had planned to become a world traveler when your working days were over. Of course, in the near term, extensive travel may not be possible, anyway, but once we move past the pandemic, your freedom to roam will likely return. But if your investment portfolio is not where you thought it might be, can you (or do you want to) adapt your lifestyle plans? And can you accept the same flexibility with your other lifestyle goals, such as purchasing a vacation home, pursuing hobbies, and so on?
 - Tradeoffs – Based on your retirement goals and your willingness to adjust your retirement lifestyle, you'll want to consider your options and tradeoffs. For example, would you be willing to work more years than you had originally planned in exchange for greater confidence in your ability to enjoy a comfortable retirement lifestyle? By working longer, you can continue adding to your IRA and 401(k) or similar retirement plan, and you may be able to push back the date you start receiving Social Security to receive bigger monthly benefits. The Editor's Inbox...Letters to the Editor

The June 4, 2020 edition of this paper included the article "Bill Dance Signature Lake on Final Approach for Landing". The article suggests the contracting with engineering and consulting firms is recent but does not give a time relevance on references to the US [Army] Corp of Engineers (USACE), Bill Dance review and statements, University of Memphis Sparks Bureau, and the projected number of visitors and economic impact. A review of information obtained through public records requests to local, state, and federal offices suggest clarification and rebuttal of claims and statements are warranted.

A Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request to the Memphis District USACE should clarify when meetings were held with Environmental Attorney Laura Benz. At last check her most recent meeting with USACE was April 11, 2019. A FOIA request in regard to that meeting obtained one notation from the meeting which stated "Prop lake would be on Pleasant Run Creek - immediately west of Bolivar". No other notation.

A public records request to the University of Memphis Sparks Bureau obtained a copy of a five page report produced by the center. That five page report was titled "The Economic Impacts of the Proposed Spring Creek Lake on Hardeman County". While the report was not dated it appeared to be composed in 2014 as it indicated making adjustments to "...2014 dollars.". The opening statements in the report are "This document provides a brief look at the economic impacts of the proposed Spring Creek Lake development in Hardeman County, Tennessee. Specifically, the analysis is limited to the large lake, primitive recreational facility scenario as presented in the Spring Creek Lake Feasibility Study (1985)...." (emphasized). In other words, Sparks did not conduct a feasibility study. They repeated the findings in a twenty nine year old (now 35 years old) report. The 1985 study included five reservoir scenarios of different dam locations along Spring Creek. That study found that none of the scenarios justified the cost of lake development and, at best, could pay for operating costs. The report stated in its Executive Summary "No level of recreational development considered will generate sufficient revenues to support annual operating costs and retire capital indebtedness. It appears that revenues will at best cover only annual operating and maintenance costs. Capital costs for lake facility development would essentially have to be subsidized".

An email exchange with the Sparks Center Director of the Bureau of Business and Economic Research and the Center for Manpower obtained the following statements " Bob. Always glad to help but you really need to find the authors of the original study for many of your questions. IMPLAN is a widely used and recognized model for looking at the potential impact of projects like this one. A completely new in-depth study needs to done for any project that might be under consideration. No study nearly 40 years old can have much value or accuracy at this point in time even if we updated the numbers in 2014 (emphasized). It appears you are most concerned about the financial feasibility of the project but those questions were addressed in the 85 study. An economic evaluation or justification for the project requires much more information than can be determined from that study. The best answers to your questions are as follows: The implan model doesn't provide any information about the validity or accuracy of those cost or revenue estimates. Those were all provided by the State and were used for the initial study in 85. The financial feasibility and funding options were not re-examined in detail in 2014. So there is no way to look at those issues without a new feasibility study by the state of any project under consideration. It does not surprise me that the project would be more feasible now but would still have to be funded and supported by the State (emphasized). Many of the tax gains from developing housing for example would fall to local governments. I encourage you to get the State to look in detail at any project under consideration. They could answer your questions in more detail. " In other words - the Sparks Center disavowed any factual claim of economic feasibility.

At last check there had not been a comprehensive and time relevant economic feasibility study conducted for a lake project in Hardeman County. The contract signed by Laura Benz and Mayor Jimmy Sain dated March 17, 2016 indicates the attorney Laura Benz's focus is on permitting - not economic feasibility. It seems unreasonable to claim public benefit based on a thirty five year old feasibility study for a proposed lake that has changed in nature and probably location. Particularly given that 1985 study claimed no scenario in its consideration was economically justifiable. Add in the experience Carroll County is having with its similar actual lake project and claims become more dubious - given that the Carroll County project, according to annual reports and statistics is currently a local public burden - not benefit. The vast majority of the Carroll County lake development cost came from and operating costs are coming from local tax revenue.

Manage Mowing to Benefit Wildlife from UT Extension and the TWRA

Mowing or bushhogging can be devastating to many Tennessee wildlife species that nest in fields at this time of year, which include white-tailed deer, bobwhite quail, cottontail rabbits, wild turkey, and ground-nesting songbirds, such as eastern meadowlark. The Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency says waiting until after mid-August greatly reduces the chance of killing and injuring nesting and newborn wildlife and still allows for effective field maintenance.



"Although we like to keep our lawns and other immediate homestead property looking clean and neat by regular mowing, old fields and odd areas that are left to grow in grasses, clovers and natural broadleaf plants provide valuable nesting and brood-rearing cover spring through mid-summer," said Mark Gudlin, TWRA Habitat Program manager. "Refraining from mowing during this time not only is beneficial to wildlife, but saves you gas as you use your mower less."

Problem spots with woody vegetation can easily be spot-sprayed or controlled without mowing the entire field. In addition, if mowing is intended to allow more accessibility, consideration should be made for mowing paths rather than entire fields. Not only will you still be able to walk around and enjoy your land, you also will retain cover that is critical to the wildlife you enjoy seeing use your fields.

Craig Harper, University of Tennessee Extension wildlife specialist, has authored a number of publications on habitat preservation and management. "A Quick Guide for Landowners: Managing Old-fields for Wildlife (PB 1855)" details management techniques for specific field conditions and species. The publication can be viewed on the UT Extension website: extension.tennessee.edu/publications.
