It's changed, but really it's kind of the same when it comes to why you go.



Enhance Food with Summer Herbs by Carolyn Tomlin

As you plan your garden, add a few herbs to your vegetable plot. Herbs can be grown successfully in containers with at least 6-hours of sunlight daily. They're easy to grow and will be an addition to many recipes.

Using herbs to enhance flavors of food is nothing new. They go back hundreds of years and are the basis for many foreign dishes.

Create unique ways to include these plants as part of a healthy diet. Try these tasty recipes for a different flavor to accompany favorite food.

Southern Tomato Pie

3 eggs beaten

1/4 cup milk

1 T. plain flour

1 T. olive oil

2 medium size tomatoes, thickly sliced

Salt and pepper to taste (use course ground pepper)

3 Tablespoon fresh basil, chopped

2 Tablespoon fresh chives, chopped

1/4 cup lite mayonnaise

1 cup grated cheese (Cheddar, sharp or mild)

½ cup chopped bacon for topping

Stir flour into milk and add to beaten eggs and oil. Slice tomatoes and place in bottom of oven-proof dish; sprinkle with salt and pepper. Add mayonnaise, cheese and herbs to egg mixture. Spoon this mixture over tomatoes. Bake at 400 ° F. for 20-30 minutes. Top with crisp bacon pieces. Makes 6 servings.

Parsley-Mustard Margarine Spread

2 sticks low-fat, soft-spread margarine

1 tablespoon fresh parsley, minced

2 teaspoons prepared mustard

Mix margarine, parsley and mustard together. Let stand in the refrigerator several hours to enhance flavors. Use as a topping on baked potatoes, a spread on homemade bread or crackers. Makes 1 cup.

Herb Croutons

1 loaf French bread, cut in cubes

1 Tablespoon parsley, chopped

1 Tablespoon onions, minced

1 Tablespoon rosemary, chopped

½ cup olive oil

1 teaspoon salt

1 teaspoon course-ground black pepper

Cut bread into cubes. Place in a large mixing bowl. Add herbs, oil and seasoning and toss together. Place on a large 15-inch by 10-inch baking sheet. Heat in a 300° oven for 45-minutes or until crusty. Toss often while baking. Remove from oven and spread on a kitchen towel to cool. Add croutons to a tossed salad or soup. Store in an air-tight container or the refrigerator.

Tips for using herbs in cooking

- 1 lb. leaves = 16 cups
- 1 cup leaves = 1 ounce
- Substitute dried herbs at 1/3 the amount of fresh herbs.
- Add basil just before serving. The longer it simmers, the weaker the flavor.
- Store fresh herbs in the refrigerator with stems in an inch of water.
- Wash herbs prior to use; pat dry with a towel.
- Preserve extra herbs by drying (place in a paper bag in the refrigerator), hang to dry in a dark room with good ventilation or freeze leaves in ice cube trays and water. Remove and drop in a plastic bag until ready

Cooking with herbs brings out the natural flavor of familiar foods. Grow your own in small pots or look for herbs at a farmer's market. You're sure to find tasty recipes to share with family and friends.





Ingredients 1/2 cup all-purpose flour, plus more dusting

One 16.5-ounce log refrigerated sugar cookie dough 15 drops red gel food coloring

15 drops blue gel food coloring 1/4 cup red, white and blue sprinkles

Knead the all-purpose flour into the sugar cookie dough on a lightly floured surface until smooth, about 5 minutes. Divide the dough into thirds. Knead the red food coloring into one

piece of dough, the blue food coloring into another piece and leave the third piece plain. Flatten and wrap each piece in plastic wrap, then refrigerate for about 20 minutes. Roll each dough piece between two pieces of parchment to a roughly 11-by-7-by-1/8-inch rectangle. Wrap in plastic wrap and refrigerate again, about 20 minutes. Stack the dough rectangles in red, white and blue order using the parchment to help you transfer them. Use the parchment to help you roll the dough stack into a tight spiral, forming an 11-inch-long log. Pour the sprinkles onto a baking sheet, then roll the log in the sprinkles so it is completely covered in them. Wrap the log in plastic wrap and freeze until solid, about two hours. Position oven racks in the upper and lower thirds of the oven and preheat to 350 degrees F. Line two baking sheets with parchment. Cut 1/4 inch off each end of the log with a very sharp knife to reveal the swirly pattern. Cut the log into slices about 1/4 inch thick. Arrange the slices about 1 1/2 inches apart on the prepared baking sheets. Bake, rotating the baking sheets halfway



through, until the cookies are crisp and just starting to turn brown on the bottom, 10 to 12 minutes. Let cool on the baking sheets for 10 minutes before transferring them to a cooling rack to cool

Jesus as God, Part 6 by Jeff Capshaw

In last week's article, I discussed the first part of a significant passage in the New Testament about Christ's deity: Colossians 1:15-20. Paul begins a description of Christ related to his "preexistence," meaning his eternal, pre-incarnation existence as a member of the triune Godhead.

Paul asserted that Christ is an exact representation of God, that he is preeminent above all creation, and that Christ was even intimately involved in the creation of the Cosmos itself (1:15-16) because "all things were created through him and for him."

In verses 17-20, Paul continues to explain the implications of Christ's eternal existence in communion with the triune Godhead. He writes, "and he is before all things, and in him all things hold together" (1:17). The phrase "before all things" implies a time marker to punctuate Christ's existence as an eternal, divine being who also, in the words Hebrews, "upholds all things be a 'word' of his power" (1:3). That means that Christ also sustains the created order.

Similarly, in John's Gospel, Jesus had a dispute with the

Pharisees about their spiritual heritage as children of Abraham. Although kin to Abraham as natural descendants, Jesus claimed that they were actually spiritual descendants of Satan. Toward the end of that encounter, Jesus makes an astounding claim about himself. He said, "Your father Abraham rejoiced that he would see my day. He saw it and was glad.' So, the Jews said to him, 'You are not yet fifty years old, and have you seen Abraham'? Jesus said to them, 'Truly, truly, I say to you, before Abraham was, I am" (John 8:56-58). They knew Jesus was claiming to exist prior to Abraham because John reminds his readers that they tried to stone him for it (v. 59).

Finally, Paul packs into a mere 8 words in the original text one of the most profound statements in all of Scripture. Literally, it says, "because in him [Christ] all the fullness was pleased to dwell." The phrase "of God" isn't in the Greek text, but this entire passage should be understood in poetic terms. Perhaps it was part of an early creed or a hymn sung by the early Church.

Gordley's, New **Testament** Christological Hymns: Exploring Texts, Contexts, and Significance, the New Testament scholar, Larry Hurtado, sums up the significance of this passage among others as follows. "One of his further contributions is to emphasize the original social and historical contexts in which Christological praise and hymnic devotion were expressed. The texts all posit Jesus as the true universal saviour [sic] and ruler, which poses an obvious contrast with the Roman imperial narrative of Rome as the world ruler, and the emperor in particular

as rightful object of worship." Colossians 1:15-20, as well as other passages in the New Testament, indeed assert that Jesus is the cosmic Ruler, Savior, and even Creator. All these are just other ways of saying that Jesus is God.

MIKE JETER JULY 7, 1951 ~ JUNE 21, 2019



My name is Jana Sue Mathias-Bower and I am looking for information on my great grandmother, Margaret Sexton-Rice-Gabbard and her extended family. This has been a life long search for me and I'm hoping some of you can help me with this.

Here is the information I have. Please keep in mind, some of it may be wrong, after it has passed down through the family since the 1840s to the present day.

James C. Jones-Sexton who was born August 10, 1847-1849, in Mt. Zion, Tipton County, TN. He died March 15, 1910 in Memphis, Shelby County, TN. His wife was Nancy Jan McBride-Sexton was born in 1847-1848 in Mississippi. She died December 25, 1932 in Munford, Tipton County, TN. They were married on Feb. 3, 1870 in Tipton County, TN. It is said that James and his wife had 21 children. One of those children was my great grandmother, Margaret Sexton, born in 1874 in TN.

My great grandmother, Margaret Sexton, married John Fountian Rice, born Feb. 6, 1873 in Kentucky and died February 12, 1902 in Berean, Madison County, Kentucky. John and Margaret had three children; Estella, born December 27, 1895 in Kentucky, Lewis Preston, sometimes called Preston, born September 23, 1897 in Kentucky and Robert, born March 21, 1900 in Kentucky. Their father died when the children were quite young and my great grandmother Margaret, married again to a man named John Raphael Gabbard, who was called Rafe.

Margaret and her husband, John, had two children; Edith Dolores born in 1905 in Indiana and Minnie born June 24, 1911 in Berean, Madison County, Kentucky.

My great grandmother, Margaret-Sexton-Rice-Gabbard died on March 23, 1945 in Bolivar, Hardeman County, TN. Out of the 20 siblings of my great grandmother, Mrgaret, I only have seven names; Mary/Mary J./Mary Jane, Lena/Linar with the middle name of Olivia, who was also called Livy, Margaret Mannery called Mag, William/William James, Samuel, Minnie Lee and Nellie May.

I would love to hear from any Sexton descendants or from anyone who knew the Sexton family. I would love to have copies of any family information you have or photos. I will gladly reimburse you for the cost of postage and the cost of copying any information, no matter the amount.

I'd like to know if my great grandmother Margaret Sexton-Rice-Gabbard is buried in Bolivar and if so, what is the name of the cemetery and does she have a tombstone on her grave. Would love to have a photo of her tombstone and the entrance to the cemetery. I would also, love a copy of a photo of her as I have never seen what she looks like. I would love to know what her middle name was. I'd love to buy copies of any books



Farm Service Agency County Committee Nominations Open USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) has begun accepting nominations for county committee members.

Agricultural producers who participate or cooperate in an FSA program may be nominated for candidacy for the county committee. Individuals may nominate themselves or others as a candidate.

"I encourage America's farmers, ranchers, and forest stewards to nominate candidates to lead, serve, and represent their community on their county committee," FSA Administrator Richard Fordyce said. "There's an increasing need for diverse representation including underserved producers, which includes beginning, women and minority farmers and ranchers."

Committees make important decisions about how federal farm programs are administered locally. Their input is vital on how FSA carries out disaster programs, as well as conservation, commodity and price support programs, county office employment and other agricultural issues.

Nationwide, more than 7,700 dedicated members of the agricultural community serving on FSA county committees. The committees are made of three to 11 members and typically meet once a month. Members serve three-year terms. Producers serving on our FSA county committees play a critical role in the day-to-day operations of the agency.

Producers should visit their local FSA office today to find out how to get involved in their county's election. Check with your local USDA service center to see if your local administrative area is up for election this year. Organizations, including those representing beginning, women and minority producers, also may nominate candidates.

To be considered, a producer must sign an FSA-669A nomination form. The form and other information about FSA county committee elections are available at fsa.usda.gov/elections. All nomination forms for the 2019 election must be postmarked or received in the local FSA office by August 1, 2019.

Election ballots will be mailed to eligible voters beginning November 4, 2019.



Tales from the Yellow House

The Fourth Of July at the Yellow House was just a near normal day. The biggest thing that we celebrated was the fact that the crops were laid by as the country folk called it, and we were finished with most of the cotton chopping. The only fireworks around the house was Mom striking a match to light the fire in the cook stove in the kitchen. On the fourth, there was probably a big iron pot of fresh broken green beans with a big slab of cured pork slowly simmering on the stove. There were ripe tomatoes at this time. I could hardly wait for the first tomato to start turning. There is nothing better than a fat slice of shiny red tomato in a big home-made cat-head biscuit. Nowday's, I do not get too many home-made biscuits, but I love a "mater sammich" on white bread with a generous glob of Dukes mayo. Mom use to fry a big platter of green tomatoes. She sliced them thin, bathed them in a mixture of flour and cornmeal, salt and pepper, and fried them a golden brown. Sometimes she would fry up a batch of squash bloom fritters. She chopped up the squash blooms and combined them in a batter of flour, meal, milk and eggs and made them into patties and fried them. They taste kind of like a fried oyster. Really good.

As you can see, I completely veered away from the Fourth of July and started talking food. I suppose everyone remembers their Moms cooking. Most people will be quick to tell you that no one cooks like their Mom. They may not get on a stump and shout it to the world, for fear of a rolling pin up side of their head, but I bet they think it to themselves. Sometimes if Dad had the money to buy a block of ice from the ice-man, he would borrow an icecream maker and make some icecream on the fourth. This was a big treat for us. I always watched him make each turn of the crank. When it began to get hard to turn, I knew it would soon be ready to eat. After he finished the turning, he would cover the icecream maker with an old quilt and let it sit for awhile. I don't know what that was for unless it was to make my mouth water more. I would eat the icecream so fast that my

head would start hurting. I believe that we called this situation "brain freeze". We would usually have some company on the fourth and most times we ended up on the front porch in the early evening hours playing music. I can still hear Mom playing Boil Them Cabbage Down on her fiddle, and the steady chorous of the whipperwills as they performed their own concert in the fields surrounding the Yellow House. Happy Fourth Of July to everyone and may God bless our country.

Changes in Hardeman County Bus Routes

Hardeman County Schools is making some changes in our bus routes for the 2019-2020 school year. Below are the schools and routes that will be affected. We ask that you review this information carefully and call us at 731-658-3444 if you have any questions about which bus your student will be riding and the approximate time for pick up in the mornings. We also ask that you be patient with our drivers as we implement these changes to our routes. These changes are also posted on the district website at: www. hardemancountyschools.org Thank you.

Below are changes in bus routes for the Toone and Bolivar zones that may impact your

- Buses #1 and #5 are being eliminated.
- Bus #31 will pick up current route plus students zoned for Toone on Pine Top, Harris and Isaac Jordan Roads
- Bus #9 will cease to pick up on McNeal Street, which runs in front of the Columns. Bus #9 will pick up Hwy 125 North, Fitts-Ross Rd, Ebenezer Rd, Hwy 100 toward Bolivar from Pine Top Rd, Naylor Rd and Cloverport Rd, which are zoned for Bolivar. Bus #9 will continue to pick up students on Main Street, entering Bolivar on Hwy 18 North. This includes most of Bus #1's old route.
- Bus #58 will cease to pick up on Elmview Street. Bus #58 will pick up the rest of its current route, adding McNeal Street, Madison Street, Butler Street, West Jackson Street and the area around Bolivar Municipal Center, North Washington Street and the area around the Bolivar Library. These areas include parts of Bus #1's and Bus #9's route in Bolivar.
- Bus #60 Current Route and add Elmview Street, which is off of Sain Rd.
- Bus #6 will keep current route and will add Walton Road and Vildo Road, between Old Hwy 64 and New Hwy 64. Bus #6 will not pick up students north of New Hwy 64. These are students that were a part of bus #5's and bus #13's old routes.
- Bus #13 will no longer pick up on Vildo road between Old Hwy 64 and New Hwy 64, the area beside/behind the Hardeman County Fairgrounds and will no longer pick up on Jackson Street or Lee Street. Bus #13 will pick up all of Vildo Road, north of New Hwy 64, and Walton Road, North of Hwy 64. This is part of Bus #5's old route. In addition, Bus #13 will pick up on Pleasant Creek Lane, which is across from Joe's Restaurant.
- Bus #11 will continue its current route and add Jackson St. and Lee St.
- Bus #25 will cease to pick up students behind Jervis, Young Road and Roger Avenue. Bus #25 will pick up all students in the Country Club Area, including Hines Blvd, Stevens Road, Lucy Black Rd, Nuckolls Rd, Janet Rd, Blue Bonnet Ln, Karen Drive and El Capitan. This includes parts of Bus #5's old route
- Bus #56 will pick up all students for BCHS, BES & BMS on Tate Rd, Young Rd and Roger Avenue, including all the area behind Jervis.

- Buses #18 and #53 are being eliminated.






