The Hardeman County Commission on May 21 voted unanimously to accept the 2019-2020 budget presented to them on the first reading after the Budget Committee itself barely moved the budget numbers out of their five-man committee.

The 16-0 vote pushed the process forward to the second reading and public hearing, which is scheduled for June 18. If passed in June, it would make the budget official.

The Hardeman County Budget Committee consists of commissioners Jackie Sain, Chris Bell, and Johnny Lanier, with Junior Jimmerson and Jerry Watkins rounding out the committee.

The final vote from the committee saw Sain and Bell reject the budget but it moved forward to the full commission with yes votes from Watkins, Jimmerson, and Lanier.

The Hardeman County Commission voted to meet monthly for the secmeasure. Voting against meeting monthly were Gary Barber, Chris Bell, Johnny Lanier, and Jackie Sain.

In March, the commission voted 12-3 to meet monthly. Voting against the move in March were Bell, Lanier, and Chandra Lake. Mac Vaughn did not attend the March meeting, but voted in favor of the change this week. The monthly meetings would begin in July.

Opening up the night is Hardeman County's Brian Lee Howell as Elvis. The evening is scheduled to begin at 7:00 p.m.



Jesus as God, Part 1 by Jeff Capshaw

The Christian scholar and theologian, Wayne Grudem, said that the greatest miracle in all the Bible is the fact that Jesus is fully divine and fully human. There just is nothing in our normal experience which enables us to comprehend this truth. It is a mystery which defies common sense and is utterly counter-intuitive, but this is not unique to theology.

According to modern science, many facts about nature prove to be totally unrelatable to our normal experiences. There simply are no sufficient analogies or illustrations that will elucidate them. Additionally, one would be considered foolish or delusional to deny some of them.

Take Quantum Mechanics (QM); even experts call it bazaar. The late Nobel Laureate, Richard Feynman even said, "nobody understands QM." QM is the study of the behavior of infinitesimally small atoms and their sub-atomic constituents. At those tiny scales, classical physics breaks down and no longer works. For example, humans can see objects down to about a length of 0.1 millimeter. That's smaller than a grain of salt. Yet, electrons are so small that no one has been able to determine their size, but they have calculated the largest their radius could be, and that's one billionth of one bil-

lionth of a meter.

Moreover, according to some interpretations of QM, particles can be in superposition: two places at once. Also, physicists are only able to calculate either their position or momentum but never both simultaneously. Oddly as well, particles, once they become entangled, appear to be able to communicate with each other at great distances and at speeds faster than light, thus seemingly violating Einstein's Theory of Relativity. As a matter of fact, he called it "spooky action at a distance" and died believing there were hidden variables yet to be discovered about QM.

Finally, some interpretations suggest that somehow, by measuring a particle, it collapses its wave function. Yes. The observer somehow impacts the behavior of particles. Although QM has been marvelously successful and enabled the wonders of modern technology, these and other mysteries remain unsolved as do many other phenomena of nature.

So, just because we can't get our heads around something, it doesn't mean it isn't so. Scripture is clear. "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things were made through him, and without him was not anything made



GRAND JCT AREA PLANNED POWER OUTAGE

Bolivar Energy Authority will have a planned power outage in the City of Grand Junction and surrounding area south of Grand Junction starting at midnight June 1 and lasting for approximately 2 hours. Power should be restored by 2 a.m. on June 2 to everyone except consumers adjacent to and near the Post Office. Areas affected by the planned outage include City of Grand Junction, Jenkins Rd area, Park Swain Rd. area, Holder Rd. area, and Indian Creek Rd. area.

The reason for the planned outage is to switch over to new feed for the City of Grand Junction and the surrounding areas south of town.

This planned outage is weather dependent and will be rescheduled in the event of inclement weather.

Equine Disease Found in West Tennessee

The Tennessee Department of Agriculture is advising horse owners of a case of equine infectious anemia (EIA) in West Tennessee.

A horse stabled at a farm in Shelby County recently tested positive for EIA. The horse has been euthanized, and state officials are now testing additional horses that stabled with or live near the infected horse

EIA is not contagious to humans. It is a blood-borne illness that can be fatal for horses. Symptoms may include fever, weakness, swelling, loss of appetite, or colic. However, an infected horse may not show any clinical signs. There is no treatment or vaccine. Once infected, a horse must be permanently quarantined or

In January, four horses stabled at a farm in Rutherford County were euthanized after they tested positive for EIA. Six other horses at the same farm tested negative.

State law requires an annual Coggins test to check for the presence of EIA before any horse is transported from its home farm to a different location. Although that paperwork is valid for one year, horse owners may want to consider testing their livestock more frequently.

"Early detection and containment are critical to preventing the spread of EIA," Interim State Veterinarian Doug Balthaser, D.V.M. said. "We urge horse owners to practice good animal husbandry and regularly test their horses. As always, contact your veterinarian if you notice any signs of illness in your livestock."

- Other tips include:
- Don't co-mingle your horse with other, unfamiliar horses. • Do not share needles or any other medical supplies that come into contact with blood.
- Keep the area in and around your barn clean to reduce the fly population.

The C.E. Kord Animal Health Diagnostic Laboratory offers a full line of equine disease testing, including West Nile virus, equine infectious anemia, equine herpes virus, equine protozoal myeloencephalitis, eastern equine encephalitis, and equine influenza virus. 

Take a Closer Look at Myths **Surrounding 529 Plans**

If you want to help pay for your children's college educations, you might want to consider contributing to a 529 plan. With this plan, your earnings grow federally tax-free, as long as the withdrawals are used for qualified higher education expenses such as tuition and room and board. Yet, you may have heard some things about 529 plans that are keeping you from investing in one. However, these concerns may be more myth than reality – so let's take a look at a few of them.

"I need a lot of money to contribute to the plan." This myth has essentially no truth to it. Typically, only a modest amount is required to open your 529 plan, and you can generally transfer small sums to it from your checking or savings account.

"If my child doesn't go to college, I lose out on the money I've put in." This myth runs counter to one of the 529 plan's greatest benefits: flexibility. If you've named one child (or grandchild) as a beneficiary of a 529 plan, and that child or grandchild decides against pursuing higher education, you can simply change the beneficiary to another eligible family member. Furthermore, if none of your intended beneficiaries will need the 529 plan, you can name yourself the beneficiary and use the money to take classes or receive some other type of qualified education opportunity. In a worst-case scenario, in which the money is never used for education, you will be taxed on the earnings portion of the withdrawals - but had you never contributed to a 529 plan, the funds would have been taxed, anyway. (However, you might be subject to a 10% penalty tax, in addition to regular income taxes, again on the earnings portion of the withdrawals.)

"I have to invest in my own state's plan." Not true. You're free to invest in the 529 plan of any state, no matter where you live. But it could be advantageous for you to invest in your own state's plan, as you might receive some tax breaks for state residents. (The tax issues for 529 plans can be complex, so you'll want to consult with your tax advisor about your situation.) Investing in your own state's plan also might provide access to financial aid and scholarship funds, along with possible protection from creditors.

"A 529 plan will destroy my child's chances for financial aid." While a 529 plan could affect your child's financial aid prospects, it might not doom them. And the benefits of building significant assets in a 529 plan could outweigh the potential loss of some needs-based

Before investing in a 529 plan, you'll want to explore it thoroughly, as you would any investment. You can find details about a 529 plan's investment options, share classes, fees, expenses, risks and other information in the plan's program description or offering statement, which you should read carefully before making any purchasing deci-

But, in any case, don't let "myths" scare you off from what could be one of your best college-savings vehicles.


Anderson to Attend UT Martin


