## *le* Gather at the Rive was to create a nature center, museum and out-

The Bolivar City Council got closer to a financially viable solution for the Hatchie River Park on May 21, as they voted to return to the State of Tennessee approximately \$23,000 of funds already used by the city for the project.

The vote was 6-1 in favor of returning the funds, with Suzanne Rhea opposing the measure. Councilman Todd Lowe was not present for the meeting.

The money returned is part of the second grant the city obtained in relation to the former Boat Dock Bar and Grill property on Highway 18 North.

The first grant, for \$60,000, helped with the purchase of the property in 2014, while the second grant, obtained in 2017 for \$486,350,

When the bid was opened to construct the facility to satisfy the second grant, the bid of \$608,600 would have required the city to spend additional funds to complete the project. At that point, the council voted 7-1 to ask Mayor Julian McTizic to investigate with the State of Tennessee the option of returning the \$23,000 already used.

The original grant, which must be followed, only specified a "nature center" would be maintained on the property. What form the nature center takes is up to the state, according to McTizic.

Giving up the second grant could release the early 19th century.

"We are going to do new plans and ask for the approval of the state," said McTizic.

The Hatchie River, which runs diagonally through Hardeman County, is believed to be the only major river of West Tennessee that has never been impounded, channelized, or otherwise modified by human activity to any major degree. It is thought to be indicative of what much of West Tennessee must have resembled prior to the time of European settlement in

#### Hardeman County Remembered by Lisa Coleman

I have seen several commercials on television over the past few days that advertise "Memorial Day Sales" or some "Memorial Day Event" neither of which has a cotton-pickin' thing to do with Memorial Day, thank you ever so much. I have nothing against picnics, parades, programs, or promotions but let's remember to recognize the day for what it truly is and should be.

Memorial Day in the United States is a day when we stop and remember those who have given the supreme and ultimate sacrifice in service to their country. The day, interestingly enough, came about as a result of the Civil War. About three years after the end of the war, May 30 was designated as a "Decoration Day" to decorate and honor the graves of the dead who died during the Civil War. It is believed that May 30 was chosen because many flowers would be in bloom across the country and would lend a natural beautification to the service. Major General John A Logan of the Grand Army of the Republic (a Union veterans organization) ordered that "graves be decorated with the choicest of flowers of springtime...to guard their graves with a sacred vigilance."

For nearly a century, towns all over the U.S. claimed the honor of "founder" of Memorial Day. In 1966 President Lyndon Johnson and Congress declared that Waterloo, New York was the birthplace of Memorial Day, as it was believed they held one of the earliest documented days of remembrance on May

5, 1866 (See, it's important to document things. You never know when having that kind of information can come in handy.) In 1971, Memorial Day became an official national holiday. In 2000 Congress passed an act known as the "National Moment of Remembrance Act" which asks citizens to pause at 3:00 p.m. on Memorial Day for a moment of silent remembrance to honor those who have died in service to their nation.

Stop over this Memorial Day for more than a moment and remember those, perhaps those from your own family, who have died in serving and protecting our country and its freedoms. The Korean War Memorial in Washington D.C. has the poignant phrase, "Freedom is Not Free" etched into the marble, and it is a fitting phrase to remember this Memorial Day, y'all.




Advising and registration will begin at 10:45. An optional tour of UT Martin's campus, which is a Level I Certified Arboretum, will start at 1 p.m.

#### Sunrise: Understanding by David Coy

Last week I wrote about the importance in our journey with grief that each of us receive from others the feeling of significance. Kin to this need is the need to understand. My brother had this struggle. He claimed to be disbelieve while he was at a loss in how he was to reconcile the existence of evil and suffering. He suffered much in his life, and in the end died from a broken heart. His struggle is much the same as many of us, faith seeking understanding. Proverbs 6:16-19) by the perpetrator, and or terminal illnesses. Traumatic loss and suffering often hits us in the gut and knocks the wind out of us. When we do



#### **Worldview- Part 5** by Jeff Capshaw

Last week I discussed the "Creator-Creature" distinction and insisted that Christians ought not blur it. This distinction means that the Christian God is uncreated, eternal and self-existent, but all else is part of God's creation. As Colossians 1:16-17 says, "For by him all things were created, in heaven and on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or rulers or authorities—all things were created through him and for him. And he is before all things, and in him all things hold together"

Another component of the Christian worldview is neutrality: a familiar concept to English speakers. One may think of neutral colors (e.g. gray), a car's being put into the neutral gear (not drive, park or reverse) or of Switzerland's being a neutral country during World War II.

When it comes to thinking

hard, however, neutrality—i.e. "the absence of decided views, expression, or strong feeling" -may seem appropriate or fairminded. On the contrary, however, neutrality in the interpretation of ideas, facts or reality is impossible.

Christian thinkers should know there is no such thing as neutrality, because there is no such thing as an uninterpreted fact, thought or aspect of reality. Why? First, all facts and thoughts concerning reality are interpreted from the perspective of the thinker's worldview, whether Christian or not. Since all worldviews have their starting points, then those starting points (especially God or no God ones) will especially influence thinkers' interpretations of any data.

Next, Christians should also remember that Creator of all is also the interpreter of all reality and facts. Instead of attempting to assume a neutral stance,

the Christian thinker aims to understand God's interpretation of all reality and all facts. The Christian strives to reinterpret what God has already interpreted with respect to all of His Creation: not just biblical texts or theological ideas. Thus, Christians should study how God thinks in Scripture and strive to think in analogous ways, while knowing they will never get it exactly right all the time.

For example, Cornelius Van Til reminded his students that the unbeliever can dissect a frog just like a Christian. However, the unbeliever will have a different interpretation of things discovered in the exercise. Since the frog is part of God's creation, and since the unbeliever doesn't believe in God, then the unbeliever is disadvantaged. Van Til said, it is "because the unbeliever doesn't have all the facts."

#### IV. This World is Only Our Temporary Dwelling

It was long ago that Moses spoke about how short our life is on the earth in Psalms 90:9-10, For all our days have passed away in Your wrath; we finish our years like a sigh. The days of our lives are seventy years; and if by reason of strength they are eighty years, yet their boast is only labor and sorrow; for it is soon cut off, and we fly away."

This passage of scripture reminds us that we have only a limited amount of time to live on the earth. According to God's word, we have approximately seventy to eighty years as a normal lifespan. That's why James refers to the brevity of our life as, "a vapor that appears for a little time and then vanishes away." (James 4:14) And even if a man could have it all here in this life—the finest house, the finest car, and the finest luxuries of life—death would still come and take it all away (Mark 8:36; Luke 12:19-20; Luke 16:19-22). As much as we might want to, we cannot stay here forever. It is sad reality—that so many are laboring, so hard— for things they cannot keep; because in the end, the world itself will be no more (2 Peter 3:10-11). That's why a Christian could live in poverty, with little in this world to call his own, and as long as he knows the Lord, he can be content (I Timothy 6:6-8); because he knows this world is not our home, and just like the song says, we're "just passing through."





#### **Grilled Flank Steak Salad**

#### **Ingredients**

1 cup desired salad dressing

8 ounces beef flank steak

2 small yellow and/or red sweet peppers, halved 1 ear fresh sweet corn

2 green onions, trimmed Nonstick cooking spray 2 cups torn romaine lettuce

4 cherry tomatoes, halved 1/4 of a small avocado, peeled and thinly sliced (optional)

#### **Directions**

Divide 1 cup of desired dressing into 2 parts.

Trim fat from steak. Score both sides of steak in a diamond pattern by making shallow diagonal cuts at 1-inch intervals. Place steak in a resealable plastic bag set in a shallow dish. Pour one portion of the salad dressing over steak; set remaining dressing aside. Seal bag; turn to coat steak. Marinate in the refrigerator for 30 minutes.

Coat sweet peppers, corn, and green onions with cooking spray.

For a charcoal grill, place steak and corn on the grill rack directly over medium coals. Grill, uncovered, until steak is desired doneness and corn is tender, turning steak once halfway through grilling and turning corn occasionally. For steak, allow 17 to 21 minutes for medium rare (145 degrees F) to medium (160 degrees F). For corn, allow 15 to 20 minutes. Add sweet pepper halves to the grill for the last 8 minutes of grilling and green onions to the grill for the last 4 minutes of grilling, turning frequently. (For a gas grill, preheat grill. Reduce heat to medium. Place meat and then vegetables on grill rack over heat. Cover and grill as above.)

Thinly slice steak against the grain. Coarsely chop sweet peppers and green onions; cut corn from cob, leaving kernels in "sheets." To serve, divide romaine lettuce between two bowls. Place steak, grilled vegetables, tomatoes, and, if desired, avocado slices on lettuce. Drizzle salads with the reserved portion of salad dressing.

#### You Can Still Gain Tax Benefits from Charitable Donations

Like most people, you probably know several organizations worthy of your philanthropy, and you may well have contributed to them, perhaps on an annual basis. In the past, when you've made charitable donations, it's been a win-win: You were able to provide support to a worthy organization and you received some valuable tax benefits. But with the passage of the new tax laws, things may have changed considerably for many people. Are there still tax benefits to making a charitable donation?

Here's some background: Previously, you may have been able to deduct your charitable donations if you itemized deductions on your income tax return. So, for example, if you were in the 25 percent tax bracket and you gave \$1,000 to a qualified charity, you may have been able to deduct \$250.

But under the new tax laws, the standard deduction is almost doubled for 2018, to \$24,000 for joint filers, and \$12,000 for single filers. As a result, far fewer people are likely to itemize their deductions. If you're in this group, you may find that you have less incentive, at least for tax reasons, to make charitable gifts.

However, receiving a tax deduction is not the only tax benefit of making a charitable gift. If you own an IRA and you're 70 1/2 or older, you generally must start taking withdrawals - technically called required minimum distributions, or RMDs - from your traditional IRA. (Roth IRAs are not subject to RMDs until after the death of the owner.) If instead of withdrawing the money, the IRA owner decides to transfer the funds directly to a qualified charity, the distributed amount can be excluded from the IRA owner's income. So, in effect, you can get a sizable tax benefit from your generosity. In fact, you may be able to move up to \$100,000 from your IRA per year to an eligible charity and have it count as your RMDs, even if the amount donated is more than the required minimum withdrawal.

Even if you aren't 70 ½ yet, you might still gain some tax benefits from certain types of charitable donations. When you itemized, and you donated appreciated stocks, you were generally allowed a charitable deduction for the full fair market value of the stocks on the date of the transfer, even if your original cost was only a fraction of that value. Now, if you don't itemize, that charitable contribution is not deductible, but you can still avoid the capital gains taxes you'd have to pay if you sold the securities, rather than donating them.

Finally, you could name a qualified charity as a beneficiary of your IRA or 401(k). This can allow the assets to pass free of income tax to the charitable group. Given the increased standard deduction resulting from the new tax laws, many charitable groups are worried about the potential loss of contributions. Nonetheless, as we've seen, you can still find ways to get some tax benefits from your

own charitable gifts. And you'll still get the same satisfaction from supporting a






