Mayor Expects Budget to Pass

After months of debate and work, Hardeman County Mayor Jimmy Sain says he expects the 2019-2020 budget to pass without a tax increase and without much trouble at the second reading on June 18.

"It'll be easy. It should be. The Budget Committee is doing the right thing. They should support the Budget Committee," said Sain.

Sain, pointing out that there hasn't been a tax increase in five years of his administration, says the schools and the sheriff's department are the biggest challenges.

"Two years ago we had to take four cents from the general fund and the schools so we could make up the deficit in the debt service. It was a have-to case. We got accused of balancing the books on the back of school children. That stuff I'm tired of hearing. Last year they lost like

40-something more kids," he said, speaking of the schools. "And we didn't even blink an eye, we went on with the same budget. This year it's 147. That's a serious drain."

"The schools are a business," he continued, saying the schools have lost 25% of their students in the past eleven years. "When you lose 25% of your business, you can't keep the same budget. Things have to change. Why are all these kids homeschooling? Why are all these kids going to private school?"

"We are not asking for any of their funding. We are just asking to adjust the tax rate to protect us in the future.'

Sain says he feels confident that even with a tax rate drop, the talks with the schools to make a deal in a win-win situation for both in the long-term.

Sain said the Sheriff's Department's budget problems aren't money, but administration of the budget.

"It is not fixed. They do not have an administrator over budgeting and funding," said Sain, saying the department doesn't need more money to operate. "They had one in Billy Davis, who is now the Circuit Court Clerk. They need to administer what they have. And no one in this office can administer what they have. Once their budget is approved, they need to administer it, just like we do our budget and the other elected officials do theirs."

The second reading of the Hardeman County Budget is scheduled to take place June 18 at 7:00 p.m. in the Hardeman County Courthouse Courtroom. A public hearing will precede the vote by the County Commission.

Unveiled as a 122-acre park, the plans have a boat ramp, beach area, walking trails, an amphitheatre, camping areas, and in the future, cabins.

McTizic said that he expects the walking trail to be finished in two to three years, and the camping area, amphitheatre, and zip line in 3-4 years.

Councilman Page Walley said he has kept an eye on this project for a few years.

"Historically, there have been talks, on and off, about possible development around the lake, but as of the last two years, development has moved from talks to actually planning the project," he said.

In November of 2018, the city voted to use the funds from the Hatchie River Project to purchase the property to create a tourism destination.

Trails Open for Business on June 1



Tennessee State Parks will celebrate National Trails Day with free guided hikes at all 56 state parks on Saturday, June 1.

This will be the third of the state parks' signature hikes this year, following First Day Hikes in January and Spring Hikes in March. Thus far, 4,787 park visitors have partici-

"Whether you're interested in a park's history, seeing incredible views or taking a challenging trek, our parks give everyone that feeling that you can't get anywhere else."


The American Hiking Society designates the first Saturday in June as National Trails Day as a day of public events aimed at advocacy and trail service. Last year, 108,947 people participated in 1,203 events across 50 states.

Tennessee State Parks are offering a variety of ranger led hikes, night hikes, history hikes, nature hikes or trail clean-up hikes. With more than 1,000 miles of trails, ranging from easy paved trails to rugged backcountry trails to scenic waterways, the state parks have something for everyone.

Ingredients

- 1 lb. ground beef
- 1 small onion, diced 1 large bell pepper, diced
- 1 (29 oz) can diced tomatoes or Rotel tomatoes and chilis
- 1 (8 oz) can tomato sauce or tomato soup
- 1 (14 oz) can chicken broth (or beef broth)



Vacation and Retirement: Different Goals Require Different Investment Strategies

To achieve any of your financial objectives, you need to save and invest - that much is clear. But just how you save and invest may differ from goal to goal. Let's look at two common goals to see the differences in your savings and investment strategies.



Jesus as God, Part 2 by Jeff Capshaw

In the previous article, I indicated that Jesus' having two natures is miraculous, mysterious, incomprehensible and unrelatable to our everyday experience. Furthermore, I shared some theories of Quantum Physics and claimed that they too are deeply mysterious. These alleged phenomena are as far beyond the realm of analogical comparison to our human experience as is Jesus' having two distinct natures (human and divine). However, since the Council of Chalcedon (451 AD), this is what the Orthodox creeds teach, and those creeds are anchored in the New Testament.

For example, the Westminster Confession of Faith (1647 AD) summarizes the doctrine this way. "The Son of God, the second Person in the Trinity, being very and eternal God, of one substance, and equal with the Father, did, when the fullness of time was come, take upon him man's nature, with all the essential properties and common infirmities thereof; yet without sin: being conceived by the power of the Holy Ghost, in the womb of the Virgin Mary, of her substance. So that two whole, perfect, and distinct natures, the Godhead and the

manhood, were inseparably joined together in one person, without conversion, composition, or confusion. Which person is very God and very man, yet one Christ, the only Mediator between God and man" (VIII.ii).

Several years ago, the New Testament Greek scholar, Murray J. Harris, conducted a study of Christ's divinity. His book, Jesus as God: The New Testament Use of Theos [God] in Reference to Jesus, concluded that there is no statement in the Greek New Testament that reads, "Jesus is God." However, Harris demonstrated that numerous passages do attribute divinity to Jesus of Nazareth.

One example of this is in John 12:37-41. The Apostle clearly says that the miracle worker, Jesus of Nazareth, is the same person as the God of the Old Testament (Yahweh-Exodus 3:14). John writes, "even after Jesus had performed so many signs in their presence, they still would not believe in him. This was to fulfill the word of Isaiah the prophet . . . (12:37, NIV). John then cites two texts from Isaiah regarding the Jews' hard hearts of unbelief and their spiritual blindness (Isaiah 53).

Everything indeed has its time and purpose. Even if we do not understand the reason or the meaning behind events in our lives. Life can be a beautiful experience, but it can also be a time of sorrow and tribulation.

Earthly endeavors are abundant for us to enjoy and pursue, yet not all are lawful or healthy. Sometimes we

can become our own worst enemy by the poor unhealthy choices we make and sometimes through no fault of our own we suffer as well. In either case we may wonder why such and such is happening to us. As there is a

time for everything under heaven, 'a season' (for example a time to be born and a time to die, Ecclesiastes 3:2), so there is a purpose for everything and a time for these to be fulfilled in their proper order (Ecc 3:1-8). Even healthy and lawful activities may become unhealthy and improper when used out of proper time and order. It is when we abuse the good earthly blessings provided us, that we may suffer because of our own poor choices.

We may not understand when for no apparent reason sorrow comes to us. Illness may come and is discovered

quite by accident or death comes to a loved one sudden and unexpectedly and we wonder why, how? Then proclaim, I cannot handle this, I cannot cope or we stuff what is happening and pretend it did not happen. When

this occurs we risk destroying ourselves from the inside and damaging our relationships around us. We should recognize we are not an island to ourselves and exist and succeed because of others support toward us just as we

have supported others. This is the design and purpose of support groups. To support one another in our time of need. We need to acknowledge our need and the value of support in due season. This is Sunrise Aftercare,
