year for Hardeman County Mayor Jimmy Sain may have been a disappointment for those who wanted some high drama, but it wasn't for him.

"I'd like to thank the hard working budget committee," said Sain announcing no tax increase and a balanced 2018-2019 budget. "They did a good job. Also, our department heads are working hard to stay within their budgets."

Sain's comments came at the end of the county commission meeting on May 29 that saw the 16-member body vote 16-0 to approve all three budgets on the first reading as the Hardeman County Schools, the Hardeman County Highway Department, and the County Budget all got a unanimous thumbs up.

The few adjustments to the budget the May-

- A \$2,000 increase to the Hardeman County Rescue Squad, as Mayor Sain noted the volunteer self-funded group had purchased equipment over the past year.
- Middleton, and Grand Junction all received an increase of \$1,000 in the coming year.
- \$10,000 for a truck for Hardeman County Animal Control. Mayor Sain said the vehicles being used were over ten years old and were broken beyond repair.
- The Hardeman County Chamber of Commerce received a total of \$40,000, equal to last year's contribution.
- County Commissioners pay to attend meetings was raised from \$75 per meeting to \$150, and county board payments were raised from

\$35 per meeting to \$50.

- \$100,000 for the new EMS facility. Sain said they hoped to have a ribbon cutting on July 15.
- A contribution to the Grand Valley Fire • Hardeman County Libraries in Whiteville, Department in areas of maintenance, fuel, and insurance that was expected to save the allvolunteer force approximately \$8,000.
 - \$150,000 to go toward the renovation of the Hardeman County Fairgrounds.
 - Based on evaluations by department heads, the budget committee allocated a 2.5% salary increase for county employees.

The passage of the budget on the first reading will be followed by a second meeting, announced for June 19, where public comment will be allowed before a final vote on the budget is expected to take place.

County Unemployment Drops

Hardeman County showed a 4.1% unemployment rate in April, down from 5.0 in March, according to the Tennessee Department of Labor and Workforce Development.

Compared to bordering counties, Hardeman is fourth, ahead of Mc-Nairy (4.5%), but behind Fayette (3.0%), Chester (3.1%), Haywood (3.2%), and Madison (3.2%).

Statewide, the seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 3.4 percent for the third consecutive month. For the first time in six months, the national unemployment rate decreased in April when it dropped from 4.1 percent to 3.9 percent.

Tales from the Yellow House by Lee McAlpin

While growing up at the Yellow House, we were accustomed to many odd home remedies and superstitions. The superstitions were practiced only for fun and play, at least most of them. The home remedies were taken more seriously. One of the home remedy staples around our house was rabbit tobacco. The scientific name being Gaphalium Obfusifolium. It is said that the Cherokee Indians used this plant often and called it Life Everlasting. In the fall we would go out into the fields for our annual rabbit tobacco gathering. When we had a cold or chest congestion, Mom would make a tea from the leaves and we would take a dose for our coughs and whatever. I do know that it actually works. I keep a batch of the leaves on hand even today. While having a bout of the crud recently, I chewed several cuds of the stuff and it definitely stopped my cough and eased my affliction. And many times us kids would slip behind the house and roll some of the leaves in a brown paper wrapper and smoke it. It has been said that smoking the leaves will relieve asthma. Coal oil (kerosine) was used for all cuts. It must have worked, because we never had a tetanus shot and we never lost life or limb. Many times when we had the croup, Mom would put a drop of coal oil and turpentine on a spoonfull of sugar and give it to us to relieve our malady. There were other remedies that were used which most times worked. They say that half of the cure is believing in the cure itself. I remember seeing a young boy wearing a piece of lead on a string around his neck. This was supposed to prevent nose bleeds. Some of the more stranger remedies that I have heard of is to break off the head of a Bessybug and squeeze a few drops of blood in

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


the ear for earache. And a more bizarre remedy is to take a few drops of chamber lye and put it in the ear. Now who would dare put anything from a bed pan in his or her ears. Tie a pair of scissors to a string and dropped down the back of the collar, with a penny under the tongue is supposed to stop nosebleed. For a stye, run the tip of a black cats tail over the eye. Headache, bury clippings of your hair under a rock. Athletes Foot, tie a string around a toe, step in cow manure. Sore throat, tie a dirty sock around your neck. Warts, steal a neighbor's dishrag and bury it in the woods.

Some of the superstitions that some people practice and believe in are odd to say the least. One of them is if you tie a knot in the corner of a sheet, it will stop whippoorwills from singing. Some people carry a buckeye in their pockets for good luck and for rheumatism relief. The black cat crossing the road in front of you is said to be bad luck, or walking under a ladder. And there is the seven years of bad luck associated with breaking a mirror. The eating blackeyed peas on New Years for good luck. One trick I heard about with this practice is that you are supposed to leave three peas on your plate and put them in your left pocket. With

all the blackeyed peas that I have eaten all my life, I should have a continuous string of good luck. My Dad believed in planting by the signs. And Mom believed that if you made saurkraut when the signs were in the bowels, that the kraut would turn black in the jars. I saw this happen one time, whether it was from the signs or not, I do not know. One last superstition. One old one says that if the full moon shines on a woman's navel, she would become, as the nice old saying goes, "In a family way." I'm sure that the moon can affect the oceans tide and serve as a landing pad for our astronauts, but I think that's the limit.

There are literally thousands of home remedies and superstitions. Some of the old home remedies do work and I use them occasionally, but the superstitions, that's another story. But as I mentioned before, to each his own.

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




Andrea Lashae Murphy

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

Sunrise: Evil & Suffering by David Coy

Trauma comes to all of us at various times in our life. When a 7.8 magnitude earthquake struck Nepal, Buddhist nuns came to the rescue the remaining villagers after an avalanche killed more than 8,500 and left many more homeless. In a country where most women are not allowed to swim in public, one women with a desire to surf found herself homeless after her parents evicted her from their home when she was seven years old. These two examples prove what one writer reminds us, that our suffering results from inanimate as well as animate sources. The animate may have evil intent or motives.

We question why suffering happens, especially to those whom we have evaluated as being good when people with evil motives and actions seem to prevail and be in ease. Listen to the words of the Old Testament prophet Jeremiah, "You are righteous Jehovah, when I might complain with you; Yet I would like to speak with you about the disposition of justice. Why does the way of the way of the wicked prosper? Why do all dishonest people who deal treacherously have such easy lives?" The disciples of Jesus in the New Testament spoke similarly when they asked about a certain blind man who sinned, this man or his parents, that he should be born blind? Jesus answered neither.

Thomas Warren spoke of four sources of suffering; God, man, evil and the world. We live in a

if you address as Father the One who judges impartially based on each one's work, you are to conduct yourselves in fear during the time of your temporary residence." It is good for us to remind ourselves why we should not treat this world as our permanent place of resi-



dence. God gives us several reasons in the scriptures, as to why, we should not long to stay on the earth beyond our days.

V. God Has Prepared Us A Better Place.

The examples of true and genuine faith by God's people in Hebrews 11:8-16 are simply amazing! They showed not only great faith, but also great sacrifice and hope in God's reward (Hebrews 11:6). The way they lived as, "pilgrims and strangers on the earth" (verse 13), speaks volumes to us about a proper attitude about our life here and now. Why did Abraham give up his homeland to live the life of a wanderer in a strange land? The Bible tells us, "for he waited for the city which has foundations, whose builder and maker is God." (Hebrews 11:10) Not only Abraham, but his sons and their sons had this kind of faith. Why did others endure suffering so greatly in verses 36-38? The same reason—heaven! We need to have the same faith in God's promises of an eternal home in heaven (John 14:1-3). Every Christian needs to long for and desire the better land that God has prepared for the faithful and true! (Matthew 25:34) Peter speaks of the Christian's reward in 1 Peter 1:3-5, "Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who according to His great mercy has caused us to be born again to a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, to obtain an inheritance which is imperishable and undefiled and will not fade away, reserved in heaven for you, who are protected by the power of God through faith for a salvation ready to be revealed in the last time." We, as Christians, are called to make the sacrifices of sin's pleasures (Hebrews 11:24), of conformity to this world (Romans 12:1-2), of the love of the world (I John 2:15-17), and of self (Luke 9:23-24; Galatians 2:20); and this we do joyfully, knowing that God will reward us far greater than what we could ever give up living here in this world— after all, this world is not our home...



Worldview- Part 6 by Jeff Capshaw

Last week I asserted that Christian thinkers should remember that there is no such thing as neutrality, because there is no such thing as an uninterpreted fact, thought or aspect of reality. Since every interpreter has a worldview (whether conscious of it or not) and since all worldviews start with some belief about God, then neutrality is an impossibility.

I have also insisted that all theorizing about origins and other aspects of reality arise from heart motives that are certainly religious; they either profess a belief in the divine or ascribe some aspect of reality to a divine status.

In this and next weeks' articles, I will briefly discuss two Scriptures that provide helpful instruction for consistent, Christian Worldview thinking: 2 Corinthians 10:5 and Proverbs 26:4-5. The 2 Corinthians passage provides a biblical mandate for Christian thinkers. The Proverbs texts provides Christian thinkers with wisdom for engaging unbelieving worldviews.

2 Corinthians 10:5 says, "we destroy arguments and every lofty opinion raised against the knowledge of God, and take every thought captive to obey Christ." (ESV). This text often is understood only in terms of moral thinking: as in pure versus impure thoughts. While that certainly pertains here, that isn't the whole picture.

Paul clearly states that ALL thinking should be subject to Christ's authority. How better or more consistently could a Christian possibly think than "Christianly"? So then this mandate would include beliefs about where we came from, whether or not life has ultimate meaning, how we should live our lives, what happens after we die, what it means to be human and so on.

A thinker whose thoughts are not in line with the God's knowledge and are not submitted to the Lordship of Christ cannot possible answer those and other questions in a consistently Christian way.

Consider the question of what it means to be human. Is a human just a higher form of animal-like beings that sprung into existence by unguided, random, biological processes? Or are humans just "molecules in motion," merely random bits of sub-atom particles flung into existence by chance? The Christian will reject all these views and opt, instead, for a view submitted to Christ's Lordship. Christ's Word says that humans are created by God in the image God (Genesis 1:27). Therefore, to think about origins differently is to set one's thoughts above God's thoughts and to disobey the mandate of 2 Corinthians 10:5.



Do you know about 529 savings plans? If not, you are not alone although these plans have been around since 1996, many people are still unaware of them. And that's unfortunate, because a 529 plan can be a valuable tool for anyone who wants to help a child, grandchild, friend or other family member save for education expenses.

Here are some of the key benefits of a 529 plan:

Potential tax advantages – A 529 plan's earnings are not subject to federal income taxes, as long as withdrawals are used for qualified elementary, secondary and higher education expenses of the designated beneficiary, such as your child or grandchild. (You will be subject to ordinary income taxes, plus a 10 percent federal penalty, on the earnings portion of withdrawals not used for qualified education expenses.)

High contribution limits – Contribution limits are generally quite high for most states' 529 plans. However, you could possibly incur gift tax consequences if your contributions, plus any other gifts, to a particular beneficiary exceed \$15,000 during a single year.

Ability to switch beneficiaries – As the old song goes, "The future is not ours to see." You might name a particular child or grandchild as a beneficiary of a 529 savings plan, only to see him or her decide not to go to college after all. But as the owner of the plan, you generally may be able to switch beneficiaries whenever you like, right up to the point when they start taking withdrawals. (To make this switch nontaxable and penalty-free, you must designate a new beneficiary who is a member of the same family as the original beneficiary.)

Freedom to invest in any state's plan - You can invest in the 529 plan offered by any state, regardless of where you live. But if you invest in your own state's plan, you might receive some type of state tax benefit, such as a deduction or credit. Additional benefits also may be available.

Flexibility in changing investments – You can switch investment options in your 529 plan up to twice a year. Or, if you'd rather take a more hands-off approach, you could select an automatic age-based or target date option that starts out with a heavier emphasis on growthoriented investments and shifts toward less risky, fixed-income vehicles as the beneficiary approaches school or college age.

While a 529 plan clearly offers some benefits, it also raises some issues about which you should be aware. For example, when colleges compute financial aid packages, they may count assets in a 529 plan as parental assets, assuming the parents are the plan owners. To clarify the impact of 529 plans on potential financial aid awards, you might want to consult with a college's financial aid officer.

One final note: In previous years, 529 plans were limited to eligible colleges, universities and trade schools, but starting in 2018, you can also use up to \$10,000 per year, per beneficiary, from a 529 plan to pay for tuition expenses at public, private or religious elementary and secondary schools. (Not all states recognize elementary and secondary school expenses as qualifying for 529 plan benefits, so consult your local tax advisor before investing.)

Education is a great investment in a child's future. And to make that education more affordable, you might want to make your own investment in a 529 plan.

The only option was to very slowly and carefully cut all that hair off of her, which took us several hours to do. She was so, so patient and even acted like she was so glad to be able to move and walk properly again. Mom and Dad decided she had found her home and she was named Little Orphan Ani, but we always called her Ani.



Dr. Frank Wilhite helped us estimate that she was probably about 2 years old, and other than being undernourished, she was in amazingly good health for a little dog girl who had been found wandering the streets. We ran ads and posted on Facebook to see if anyone was missing her, as she was obviously very comfortable around people, but no one ever responded. We often wondered over the years what her story was and how that little girl dog stayed alive on the streets on her own.

Ani was definitely my Mom's dog, but she loved Dad too. She LOVED to go for rides in the car, and if you ever said the word "go", you needed to have your keys in hand because she was always ready to go at a moment's notice. She adored going to Sonic and getting ice cream, and would ride so well no matter how long the trip was. Ani sent out her own Christmas cards every year to all the people she knew who had dogs. She stayed really close to Mom during the last year of her life as her heart condition worsened, and she stayed by Mom the day she fell and broke her leg so horribly. After Mom's death, Ani really became Dad's buddy and took extra good care of him over the last 15 months. She, too, had started to slow down and her little heart finally could not go on anymore.

All of our lives were blessed by that little fuzzy girl and while we miss her a great deal, we are so glad she did not suffer or have to go through a long illness. Our family is forever grateful for the good care of her over the years from Dr. Frank, Dr. Jerry, Becky Hodge, and all the good folks at the Old Hatchie Vet Clinic. We are also grateful to Ms. Becky Ervin who was Ani's "hairdresser" for so many years and who loved her as much as we did.

Y'all, that little orphaned dog-girl brought a lot of happiness and love into a lot of people's lives; and, my goodness, did we all love her too.

USDA Announces 2018 Elections

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) encourages America's farmers and ranchers to nominate candidates to lead, serve and represent their community on their local county committee. USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) will accept nominations for county committee members beginning Friday, June 15, 2018.



Producers across the country are already serving on committees where they play a critical role in the day-to-day operations of FSA, making important decisions on programs dealing with disaster and conservation, emergencies, commodity price loan support, county office employment and other agricultural issues.

"Our county committees make decisions about how federal farm programs are administered locally to best serve the needs of agriculture in their community," said Acting FSA Administrator Steve Peterson. "There's an increasing need for representation from underserved producers, which includes beginning, women and other minority farmers and ranchers."

Nationwide, more than 7,700 dedicated farmers and ranchers serve on FSA county committees, which consist of three to 11 members and meet once a month, or as needed. Members serve three-year terms.

Producers can nominate themselves or others. To be eligible to serve on an FSA county committee, producers must participate or cooperate in an FSA program and reside in the area where the election is being held.

To be considered, a producer must sign an FSA-669A nomination form. The form and other information about FSA county committee elections are available at www.fsa.usda.gov/elections. All nomination forms for the 2018 election must be postmarked or received in the local FSA office by Aug. 1, 2018. Visit farmers gov for more information.


