More Testing Doubles Known Cases

Hardeman County saw the COVID-19 cases double in a week as the county prepared to open businesses in response to the most recent executive order issued by Governor Bill Lee.

As of April 28, the State of Tennessee website listed 11 cases in the county, but due to an increase in testing (see below), confirmed cases almost doubled, to 20, as of May 5, per tn.gov. The website listed 567 negative tests in the county.

With the increase in confirmed cases, Hardeman County Mayor Jimmy Sain said he is being told those infected are being monitored.

"I am being told the Department of Health is checking on them daily," he said.

Statewide in the same week, con-

firmed cases jumped from 10,052 to 13,690.

But while the economy is opening for many businesses, the fun is still on hold.

"Social and recreational gatherings of 10 people or more are prohibited, including but not limited to festivals, fairs, parades, youth and adult sporting events, and overnight summer youth camps," says the order that has an expiration date of May 29.

This continued restriction would keep events such as Music on the Square in Bolivar, Dizzy Dean Baseball and Softball, and Bolivar Central High School and Middleton High School graduation plans on hold, although all have announced plans to resume activities based on the May 29 expiration date.

City Hosts Free COVID-19 Testing



Creating a Habitat for Butterflies by Carolyn Tomlin

"If you plant it...they will come!" says Emilie Dickinson, a West Tennessee native. "It's true of many different species and it's certainly true of butterflies (Lepidoptera). This elusive creature is one of God's marvels of nature. From a tiny egg, to a caterpillar or larva, to a chrysalis, and finally a graceful adult butterfly—these four stages have intrigued gardeners for centuries." Dickinson should know, as she has planted her yard in flowers that attract butterflies and wildlife.



Gardeners who have welcomed these jewels of nature to their yard recommend you start small. It's better to have a miniature plot kept attractive than to plan an overgrown garden that you can't maintain. If you don't have a garden, use large pots on your patio. Larger containers are easier to care for in hot, summer weather as they require less water. Consider the location... sun or shade? Are the plants compatible as to needing a similar amount of water? An organic mulch not only cuts down on your work, but it keeps the plants moist and requires less water.

The following factors provide a habitat that not even the most elusive butterfly can resist. Provide both host and nectar plants

Caterpillars are very particular in what they munch on the menu. Include the plants native to your area when possible. Native plants thrive in the environment, are usually resistant to disease and insect. They also adapt to the moisture level in the area.

- Monarch – Butterfly weed, Milkweed (both a host and nectar plant)
- Black Swallowtail – Parsley, dill, carrot, Queen Anne's lace
- Tiger Swallowtail – Tree leaves, cherry, tulip, poplar, and birch
- Long-tailed Skipper – Butterfly pea
- Little Sulphur – Sensitive Plant, alfalfa, clover
- Buckeye – Wild Petunia
- Painted Lady and Red Admiral – Thistle and nettles (for a wild area nearby)
- Adult pollinators – Ageratum, Obedient Plant, Swamp Sunflower, Goldenrod

Organic Control of Harmful Insects

(1) This all-purpose spray is effective against any leaf-eating pests and mosquitoes.

- 1 garlic bulb (chopped)
- 1 small onion (chopped)
- 1 teaspoon cayenne pepper
- 1 quart water

Steep for one hour; strain.

- 1 tablespoon non-detergent liquid soap

Spray the undersides of leaves where pests are found. Avoid contact with eyes or nose. Store up to one week in a refrigerator.

(2) Beneficial insects – Ladybugs feed on aphids. Ground Beetles feed on grasshoppers and aphids

(3) Plants to deter insects—Oil in the mint herb deters mosquitoes; marigolds, rosemary and lemongrass are repulsive to plant-eating aphids

Keep in mind that the ideal butterfly habitat contains plants that support all four stages of the lifecycle. Gardeners have a wide variety of flowers, shrubs, and trees that provide a welcome habitat for those beautiful butterflies that frequent your garden.

FAITH

Jesus Now? Part 3

All prior lessons were based on the Epistle of Hebrews, because there isn't a better place in the New Testament for the current focus. So, in this week's concluding meditation on the topic of Christ "now work," the same course is followed. What is another lesson believers may take away from Christ's present, priestly work?

To answer that question, we will circle back to the very beginning of this rich epistle and remind readers of whom is in control of the events which have befallen us. It certainly isn't we, nor is it any government. Rather, it is the ascended and seated Creator and Sovereign of the universe, Christ Himself.

Consider the opening verses of Hebrews and be encouraged by it. "Long ago, at many times and in many ways, God spoke to our fathers by the prophets, but in these last days he has spoken to us by his Son, whom he appointed the heir of all things, through whom also he created the world. He is the radiance of the glory of God and the exact imprint of his nature, and he upholds the universe by the

word of his power. After making purification for sins, he sat down at the right hand of the Majesty on high, having become as much superior to angels as the name he has inherited is more excellent than theirs" (Hebrews 1:1-4, ESV).

There are three statements for consideration in this passage concerning Christ's work. First, the entire Creation belongs to Him. God the Father appointed Christ to be the "heir of all things." That means he has custody of it. Although the creation is fallen and vividly messy to us, especially in recent weeks, the Son will see to it that this fallen creation will one day be put back into its original, pristine condition. Pandemics do not take creation's owner by surprise nor thwart his ultimate plan of Redemption.

Second, not only is Christ the heir of all things in the created order, but he was somehow the agent of Creation. This is an instance in Scripture that strains our imagination. We have nothing in our experience to compare it to. How exactly was the pre-

existent Christ involved in the Father's creation of the world? From the book of Genesis, we are told that God the Father created by his spoken Word and declared that creation good. In verse 2 of Genesis, we are also told the Spirit of God "hovered over the face of the waters." Thus, from the very beginning, we see all three members of the Triune Godhead involved in the very act of creation.

That makes the final statement even more meaningful. "He (Christ) upholds all things by the word (literally 'a word') of his power." Here is one encouraging take-away. Since Christ is the Creator, the Heir, and Sustainer of all creation, then there is also nothing that comes into our lives that he cannot handle. Rest in the present work of Christ.

Hardeman County Parents, Students, and Teachers,

I hope this update finds you and your family healthy and safe. Last week, Governor Lee held a press conference and shared important information for school systems to consider as we plan the closure of this school year. Each school will be contacting parents/students with the dates and times that personal belongings may be picked up from the building. Please return textbooks, library books, or other materials that belong to the school. (Note: Consumable textbooks that students write in may be kept). Report cards will also be issued during this time.

For seniors, I understand the unknowns and disappointments that have been endured during an unexpected end to their last school year. With our state just now beginning to release certain restrictions, we feel it is best for the health and safety of everyone to go with June dates for graduation. The following has been decided regarding graduation (dependent upon further state guidance):

- Middleton High School will hold graduation ceremonies on June 13 at 4:00 p.m. and 6:00 p.m.
- Central High School will hold graduation ceremonies on June 19 at 7:30 p.m. (Rain date is June 20 at 7:30).
- Schools will be contacting each graduate about practice dates, times, and other pertinent information specific to each high school.
- There may still be some specific guidelines we have to establish to host this event if social distancing recommendations are still in place. Examples of this could be that we may have to limit the number of guests, provide specifics on entering/exiting the area, use of restrooms, etc. If this is the case, that information will be shared by June 5.

Fire Departments Get Funding

The Tennessee State Fire Marshal's Office (SFMO) announced that two Hardeman County volunteer fire departments were selected to receive funding through the Volunteer Firefighter Equipment and Training Grant Program.

The program, which was created Governor Lee, received State Representative Johnny Shaw's support and was approved by the Tennessee General Assembly, earmarked \$500,000 for the purchase of firefighting equipment by Tennessee's volunteer fire departments or to help volunteer departments meet local matching requirements for federal grants for purchasing equipment.

The majority of Tennessee's firefighters are volunteers. The 22,065 active firefighters that have been reported to the SFMO consist of 14,218 (64.4%) volunteers and 7,847 (35.6%) career firefighters.

Chief Lynn Price and Bolivar Fire and Rescue were awarded \$13,250 and the Grand Valley Fire Department will receive \$11,900 to support their respective fire departments.

Our firefighters are instrumental in keeping our communities safe and put their lives on the line each and every day," said Shaw. "I hope rural communities will benefit from and receive more of these grants in the years to come."

Cycling for Health in Hardeman County

As we approach summer, many of us may be pulling our bicycles out of the garage to enjoy some nice scenery while getting exercise.

Cornell Falls, a local cycling enthusiast, has seen physical and mental health benefits since taking up the hobby. "I've lost 20 pounds. I enjoy a ride at the end of the day to relieve stress from the work day. I sleep better." Going for a bike ride also improves heart health, is easy on joints and can even help to maintain balance.

Falls started out riding in his neighborhood and in local parks like Pleasant Run Creek Park. He also rides on the wide shoulders of Highway 64 and has even used cycling to help run errands. In Hardeman County, you can also access trails at nearby Chickasaw State Park, which allows biking on park roads, including many in Chickasaw State Forest.

Dr. Fitzhugh, UT professor of recreation and kinesiology and a cyclist himself, states, "the roads of Bolivar are well connected, which allows for both recreational cycling and cycling to destinations like running errands."

According to Dr. Fitzhugh, it's important to remember to check your bike before going out for a ride. The ABC Quick Check is an easy way to make sure your bike is in good working order. Check the air in the tires, make sure the brakes aren't worn, check for gunk in your chain and that cranks aren't loose, that the Quick release on each tire is closed, and finally, check the bike out on a slow brief ride. The League of American Bicyclists has an excellent video that demonstrates the ABC Quick Check (https://youtu.be/mQ1_yx_6B-U). The League also has some great resources for you on how to fit your helmet (a must to be safe!), what type of clothes to wear, and how to set up your bike to be as comfortable as possible. 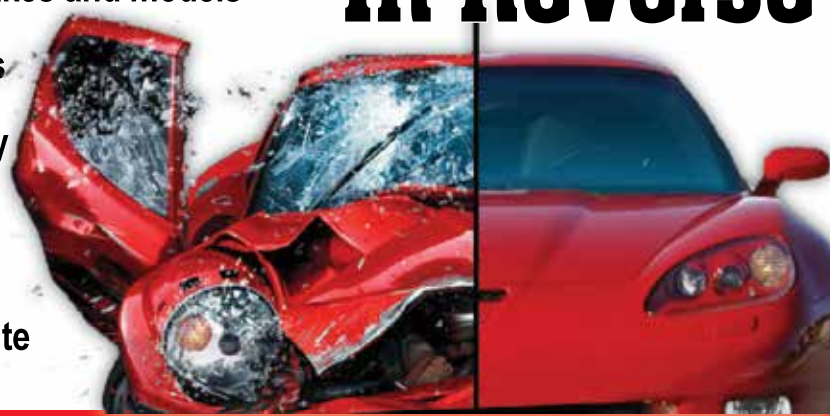

Saving the Thin Mints™ for a Better Day

Girl Scouts Heart of the South announced to its members this week that the council will buy back unsold Girl Scout Cookies from troops throughout its 59-county area. As a result of the COVID19 pandemic, the 2020 Girl Scout Cookie Program was cut-short during the booth sale season, leaving many troops with cookie inventories and no way to complete their sales.



“At a time when we are all focused on family, work, finances and health, Girl Scout Cookies should not be a financial concern to families, troops or volunteers,” said Girl Scouts Heart of the South CEO Melanie Schild. “It is with these concerns in mind that we have announced the Cookie Relief Program to relieve Girl Scout troops of any financial burden due to unsold cookie inventory.”

The 2020 Girl Scout Cookie Program was cut short due to health and safety concerns during the COVID19 outbreak. In a normally 4-week program of booth sales, only two full weeks were able to be held. The third week of the program saw a sharp decline in the number of troops continuing the public booth sites, leaving many troops with cookies on-hand and responsibility for payment. Some Girl Scouts continued sales through porch drops and other social-distancing methods of delivery but were not able to deplete their inventory with limited options of reaching customers.

“Many girls are disappointed to miss out on reaching their goals for the 2020 program. They plan their programs, trips, service projects and troop activities for the year around meeting their goals,” Schild continued. “Even through online sales and donations, troops have not been able to continue the program at the rate they had planned and prepared for.”

Girl Scouts Heart of the South serves more than 6,200 girls in west Tennessee, north Mississippi and Crittenden County Arkansas. The council expects to see a financial loss of approximately 40% of its annual cookie program income. Council proceeds from the annual Girl Scout Cookie Program remain in the local area and are used to provide program, summer camp and travel opportunities for girls, along with training and support for more than 1,700 volunteers.

“We are grateful to our communities for their continued support of the annual Girl Scout Cookie Program. We are dedicated to continuing our extraordinary programs and support for our members and will be exploring ways to reduce expenses without diminishing the Girl Scout Program Experience,” said Schild.

Local Girl Scout Service Units – a collection of troops in a particular county or geographic area, have an opportunity through the Cookie Relief Program to take possession of remaining cookie inventory, when it is safe to do so, and sell remaining cookies to the public in order to raise needed funds for local, community-based programs, girl memberships, new troop start-up funds and service unit events. Potential customers may see additional opportunities to buy cookies from the service unit efforts if safer-at-home advisories are lifted in time to do so.

“We are committed to continuing the Girl Scout Experience which prepares girls for a lifetime of leadership, success, and adventure in a safe, no-limits place designed for and by girls,” Schild stated. “No other organization in the world gives girls as many opportunities as Girl Scouts and we’ll see this short-fall through for our girls, troops and families to ensure that no family carries this financial burden while we all strive to stay healthy and safe.”
