An investigation by the Tennessee Comptroller's Office has resulted in the indictment of Bolivar City Councilman Jonathan Joy alleging he overbilled Hardeman County for the sale and installa-

tion of five air conditioning units. Joy, who is the owner of Joy Heating & Air, was hired to install new air conditioners at multiple county facilities between August 2017 and June 2018.

Investigators determined that Joy installed air conditioners that were rated for less tonnage than what the county ordered, and then billed the county for products with more tonnage. For example, in January 2018, Joy installed a 6-ton

air conditioning unit at the Harde- higher priced 7.5-ton product. man County Health Department, and then invoiced the county for a

## 2019 Election: Better....Not Great

It's not a mad rush to the polls, but it's better than last time in the non-mayoral election year for the City of Bolivar.

The Hardeman County Election Commission reported the number of voters, 147 through six days of voting, as higher than the totals in 2015, when 43 had gone to the polls through the same number of days. According to the Election Commission, there are 3,237 registered voters in the City of Bolivar.

Early Voting continues through May 16. Election Day is May 21.

The City of Bolivar remains the only municipality in Hardeman County to not follow the Federal Election schedule of elections in even numbered years. A change could save the city as much as \$10,000 per year, according to figures obtained from the Hardeman County Election Commission.

This week, Joy was indicted by the Hardeman County Grand Jury on one count of theft over \$1,000 and one count of official misconduct. He was arrested May 7, posted bond, and was released.

A initial court date of May 9 was listed on the arrest report.

In April, Joy was elected as the Chairman of the Hardeman County Democratic Party.

Joy, who was elected to city council in 2017, will be up for re-election in 2021. If convicted, Jov would be removed from the council, according to the City of Bolivar charter.



## **CTAS Holds County Mtg.**

Hardeman County leaders had a visit from the University of Tennessee County Technical Service county government consultant Wesley Robertson and consultant Kelsey Schweitzer on April 22 at the Hardeman County Courthouse in an attempt to clarify issues pertaining to "Maintenance of Effort" in funding the schools, the highway department, libraries, and the sheriff's department.

The meeting was hosted by Hardeman County Mayor Jimmy Sain.

"I'm pleased the mayor is working hard for solutions. We all learned a few things. I was glad to have the opportunity to hear about it," said Superintendent of Schools Warner Ross. "I appreciate the opportunity to listen to CTAS and understand the formula and how it impacts our schools and our county."

Consultant Robertson explained the MOE on schools and stated that there were two funding formulas that were used to calculate the MOE amount. One of the formulas generally used was based on the student population. With state funding, when the school system increased student enrollment the funding went up and when the student enrollment decreased, the funding went down. He stated that this was not true with county funding because when the student enrollment increased, the county funds automatically went up, but when the student enrollment decreased, the funding did not automatic go down. It was explained that if the County Commission did not lower the funds in the year that the student enrollment decreased, then the current enrollment became the MOE for the next year. Ross said he is happy the county funding isn't the same method the state uses. "We are funding higher than is required. I'm glad of that. We would never want to fund the lowest that can be required. We don't want us to become like the state or follow the same methodology," he remarked, adding that there are several unfunded mandates by legislations. "It meets 70-75% of what is required. It funds teacher positions, but only 70-75% and 50% of non-certified positions. It does not meet all continued on All








Work began May 7 to "scrub seal" and "shadow pave" Highway 18 North from Market Street in Bolivar to the Hardeman County line near Medon.



Dee was born in Memphis, TN, on October 1, 1929, during the Great Depression and was known to be very frugal. As a child, he had a paper route that started at 4 a.m., and from there he would serve as an alter boy at St. Thomas Catholic Church.

He was a world-famous paddleball champion. His mother would run him out of the house for playing it. Few people knew that he liked to pick fights after school. This is what landed him the famous "Crossnine nose"

His family Sunday dinner as a child was spaghetti and fried chicken. He remembers his mother going to the backyard to get the live chicken and wring its neck.

He played first base for Catholic High School for Boys and shared his love of baseball with all his kids and grandkids. He also loved to watch football, especially his favorite team, Notre Dame. He enjoyed many wonderful Super Bowl parties with family and friends at the Crossnine residence.

Dee worked at Ford Motor Co for 10 years with his dad until the plant was relocated to Chicago. In 1958, he became a firefighter with the Memphis Fire Department. In those days firemen still rode on the back of pumper trucks. He was once thrown from a moving pumper as it turned a sharp corner. It was right after that he applied for a Fire Inspector's position. He moved up in rank to serve as Fire Marshal for the City of Memphis from 1980 to 1994.

In 1995, the Southeastern Association of Fire Chiefs established the H.D. Crossnine Award. This award commemorates the career contributions of retired Memphis, TN Fire Marshal Chief Hubert D. Crossnine. Chief Crossnine contributed greatly to the Association's efforts to develop fire safety standards in line with fire service values and the needs of communities.

During his impressive fire service career Chief Crossnine served for more than 20 years as a member, Vice Chairman or Chairman of several code development committees. He was also very instrumental in the planning of the City of Memphis Fire Department Museum. Dee's priorities were God, family, and friends. In that order. He loved the outdoors and got truly excited when it was almost time to cut grass again. He loved to get on the tractor and just ride. Dee will truly be missed by all his family and friends. The family would like to express their heartfelt appreciation to the staff and nurses at Methodist Hospice for their compassionate care and support. He loved to travel and spent his free time sightseeing in the Rocky Mountains and other areas surrounding Pueblo. He also loved the water and traveled to the beach at every opportunity.

## False Prophets. Sermon on the Mount: Part 16 by Jeff Capshaw

actions (v. 16a).

This week's theme is clear; it's about false prophets. By Jesus' time, the prophetic office had an illustrious Old Testament history. Old Testament prophets weren't fortune tellers looking into crystal balls to predict the future. Instead, they were spokesmen for God; they primarily were "forth-tellers" of truth not always "foretellers." The prophets' messages came from the 5 books of Moses, and their primary role was to enforce Yahweh's covenant among his people.

Additionally, authentic Old Testament prophets were ardent about exposing false prophets. According to the Baker Evangelical Dictionary of Biblical Theology online, "false prophets prophesied lies (Jer. 6:13; 27:14; Zech. 13:3 ), deceived the people with their dreams (Jer. 29:8), prophesied by the alleged authority of Baal (Jer 2:8; 23:13), threatened the lives of the true prophets (Jer 26:7), and dared to speak when they had not stood in the council of Yahweh and received a word directly from the Lord (Jer. 23:18).

Accordingly, Jesus' warning continues this practice of exposing false prophets (preachers). Attempted deception is these false prophets' cover. As Jesus said, they "come to you in sheep's clothing but inwardly are ravenous wolves" (7:15). But what blows their cover? It is simple; "you will recognize them by their fruit," i.e. by their In the same way that a particular fruit tree brings forth its unique fruit (say an apple tree bears apples), so also prophets (preachers) bring forth fruit consistent with their true natures. Put another way, in principle an unhealthy tree doesn't produce healthy fruit, but healthy trees produce good quality fruit.

Thus, Jesus sums up the teaching of the passage like this. The telltale sign of a non-genuine, lying or false prophet (preacher) is this; "thus you will recognize them by their fruits" (v. 20). It is easy to identify an apple on an apple tree or a healthy, non-diseased tree. But what about healthy, "spiritual fruit"? Or what about diseased or unhealthy "spiritual fruit" from a bad source? How does one know these? After all, this is the point of the passage, and the answer is clear in the next paragraph.

Jesus said, "not everyone who says to me, 'Lord, Lord,' will enter the kingdom of heaven, but the one

## Sunrise: Fear vs Peace by David Coy

Fear can have a positive effect on our life. Fear can actually be healthy. Fear of getting burned will keep us away from a hot stove. Fear of being run over will keep us from stepping out into a street without looking both ways to make sure the way is clear. Fear can be constructive and educational when we use it to learn to exercise restraint and self control. We obey laws so as to prevent the negative consequence that comes when we are caught in violation of the law, thus we fear (reverence) the statutes. I remember in my youth driving on an icy road around a curve too fast and fishtailing. My heart began to race and I even panicked as my vehicle began to swerve because of ice, It prompted me to slow down my rate of speed.

Fear can also be debilitating and torment us from the inside and rob us of our peace of mind. The Greeks have a word for this we recognize very well, phobos from which we get phobia. It means 'to be put to flight, fear, panic, terror.' Fear suffocates faith and confidence in our abilities, and in our willingness to try! This causes us to develop pain of mind that we know as grief. Centuries ago twelve men were sent out on a mission to examine an area of land. When they returned they said we cannot take this land though it is flowing with milk and honey (fertile) for the people of the land are giants and we are like grasshoppers in their sight (Numbers 13). 

## **Instant Pot Pulled Pork BBQ**

## For the Seasoning Rub:

brown sugar smoked paprika coarse ground black pepper kosher salt chili powder garlic powder onion powder cayenne

## For the pulled pork:

boneless pork butt soda (root beer, Dr. Pepper, Coca-Cola) apple cider vinegar BBQ sauce

Pull the pork butt out of refrigerator a few hours before you are going to cook it. Then remove any packaging (do this part over the sink since there will be a lot of liquid.) Then, using paper towels, dry off the pork butt. Set aside.

Mix up the seasoning rub. Cook's Note: This makes a lot of rub, so you'll probably only need half. Just put the other half in a mason jar or Ziploc bag and save for later. Sprinkle this rub all over pork shoulder. Make sure to rub it in well.

Cook's Tip: Want even more flavor? Rub the pork butt, wrap in plastic wrap and stick in the refrigerator overnight. Take out a few hours before cooking then continue with directions. Into the bottom of electric pressure cooker, pour in can of soda and apple cider vinegar. Stir together. Then add seasoned pork butt. If you are using, pour half the bottle of BBQ sauce over the pork butt. Secure the pressure cooker lid and set the pressure release valve to "SEAL".

Set on manual high pressure for 40 minutes (you'll want to estimate about 15 minutes per pound.) Once the cooking time is finished, allow the pressure to release naturally for 10 minutes (most pressure cookers will switch to a keep warm setting and start counting down how long it is on that setting – this is naturally releasing the pressure as well.) After 10 minutes, do a quick release.

Remove the meat from the instant pot and shred using two forks (discarding any liquid left in the Instant Pot.) Remove any fatty bits. Add remaining barbecue sauce to the shredded pork and stir. Serve on a soft hamburger bun.





requirements. It is a solid base, but doesn't fully fund us."

It was stated that the county was concerned that they had not reduced the MOE each year and that the school system enrollment had declined by approximately 929 students over the past 11 years. Consultant Robertson stated that the County should not be concerned because they were over funding the schools so much that a drastic increase in student enrollment would not effect the MOE. He stated that Hardeman County ranked number eight in Tennessee by percentage of funding their school system over the required BEP amount of funds. The Basic Education Program (BEP) is the funding formula through which state and county education dollars are generated and distributed to Tennessee schools.

Ross said he wasn't aware of the methodology in determining their state ranking, but that his statistics show the county is average in funding and that being funded more is something to be proud of.

"I look at the state report card. It breaks down local, federal and state. We are in the middle of the pack in West Tennessee," he said. "Our local funding body provides more than is required and that is a good thing. We appreciate it."

The State Board annually reviews and approves school system allocations generated through the BEP formula. The training session was attended by new County Commissioners, School Board members, Budget Committee members and others.

Ross estimates that of the total funding for the schools, 65% comes from the State of Tennessee, 10% is Federal money, and the rest comes from local government.

"The CTAS meeting was very productive. We are still working hard together to meet expectations of our community," said Ross.



"For the rest of the boys, we had a big learning experience. Connor


"I can't say enough about these girls. They have worked hard all season," said Hill. "It's been awhile since we've (Bolivar Central) been here."




