Joy Indicted for Theft

An investigation by the Tennessee Comptroller's Office has resulted in the indictment of Bolivar City Councilman Jonathan Joy alleging he overbilled Hardeman County for the sale and installation of five air conditioning units.

Joy, who is the owner of Joy Heating & Air, was hired to install new air conditioners at multiple county facilities between August 2017 and June 2018.

Investigators determined that Joy installed air conditioners that were rated for less tonnage than what the county ordered, and then billed the county for products with more tonnage. For example, in January 2018, Joy installed a 6-ton

air conditioning unit at the Hardeman County Health Department, and then invoiced the county for a

higher priced 7.5-ton product.

Investigators determined that Joy overbilled the county \$1,609

2019 Election: Better...Not Great

It's not a mad rush to the polls, but it's better than last time in the non-mayoral election year for the City of Bolivar.

The Hardeman County Election Commission reported the number of voters, 147 through six days of voting, as higher than the totals in 2015, when 43 had gone to the polls through the same number of days. According to the Election Commission, there are 3,237 registered voters in the City of Bolivar.

Early Voting continues through May 16. Election Day is May 21.

The City of Bolivar remains the only municipality in Hardeman County to not follow the Federal Election schedule of elections in even numbered years. A change could save the city as much as \$10,000 per year, according to figures obtained from the Hardeman County Election Commission.

CTAS Holds County Mtg.

Hardeman County leaders had a visit from the University of Tennessee County Technical Service county government consultant Wesley Robertson and consultant Kelsey Schweitzer on April 22 at the Hardeman County Courthouse in an attempt to clarify issues pertaining to "Maintenance of Effort" in funding the schools, the highway department, libraries, and the sheriff's department.

The meeting was hosted by Hardeman County Mayor Jimmy Sain.

"I'm pleased the mayor is working hard for solutions. We all learned a few things. I was glad to have the opportunity to hear about it," said Superintendent of Schools Warner Ross. "I appreciate the opportunity to listen to CTAS and understand the formula and how it impacts our schools and our county."

Consultant Robertson explained the MOE on schools and stated that there were two funding formulas that were used to calculate the MOE amount. One of the formulas generally used was based on the student population. With state funding, when the school system increased student enrollment the funding went up and when the student enrollment decreased, the funding went down. He stated that this was not true with county funding because when the student enrollment increased, the county funds automatically went up, but when the student enrollment decreased, the funding did not automatic go down. It was explained that if the County Commission did not lower the funds in the year that the student enrollment decreased, then the current enrollment became the MOE for the next year.

Ross said he is happy the county funding isn't the same method the state uses.

"We are funding higher than is required. I'm glad of that. We would never want to fund the lowest that can be required. We don't want us to become like the state or follow the same methodology," he remarked, adding that there are several unfunded mandates by legislations.

"It meets 70-75% of what is required. It funds teacher positions, but only 70-75% and 50% of non-certified positions. It does not meet all

In addition to Taiwan and Hardeman County he lived in Wahiawa, Hawaii, Tallahassee, FL, Calvary, GA, Clarksville, TN, Memphis, TN, Savannah TN, Athens, GA, and Pueblo, Colorado.

Howie graduated from Middleton High School in 1986 and then attended Austin Peay State University. He quickly decided he was not ready for college and dropped out after the first semester. He then began his travels, worked at many different jobs and accumulated lots of friends wherever he went.

He worked as an assistant service manager for Bolivar Ford Mercury, assistant manager at McDonalds in Savannah, TN, a waiter and bar tender on Beale St. in Memphis. He then moved to Athens, GA, and worked as a taxi driver near the University of Georgia. He moved back home in 2002 and worked in Middleton for a short time for Kirk's Grocery Store.

In 2004 he started work as a team leader in a plastics manufacturing plant in Jackson TN. He worked the 10:00 p.m. to 7:00 a.m. shift. In 2009 while still working there he decided at the age of 41 to finish his college education, with the goal to become a travel nurse.

Howie took classes at Jackson State Community College in the mornings after he finished his 12 hour shift and also online computer classes. After receiving his Associates Degree he began nursing school full time, graduating with his ASN Nursing Degree in 2013 at the age of 45. (He was near the top of his classes throughout college).

He began his nursing career at Methodist University Hospital in Memphis as a Medical Surgical Nurse. After two years he decided it was time to travel and accepted a job in Pueblo, CO. for Parkview Medical Center Hospital as a Medical Surgical Travel Nurse, for a Stroke, Orthopedic, and Acute Medical Unit. When his travel contract ended he loved the area so much he remained there and bought a home.

Howie worked as a hospice nurse for the past two years for Sangre de Cristo Hospice and Palliative Care in Pueblo and believed it was his "true calling" as a nurse. He loved the work of helping to comfort and care for his patients in their last days and hours on this earth.

Howie loved music and wanted to take piano lessons when he was 12, and soon began composing his own music. He played the alto saxophone in high school and developed his love for the Blues. While living in Savannah he sometimes sang with Darryl Worley's band as they jammed in a garage before Darryl became well known. He loved to travel and spent his free time sightseeing in the Rocky Mountains and other areas surrounding Pueblo. He also loved the water and traveled to the beach at every opportunity.

Howie is survived by his parents, his aunts Denese Smalley and Cathy Shelton, uncles Dwaine Smalley, David Smalley (Barbara), Richard Smalley, Jimmy Smalley, and Paul Yarbrough. Cousins Bridget Smalley Roberts (Paul), Sara Smalley, Mark Smalley (Christina), Cheyenne Cook, Lindy Yarbrough Whitcomb (Bob), Jenny Jones, and Ben Yarbrough (Angela). HUBERT "DEE" CROSSNINE OCTOBER 1, 1929 - APRIL 29, 2019

Hubert Donald (Dee) Crossnine, 89, transitioned peacefully from this world to our Heavenly Father's arms on April 29, 2019.

He is survived by his wife of 36 years, Becky and his three sons, Don (Melandia), Michael (Debi), Pat (Lisa), two daughters, Brandy (Chuck), and Sara; 10 grandchildren; Steve (Amy), Kim (Michael), Dena (Troy), Paul, Rick, Tino, Cody, Samuel, Khristina and Steven; eight great grandchildren: Ethan, Lindsey, Henry, Lindi, Taylor, Zachary, Blakely and Kyler.

Dee was born in Memphis, TN, on October 1, 1929, during the Great Depression and was known to be very frugal. As a child, he had a paper route that started at 4 a.m., and from there he would serve as an alter boy at St. Thomas Catholic Church.

He was a world-famous paddleball champion. His mother would run him out of the house for playing it. Few people knew that he liked to pick fights after school. This is what landed him the famous "Crossnine nose".

His family Sunday dinner as a child was spaghetti and fried chicken. He remembers his mother going to the backyard to get the live chicken and wring its neck.

He played first base for Catholic High School for Boys and shared his love of baseball with all his kids and grandkids. He also loved to watch football, especially his favorite team, Notre Dame. He enjoyed many wonderful Super Bowl parties with family and friends at the Crossnine residence.

Dee worked at Ford Motor Co for 10 years with his dad until the plant was relocated to Chicago. In 1958, he became a firefighter with the Memphis Fire Department. In those days firemen still rode on the back of pumper trucks. He was once thrown from a moving pumper as it turned a sharp corner. It was right after that he applied for a Fire Inspector's position. He moved up in rank to serve as Fire Marshal for the City of Memphis from 1980 to 1994.

In 1995, the Southeastern Association of Fire Chiefs established the H.D. Crossnine Award. This award commemorates the career contributions of retired Memphis, TN Fire Marshal Chief Hubert D. Crossnine. Chief Crossnine contributed greatly to the Association's efforts to develop fire safety standards in line with fire service values and the needs of communities.

During his impressive fire service career Chief Crossnine served for more than 20 years as a member, Vice Chairman or Chairman of several code development committees. He was also very instrumental in the planning of the City of Memphis Fire Department Museum.

Dee's priorities were God, family, and friends. In that order. He loved the outdoors and got truly excited when it was almost time to cut grass again. He loved to get on the tractor and just ride.

Dee will truly be missed by all his family and friends.

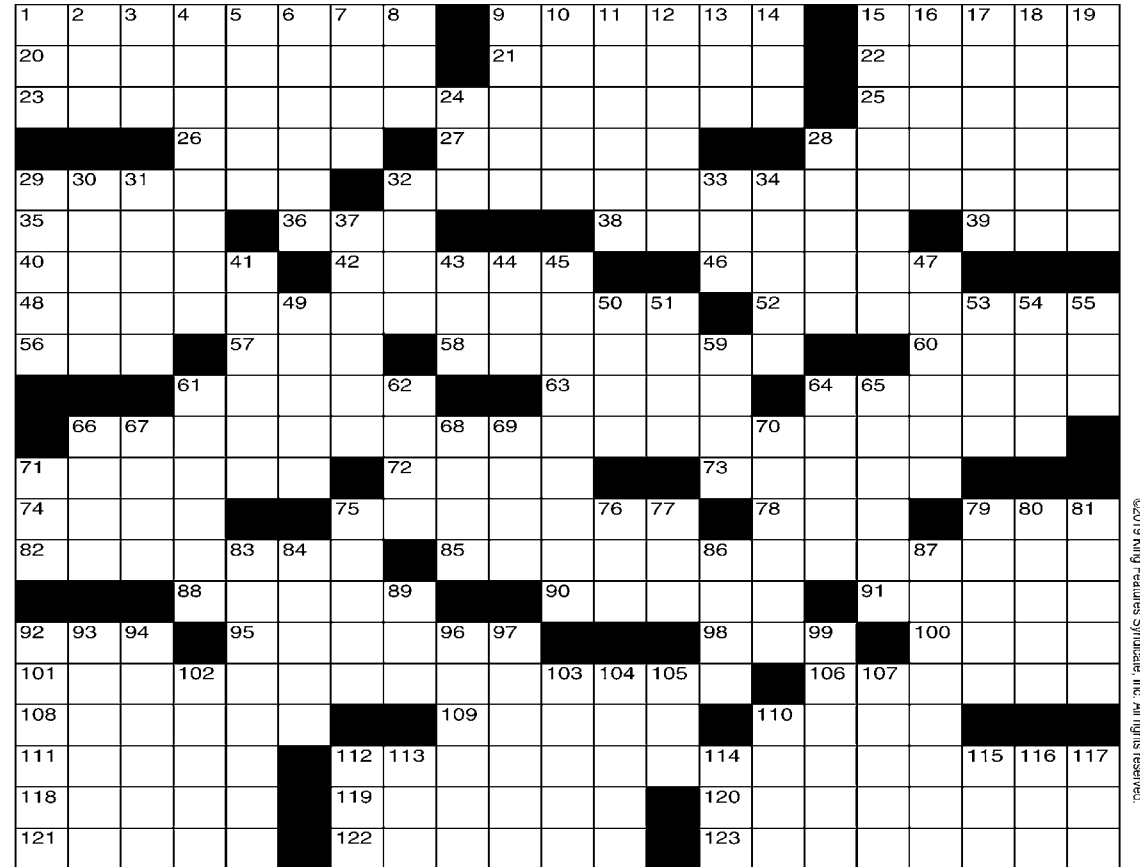

Instant Pot Pulled Pork BBQ

For the Seasoning Rub:

- brown sugar
- smoked paprika
- coarse ground black pepper
- kosher salt
- chili powder
- garlic powder
- onion powder
- cayenne

For the pulled pork:

- boneless pork butt
- soda (root beer, Dr. Pepper, Coca-Cola)
- apple cider vinegar
- BBQ sauce



Pull the pork butt out of refrigerator a few hours before you are going to cook it. Then remove any packaging (do this part over the sink since there will be a lot of liquid.) Then, using paper towels, dry off the pork butt. Set aside.

Mix up the seasoning rub. Cook's Note: This makes a lot of rub, so you'll probably only need half. Just put the other half in a mason jar or Ziploc bag and save for later. Sprinkle this rub all over pork shoulder. Make sure to rub it in well.

Cook's Tip: Want even more flavor? Rub the pork butt, wrap in plastic wrap and stick in the refrigerator overnight. Take out a few hours before cooking then continue with directions.

Into the bottom of electric pressure cooker, pour in can of soda and apple cider vinegar. Stir together. Then add seasoned pork butt. If you are using, pour half the bottle of BBQ sauce over the pork butt. Secure the pressure cooker lid and set the pressure release valve to "SEAL".

Set on manual high pressure for 40 minutes (you'll want to estimate about 15 minutes per pound.) Once the cooking time is finished, allow the pressure to release naturally for 10 minutes (most pressure cookers will switch to a keep warm setting and start counting down how long it is on that setting - this is naturally releasing the pressure as well.) After 10 minutes, do a quick release.

Remove the meat from the instant pot and shred using two forks (discarding any liquid left in the Instant Pot.) Remove any fatty bits. Add remaining barbecue sauce to the shredded pork and stir. Serve on a soft hamburger bun.

Financial Gifts Can Brighten Anyone's Mother's Day

Mother's Day is fast approaching. This special holiday reminds us of the joy we receive from the powerful bond between mother and child. To help mark the occasion, you may want to consider making certain financial gifts, including the following:

For your mother:
 IRA contribution – If your mother is still working, she is eligible to contribute to an IRA, but she might not always fully fund it – so you may want to help. A financial advisor can help your mother move toward her retirement goals – and, at some point, also can work with legal and tax professionals to assist your mother with her estate plans.
 For your children:
 529 plan contribution – If your children are still of school age, you may want to contribute to a college savings vehicle. One popular choice is a 529 savings plan. When you invest in this plan, your earnings can grow tax-free, provided the money is used for qualified educational expenses. (Be aware, though, that withdrawals not used for qualified education expenses may be subject to federal and state taxes, as well as an additional 10% penalty.)
 As the 529 plan owner, you have flexibility in using the money. For example, if you've designated one of your children as the 529 plan's beneficiary, and that child decides not to pursue any higher education, you can switch the beneficiary designation to another child or to yourself.
 You can choose the 529 plan offered by any state, but your contributions might be tax deductible if you invest in your own state's plan. Tax issues for 529 plans can be complex, so, before investing, consult with your tax advisor.
 Shares of stocks – Giving stock shares to children is a good way to help them learn some of the basics of investing. You can track the progress of their stocks with them, and even do some research together about why prices may be going up or down. By getting children involved early, you may help instill a lifelong interest in investing.
 Charitable gifts – Many children are now concerned about various social issues. You can help encourage this involvement – and possibly an appreciation of the value of philanthropy – by making a gift to a charitable group whose work aligns with your child's interests.
We don't need to exchange presents on Mother's Day to show our appreciation for one another, but certain financial gifts can help provide needed support – and even some valuable life lessons – for your loved ones.

Tennis Finishes Learning Year



"I knew this would be a rebuilding year team-wise for both the boys and girls," said Bolivar Central Tennis Coach Ian Wellons after his team failed to advance from the district tournament.

"For the boys, Josh Burnett had the regular season I expected. Among #1's in the district, there was a lot of parity. Each of the top four players in the district lost to another top 4 player at some point in the regular season or post-season, but also beat someone else. Josh's signature win of the season was against Lexington's #1, Austin Wood.

"For the rest of the boys, we had a big learning experience. Connor Emerson improved his game a lot over the summer and during the season, and it showed in his play in both singles and doubles. Connor and Josh would have made a formidable doubles team and could have had a shot at the district title, but Connor was gone to the FFA National Soil Judging competition. The rest of the team had either no experience, or very little in-game experience. The only senior I'm losing is Colten Watkins, who only competed this season. My younger players who saw court time show a lot of promise, and we could be a deep team next year.

"For the girls, a lot of the same story as the guys. After graduating my five senior starters from last season, I knew we would have a tough season. Kyli Sherman, who played at the 5 and 6 spot last year, was moved to #1, and Ella Richardson and Caylee Richardson, who played sparingly last year, became my 2 and 3. After that, I had no one who had played tennis or had played in a competitive match last year. Kyli and Ella in singles had a rough year. Kyli learned how hard #1 is, since you play the best every school has to offer. She played a senior girl in every singles match she played, with the exception of Northside, whose #1 girl was the #1 overall player and district champion.

"Ella worked hard over the summer to improve her game, and she has, but her limited court experience from last season hindered her. In doubles, she and Kyli proved they could go head-to-head with the best, giving the back-to-back district champs a tough match every time. They played a two hour, three set match in the district tournament and battled every point before eventually losing.

"For Caylee, she had a great year at #3. She was the only player over .500 in her singles record this season. Her game greatly improved this season as well. She unfortunately had to face the overall #1 in the second round of the tournament, and played well, but was just outmatched in the long run.

"After her, I had basically all new players. The only senior that played this year was Abby Shelton, and she was new to the game this year. Had she played since her 9th grade year, she could have been a really strong player. I'll have to replace her in the starting lineup for next year, but I have a few current freshmen that can easily fill that spot. With so much youth getting experience this year, I look forward to what we can do next year, and the next, since Kyli, Ella, and Caylee will only be juniors next year."

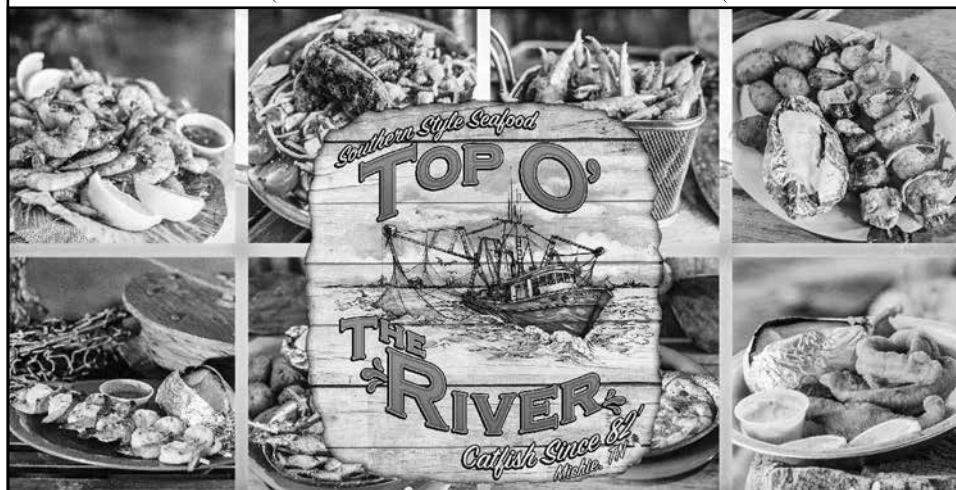

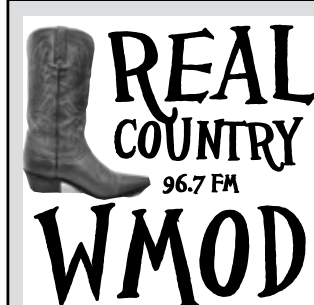

"I can't say enough about these girls. They have worked hard all season," said Hill. "It's been awhile since we've (Bolivar Central) been here."

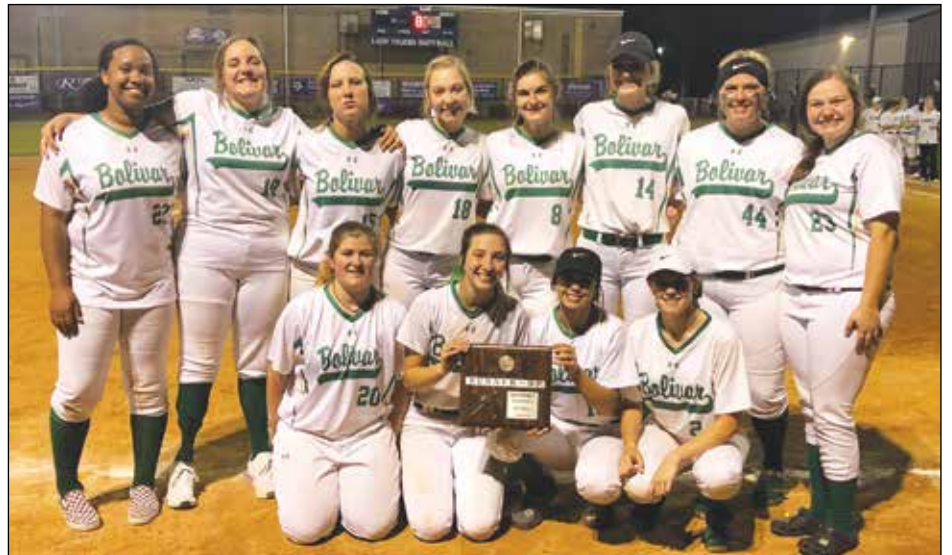

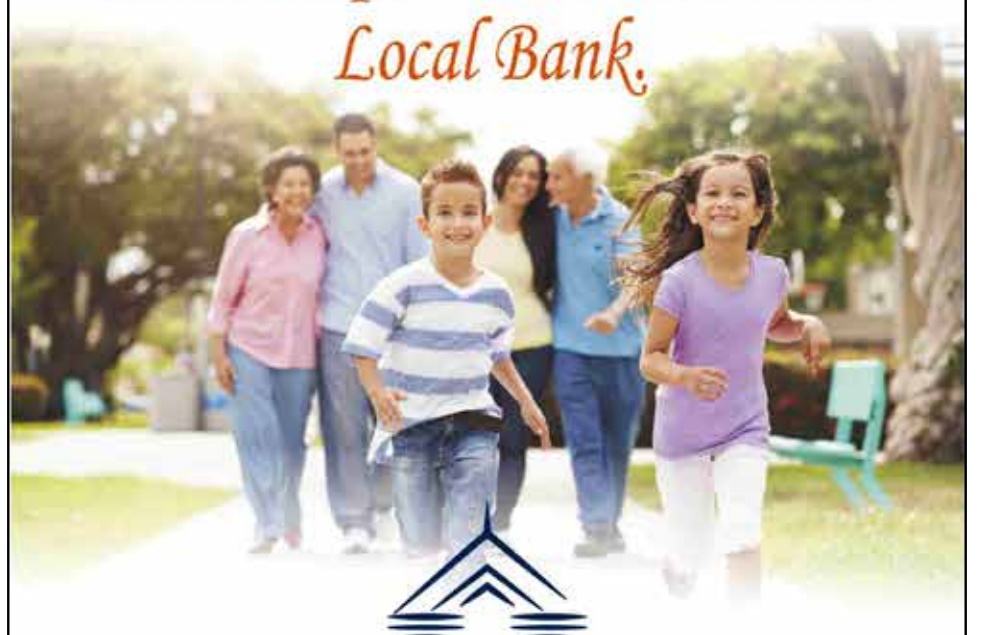
