Honky Tonk to Become a Park

What a long, strange trip it has been. The City of Bolivar expects to receive a grant that will end years of limbo for the property on Highway 18 North bordering the Hatchie River that was the home of the Boat Dock Bar and Grill for many years.

A brief history:

- The land housed The Boat Dock, which operated as a bar until the owner sold the land and building to the City of Bolivar in 2014.
- The purchase was made with help from a grant from the State of Tennessee that required an agreement to make the area into a park. Bolivar's fifty percent share of the purchase was

\$60,000.

• Early work on the project resulted in the Hatchie River Park being dedicated on October 17, 2015.

• In 2016, the Southwest Tennessee Development District voted the Hatchie River Park and Nature Center as the district's "Project of the Year."

• A matching grant to expand the facility to include a museum and an outfitter location for boating and canoeing were approved by the state on June 28, 2017, when Mayor Barrett Stevens signed an agreement with the State of

Nehemiah Project Ready to Launch



Common Grounds, the coffee shop that will be the centerpiece of the Nehemiah Project 38008, plans to open for business on December 1.

The location at 313 West Market Street (previously Pulse Real Estate) in Bolivar is almost ready for customers, according to Terry Walley.

"We hope to have a soft opening before December 1," she said. "We started wanting to help people with barriers to employment, no matter what the reason. But what we are finding is their particular barriers are legal issues relating to criminal backgrounds and they can't get hired. There are training issues that are barriers to employment also. November Election Still a Hot Ticket

Voters keep streaming to the polls in Hardeman County in record numbers for an off-presidential year.

With two days left in early voting, 3,477 voters have gone to the polls, almost double the total number (1,858) who voted early in 2014.

The numbers project to easily surpass the 5,141 that eventually voted in 2014. In 2014 and 2018, both Johnny Shaw (80th District) and the representative from the 94th (then Leigh Rosser Wilburn now Ron Gant) are running unopposed in their respective races. Other races available to Hardeman County voters were the governor's race won by Bill Haslam, the Senate race won by Lamar Alexander and Marsha Blackburn won the 7th Congressional District race.

This year, voters have the same choices, as Dr. Mark Green and Justin Kanew are vying for the 7th district spot, Blackburn faces former governor Phil Bredesen for senate and Bill Lee vs. Karl Dean for Governor is also on the ballot. A mayor and aldermen in both Hickory Valley and Grand Junction is included also. See A4 for ballot. A total of 14,238 are registered to vote in Hardeman County.

Early voting ends November 1. Election Day is November 6.

Retirement Security Week -- Take Steps to Boost Your Retirement Security

To raise awareness about the importance of saving for retirement, Congress has dedicated Oct. 21-27 as National Retirement Security Week. 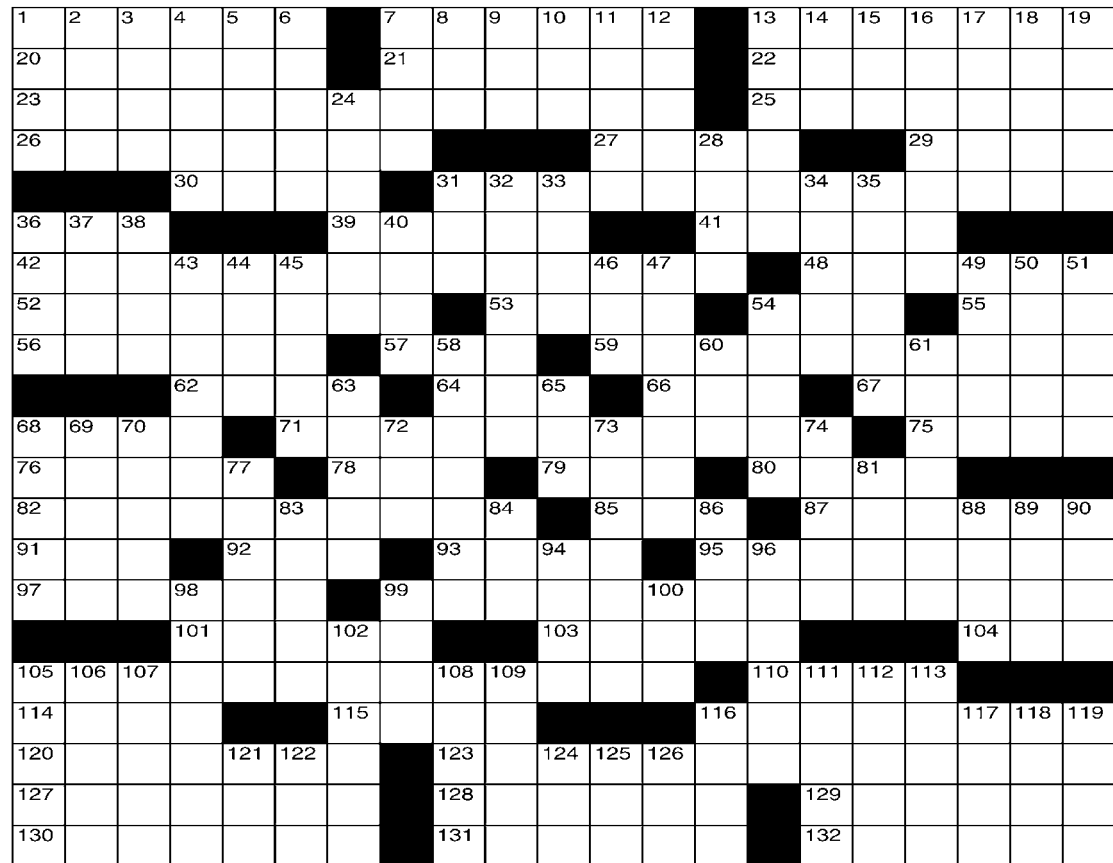

GO FIGURE! by Linda Thistle

The idea of Go Figure is to arrive at the figures given at the bottom and right-hand columns of the diagram by following the arithmetic signs in the order they are given (that is, from left to right and top to bottom). Amos: A Prophet for Us - Part 8

Here we have explored selected themes from the Hebrew Prophet, Amos. Interestingly, this Old Testament book exposes contemporary problems and provides relevant solutions too. Although Amos vehemently denounces the sins of Ancient Israel's pagan neighbors, he does not let God's covenant people off-the-hook either. For example, he writes: *For I know how many are your transgressions and how great are your sins you who afflict the righteous, who take a bribe, and turn aside the needy in the gate* (5:12).

Instead of addressing the communal needs of the less fortunate, many in Ancient Israel were preoccupied with enjoying their own prosperity and a time of relative peace. To paraphrase Amos, they were *taking it easy in Zion*. I compared that lackadaisicalness to the American Church in general and suggested that many social ills and needs of our local communities still go unaddressed.

According to Amos, thinking and talking about social problems isn't enough. God's people must get their hands dirty by taking the love of Christ and his Gospel to the real-life trenches where people are. Certainly, it is appropriate to write a check, and that is all some can do. However, while God calls some to give, others must go and meet acute needs brought on by the sin and brokenness of the human heart (Jeremiah 17:9).

Another theme taken up by Amos--one of the most indicting--is insincere worship. He says: *I hate, I despise your feasts, and I take no delight in your solemn assemblies. Even though you offer me your burnt offerings and grain offerings, I will not accept them; and the peace offerings of your fattened animals, I will not look upon them. Take away from me the noise of your songs; to the melody of your harps I will not listen* (5:21-23).

Theologically, sincere worship of the Lord precedes sacrificial service to others. If our hearts are not properly aligned horizontally, then our vertical service to others will likely be hypocritical and ineffective. So, what shall we do? Simply put, we must obey the Lord.

You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the first and great commandment. And the second is like it: You shall love your neighbor as yourself. On these two commandments hang all the Law and the Prophets (Matthew 22:37-40).

All Saints Day and Giving Thanks

We start November with the celebration of All Saints Day. It is believed that the commemoration of 'all the saints' on the first day of November originated in Ireland, spread from there to England, and then to the European continent. It had become a permanent fixture on the Christian calendar by the ninth century. However, the desire of Christian people to express the intercommunion of the living and the dead in the Body of Christ by a commemoration of those who, having professed faith in the living Christ in days past and entered into the nearer presence of their Lord, was far older than the early Middle Ages. Eastern patriarch John Chrysostom, who died in 407, says that a festival of All Saints was observed on the first Sunday after Pentecost in Constantinople during his episcopate. The first evidence an all saint's celebration dates back to 207 AD.

In recent times the historical significance of All Saints Day has been somewhat clouded by the inclusion in our calendar of an observance of an "All Souls Day". This seems to indicate that All Saints Day is something that applies only to those who have achieved some special status in the Church, and that "All Souls Day" is a time to remember ordinary Christians that have passed on to glory. This view has become the norm in some churches but is not what the early church fathers envisioned. The ultimate destiny of Christians is bodily resurrection, an event which has not yet happened. This means that all such persons are currently somewhere between death and resurrection. This is what we generally refer to as "heaven", being in the presence of Christ but not yet having been bodily raised. There is no reason that can be found in the foundation documents of Christianity to suppose that there are any category distinctions between Christians in this intermediate state. All are in the same condition; and all are 'saints'. In the New Testament every single Christian is referred to as a 'saint', including the muddled and uncertain ones to whom St. Paul writes his letters. Through Baptism and confessing Jesus as the risen Lord, we leave the realm of darkness and enter into the Kingdom of God's light.

All Saints Day is the time we set aside to remember all those in Christ and especially those that are no longer visible to us.

Agricultural festivals are of great antiquity. Among the Jews, the three pilgrimage feasts, Passover, Pentecost, and Tabernacles, each have agricultural significance. They thanked God for caring for them and offered Him the first fruits on the new harvest. Our Thanksgiving Day finds its roots in observances begun by colonists in Massachusetts and Virginia, a tradition later taken up and extended to the whole of the new American nation by act of the Continental Congress. Traditionally this time of year, we see images of the Pilgrims enjoying a meal with the natives they found living in the area that is now Massachusetts. There is really no evidence that the new Plymouth Colony ever really had a fall celebration like this. The Pilgrims on the Mayflower reached land just before Christmas. The first winter in the New World was a nightmare for the new settlers. Food was scarce and sickness descended upon them. William Bradford, the colony's first governor, says in his journal that by spring a third of their number had died and most of the rest were sick. Those that were still able tended to those who could no longer care for themselves. All their meager resources were shared and they spent their days in constant prayer, thanking God for giving them a new home in which to worship Him. In short, they conducted themselves as true Christians. Thanksgiving is a time we set aside to praise God for all blessings he has bestowed upon us. For Christians, this is something we should remember to do every day.

There are an estimated 30,000 people living with dwarfism in the United States. There is no known way to prevent dwarfism because it results from genetic mutations that affects bone growth to which no one is immune. Dwarfism occurs in all races and ethnicities with 80% of little people being born to parents of average size.

The organization, Little People of America (LPA) and Little People of the World Corporation (LPOTW) have designated October as Dwarfism Awareness Month and October 25 as Dwarfism Awareness Day. Their goal is to provide social interaction, education, medical support, and scholarships/grants for many of these individuals.

When society isn't provided with sufficient knowledge and educations about dwarfism, this enables discrimination that can cause social and economic disadvantages for those with the condition. Dwarfism Awareness Day will help toward the education of the public, acceptance of all born with the condition.

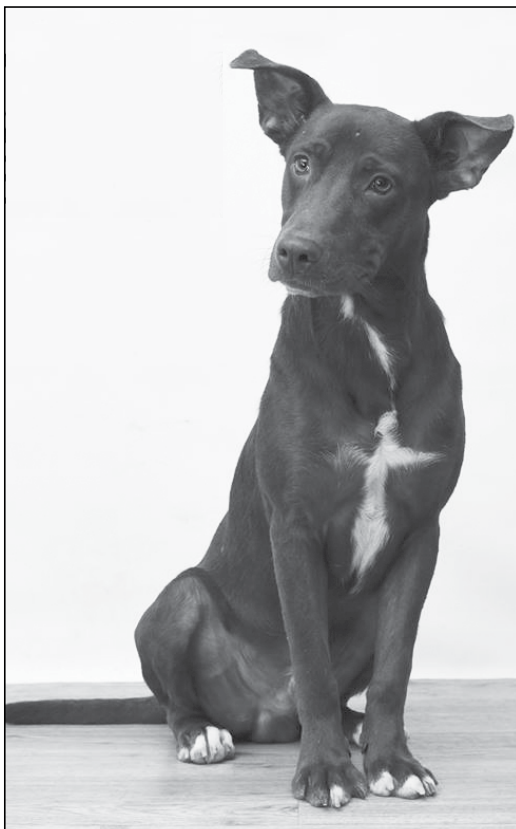

Tennessee for \$486,350. This took place two days before he left office, giving way to Mayor McTizic on July 1, 2017.

- The lone bid received by the city to complete the project was opened on April 24, 2018. It totaled \$608,600, which would require Bolivar to put \$142,000 more into the project.

- On April 24, 2018, the city voted 7-1 to cancel the grant and come up with a concept that would be economically feasible.

The new plans will have a 20x30 foot pavilion with picnic tables and a wooden deck near the water wheel (see photo right), while the building on the property will be torn down and replaced with a grassed area.

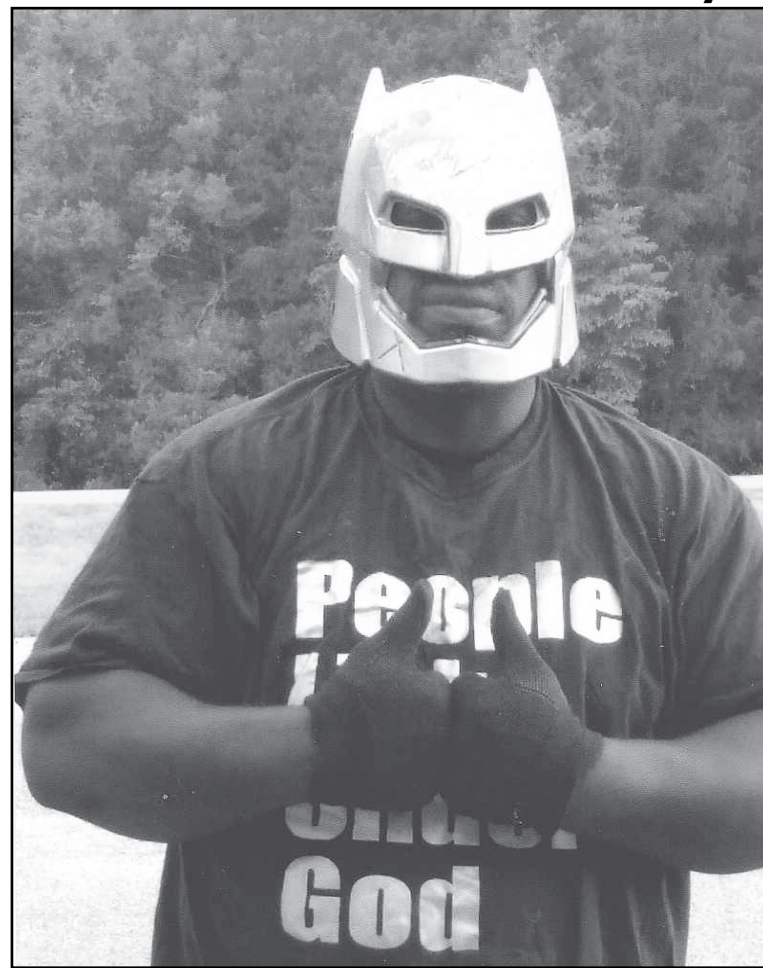

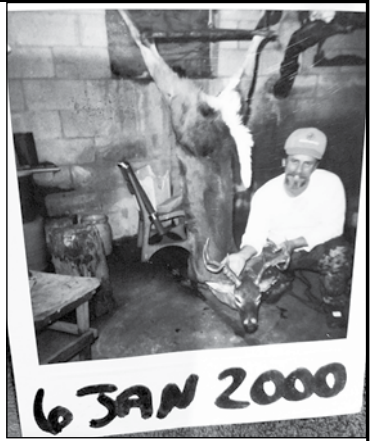

In Middleton, senior night at T.D. Owens field saw the Tigers lead 28-12 at halftime and at the end of three quarters, but a second half comeback by Perry County (1-9, 1-5) ended with a 36-28 loss for the Tigers. Middleton finishes the year at 1-9 for the second consecutive year.

Senior Christian Matthews led the team in tackles with 137, followed by McMahan with 103, and junior Terrence Clemmons had 91.
