*What you got...

Provisional ballots in Hardeman County Municipalities were waited upon but too few provisional ballots were collected to change leads in Middleton and Hornsby, while Toone's razor thin margin total did not change at all.

In Toone, Jackie Kelly led David Wayne Williamson 51-50 after election night, with provisional ballots needed to be waited upon in order to finish the total, but in the case of Toone, the unofficial count did not change.

Provisional ballots are to ensure voters have

a chance to cast a ballot if their eligibility is uncertain. The ballots are counted after Election Day after they are investigated to determine if they were cast under legal guidelines.

And while Hardeman County Administrator of Elections Amber Moore anticipated having final results by Monday, November 9, the records from the state agency took a few more days, due to a heavy volume of voting statewide.

In Middleton, incumbent Mayor Jackie Cox trailed Robert "Evan" Mott 145-132 and according to the election commission, not enough provisional ballots were cast to change the outcome. The same occurred in Hornsby, where Megan Hedwall had an 82-54 lead on incumbent Mayor Mack Carter, Jr. after election night.

Other races with no opposition including Jim Daniel remaining Mayor of Saulsbury, Grand Junction elected three aldermen and Silerton saw Mayor Willard Beshires run unopposed as well.

The election is scheduled for certification on November 17.



Council Passes Raise on 1st Reading

The Bolivar City Council passed a raise to \$6,000 per year for each member on the first reading by a 4-2-1 vote at the regular meeting of the city council on November 9.

And while it was only the first reading and will require a second reading and second vote by the council to make it official, the room had the feel of a final vote debate.

"What do you have to justify \$500 a month?" asked councilman Jonathan Joy. "Justify it! I'll vote for it. I don't know who was in the committee meeting, but justify it. You want extra money? Go to Walmart and be a greeter!"

"We had a park dedication," began councilman Melvin Golden. "And you weren't there."

"I wasn't invited," interrupted Joy. "I've done stuff out of my own pocket. I've done stuff you don't know about. But you want to take it from the citizens? Go ahead. But you ain't got my vote."

After a motion by Golden and a second by councilwoman Carole Spinks, councilman Larry Crawford, also a member of the committee with Spinks and councilwoman Suzanne Rhea, proposed an amendment to the ordinance to put the monthly salary back to \$275 but pay the council members for committee work at the rate of \$50 per meeting. The motion died as no one on the council seconded the motion.

The final vote had Golden, Rhea, Spinks, and councilman Todd Lowe voting for the raise, while Crawford and Joy voted no. Councilman Larry McKinnie abstained from the vote. Present at the meeting, but unable to participate was State Senator Page Walley, prohibited by statute from participating after his recent election to the 26th District spot in the senate.

New Councilman Sought for Bolivar



The election of Bolivar City Councilman Page Walley to the Tennessee Senate made for an immediate opening on the Bolivar City Council as the Vice-Mayor was no longer able to serve the city, even though the election results are yet to be certified.

"It's not when I'm sworn in," explained Walley to the city council. "They tell me I became the senator the moment I was elected."

While Walley's spot is up for election in 2021, a replacement will be elected to the council at the December meeting.

The American Legion Post 198 gathered at the Middleton Veterans Wall at 11:00 a.m. on November 11 to commemorate and celebrate the armistice signed at Le Fancport near Compiegne at that same date and time in 1918 that ended all fighting in World War I between the Allies and Germany.

Although the agreement was made in advance, fighting continued up to 11:00 a.m. that day, with 2,738 men dying on the last day of the war.

The armistice ended the fighting on the Western Front, it had to be prolonged three times until the Treaty of Versailles, which was signed on 28 June 1919, took effect on January 10, 1920.

upon Paul's letters to Timothy and Titus, because the churches in Ephesus (Timothy) and Crete (Titus) were thrown into disarray by false teachers. They were also men of shady character. Paul confronted these problems, because the churches' families needed to recenter and refocus on the Gospel mission in their pagan cultures (Ephesus & Crete).

To accomplish this, Paul began a character-building program. He was trying to bring foundational stability to the core sociological groups in these churches, where distraction and disorientation had resulted from his nasty opponents.

Paul encouraged Timothy and Titus to teach the various sociological groups some specific things. For example, all men are to pray, but the older men are to be "sober-minded, dignified, selfcontrolled, sound in faith, in love, and steadfastness." Moreover, Paul urged "the younger men to be self-controlled" (Titus 2:6).

Women were to practice modesty, self-control, propriety, godliness, and good works. They also were to be known for their internal character and not for making external shows. They

The prior three articles centered were not to be given to much wine nor slander. Instead, "they are to teach what is good. . . "(Titus 2:3).

> The next sociological group he instructs the young Pastors to admonish were the wealthy, and he has much to say to this group. He writes, "as for the rich in this present age, charge them not to be haughty, nor to set their hopes on the uncertainty of riches, but on God, who richly provides us with everything to enjoy" (1 Timothy 6:17).

> Because of their tangibleness, material possessions may give owners a false sense of security or control over life. The wealthy may also forget from where their wealth comes. Moreover, Paul tells the wealthy that "they are to do good, to be rich in good works, to be generous and ready to share, thus storing up treasure for themselves as a good foundation for the future, so that they may take hold of that which is truly life" (1 Timothy 6:18-19).

> These admonishments to the wealthy are for good reasons. While the above instructions offer the practical implications for properly handling and mishandling wealth, the final text aimed at the rich gets at the heart of

Paul writes, "but those who desire to be rich fall into temptation, into a snare, into many senseless and harmful desires that plunge people into ruin and destruction. For the love of money is a root of all kinds of evils. It is through this craving that some have wandered away from the faith and pierced themselves with many pangs" (1 Timothy 6:9-10).

If believers are blessed with material means, they should understand both its proper uses and its potential pitfalls. In another place, Paul urges Christians to work and earn in order to give to those who without (Ephesians 4:28). Finally, an unhealthy love something tangible and temporary like money may also lead to evil and pain.

Graveside services were held at 1 p.m., Saturday, November 7, 2020 at Union Cemetery in Bolivar with Shackelford Funeral Directors in charge.



Protect Your Finances from "Cyberthieves"

You've no doubt heard reports of personal data being stolen and used for financial fraud - anything from online shopping on your credit cards to actual theft from your financial accounts. This problem won't go away anytime soon – but you can take steps to defend yourself.

Here are a few suggestions:

Use multifactor authentication or other extra security options with online accounts. Many of your online accounts offer extra security by giving you the option to prove your identity in different ways. With mutifactor authentication, you must provide at least two different factors to prove your identity when you log in to an account. This additional layer of security provides you with much greater protection.

Be creative with passwords. Create different passwords for work, financial services sites, social media and email - and give each password some length and complexity. Consider passphrases - actual words combined with symbols and numbers (for example, "ThisIsA-Passphrase!2468"), for sites that allow them.

Protect your computer and your key data. Keep your antivirus software updated. And don't install bootleg or unlicensed software, which could infect your computer with a virus. Also, back up your important data.

Watch out for fake websites or apps. When making financial transactions, be sure you're on the website of your bank or financial institution – and not on a fake site established by hackers. Your financial statements should have the legitimate website, so bookmark it and use it when doing anything with your accounts. Also, be careful when downloading apps – stick with those from established providers such as Google Play or the App Store.

Avoid "over-sharing" on social media. Cyberthieves constantly stalk social media platforms for information they can use to commit their crimes. You can help stymie them by limiting what you share online. It's a good idea to keep your full name, address and birthday private. You might also avoid discussing your plans for upcoming vacations. And review your privacy settings periodically so that only people you know or approve can see your information.

Limit use of public Wi-Fi. Hackers often set up their own Wi-Fi networks in public areas, such as the computers found in hotel business centers. Ask an employee for the name of the legitimate net-

work. And even when you use it, log off when you're finished.

Don't take the bait of "phishers." Cyberthieves go "phishing" for sensitive information – usernames, passwords and account numbers - by sending communications, such as emails, purporting to be from a business or financial institution with which you often do business. They may claim your account was "suspended" or that an "unauthorized transaction" was made, and you'll be asked to click on a link that takes you to what appears to be the company's website.

If you go along with this request, you could find malicious software being downloaded on your computer. But legitimate businesses generally won't ask for account numbers or passwords unless you initiate the transaction. Other signs of phishing include threatening language, "urgent" requests, misspelled words or odd word choices. If an email does look suspicious to you, delete it without opening it.

This list is not exhaustive, but by putting these steps to work, you can at least reduce the risk of becoming victimized by cybercriminals.



Making the Streets Safer in Hardeman County

Through the COVID-19 pandemic, UT Extension's Hardeman Healthy Outreach has continued work to make streets in the towns of Hardeman County safer for people to walk, run and cycle. Now there is a virtual opportunity for residents to provide feedback about unsafe roads, crossings, and intersections—along with the best routes to get to exercise and to everyday locations.

"Due to COVID, many of the peer projects across the country have moved from in-person walk audits where people walk together to identify trouble spots that are barriers to safe walking and cycling. Wikimapping is a less expensive way we can find and help the towns plan for possible crosswalk or signage improvements in the future," Amy Elizer, UT Extension specialist said. "I shared the program with partners in Middleton and they feel it will move walkability throughout the county to the next level," she continued.



closely at places people walk for exercise to help the town have data to apply for the funding to improve walkability here. Many things have been on hold because of the pandemic, but this virtual opportunity will keep us moving forward. I want to encourage everyone to participate," said Linda Earnest, Middleton city recorder. Dr. Gene Fitzhugh guides H2O's physical activity work; he is a UT Knoxville associate professor of kinesiology, recreation, and sport studies.

"Quite a few people walk to the trail at Middleton park instead of driving there so they get even more exercise. We have sidewalks in most of the area, but it's along the highway. I think what

H2O learns will help the towns be safer for people who want or need to walk or ride a bicycle.

It can help me have a better idea of where there may be speeding issues that I'm not already aware of," Matthew Maness, Middleton police chief added.

The Editor's Inbox...Letters to the Editor

Dear Editor,

On December 20, 2010 in one sentence from the doctor, my husband and our lives changed forever. We were given the diagnosis of liver cancer with widespread metastasis. We spent New Year's weekend in shock. On January 3, 2011 we met with the oncologist who was honest with us in explaining that the disease had progressed and was widespread and no treatment was offered, other than some radiation to gain a few days. He was barely able to do five days of radiation, as disease was progressing rapidly, and my husband became too weak to travel in the car for treatment. Pain was excruciating.

We started hospice within a few weeks of diagnosis. Hospice was a godsend to my family and I. I, myself am a Registered Nurse, but it was immediately clear to me that I could not handle all this on my own. I have one daughter, who was also devastated. No other family in my hometown.

From the moment my hospice team entered our home, I felt a sense of security and peace that sustained me throughout the final four weeks. I was not able to think clearly; my daughter and I were in such pain, we were treading in unknown waters - without hospice support we would have drowned. Their professional expertise and genuine compassion held us up during the darkest days of my life.

It was a natural and God-driven transition for me, as a nurse, and a widow, to now "pay it forward" to other suffering families' by volunteering with Hospice of West Tennessee. My heart and soul will forever be dedicated to easing the pain and providing comfort to another person/family's journey through the process of illness to death. I will be forever grateful to my hospice team for the love and support that carried me to this day in 2020.



Bolivar PD to Run Safety Campaign in November

As the Thanksgiving holiday approaches and more drivers hit the roads, the Bolivar Police Department is partnering with the Tennessee Highway Safety Office (THSO) to remind motorists to "Click It or Ticket." From November 16 - 29, participating agencies across the state will increase seat belt enforcement as part of the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration's (NHTSA) nationwide mobilization.

"During the 'Click It or Ticket' campaign,

we'll be working with our fellow law enforcement officers across local and state lines to ensure the seat belt safety message gets out to all drivers and passengers," said Bolivar Police Chief Michael Jones. "By far, buckling up is the simplest thing you can do to limit injury or save your life during a crash. We see the results of not wearing a seat belt all the time. We see the loss of life and devastating injuries that could've been prevented with the simple click of a seat belt. That's why buckling up is more than just a good idea—it's the law."

According to NHTSA, in 2018, there were 9,778 unbuckled passenger vehicle occupants killed in crashes in the United States. In that same year, 56 percent of passenger vehicle occupants killed at night (6 p.m.-5:59 a.m.) were not wearing their seat belts. That's why one focus of the "Click It or Ticket" campaign is nighttime enforcement. Participating law enforcement agencies will be taking a no-excuses approach to seat belt law enforcement, writing citations day and night.

Basketball will split from three classes to four classes in the 2021-2022, throwing Bolivar into a district that will be familiar...to Middleton fans.


Bolivar basketball will be in 13AA playing against Adamsville, Decatur County Riverside, Madison Academic, and Scotts Hill High

Three players are tied for the lead in the 10th annual SEC Football Pick'em Contest.


The winner will get a Lazyboy chair from Weems Furniture.


