
### A Bus You Don't Want to Miss is Headed Your Way The Hardeman County Arts Council (HCAC) will present The Christmas Bus on Friday,





### The All-American Stuffing

### Ingredients For cornbread stuffing, toasting the dried-out cornbread is essential; this will keep it from falling apart

during mixing.

3/4 cup (1 1/2 sticks) unsalted butter, cut into pieces, divided, plus more 1 9x13-inch pan cornbread, torn into 1-inch pieces (about 10 cups), dried out overnight

- 1/3 cup coarsely chopped pecans
- 3 tablespoons olive oil
- 12 ounces breakfast sausage, casings removed 2 onions, chopped
- 4 celery stalks, chopped 4 cups collard greens, tough stems removed, torn into 2-inch pieces

2 large eggs, beaten to blend

Kosher salt, freshly ground pepper 1/4 cup apple cider vinegar

2 cups turkey or chicken stock (preferably homemade), plus more

### Preparation Preheat oven to 400°. Butter a shallow 3-qt. baking dish and a sheet of foil. Toast cornbread pieces on

2 rimmed baking sheets until browned, 8-10 minutes; place cornbread in a very large bowl. Reduce oven temperature to 350°. Toast pecans on a clean rimmed baking sheet, tossing once, until fragrant and slightly

darkened, 8-10 minutes. Let cool; add to bowl with cornbread. Meanwhile heat oil in a large skillet over medium-high. Add sausage and cook, stirring occasionally and breaking into small pieces with a spoon, until browned and cooked through, 7–10 minutes. Transfer to bowl with cornbread with a slotted spoon. Add onions, celery, and collard greens to skillet, season with salt and pepper, and cook, stirring often, until onions are golden brown and soft, 10-12 minutes. Transfer to bowl with cornbread. Reduce heat to medium and cook vinegar in skillet, scraping up any browned bits, until almost all evaporated, about 1 minute. Add ½ cup butter; cook, stirring, until melted. Drizzle over cornbread mixture. Whisk eggs and 2 cups stock in a medium bowl; pour over cornbread mixture. Season with salt and pepper and gently toss, adding more stock 1/4-cupful at a time as needed (you may not use it all), until combined and cornbread is hydrated. Mix carefully to avoid breaking cornbread into crumbs. Transfer to prepared baking dish and dot with remaining 1/4 cup butter.

Cover with buttered foil; bake until a paring knife inserted into the center comes out hot, 30–35 minutes. Increase oven temperature to 450°. Uncover and bake until top is golden brown and crisp, 20-25 minutes. Let sit 10 minutes before serving. Do Ahead: Stuffing can be assembled 1 day ahead. Cover and chill. Serves eight.



### The Editor's Inbox...Letters to the Editor

TnAchieves is a nonprofit organization dedicated to the achievement of Tennessee high school students. It helps students who are ambitious enough to attend post-secondary educations at Tennessee College of Applied Technology (TCAT) Junior Colleges or four year universities. The program for each high school senior class begins with the fall semester (currently fall 2017) and continues into the fall semester of their first year of college or TCAT (to the end of 2018). There are some hurdles the senior students must cross during their senior year at high school. If they successfully cross them, they may get scholarships to college or TCAT.

Many of these students will need scholarships to attend college or TCAT in August 2018. Many students will depend on mentors and teachers to get them over the hurdles, even though the hurdles are not difficult. November 1 is past, signing up with an application. The next hurdle is attendance at the mandatory fall meeting. The deadline for completing the Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) is in January 2018.

Many of the students do not have parents or relatives to help, or if they do, the parents or relatives may not have any experience with college attendance or with applying for college entrance. Mentors are the answer... adults who volunteer to help and have the experience and skills to help with. TnAchieves has 63,000 students statewide enrolled for 2018. The TnAchieves office does not have a large

staff and obtains funds to run its operation from many corporations. For success, it needs 2500 volunteer mentors to help the students over the hurdles. We are asking for volunteers for this fall to work with the students and help them complete the program by the end of the summer, 2018. Hardeman County needs 41 mentors. As of 2017-11-13 there are 22 mentors for Hardeman County and 19 more are needed. See the website tnAchieves.org for more information.

As with most new political processes, there are misconceptions about the new Hardeman County Democratic Party Primary Board. One of the most common that we have heard is that the Board will pick the Democratic Party's candidates. Nothing could be further from the truth.

The Hardeman County Democratic Party encourages all citizens to take an active part in the political process – that's what makes a democracy work. Citizens have a responsibility to their community to help with the governance, whether it be simply voting or running for office. We invite all qualified citizens to help by running for office and if they are a Democrat, to run as a Democrat.

The role of the Hardeman county Democratic Party Primary Board is simply to ensure that people who run under the Democratic Party banner are in fact Democrats. Those declared candidates for county office that otherwise qualify and file to run as a Democrat will be reviewed to determine if they are a Democrat. The base-line criteria are whether they have voted in three of the last five Democratic primaries for state or federal elections (voted Democrat a majority of the time). If they meet these criteria, they are assumed qualified unless some other evidence is presented to the contrary such as openly endorsing and supporting candidates for major office from another political party.

Even if the candidate does not meet these requirements, they may still be qualified as a Democrat. They will be notified of the problem and given an opportunity to meet with the Primary Board and explain the deficiency. There are explainable reasons why, such as "they have not been old enough to vote in the required number of elections" or "maybe their best friend or relative was running in the other party's election" or "maybe the Democratic Party did not have a viable candidate running so they voted in the other election". One last reason, maybe they have just simply had a change of heart on how they see our government and the differences in the political parties. The Primary Board has the discretion to make an exception when they believe it is in the best interest of the Democratic Party.

The Primary Board does not seek to limit the number of candidates or choose who runs for office as a Democrat. They simply seek to ensure that candidates that run as Democrats are in fact Democrats. We think that's the way it should be. We have written a one-page sheet that we intend to mail to candidates that pull petitions to file for office

as a Democrat (attached). We requested that the Elections Office give one to each candidate when they get their petition, but the TN State Elections office declined to allow it. The document is attached for reference. Sincerely,

The Bolivar Fire Department has installed smoke detectors in several of the apartment units with ten year batteries, giving residents instruction on the proper use of fire extinguishers and participated in many public

The Chief of Police and members of the City of Bolivar administration have reported to me that the Bolivar Housing Authority development's streetscape is clean and looks really good. There is so little negative activity in the developments that the police patrol the area as little as any community in the city. Although I as Executive Director hear the accolades, the real reason for the positive living environment is the residents

in cooperation with the maintenance staff. The second business is the Dixie Funeral Home. The City of Bolivar Police and Hardeman County Sheriff Departments are crucial in escorting funeral processions. Not only do they do a great job escorting but they







### Required Withdrawals from Retirement Plans: What Should You Know?

You may spend decades contributing to your IRA and 401(k). But, eventually, you'll need to use this money. Before that day arrives, you'll want to be familiar with the rules governing withdrawals – and you'll want to know just how much you should take out. To begin with, withdrawals from traditional employer-sponsored

retirement plans like these fall under the Internal Revenue Service's "required minimum distributions" (RMD) guidelines. (You aren't required to take these distributions from a Roth IRA.) Here are some of the key RMD points to keep in mind: You need to take distributions by age 70-1/2. You generally should

begin taking RMDs in the year in which you turn 70-1/2. If you don't take your first RMD during that year, you must take it no later than April 1 of the following year. If you do put it off until April 1, you must take two distributions in one year. If you don't take your RMDs on time, you may have to pay the IRS

a 50 percent penalty tax on the taxable portion of your uncollected distribution — so make sure you know your dates. You can take more than the minimum. You can withdraw more than

the RMD, but, as the word "required" suggests, you can't withdraw You may be able to delay RMDs in an employer's retirement plan if

you're still working. If your employer's retirement plan permits it, you may not have to take RMDs if you are still working and you are 70-1/2 or older. However, this exception won't apply if you own 5 percent or more of your company. To determine your RMD, you'll need to use either the Uniform Life-

time Table, which is based on your life expectancy, or the Joint Life Table, if you have a spouse who is the sole beneficiary and who is more than 10 years younger. Your tax advisor can help you make this

So, now that you know the basic rules of RMDs, you'll need to consider their impact on your retirement income. As mentioned above, you can certainly take out more than the RMD, but should you? If you need the extra money, then you'll have to take it. However,

when determining how much you should take beyond your RMDs, you'll need to weigh some other factors. For one thing, if you can delay taking Social Security, you'll get

bigger checks, so you might be able to lower the amounts you take from your 401(k) and IRA. Another factor to consider is the size and composition of your investment portfolio held outside your retirement accounts. If you have

a sizable amount of investments, with some of them providing regular income, you may be able to afford to take out only your RMDs, or perhaps just slightly more. On the other hand, if your 401(k) and IRA make up the vast majority of your investment holdings, you might need to rely on them much more heavily. In any case, though, you will need to establish an appropriate with-

drawal rate for all your investments to ensure you won't outlive your money. A financial professional can help you calculate this rate.

Do whatever it takes to maximize your benefits from your IRA and 401(k). They're valuable assets – so use them wisely.







### Hardeman County Remembered by Lisa Coleman

Reminders to people riding in my vehicle about wearing their seatbelts often remind me of this photo. If you ride in my vehicle with me today, you wear your seatbelt; no discussion. This is me somewhere around a year or so old riding in my car seat in the front seat of Dad's 1957 Chevy. I don't remember riding in the car seat myself, but I do remember the Chevy - it was white and beige with marvelous chrome.

I had the "upgrade" version (of sorts) of this early 1960s car seat – it had a steering wheel and a horn. I remember my brother riding in the seat too - the steering wheel was white and there was a big red button in the middle for the horn. As far as I remember, there was no kind of safety strap or belt or anything – just hook onto the car seat, in we went, and then off we would go. I don't think the kind of car seat I rode in was ever marketed to be a "safety seat" as much as it was a place to put the baby in the car. It was what we had and what we did then.

Having had this type of car seat may explain why I love car trips so much – some of my first trips were made in that '57 Chevy, sitting there between Mom and Dad looking out the window at the world as we watched the miles go by. Like



this seat, but I do have memories of riding in the car. By then, I was in the back seat, usually standing on what we called "the hump" in the back floorboard, hanging over the front seat looking at the sights. That's how I learned to read maps, looking over my Dad's shoulder as he drove us on our many adventures as a family. (I still use maps today, and not a GPS - the maps have never sent me north when I was trying to go south or sent me in circles like a GPS did the one time I used one in someone else's

This time of the year at the Yellow House, us kids were anxiously awaiting the order to arrive at the post office from Sears and Roebuck bringing our new winter clothes. That package wrapped in brown paper, tied with strong cords, had a distinctive smell of NEW all about it. We could hardly wait until the package was opened so we could try on our new jeans, overalls and flannel shirts. My three sisters pranced around the house like models on a New York fashion runway, grinning from ear to ear. I'll insert a country makedo here while I'm mentioning my sisters. They made their hair rollers from coffee cans. They would cut strips from the tin can about one quarter inch wide and about six inches long. They would wrap the strips with paper from an old catalog. They would roll their hair on these strips and bend the ends back over the curls. Quite inventive you might say.

I couldn't wait to show off my new duds at school. Most of the time the girls would look right past me at Dale Wardlow who wore khakis, rode a new bike with lights, luggage carrier, and streamers hanging from the handlebars, plus he lived in a white two-story house downtown and brought a large bag of corn puffs to school and shared them with the good looking girls. At school,



we were cutting out and painting turkeys, pilgrims, pumpkins and Indians. At that time, I had never seen a real turkey or a pilgrim in Pocahontas. But I knew that the Indians didn't scalp the pilgrims like they did in the western comic books, but sat down and ate a big dinner with them at a big rock called Plymouth.

Talking about Thanksgiving, my Mom was constantly reminding us to be thankful for what we had. I remember walking home from school down the railroad tracks in the wintertime and when I got home I was starving as usual. I would head straight to the kitchen. Mom would say, "There's some baked sweet potatoes in the warming closet on the stove." I'd say "Is this all we got?" She would say "You better be thankful for that, for there's a lot of little kids who don't have anything to eat." I ate so many of the tubers when I was growing up that I still don't really care for them. Guess that's the only thing that I don't really like. I like everything from baked chimichangas, german wienerschnitzels and kung pao shrimp, to chicken gizzards, collard greens and sardines. I am thankful for each blessing. 

### School Board Attends State Conference

The Hardeman County School Board recently attended their annual convention in Nashville, November 3-5. All nine board members along with Deputy Director Bobby Doyle attended the convention hosted by the Tennessee School Board Association.

The convention kicked off Thursday and Friday with a leadership conference led by Conrad Lehfeldt of Team Trek. Lehfeldt has led leadership training and teambuilding seminars with many corporations across the county, including Fed Ex.

Friday afternoon's session began with speaker Fredi Lajvardi, a teacher at Carl Hayden Community High School in Phoenix, AZ, where nearly the entire student body is of Hispanic descent, many of the students come from high-poverty homes, and English is not the students' first language. Lajvardi led a group of these high school students to a national championship in underwater robotics, competing again not only other high schools but also against universities such as MIT and Stanford. The movie Spare Parts is based on this inspiring

Saturday was filled with a variety of breakout classes. Board member Jerry Crisp moderated a class led by Emily Parrish entitled "Homework Hotline: Tutoring Is Free in Tennessee." This tutoring service is based out of Nashville but can be accessed by any K-12 student across the state and represents the kind of ideas board members believe will help Hardeman County reach student target goals in tested subjects.

At Saturday afternoon's delegate assembly, Patricia Carter, Gene Ross, and Jerry Crisp represented Hardeman County. This assembly voted on key proposals from schools across the state for which TSBA will lobby on Capitol Hill.



The awards reception followed on Saturday evening, with many school systems and board members recognized for outstanding achievement. The Hardeman County School Board was recognized as a "Board of Distinction." This award is one of TSBA's most prestigious, celebrating the achievement of those boards who have met the challenge of leadership in all areas of their board responsibility – planning, policy, promotion, and board development - by creating a five-year plan, maintaining their policy manual, participating in TSBA district and state meetings, and conducting a self-evaluation. Only a few school boards across the state achieve this status.

The closing session on Sunday morning featured keynote speaker Liz Murray, whose life as the child of cocaine-addicted parents in the Bronx was bitterly grim – no food in the house, filthy living conditions, drugs everywhere, and welfare checks spent before their arrival. Following her mother's death, Murray was homeless by age 15 – living on the streets, riding the subway all night, and eating from dumpsters. Amid such adversity, Murray still imagined a better life and used the lessons of

life on the streets to overcome the obstacles before her. Determined to take charge of her life, Murray finished high school in two years and was awarded a full scholarship to Harvard University, all whole camping out in New York City parks and subway stations. Her life story was turned into the Lifetime Television movie, Homeless to Harvard.

Liz Murray's speech made a definite impression on members of the school board, leading them to realize their responsibility to help change a defeatist mindset that our students cannot achieve because of various obstacles and barriers. Instead, the board needs to set goals for all students and expect them to succeed.

School board chairman Bobby Henderson praised the members of the board: "I am very proud to serve with a board that is dedicated to our students, staff, and the community. Each board member attends classes throughout the year, expanding their knowledge in all areas of education. To have all nine board members give up four days, two of which were the weekend, speaks to their dedication to this school system."
