County Honors Shaw

Johnny Shaw's 11th term in office began with something new as the State of Tennessee agreed with the Hardeman County Commission to name a portion of Highway 64 between Bolivar and Whiteville in his honor.

"I've spent a lot of time on that road," said Shaw. "Governor Wilder got that portion of the road four-laned and its always been a part of my life even before I went to the legislature. I was real pleased to get my name on there."

Shaw said he was happy his name went on the road in less than the usual way and is both a honor for his ancestors and his descendants.

"Normally, it's kind of a memorial. But for me to get it on there in real time, road named in your honor. It will become a memorial and honor the friends and family that you knew along the way. I'm real excited about that."

Shaw's career at the legislature began in 2000 when he was elected to the 80th district, replacing the retiring Page Walley, who was recently elected to the 26th State Senate District. Since 2000, Shaw has only faced an opponent five times, four times in the primary and just once in the general election. At his election in 2000, Shaw was the first African American representative from a rural West Tennessee district since the Reconstruction.

Shaw, married to Opal Shaw, has five children and nine grandchildren.

Kelley Certified as the Winner in Toone

Two weeks of uncertainty ended on Tuesday, November 17, as the Hardeman County Election Commission officially certified the results of the November 3 elections in Hardeman County.

The uncertainty came from the mayor's race in Toone where former alderman Jackie Kelley led 51-50 after election night, but a recount and the possibility of a provisional ballot delayed the announcement of a winner in the race. In the end, the 51-50 vote held up as official.

The race for six aldermen in Toone saw Karen Lambert receive 22 votes as a write-in candidate to join Arthur Chism, Johnnie Chism, Mary Ellison, Keith Foote, and Bedford Forrest West, Jr., on the panel.

In Hornsby, Megan Hedwall won 82-54 over incumbent Mayor Mack Carter, Jr. with Raymond Cox, Wayne Isbell, Gregory Vance, Curtis Vandiver, and Melissa Cossar Wilson taking up the five seats as aldermen.

In Middleton incumbent Mayor Jackie Cox trailed Robert "Evan" Mott 145-132 and that total held up exactly as it was on election night, while the Middleton aldermen's race had only four candidates for five spots, sending Randal Bishop, David Bo Callahan, James S. Simpson, Jr., and Kevin Speck to the seats, and Sharon Bishop outdistanced Ann Baxter 86-67 as a write in candidate to pick up the sixth seat.

The Silerton election was one candidate short of a full ballot, but only Stanley Rush received write-in votes and will join Frankie Lambert, Gail Mayfield, John Naylor, and Rickey Leon Wilson and incumbent Mayor Willard Beshires for the next four years in Silerton.

Jim Daniel ran unopposed to keep his post as the Mayor of Saulsbury with Rich Emerson, Carl Hayes, Kenneth Hines, Johnny Smith, and Jan Ward filling the five slots as

aldermen.

In Grand Junction, three aldermen spots were up for grabs and will be occupied by the three candidates, Carl Franklin Bell, Courtney Breeden, and Vince McCalip.

The decaying oak tree on the south side of the Hardeman County Courthouse was removed on November 17. The bidded process cost nearly \$7,000 according to Hardeman County Mayor Jimmy Sain and the work was done by Memphis Tree Service. The tree measured 6'8" at the trunk.



Place sweet potatoes in a pot of boiling water. Simmer for 15 minutes or until fork tender. Drain. In a large bowl (or in the pot the potatoes were cooked in), mash the sweet potatoes with brown sugar, butter, cinnamon, vanilla and salt & pepper.

Fold in half of the pecans and spread into prepared pan. Sprinkle with the marshmallows and the remaining pecans.

Bake for 25 minutes or until marshmallows are golden brown and potatoes are heated through.

These Things, Part 5 by Jeff Capshaw

This is the final article of the series from the Pastoral Epistles. False teachers with shady character and false doctrine had influenced the house churches in Ephesus and Crete. So, Paul had to confront them, because the churches' families had gotten disoriented and lost focus on living out the Gospel in their respective pagan cultures.

As a result, Paul began a character-building program to bring stability to the core sociological groups in these churches. Those groups included younger and older men and women, the Pastors themselves, and the wealthy.

The final group of focus for this series is slaves. It is important to clarify what Paul meant by this term and its denoted group. Slavery in the New Testament bore little resemblance to the slavery of 18th and 19th century America.

In New Testament times, slavery was a basic element of culture. Some have estimated that 1 in 5 people in the Hellenistic and Roman worlds were slaves. According to one New Testament scholar, "the work of slaves covered the entire gamut of activities in the ancient world, with few exceptions" (E. Ferguson, Backgrounds

of Early Christianity, p. 57). New Testament era slaves were not relegated merely to mundane tasks. Many were artisans and possessed special skills of various types. A more accurate parallel for today is believing employees. Accordingly, there are principles in these texts for them.

First, Paul writes, "let all who are under a yoke as bondservants regard their own masters as worthy of all honor, so that the name of God and the teaching may not be reviled. Those who have believing masters must not be disrespectful on the ground that they are brothers; rather they must serve all the better since those who benefit by their good service are believers and beloved" (1 Timothy 6:1-2).

Submission to authority is important because believers trust that God is sovereign in all matters. The purpose of believers' proper alignment with authorities is clear. It is for the sake of the Gospel, " so that the name of God and the teaching may not be reviled." Not respecting the position of superiors is unbecoming of believers. That is why believers should "serve all the better." Thus, Christian employees should have the best attitudes and work ethic in the entire workforce. Next, Paul writes, "bondser-

tus 2:9-10).


Notice the similarity in what Paul said to Timothy and Titus. Christian workers should possess a great attitude, be busy about assigned tasks, while "showing all good faith." Why? Because that will "adorn the doctrine of God." That is just another way of saying that Christian employees should "glorify God" even in the workplace.



Harvest Incentive Program Offered for Unit CWD

An incentive program to increase the deer harvest in Unit CWD is being offered in partnership between the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency and the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Foundation. The program fea-

tures two levels of rewards to incentivize deer harvest resulting in a free license for the 2021-22 license year. The top tier first prize would be a free sportsman's license for 2021-22. Any hunter who harvests four antlerless deer and four antlered deer through January 8, 2021 would receive a free Sportsman's license. Any hunter who harvests four antlerless deer through January 8, 2021 will receive a free Type 001 license (\$34) and a supplemental hunting equipment license of the hunter's choice (\$33). The Tennessee Wildlife Resources Foundation will be purchasing the licenses.

The offer only applies to deer harvested in Unit CWD. The deer must be submitted for CWD testing. The license is not transferrable to another person.

The program applies to only Tennessee residents or native Tennesseans. After the hunting season, hunters will be notified and asked which supplemental license is desired if they are in the second tier. The successful hunters will be notified of new license in mid-February.

Unit CWD consists of the counties of Chester, Crockett, Fayette, Gibson, Hardeman, Haywood, Lauderdale, Madison, McNairy, Shelby, and Tipton.




FAFSA workshops to be held at JSCC

Bolivar Woman Arrested for TNCare Fraud

An investigation by Special Agents with the Medicaid Fraud Control Division of the Tennessee Bureau of Investigation has resulted in the arrest of a Bolivar woman accused of TennCare Fraud.

In February of 2019, after receiving information from the Division of TennCare's Office of Program Integrity, TBI Agents began investigating Glenda Valentine (DOB: 9/2/71). At the time, Valentine was employed by two West Tennessee patient care services, one of which was responsible for her mother's care, who received TennCare benefits. During the course of the investigation, agents determined between March and July of 2018, Valentine falsified time sheets for caring for her mother while simultaneously working for the second care service.

On November 6th, Valentine was arrested on one count of TennCare fraud and one count of theft over \$3,500. She was booked into the Hardeman County Jail on a \$1,000 cash bond.

The Tennessee Medicaid Fraud Control Division receives 75 percent of its funding from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services under a grant award totaling \$6,862,935.00 for Federal fiscal year 2020. The remaining 25 percent, totaling \$2,287,645.00 for FY 2021, is funded by the State of Tennessee.



Governor Lee Announces Reconnect to Workforce Partnership

Tennessee Governor Bill Lee announced Reconnect to Workforce, a partnership between the Tennessee Higher Education Commission's Tennessee Reconnect program and the Department of Labor and Workforce Development that will assist up to 500,000 Tennesseans claiming unemployment benefits to earn a college degree while fulfilling work search requirements.

"As federal unemployment benefits end, we want to ensure Tennesseans have the tools needed to skill up and gain long-term employment," said Governor Lee. "There are over 250,000 available jobs in Tennessee and this partnership will remove barriers so Tennesseans across our state can obtain the skills needed to acquire a high-quality job."

"The biggest challenge in reconnecting Tennesseans to education is often financial hardship," said Tennessee Higher Education Commission Executive Director Mike Krause. "By removing this hurdle, we're giving unemployed Tennesseans the opportunity to reskill and find a new path forward in our changing workforce."

Tennessee Reconnect offers two years of tuition-free community or technical college by establishing last-dollar scholarships for eligible adults who have not yet obtained a degree.

Individuals from high-need populations make up a significant portion of grant recipients, including 58% having dependents and almost 70% making below \$50,000. Last year, over 2,000 students were awarded a certificate or degree.

Federal unemployment benefits funded by the CARES Act will expire as claimants reach the maximum 39 weeks of payments in the coming weeks. The last day to claim federal unemployment benefits is December 26, 2020.



Learning how to eat a rainbow (otherwise known as enjoying a broad array of fruits and vegetables) was only one activity experienced by Whiteville Elementary School students and parents on Wednesday, November 4. As part of Hardeman County's CDC Farm-to-School grant, local farmers and UT Extension staff organized the first-ever Pop-Up Farmers' Market, hosted onsite at the school. Principal Crisp warmly welcomed vendors, educators, and visitors to the school's campus. Among the visitors were Future Farmers of America (FFA) students from Middleton High School and Bolivar Central High School, who volunteered their services for the event.

More than a dozen types of produce were available for purchase, among them everyday offerings such as green and red bell peppers, tomatoes, and cabbage, as well as classics like mustard greens and turnips. Non-produce items included homemade jams and three types of meat.

Everyone in attendance enjoyed taste testing a newer variety of apple, the Jazzy, both on its own merits and as a "sandwich," accompanied by organic peanut butter, raisins, and honey. While Hardeman County does not boast any apple orchards, the school district is actively seeking an apple vendor from the West Tennessee area to supply apples to school cafeterias. The aforementioned "How to Eat a Rainbow" also introduced children, via taste testing, to a broad variety of healthy fruits and vegetables.
