I played with my friends in college. Young, athletic and quick, I figured I'd be pretty good.

It didn't work out that way. The best among us was Chuck. He was 5'11", 320.

He kind of just stood in the center and waited for the ball to come to him. And it did.

Meanwhile, my 6'0", 125 pound body ran around the court like my hair was on fire. I had unlimited energy, and I figured my superior quickness would win me point after point after point.

I didn't work out that way. He hammered me. Game after game after game.

He hit the ball where I couldn't chase it. He zigged the ball while I zagged with my body. His ball yinged while I yanged.

The harder I hit the ball, the more it seemed to bounce wherever he was, two steps to the right or two steps to the left. And he hit it just hard enough to make me chase and occasionally run into walls, while not hitting the ball.

So, I changed my strategy. I hit it softer. I'd make him run and I'd beat him.

It didn't work out that way. He changed his strategy. He took my soft shots and hammered it past me.

No matter what I did, he stayed calm and beat me. Every time. I mean every time. Not one time did I beat him.

Destination Bolivar Begins

The City of Bolivar moved on November 19 to begin a project that has been on Mayor Julian McTizic's mind for a long time.

It began as his proposal to purchase the area in East Bolivar known to locals as the "Sand Pit", that was approved by the city council.

"We're trying to create this area as a destination with walking trails, fishing, and hiking. The possibilities are endless," said McTizic. "I have had a vision for this side of town and this is the first step."

Where They Care: 2018 Voting #s

Candidates may want to pay attention to who is paying attention to elections in Hardeman County and beyond.

District 7 in Hardeman County, which includes Hornsby, Silerton, and Dixie Hills precincts were more interested in choosing their leaders during the county general, but Hickory Valley had their eye on the national election, according to numbers obtained from the Hardeman County Election Commission office.


District 7 had 46.9% of their registered voters go to the polls in August, which was narrowly ahead of District 1 (Bolivar) by a point and a half.

In the November Federal Election, 57.1% of Hickory Valley registered voters went to the polls, ahead of District 7 at 56.6%.

The lowest amount of interest in all three categories was Whiteville. Only 33.4% of registered voters voted in the county election, while only 50.5% voted in November. The low voter registration number of 20.6% is due to the fact that prisoners at both Hardeman County Correctional Facility and Whiteville Correctional Facility are included in the popultion that is represented by District 3 lawmakers.

The highest number of registered voters out of the entire population was Middleton, who have 64.2% of their citizens registered to vote. This statistic can be argued as misleading due to the age of the population variances across the county.







Last week I completed a tenpart series from the book of Amos. Therefore, it seems prudent to depart from a serial plan during the holidays.

This can be an especially difficult time for many. For some this may be one of the most trying periods in life. If that is the case, then surely my heart goes out to you, regardless of whom or for what reason.

For me personally—and for lots of reasons—there was a period of years when I woefully dreaded the holidays. The pain and heartache were often unbearable, and regardless of how hard I tried, nothing helped me to cope very well. I simply endured them and longed for January 5th to arrive, the day after my birthday, so that I could put it all behind me. I deceived myself into thinking I had nothing for which to be thankful.

other traumatic event or some sense of great loss, my advice certainly will seem counter intuitive. For some it may seem impossible. But, if you can muster up the courage, the faith, the hope and the strength to be grateful; it can help you significantly.

There have been numerous studies conducted on the physical, emotional and psychological benefits of gratitude. I recently heard a talk from the British scholar, Rupert Sheldrake, on this very idea. In his book, Science and Spiritual Practices, Sheldrake enumerates seven spiritual practices which lead to more meaningful, happier and healthier lives, even for those not religious. Second on his list is gratitude.

For my fellow Christians, let us be reminded of what the Scripture says for our benefit and for God's glory. Only a handful of times does the New Testament explicitly say,

Thank you for the laughs and good times. Thank you for showing us the human spirit and the will to live.

Thank you for showing us the vast limits of human endurance. Thank you most of all, for showing us that

Tales from the Yellow House by Lee McAlpin

Thanksgiving at the Yellow House was really just another day for us. We were constantly reminded throughout the year by Mom and Dad to be thankful for all that we had, everyday. Usually, we did have a few extra treats on that day. Mom would prepare chicken and dressing if there was an extra rooster running around the yard. When there was no chicken available, we still had chicken and dressing, but there wasn't a chicken in a mile of it. This chicken and dressing without the chicken was called "Poor Doo". It had sage, onions, eggs, cornbread etc., without chicken.



It was rather tasty in itself without the added fowl. I mentioned Poor Doo in an earlier article. This recipe was given to my Mother by an older lady in the community. Mom would usually accompany this meal with potato salad, beans or peas, turnip greens and the ever present baked sweet potatoes.

This incident didn't happen at the Yellow House, but shortly after we moved to another place. My family will probably disown me when I tell this, but it actually happened. Dad bought an old tom turkey and fattened him up for Thanksgiving. On Thanksgiving morning when he was getting ready to off with it's head, it got away from him. It was some race it was as Dad chased the old bird down through the back lot. He finally caught up with tom and laid hold on him, after which he proceeded to silence his gobble. He plucked and washed the bird and Mom prepared him for the oven. Later that afternoon, a golden brown turkey was removed from the oven and placed on a platter in the center of the dining table.

The family was seated around the table, mouths watering, eying the perfectly cooked bird. The blessing was said, and My brother-in-law took knife in hand to do the carving. When he sliced across the breast of the old bird, there was a loud explosion. The thing blew up, scattering corn, green grass, gravel and Lord knows what else all over the table. Seems as though Dad forgot to remove the craw. I guess that the pressure from the heat built up during the cooking and caused it to blow up like a grenade. Dad was the only one who ate any of the bird, but every stray dog and cat in the community had one of the best Thanksgiving dinners that they had ever had.

Every time I sit down at a Thanksgiving dinner which includes a turkey, I am almost tempted to put my plate in front of my face when the carving starts, in fear of an explosion. Happy Thanksgiving to everyone.



Tennessee Wildlife Federation's Hunters for the Hungry program is in full swing for the 2018 deer season. More than 80 processors throughout the state are now accepting donations of whole deer to help feed local families in need.

In Hardeman County, that includes Custom Deer Processing and Kimery Deer Processing.

Through the generosity of hunters over 20 years, Hunters for the Hungry has provided more than 6.5 million meals worth of healthy, much-needed protein to the hungriest Tennesseans. As a thank you for those years of support, hunters will be entered in a drawing for each whole deer they donate to win one of four made-in-Tennessee muzzleloaders by Knight Rifles. More information, including alternate ways to enter, can be found at tnwf.org/HuntersForTheHungry.



"This is a really exciting year. We've had multiple record-breaking years recently and we're adding more processors and counties to our program," said Matt Simcox, Hunters for the Hungry manager. "Even with the tough season for hunters last year, we still saw incredible giving. This program works because of Tennessee's volunteer spirit in our hunters and processors. Without them, there would be fewer full bellies this time of year."

When hunters harvest a deer, they can donate the it—in part or whole—to the program at a participating processor. The deer is processed, and the venison is delivered to local hunger relief organizations where it gets in the hands of hungry children and families. One deer provides as many as 168 meals.

Currently, all participating processors in the state are funded, meaning there is no cost to hunters to donate their venison. When deer donations surpass funding, hunters may pay a reduced, \$50 processing fee directly to the processor to cover processing costs or redeem Deer Coins purchased from Tennessee Wildlife Federation at tnwf.org/DeerCoin.

"In addition to the support of countless individuals, Hunters for the Hungry is thankful for contributions by companies," said Simcox. "Walmart Giving, in particular, has been a longtime supporter as they fight hunger in the communities their stores serve."




