A Bluegrass Christmas at the "Opry"

If you're thinking about "Opry" in New York or other metropolitan cities, think again. This is the Golden Circle Opry; December 8th on Hwy. 18 South in Malesus Park, Jackson, TN. Music begins at 5:00 p.m.

And this year, Bluegrass, Old Time Country and Gospel music blended with the sounds of Christmas will be heard from musicians coming in from several states.

John and Patsy Few are the producers and managers of 12 bands that provide family-style entertainment in West Tennessee. John grew up following his grandfather around to sporting events where this style of music was played. Always wanting to play a guitar, he didn't learn how until later in life. "One Christmas, I noticed a strange shaped box under the tree from my wife," chuckles John. "On Christmas morning, I open the box—expecting to find a metal detector, as I had mentioned I would like to have one. Instead, the present was a guitar…complete with a video and a "how-to" book.

"He learned one song, "In the Pines" and he played it over and over," laughs Patsy. "I finally suggested he learn another song."

That was about 20 years ago. Today, John has two bands in which he plays, "The Provi-

dence Road Band" and "The Possum Road Band."

As part of the Plectoral Society, the Golden Circle Opry started as a place to gather, listen, and perform the old-time music. Now in the 20th year, twelve bands rotate on the six-month schedule and usually three perform for each event. The Jackson Recreation and Parks Dept. provide the building, utilities and manage the concession stand.

Few relates that many of those involved in playing this style music grew up listening to Bluegrass music on the radio and listening to old-time music in small churches where they heard Southern Gospel. The Bluegrass heard today reflects influences from a wide variety of music, including jazz, contemporary country, Celtic, rock & roll, and Southern gospel.



This week I talked with May Jones from Lecanto, FL. May is the daughter of the late Howard and Maybelle Stack. Most of her Silerton friends remember her as Willie May. She shared memories of two of her most memorable Christmases. She

stated that when she was very young, her daddy had suffered from heart issues and was not able to work. She was old enough to know they didn't have any money. As Christmas neared, the family went to the woods and cut a nice tree. After decorating it, she and her siblings did not expect to get any presents. On Christmas morning they each had a small metal truck that had fake fruit in the bed. But to their surprise they each had an apple and an orange. They were very pleased. She related another memory of years later, she and her siblings knew their parents had gone Christmas shopping. Her daddy was now back at work. One day when their parents were not in the house, they sneaked up to the attic and was amazed to see so many presents. They took their time and looked at the gifts. 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

Butter Dip Biscuits

Ingredients

1/2 cup salted butter 1 stick

2 1/2 cups all-purpose flour 1 1/2 tbsp granulated sugar

1 1/2 tbsp baking powder

 $1 \frac{1}{2}$ tsp salt 1 3/4 cup buttermilk

Instructions

Preheat oven to 450F degrees.

In a microwave-safe bowl (or you can use the baking dish that you'll be baking these in if it's microwave-safe), melt stick of butter in the microwave. Put melted butter into an

8x8 baking dish. In a medium bowl, mix together the flour, sugar, baking powder and salt.

Pour in the buttermilk. Stir until a loose dough forms. Batter will be a bit sticky.

Pour biscuit dough into baking dish (right on top of the melted butter.) Some of the butter will run over the top of the dough, that's perfectly okay.

Bake for about 20-25 minutes, rotating dish once during baking. Oven times do vary since different ovens have different hot spots, but basically biscuits should be golden brown on top and spring back to the touch.





Hardship and Hope by Jeff Capshaw

Last week I discussed gratitude. Studies show that gratitude is characteristic of happier and healthier people. Additionally, thankfulness may benefit the nonreligious and religious. I also reminded believers that, regardless of circumstances, Scripture exhorts us to be thankful in everything, because . . . "it is the will of God" (1 Thessalonians 5:18).

Further, I urged those in the early stages of grief, feeling a deep sense of loss or enduring other hardships to ask the Lord for the grace to be thankful. It can help, especially during those periods (e.g. holidays) that often increase our sadness.

There is another tip that may help hurting believers. Since our emotions are so powerful, they often can overwhelm us. We may easily forget to think about what is ultimately true. Even so, shifting away from raw emotions to a more reflective and objective

mindset can be extremely challenging. Yet, as we gain a better perspective from reflecting on truth, it may help us feel better about our difficult circumstances.

In Romans 8, Paul offers comfort and hope for hardships. He begins by assuring believers that personal suffering is not due to God's judgment. It says, there is therefore now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus (8:1, ESV). Instead, believers ought to take comfort; Christ satisfied the just requirements of the Law by taking that condemnation for sin upon himself. God sent *His* own Son in the likeness of sinful flesh and for sin, He condemned sin in the flesh. . . (v.3).

Rest assured that God isn't punishing you for something. Rather, all suffering ultimately results from living in a sin-cursed world. For the creation was subjected to futility, not willingly, but because of him who subjected it . . . (8:20).

This time of the year at the Yellow House, with the days getting shorter and the weather colder, the whole family spent a lot of time inside, in front of the fireplace. A lot of quality time with the family just talking. Some nights neighbors would visit and the talk always turned somhow to ghost stories. After these stories, I dreaded going into the dark bedroom to go to bed. One time someone was telling about an eagle carrying a little baby off. I would go outside and if I saw a crow up in the air, I watched to make sure that he didnt have his beak and eyes pointed my way.

We would play games, some we made up, but always kept ourselves entertained one way or the other. There was always a big roaring fire in the fireplace, and this is where we prepared our school lessons. We only had two coaloil (kerosene) lamps, and Mom used one of these in the kitchen while she was preparing supper. It seems like the fireplace gave out more light than the lamp did. The only two rooms in the house that had any heat was the living room and the kitchen. The kitchen only had heat while Mom were cook-



ing meals. All the doors to the other rooms were kept closed at all times in the winter. There was no way that a fireplace could heat other than the one room. There were mornings in the winter when the dipper would be frozen to the waterbucket and Mom would set I would put some of these in our it on the cook stove to thaw it out.

The bedrooms never had any heat whatsoever, making going to bed and getting up a shaking ordeal. Just about the time we got up in the morning and got warm, it was time to hit the railroad tracks I got home. That something beto go to school. Brief History of Luez Theatre

1948: The Luez Theatre opens in Bolivar. The name of the theatre is for owner Louise Mask, but shortened to "Luez" for both spacing on the sign and budget concerns.

1973: "Walking Tall," the story of Sheriff Buford Pusser, has it's world premier at the Luez Theatre.

2012: The Luez shows its final show in August, closing due to technological changes in the movie industry, requiring digital projection.

2013: The Bolivar Downtown Development Corporation purchases the theatre in August, with plans to renovate in restore the theatre. Two weekends in December feature "White Christmas" and "It's a Wonderful Life" with monies raised going to future renovations.

2014: "Gone with the Wind" is screened at the theatre in December as the capital campaign continues.

2016: A stage is constructed to accommodate musical acts.

 $\boldsymbol{2017:}$ The Bolivar Downtown Development Corporation (DEVCO) voted to spend $\$250,\!000$ to renovate and

update the Luez Theatre in Bolivar. The initial phase was to repair the marquee outside of the theatre. Included in the plans are new seats, curtains for the walls, painting the ceiling, fixing and updating the HVAC equipment, new projection equipment, sound equipment, and a brand-new screen was to be installed. Brad Grantham construction was selected to supervise the work.

2018: DEVCO announces opening night will be December 14, 2018.
