County Votes Mostly Red

The largest margin in Hardeman County recorded history by a Republican Presidential candidate was part of the story on election night.

Incumbent President Donald Trump outdistanced challenger Joe Biden 5,760 to 4,180, breaking the record set in 2016 as Trump beat Hillary Clinton 4,912-4,174. There is no instance in recorded election history in Hardeman County where a Republican won Hardeman County and did not win the presidency. Trump's margin in Hardeman County (57%-41%), while a record, is smaller than his overall margin in Tennessee, which was 60% to 37% statewide.

State Representatives Johnny Shaw (D-80) and Ron Gant (R-94), who represent Hardeman County, both ran unopposed. Shaw received 6,194 votes in Hardeman County, while Gant received 1,042. Shaw was the lone Democrat that outdistanced a Republican opponent in Hardeman County.

"I don't consider myself a democrat or republican but I'm a public servant," said Shaw. "People will call and ask for something and add that

Attorneys Ask for \$1.1 Million

Chancellor Tony Childress of Dyersburg has sixty days to rule on the 15-month long salary dispute case in Hardeman County after both sides agreed to waive closing arguments as the time grew short on October 29 at the Hardeman County Criminal Justice Center.

Brought by Sheriff John Doolen in July of 2019 and defended by Hardeman County Mayor Jimmy Sain, the two sides finished testimony October 27 and spent most of the time on October 29 arguing over the bills submitted by the attorneys in the case.

Doolen's attorney, Roy Herron of the Herron Law Offices in Dresden, submitted a bill for a total of \$962,911.41 which was vigorously opposed by the attorney for Sain, Amber Griffin Shaw of Harris/Shelton of Covington.

Shaw obtained the bill from Herron's suit brought against Decatur County on behalf of the sheriff's department there and pointed out examples of the appearance of double-billing, such as billing more than 24 hours in a single day in more than one instance. Shaw also pointed out Herron asked for compensation for discussions with his wife, an employee at the firm, after hours in their residence.

Both attorneys asked for compensation for speaking to the media. (see *From the Other Side of the Desk* above).

Shaw's total submitted was \$154,247.05, bringing the total bill to \$1,117,158.40, with more charges possible.

The day ended with both attorneys agreeing to waive final arguments in favor of continuing the trial in November or later.

Chancellor Childress promised a ruling within 60 days.

Following the passing of the 2019-2020 budget, Hardeman County

Oompa, Loompa...The Arts Council Has a Production for You


With a stop in rehearsals due to COVID-19 behind them, the Hardeman County Arts Council will present Willy Wonka, Jr., December 3-6.

they voted for me. I tell them, whoa, whoa, I serve you no matter who you voted for. But this county is changing for sure.”

The State Senate District 26 race went to Page Walley of Bolivar, marking the first time since 1960 a Hardeman County resident will be a State Senator, when A.O. Sipes served from 1956-1960.

Walley outdistanced Civil Miller-Watkins 5,881 to 3,557 (62% to 37%) in Hardeman County and 62,653 to 19,883 (76% to 24%) in the eight counties that make up the 26th district.

“What a blessing to be chosen by the wonderful folks of Hardeman County and District 26 to serve as our State Senator,” said Walley. “I will strive daily to seek solutions and opportunities for our citizens and communities. Please call on me on me and pray for God’s Wisdom and Favor over me. Thank you.

The United States Senate race went to Republican Bill Hagerty in both Tennessee and Hardeman County. Hagerty beat Marquita Bradshaw 62% to 35% statewide and by 59% to 38% in Hardeman County.

The United States House of Representatives race in Tennessee’s 7th District went to Republican Mark Green over Kiran Sreepada by a 70% to 27% margin in the state, and by a 59% to 38% margin in Hardeman County.

Elections in Toone, Middleton, and Hornsby are still in the balance as paper ballots, including absentee ballots were waiting to be counted at press time. Hardeman County Administrator of Elections Amber Moore anticipates having final results by Monday, November 9.

At the close of polls on election night, Middleton incumbent Mayor Jackie Cox trailed Robert “Evan” Mott 145-132. The Middleton Aldermen’s race had only four candidates for five spots, sending Randal Bishop, David Bo Callahan, James S. Simpson, Jr., and Kevin Speck to the seats, with write in votes still being tabulated at press time.

In Hornsby, Megan Hedwall had an 82-54 lead on incumbent Mayor Mack Carter, Jr. on election night, but paper and absentee ballots are still to be counted. The aldermen appear set as Raymond Cox, Wayne Isbell, Gregory Vance, Curtis Vandiver, and Melissa Cossar Wilson taking up the five seats.

The closest race of the night and waiting on paper ballots was Toone mayoral race where Jackie Kelly led David Wayne Williamson 51-50 on election night. The race for six aldermen will need an extra spot coming from the write in votes, with only Arthur Chism, Johnnie Chism, Mary Ellison, Keith Foote, and Bedford Forrest West, Jr., on the ballot.

Other races with no opposition including Jim Daniel remaining Mayor of Saulsbury with a full slate of aldermen including Rich Emerson, Carl Hayes, Kenneth Hines, Johnny Smith, and Jan Ward filling the five slots.

In Grand Junction, three aldermen spots were up for grabs and will be occupied by the three candidates, Carl Franklin Bell, Courtney Breeden, and Vince McCalip.

Silerton saw Mayor Willard Beshires run unopposed, but a write in candidate will be needed to fill out the five aldermen as only Frankie Lambert, Gail Mayfield, John Naylor, and Rickey Leon Wilson were the only candidates on the ballot.

The election is scheduled for certification on November 17.

Sheriff John Doolen sued for more support, approximately \$1.4 million, in July of 2019.

The issue was seemingly settled in October 2019 after then Hardeman County Attorney Chip Cary and Attorney Roy Herron came to an agreement. Cary presented it to the county commission in a special called meeting as the sheriff’s department, who originally sought and sued for approximately \$1.4 million dollars, settled for \$102,000.

At the October 8, 2019 meeting, the vote went 13-1 in favor of ending the lawsuit with the settlement. While both sides claimed lack of adherence to the settlement terms, Attorney Amber Griffin Shaw filed a Motion to Set Aside the Consent Order on behalf of Sain on February 10, citing numerous problems with the consent order. Herron eventually gave up on the settlement, setting up the September and October 2020 trial dates.

Attorney Roy Herron, representing Hardeman County Sheriff John Doolen, had called Hardeman County Sheriff’s Department Administrative Captain Brian Vandiver, Chief Deputy Greg Moore, expert witness Steve Overton, and Doolen prior to resting his case on October 6.

Shaw called Hardeman County Mayor Jimmy Sain, McNairy County Sheriff Guy Buck, and Hardeman County Human Resources Director Linda Ervin on October 27.

These Things, Part 3 by Jeff Capshaw

The previous two weeks' columns centered upon Paul's letters to Timothy and Titus. The churches in Ephesus (Timothy) and Crete (Titus) were under siege by false teachers. It was probably Judaizers who were making trouble. They taught, for example, "Jewish myths" and "endless genealogies." Their speech actions were bad.

But they also were bad actors. Paul said, "they had swerved from the truth," and they "were in the snare of the devil." Moreover, "they desired to be rich, and were lovers of money." Paul confronted the problems head-on because he wanted to get confused and disoriented families (which the false teachers had caused) recentered and refocused on God and the Gospel.

To accomplish this, Paul instructs the young pastors to teach the various sociological groups specific things. He admonishes the regular members to think and to act in ways to get back on mission. He urged men to pray and the older men to be "sober-minded, dignified, self-controlled, sound in faith, in love, and steadfastness." He also urged "the younger men to be self-controlled" (Titus 2:6).

The next sociological group to consider is women. There isn't space to get into the various interpretations and views on his instructions for women. The point here is to deduce high-level principles without getting into the details. He writes, "likewise also that women should adorn themselves in respectable apparel, with modesty and self-control, not with braided hair and gold or pearls or costly attire, but with what is proper for women who profess godliness—with good works" (1 Timothy 2:9).

Paul isn't so much telling women how to dress or to fix their hair as he is urging them to be different from those in Ephesus who were probably ostentatious, worldly, and ungodly. The key ideas for women are modesty, self-control, propriety, godliness, and good works. In other words, women should not be known for their external appearance. Instead, they should be known for their internal character.

The next passage for women is specifically addressed to older women. He writes, "older women likewise are to be reverent in behavior, not slanderers or slaves to much wine. They are to teach what is good. . . ." (Titus 2:3). Although

it isn't clear from the text, perhaps some women in the church had gotten loose in behavior and speech. It appears they were overly imbibing in the fruit of the vine as well. Slander and drunkenness were becoming of Cretian pagans, not women who professed to follow Christ.

Readers of these letters can begin to see something like a character-building program laid out. Paul is trying to bring foundational stability to the core sociological groups in these churches, where distraction and disorientation had set in as a result of these nasty opponents of Paul.

Older and younger men must bear their responsibilities in the church during troubled times. In the same way, women also must understand their roles and responsibilities and exercise them with grace and discipline. These were more things these young pastors were to teach.

I was listening to two teachers recently who both concurrently agreed that they were mentally fatigued from all the extra work laid upon them. It occurred to me many more people are probably feeling fatigue in multiple different areas of their life these days. The slang that is frequently used is 'burnout.' This is has been defined by some as physical, intellectual, emotional, and spiritual exhaustion. While I do not agree that burnout fits that definition, the definition does accurately describe the state of many people this year. Many are struggling to endure many obstacles, many man made and for some at least, the struggle is in the middle of their journey with much yet to experience.

It has been discovered that this has developed especially in the helping professions, though not exclusively so. No matter our circumstances or struggles, there is one who has experienced and thus understands our grief and tribulation. Perhaps we may learn from and then apply something of this example to our own circumstances. Jesus was troubled and described his soul as grieved and deeply troubled. He purposely went to a quiet place to pray. He took Peter, James, and John and went to an olive grove at the base of Mt. of Olives. It is noteworthy that he took a few very close friends with him for moral support (I presume). We all need a support system during times of difficulty and grief. Further, he describes his grief as being at the point of death. 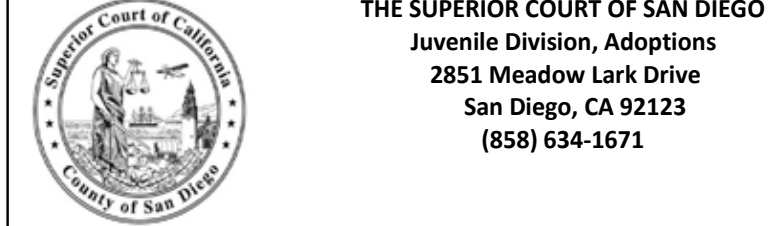

Veterans Day Facts

Veterans Day originated as "Armistice Day" on Nov. 11, 1919, the first anniversary of the end of World War I. Congress passed a resolution in 1926 for an annual observance, and Nov. 11 became a national holiday beginning in 1938. Unlike Memorial Day, Veterans Day pays tribute to all American veterans—living or dead—but especially gives thanks to living veterans who served their country honorably during war or peacetime.

Veterans Day occurs on November 11 every year in the United States in honor of the "eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month" of 1918 that signaled the end of World War I, known as Armistice Day.

In 1954, President Dwight D. Eisenhower officially changed the name of the holiday from Armistice Day to Veterans Day.

In 1968, the Uniform Holidays Bill was passed by Congress, which moved the celebration of Veterans Day to the fourth Monday in October. The law went into effect in 1971, but in 1975 President Gerald Ford returned Veterans Day to November 11, due to the important historical significance of the date.

Veterans Day commemorates veterans of all wars.

Great Britain, France, Australia and Canada also commemorate the veterans of World War I and World War II on or near November 11th: Canada has Remembrance Day, while Britain has Remembrance Sunday (the second Sunday of November).

In Europe, Great Britain and the Commonwealth countries it is common to observe two minutes of silence at 11 a.m. every November 11.

Every Veterans Day and Memorial Day, Arlington National Cemetery holds an annual memorial service. The cemetery is home to the graves of over 400,000 people, most of whom served in the military.

The median annual cost for a private room in a nursing home is over \$102,000, according to Genworth, an insurance company. Other long-term care services, such as those provided by a home health care aide, also don't come cheaply.

Furthermore, you can't count on Medicare paying all these costs – in fact, it would probably only cover a small portion of a nursing home stay and provide limited assistance for home health care. So, if you were financially unprepared for the expense of long-term care, the burden might fall on your loved ones. This could be a big financial challenge, in two ways.

First, if a family member had to become your caregiver, this individual might have to abandon a career, or at least substantially reduce their working hours. Not only would this result in a loss of income, but it could also lower the amounts that could be contributed to a 401(k) or similar employer-sponsored retirement plan.

Second, if your family members couldn't leave their jobs or cut back on their hours, or they were simply unable to provide the type of long-term care you need, they might be forced to pay for a nursing home stay or home health care worker out of pocket.

To avoid these outcomes, you have a couple of options: Self-insure – You could conceivably “self-insure” against the costs of long-term care by devoting a portion of your investment portfolio specifically to this purpose. However, if at some point you require admission to a nursing home, it may require a significant commitment of your resources.

Purchase protection – Over the past decade or so, there's been an increase in the types of long-term care protection vehicles available. These instruments vary widely in cost and in what they cover, but by choosing a protection option, you may greatly lower the financial risk you might face. By consulting with a financial professional, you should be able to find an arrangement that's appropriate for your situation.

Preserving your financial independence and helping protect that of your family should be a key financial goal. And you can make progress toward accomplishing this by recognizing the potential cost of long-term care and taking steps to deal with it.

State of TN Prepares COVID Vaccination Plan



The Tennessee Department of Health today announced the state's infrastructure plan for distribution of COVID-19 vaccines once they become available. TDH in coordination with other state and local agencies submitted an initial draft of the COVID-19 Vaccination Plan for Tennessee to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention on October 16, 2020.

"We assure Tennesseans that safe, effective and approved COVID-19 vaccines will be released in Tennessee when they are available to reduce the spread of the virus," said Tennessee Health Commissioner Lisa Piercey, MD, MBA, FAAP. "Our vaccine distribution plan will be modified as more is understood about the virus and the availability of approved vaccines currently in development."

TDH has developed a preliminary structure for the allocation and distribution of COVID-19 vaccines: Five percent of Tennessee's allocation of COVID-19 vaccines will be distributed equitably among all 95 counties

Ten percent of Tennessee's allocation of COVID-19 vaccines will be reserved by the state for use in targeted areas with high vulnerability to illness and death from the virus

85 percent of Tennessee's allocation of COVID-19 vaccines will be distributed among all 95 counties based on their populations

TDH modeled this approach to allocation and distribution of COVID-19 vaccines after review of the CDC's COVID-19 Vaccination Program Interim Playbook for Jurisdictional Operations and the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering and Medicine's Framework for Equitable Allocation of COVID-19 Vaccine, and in consultation with Tennessee's Unified Command Group and a stakeholder group of more than 28 partner agencies and offices.

TDH will ensure implementation of the COVID-19 Vaccination Program through tracking of provider enrollment, mapping of locations of vaccination services, monitoring performance of the Tennessee Immunization Information System and tracking of vaccine ordering and distribution.

TDH is working to rapidly recruit and onboard hospitals, pharmacies, clinics and other partners capable of storing vaccines and administering it to priority populations. These partners are required to sign the CDC's COVID-19 Vaccine Provider Agreement and Profile, demonstrate ability to store vaccine under the required conditions and establish a process for reporting all administered doses of vaccine to the Tennessee Immunization Information System within 24 hours of administration. TDH will ensure distribution of vaccination sites across all 95 counties, especially in rural counties and areas with high concentrations of people in vulnerable populations.
