OUR Kids are Smarter than THEIRS

It may not rise to the level of "veni, vidi, vici," but Hardeman County students did conquer the ACT (American College Test) at the highest level in years.

The 19.2 average among all public school students is not the highest in the state, but it is better than four of the five counties that surround Hardeman County.

"We are excited and proud to see the ongoing improvement in our students' ACT scores," said Superintendent of Schools Warner Ross. "It's rewarding to see that our students are not only competing academically with peers, but outperforming others in surrounding districts."

Of the 130 school districts listed in the re-

port released by the State of Tennessee, Hardeman County's graduating class of 2018 was 91st, but better than McNairy County (93rd), Madison County (116th), Haywood County (118th), and Fayette County (126th).

The only surrounding school district that scored higher than Hardeman was Chester County (51st) at 20.2.

Ross was quick to give credit where credit is due.

"The effort that our staff, students and parents have done in this area is to be congratulated. The work is a result of a deliberate plan and effort and by the entire team. This opens additional doors of opportunity for our stu-

dents to take full advantage of the Tennessee Promise and other scholarship monies available to students."

The report used students' best ACT scores—meaning that if a student took the ACT multiple times, the score included in the results is his or her highest score. This data is different than the results reported nationally by ACT, which are based on the last score a student received, regardless of whether it was the highest, and also includes private school results.

Germentown Municipal School District had the highest district ACT composite in the state for the third year in a row, posting a 25.9 average.

Mayor Says Royal Oak is "On Hold"

The reports on Royal Oak Charcoal not coming to Hardeman County are wrong, says Hardeman County Mayor Jimmy Sain.

"The acting CEO has put a hold on the West Tennessee project," said Sain. "Royal Oak will honor the contracts in hand with our sawmills to purchase materials and haul them to the Missouri plant for now. We welcome Royal Oak whenever the project moves forward."

Sain's statement contradicts a story in the November 2 *Jackson Sun* with a headline that read "Royal Oak Charcoal Withdraws from Hardeman County." Sain says it is not that simple, as the CEO's leave of absence is a factor in the timing of the project that promises anywhere from a dozen to fifty jobs in Hardeman County.

"I am proud that Royal Oak chose Hardeman County for their West Tennessee natural hardwood lump charcoal plant. The county has prepared the way by rezoning the property they chose and partnered with the State to assist the project. Our thoughts and prayers are with Royal Oak CEO Randy Beech as he has taken a personal leave of absence for family sickness," added Sain.

In October, the Hardeman County Commission voted 10-6 to re-zone a 317-acre plot in Northwestern Hardeman County that was to be the site of Royal Oak Charcoal's lump coal facility, an estimated \$15 million expenditure.

An Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation informational meeting scheduled for November 1 at the Whiteville Community Center was cancelled in light of the slow down on the project.

Hardeman County Votes RED Again

The "Blue Wave" that used to dominate Hardeman County politics didn't roll in for the 2018 elections.

County voters were in step with statewide results on November 6, agreeing on Governor, Senate, and House of Representatives races on the national level, although at lesser margins than the rest of the state.

For Governor, Hardeman County went for Republican Bill Lee at a 54% clip, compared to his 58% margin statewide.

Senator-elect Marsha Blackburn got 54% statewide and 51% in Hardeman County, while Dr. Mark Green won with 66% of the vote, while winning 53% of the votes in Hardeman County.

The lone stalwart for the Democrats, Johnny Shaw, ran unopposed for the state's 80th district, while Republican Ron Gant had little trou-

Tomato Bisque

Ingredients

- 1/2 tablespoon olive oil
- 1/2 medium onion chopped
- 1 medium carrots chopped
- 1 celery rib chopped
- 3 garlic cloves finely chopped
- 1/2 tsp red pepper flakes
- basil to taste
- salt and pepper to taste
- 2 bay leaves
- 3 tablespoons whole wheat flour
- 3 1/2 cups low sodium chicken stock (or vegetable stock for vegetarian version)
- 28 oz fire roasted tomatoes can, diced, drained (or you can use 8 fresh tomatoes, diced)
- 1/4 cup tomato paste
- 1/2 tbs sugar
- 1/2 cup half & half
- 2 tablespoons unsalted butter
- hot sauce to taste (optional)
- croutons (optional)
- sour cream (optional)
- parsley (optional)

Instructions

Put olive oil in a large stockpot over medium heat. Once hot, add onion, carrot, celery & garlic. Stir to coat with oil, then add salt, pepper, and pepper flakes (a pinch of each). Stir frequently until the veggies are lightly browned. Sprinkle the wheat flour over the veggies and stir to evenly coat. Pour in chicken stock and re-season with a pinch of salt, pepper, and pepper flakes. Add tomatoes, paste, leaves and sugar. Stir. Bring to a boil, then reduce to simmer and cover. Simmer for 15 minutes, then remove from burner and retrieve the bay leaves. Pour the mixture to a blender till 3/4 of the way full, and puree. Temporarily, pour puree into a bowl, while repeating the pureeing with remaining soup. Return all the soup to the pan and stir in the half & half. Turn burner on to medium, and cook for 5 minutes, stirring regularly. Give the tomato bisque a final seasoning, with salt & pepper and adding in the basil (to taste). Finally, stir in butter (and hot sauce, if you like) to taste. To Serve: Garnish with a dollop of sour cream, croutons, and fresh chopped parsley.

Is Your "Digital Estate" in Order?

If you spend a lot of time on the internet, you're not just shopping or being entertained, or following the news or participating in an online community. You're probably also dealing with accounts and information that eventually can become part of your digital "estate." And if this estate isn't properly looked after, it can lead to confusion and conflict among your survivors, as well as an opportunity for hackers to try to get at whatever resources they can touch.

If you haven't stopped to think about it, you might be surprised at the number of assets that could become part of your digital estate. Name a digital executor in your last will and testament. A digital executor can accomplish a variety of tasks related to your digital estate, such as transferring online assets to your heirs; closing accounts you don't want transferred; managing personal materials by archiving or deleting files, photographs, videos and other content you have created; and, finally, informing online communities of your passing. When choosing a digital executor, you'll want someone you can trust, of course, but you'll also want to make sure that person is skilled enough in technology to search your computer properly and navigate the internet and multiple websites. Not all states recognize a digital executor, so you may want to consult with a legal professional to learn about the laws governing digital estate planning in your state. Also, even if you have a digital executor, online platforms enforce their own rules about who can or can't access a deceased person's accounts. If you are concerned about this, you may want to contact the customer service areas from these types of providers - Google, PayPal, Facebook, etc. - to learn their policies.

Review your plans. Review your digital estate plans on a regular basis, just as you do with your physical/tangible estate plans. The digital world is a fast-moving one, so you'll need to stay current with changes.

In some ways, managing a digital estate can be more challenging than dealing with a physical estate. But by following the above suggestions, you can help reduce any "cyber-angst" your loved ones may feel when it's time to deal with the digital presence you've left behind.

Sunrise: The Anchor by David Coy

In the last article I mentioned in discussing that sorrow, traumatic loss comes to everyone. It is a common denominator that connects us all, no matter our cultural background, our financial degree, our gender, our spiritual traditions, or educational development. I also mentioned that some people in their journey with grief lose sight of all hope in their struggle with loss. At some point they do not see of any way forward. Basically, there is two places that we can place our hope. If they were to ever compare themselves with some standard outside of themselves they would collapse. Too often people place their hope in a human engineered source and when that source no longer exists, they that place 'their eggs' in that basket are left with no foundation to stand

upon. There is a way forward, there is an anchor that will never decay or die. It is not ourselves, it is not science, it is not our family, it is not our education or our material wealth. All these perish and are temporary. If you want to learn how to endure hardship, even when it comes in with magnitude and in multitude. You must believe there is always hope while we are alive, "But whoever is among the living has hope; live dog is better than a dead lion" (Ecclesiastes 9:4). But our hope has to be directed in the one who can never disappoint. People will fail, money, education, sci-

Amos: A Prophet for Us - Part 9 by Jeff Capshaw

According to Amos, Israel faced coming judgment, because they treated others with injustice. Understandably, some Christians have also neglected concrete remedies for social maladies. At least two reasons come to mind, but neither seems excusable.

First is the Social Gospel. According to Wikipedia, "the Social Gospel was a movement . . . that applied Christian ethics to social problems, especially issues of social justice such as economic inequality, poverty, alcoholism, crime, racial tensions, slums, unclean environment . . ."

Advocates were theological liberals like Walter Rauschenbusch in the US and Albert Schweitzer in Europe. Both led efforts to meet needs of the less fortunate in various parts of the world. Yet those good works were not energized by a biblical view of human sinfulness and humanity's need for redemption by the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

As theological liberals, they stripped the Gospel of its supernaturalism and reduced Christianity to moral ethics alone. They particularly emphasized the ethical teachings of Jesus' Sermon on the Mount. According to them, Jesus' death was just a moral example of self-sacrifice to follow, and his resurrection was a myth of hope crafted by the Early Church.

In a knee-jerk reaction to this movement, conservative Christians began ignoring social issues to distance themselves from theological liberalism and its proponents. The baby was thrown out with the bathwater.

Secondly, some Christians have imbibed American independence and unsound clichés like "God helps those who help themselves," or "pull yourself up by your own bootstraps." Yet, many personally need to experience the grace of God and His love. They need a redemptive lift out of their circumstances. They need to feel the Church truly cares for them.

Here Amos again.

Hear this, you who trample on the needy and bring the poor of the land to an end, saying, "When will the new moon be over, that we may sell grain? And the Sabbath, that we may offer wheat for sale that we may make the ephah small and the shekel great and deal deceitfully with false balances that we may buy the poor for silver and the needy for a pair of sandals and sell the chaff of the wheat" (8:4-6).

Israel could hardly wait for their hypocritical religious duties to end, so they could get on with their real passion: personal gain by unethical means. While our excuses may not be that cold-hearted, yet selfish priorities, the false teaching of others or Americanism are poor excuses for Christians to neglect the social needs of their communities.

In Hickory Valley, Mayor Ricky Ayers ran unopposed as did his five aldermen (John Rex Gates, Robert L. Hensley, Duane L. Lax, Jane M. Powell, and Noel A. Toney) who will guide the town for the next four years.

Grand Junction had a bit more excitement as a contested mayors race was won by incumbent Curtis Lane who beat Wolfgang Shirley by a 111-4 margin and the voters in the city chose those six aldermen among nine candidates. See below.

In 2016, Hardeman County voters preferred a republican for president for the first time in at least 60 years.

The results, still unofficial, are expected to be certified November 15.

Not Your Great Granddaddy's Veterans Day by Bill Stone

A hundred years and many changes later, it's Veterans Day....

A "Trivial Pursuit question for you: What happened on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month in the year 1918? The answer: An armistice was declared between the Allied Nations and Germany. World War I, known as "The Great War," effectively ended on that date. The war didn't officially end until the signing of the Treaty of Versailles on June 28, 1919 but in the minds of the American public it was over on the date of the armistice. President Woodrow Wilson declared November 11, 1919 as the first commemoration of Armistice Day.

Just a simple Presidential declaration. Well, actually not. As it turns out, this was just the beginning of a long, somewhat convoluted, journey through time for this important date. On June 4, 1926, Congress finally passed a resolution stating November 11 should become a recurring anniversary and the President should issue an annual proclamation calling for the observance of "Armistice Day". By this time 27 state legislatures had already made it a legal holiday. Now it's settled.

Wait just a minute. That's not the end. On May 13, 1938, almost 20 years after the war ended, Congress finally approved an act making November 11 a legal federal holiday. The act was "dedicated to the cause of world peace and this date would hereinafter be celebrated and known as Armistice Day". In actuality, there are no "national holidays". States retain the right to designate their own and the federal government can only designate holidays for federal employees and the District of Columbia. In practice, however, states usually, not always but usually, follow the federal government's lead.

Over and done? Not yet. Things Armistice did run smoothly until 1954 when the 83rd Congress bowed to the lobbying efforts of several veteran's organizations and amended their 1938 act changing the word "Armistice" to "Veterans". President Eisenhower signed the legislation on June 1, 1954. From then on, November 11 became a day to honor American Veterans of all wars.

Now we're all set, right? No, we aren't. In 1968, Congress passed the Uniform Holidays Bill. This was designed to ensure federal employees three day weekends on all federal holidays. Washington's Birthday, Memorial Day, Veterans Day, and Columbus Day were included in the bill. Veterans day was scheduled for the fourth Monday in October. The first observance was October 25, 1971. Confusion reigned! Most states didn't approve of this change and continued celebrating Veteran's Day on November 11. Holiday chaos!

Finally common sense appeared on the scene. In 1975, when it became evident the original date carried historical and patriotic significance to most Americans, President Gerald Ford signed a new law returning the observation of Veterans Day to November 11. This took effect in 1978 and has remained unchanged since.

While this historical information may be interesting, the main message here is we have many veterans in Hardeman County. When you see one, thank them! Let them know how much their service to and sacrifice for our country means to you!

Thank you for protecting our freedom at home and overseas. Your service will always be remembered.

Salutes Veterans Day

Grand Junction Veterans Honored at Smithsonian

Three men from Grand Junction have their names on display at the Smithsonian National Air and Space Museum's Wall of Honor.

James M. "Buddy" Taylor (top photo), born in Grand Junction, served as an US Air Corp pilot in WWII. On November 11, 1944, after his engine failed on a strafing run over enemy territory close to Hengyang China, Taylor had to bail out of his P-51 Mustang at a mere 400 feet. He was taken as a prisoner of war and did not return to American hands until September 11, 1945. Taylor is now 95.



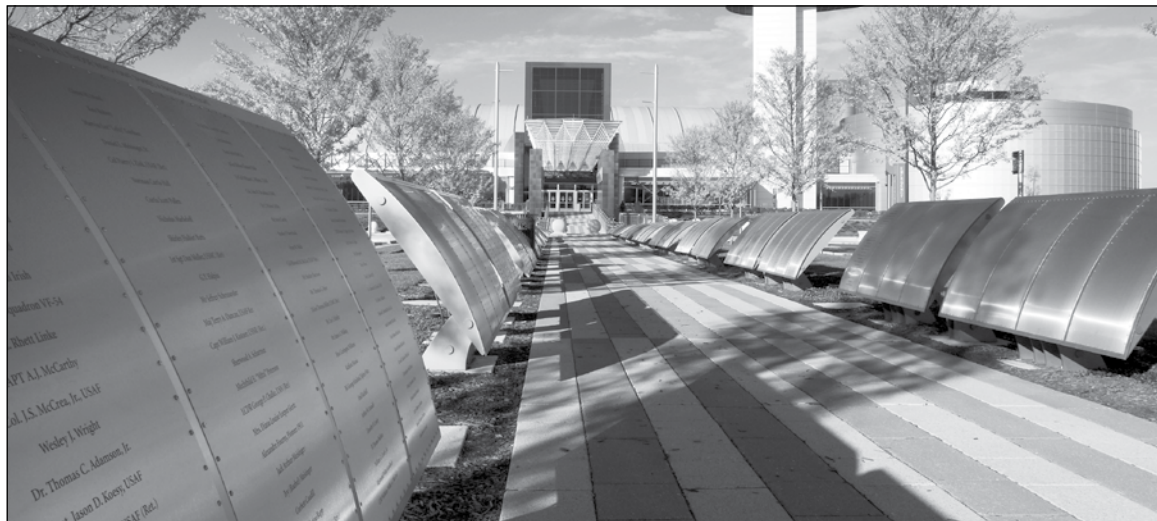
Richard E. Hughes (bottom photo), also from Grand Junction, went UT Knoxville after graduating from Grand Junction in the early 1950s and went into the US Air Force. Somewhere close Cambodia during his tour, someone was needed to volunteer to pilot a tanker into North Vietnam to refuel two American planes that did not have enough fuel to make it back out. His bravery and success on the mission earned him the Distinguished Flying Cross. Hughes, now 85, remained in the Air Force following the end of the war and is a retired Lt. Colonel and lives in Groveport, Ohio.



Nathan "Thad" Richardson (not pictured), also from Grand Junction served in the US Airforce and was also awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross for his bravery and honor in the air.

The Smithsonian National Air and Space Museum's Wall of Honor (pictured below) is a permanent memorial at the Steven F. Udvar-Hazy Center in Chantilly, VA, with many icons of flight including Wright brothers, Amelia Earhart, Neil Armstrong, John Glenn, and Jim Lovell.

The Future of Hardeman Adoptable Animals

Hardeman Adoptable Animals, Inc. is a non-profit organization that rescues unwanted dogs of Hardeman County. HAA is run by volunteers and operates solely on donations and fund-raising. Since its beginning in 2011, HAA has rescued almost 4,000 dogs! HAA takes in strays and surrendered dogs and finds them new homes. HAA currently resides in a small shelter inside the Hardeman County Landfill. The building our shelter is in is a converted tire shed that has outlived its ability to humanely living creatures. The building is made of wood and has a drainage system that cannot handle the building's current use. These issues put the dogs at risk of getting sick and having sores on their paws from being in wet kennels. In 2016, HAA began raising money for a new shelter. Since then, we have held many fundraisers, and you have surely seen our pleas for funds. Many may be wondering where we are in the process of building our new shelter.



HAA has taken many steps towards our dream of moving out of the landfill and into our new shelter. We have completed Phase One of a five phase plan, which includes making a substantial down payment on a new metal building. We have signed a long-term lease with Hardeman County to use the site of the old flight school outside of Bolivar. The County and HAA volunteers (and friends of HAA) have spent time gutting the existing building to make it useable for the shelter's needs. Siding has been replaced; holes have been patched; insulation has been pulled out; and the bathrooms have been gutted. HAA is grateful to Hardeman County Mayor Jimmy Sain and the County Commissioners for providing some of the funds to renovate that building. The building still needs a lot of work. We will need volunteers with construction, landscaping/fencing, plumbing, HVAC, and electrical skills to help us complete this portion of our work. HAA would like to say a special thank you to Mr. Kenneth Hadley for recently bush-hogging the land. Mr. Ken has been a long-time supporter of HAA, and we are truly thankful for him and his support.

The existing building will house the medical room, meet and greet space, offices for HAA and Animal Control, and a grooming area. HAA is purchasing a metal building to sit behind the existing building that will house the dogs. As mentioned above, the down payment for this building has been made. This building will house all dog kennels, some of which will be connected to individual outside runs. This will help keep kennels cleaner, as many dogs will learn to go outside to do their "business" instead of messing up their kennels. This will make the environment much cleaner and healthier for the dogs as well as make the daily chores of the volunteers much easier.

"We've never had a cleaner parking lot since William has been working here," remarked one of the fellow staff at Old Hatchie Veterinary Clinic in Bolivar. "We all know when William is working because there is nothing out of place."

Dr. Frank Wilhite who owns the practice with his brother, Dr. Jerry Wilhite, explains, "We had employed persons with developmental differences before. It means as much to us to give them an opportunity as it does to them. William is a true asset and we're glad he's here." William seemingly has found his niche and is thoroughly enjoying the benefits that go along with being appreciated and fulfilled in his full time work.


