The Never Ending Story

Salary Suit Trial Set to Begin Again October 5 With much of the preliminary

proceedings gotten out of the way during the September 3-4 trial dates, it is hoped the 14-month standoff between the Hardeman County Sheriff and the Hardeman County Mayor can be decided.

The September portion was interrupted by the morning of the second day spent in negotiations to settle the suit, but ended with no agreement and a resumption of the trial.

No negotiations since have taken place.

Still waiting to perhaps testify and not yet excused from the trial were eight persons held by the plaintiff, including budget committee members Junior Jimmerson and chairman Jerry Watkins, commissioners Jackie Sain and Johnny Lanier, who are also on the budget

What Was Wrong with the \$102,000? For the plaintiff, it was about overtime and attorney's fees.

In addition to the \$102,000 agreed to by the commission in October of 2019, the commission also agreed to:

Overtime pay shall be paid by the county promptly upon submission of those hours and the county agrees to pay all such overtime. If the total of overtime exceeds any amounts set forth in the budget and a budget line item is exceeded, the sheriff shall request a budget amendment which the county then shall approve. And they also agreed to:

The county is responsible for and shall pay all court costs and litigation costs in this matter within thirty (30) days of entry of this order.

Citing the issue of paying unlimited overtime and being subject to whatever the attorneys in the case requested, Shaw filed the suit to stop the settlement as it was written. Herron's request for \$175,000 in legal fees was stopped by the same action.

committee; commissioners Justin Howell and Mark Gilliam, and mayor's office employees Carly Weems and Linda Ervin. Their status in the continuing of the trial is uncertain.

The issue began in July of 2019, when following the passing of the 2019-2020 budget, Hardeman County Sheriff John Doolen sued for more support.

The issue was seemingly settled

in October 2019 after then Hardeman County Attorney Chip Cary and Attorney Roy Herron came to an agreement. Cary presented it to the county commission in a special called meeting as the sheriff's department, who originally sought and sued for approximately \$1.4 million dollars, settled for \$102,000.

At the October 8, 2019 meeting, the vote went 13-1 in favor of ending the lawsuit with the settlement. While both sides claimed lack of adherence to the settlement terms, Attorney Amber Griffin Shaw filed a Motion to Set Aside the Consent Order on behalf of Sain on February 10, citing numerous problems with the consent order. Herron eventually gave up on the settlement, setting up the September 2020 trial date.

Lee Ends October in September

As a National State of Emergency remains in place, Tennessee Governor Bill Lee announced on September 29, the State of Emergency in Tennessee will continue through October with adjustments made to previous executive orders.



"Tennessee's response continues to be one of the most targeted in the country and a continued State of Emergency ensures we have access to additional federal funds, ensure our health care capacity is stable and loosen restrictions that would otherwise hinder our response time," said Governor Lee. "COVID-19 is still a serious problem and I encourage every Tennessean to continue social distancing and doing their part to make wise choices and help mitigate the spread of the virus."

Governor Lee today signed Executive Order No. 63 to extend certain, targeted provisions of previous executive orders through October 30, including the authority of local governments to institute mask require ments. Remaining restrictions on businesses and gathering sizes in the 89 counties with a state-run health department have been removed.

Governor Lee also signed Executive Order No. 64, which extends through October 30 provisions that allow for remote notarization and witnessing of documents. Executive Order No. 60, which extends through October 28 provisions that allow for electronic government meetings subject to transparency safeguards, including the requirement of live broadcasts of electronic meetings to the public beginning Octocontinued on A7

Voters can also download a paper voter registration application at GoVoteTN.com. Completed paper voter registration applications must be submitted or postmarked to the election commission office by October 5. Election Day registration is not available.


Early voting for the November 3 election starts Wednesday, October 14, and runs Monday to Saturday until Thursday, October 29.



Broccoli Tots

Ingredients

1 bunch of broccoli, cut into equal sized florets (around 3-4 cups)

1 cup sharp cheddar cheese, shredded (I used Cabot Vermont Sharp White Cheddar)

1/3 cup onion, finely chopped

1/2 cup breadcrumbs

2 eggs salt and pepper

Directions

1. Preheat your oven to 400 degrees F.

2. Pour 1 inch of water into a saucepan; bring to a boil. Place the broccoli into the boiling water, cover, and reduce the heat to medium. Cook the broccoli for 5-6 minutes, or until it can easily be pierced by a fork. Drain the broccoli and set aside to cool slightly.

3. Lay the broccoli out onto paper towels and cover with more paper towels, Press down firmly on the broccoli to absorb as much moisture as you can. Another method is to put the broccoli in the center of a dish towel and ring out the water as seen here. Finely chop the broccoli.

4. In a large bowl, combine all of the ingredients and season with salt and pepper. Stir everything together until well mixed. Fill each muffin cup in a mini muffin tin to the top, pushing down on the filling with your spoon so it's nice and compacted.

5. Bake for 18-20 minutes in preheated oven. The top will be starting to golden. To easily remove from the pan (without scratching it to death), run a plastic knife around the edges of each tot and they should come out easier.

NOTES

If they seem to be falling apart when you take them out of the pan you can (1) put them back into the oven to cook for a few minutes longer so they are a bit crisper or (2) let them sit in the pan for a few minutes to let the insides firm up a bit before removing them from the pan. You have to be ginger with them if they're sticking a little to the pan!

The sharp cheddar can be substituted with whatever cheese you have on hand.

The Call of Wisdom, Part 1

This week's lesson is from a classic passage in the Old Testament: Proverbs 8. In this Proverb, wisdom is personified as a woman crying out to be heard universally by all.

It says, "does not wisdom call? Does not understanding raise her voice? On the heights beside the way, at the crossroads she takes her stand; beside the gates in front of the town, at the entrance of the portals she cries aloud: . . . " (8:1-3). Furthermore, the call is "to you, O men, I call, and my cry is to the children of man" (8:4). The point here is for all humans to hear the call.

The balance of the passage entails the contents of wisdom's words. First is the character of the message. It is characterized by being "noble," "what is right," of being "true" and "righteous." The writer goes on to characterize Lady Wisdom's words in an antithetical statement: "there is nothing twisted or crooked in them" (8:8). Instead, "they are all straight to him who understands, and right to those who find knowledge" (8:9).

Verses 10 and 11 are a value

statement. Indeed, the writer presents wisdom as of greater value than material wealth. He writes, "take my instruction instead of silver, and knowledge rather than choice gold, or wisdom is better than jewels, and all that you may desire cannot compare with her."

In verses 12-13 is found a classical example of poetic parallelism, a tool the writers of all the Old Testament Wisdom employ and which has been explained in prior articles. In these verses, "synonymous parallelism" is utilized to paint a multi-faceted picture of Old Testament Wisdom.

Although the words and phrases and the concepts themselves are different in look, sound and form, yet they all orbit in the same neighborhood of meaning. That's the point of this literary device. Here is what it says. "I, wisdom, dwell with prudence, and I find knowledge and discretion. The fear of the Lord is hatred of evil. Pride and arrogance and the way of evil and perverted speech I hate" (8:12-13).

Here is one way to think about these two verses. First, wisdom

and prudence are closely related. The wise person will, doubtless, have the ability to govern and discipline oneself by the use of reason. Likewise, a wise person will be both knowledgeable and have the skill to exercise sound judgment.

Next, there is a striking statement about fearing the Lord. It is the "hatred of evil." That too is wisdom. Proverbs 9:10 says, "the fear of the Lord is the beginning of Wisdom." So, to be wise is to fear the Lord. That is what wisdom looks like.

Finally, the writer tells us what wisdom doesn't look like. It doesn't look like pride, arrogance, evil or perverted speech. The conclusion can be summed up with another Proverb. "The beginning of wisdom is this: Get wisdom, and whatever you get, get insight" (4:7).

Blood Donor Regulations Loosened

Due to recent FDA (Food and Drug Administration's) revisions of policies concerning the eligibility of blood donors, LIFELINE Blood Services announced that some members of our community, who were deferred from giving blood in the past, may now be able to donate blood again thanks to advancements in testing technology and further scientific study.

For example, there is not a deferral for those who spent any time on a military base in the United Kingdom or Europe. In addition, there is no longer a deferral for time spent in Europe (except for those who have spent five years or more in France and Ireland between 1980 and 2001). The following blood donor deferral times have been shortened to three months: travel to Malaria risk areas, receipt of a blood transfusion, accidental blood exposure, participation in high risk behaviors.

The FDA's recent actions will allow many individuals to be able to donate blood again, and this is great news for patients who need blood and those who have been unable to participate in this life-giving service.

Hunters for the Hungry Accepting Donations

Tennessee Wildlife Federation's Hunters for the Hungry program is now accepting deer donations for the 2020 deer season. More than 60 deer processors across the state are accepting donations of deer to feed Tennessee families in need.

To see processors currently participating, visit tnwf.org/processors.

"Because of COVID-19, more Tennesseans than ever are having to rely on hunger relief organizations to help feed their families," said Matt Simcox, Hunters for the Hungry manager. "That's why we want to encourage even more hunters to donate their harvest this season. Each time they donate a deer, they're providing 168 meals to our neighbors who need it most."

When hunters harvest a deer, they may donate it at a participating processor. The venison is processed and then provided to community food banks or soup kitchens.

Since the program began, Hunters for the Hungry has provided more than 7.6 million meals to hungry Tennesseans.

Right now, hunters can drop off a whole deer donation at no cost to them. Each year, Hunters for the Hungry covers tens of thousands of dollars in processing fees for donations. If deer donations surpass available funding for this season, hunters can pay a reduced, \$50 processing fee or redeem a Deer Coin.

In partnership with the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency (TWRA), Hunters for the Hungry will test every deer donated within Unit CWD (Chronic Wasting Disease) for the disease. Hunters for the Hungry will also test many of the donations made outside Unit CWD in Region 1.

Only whole deer donations will be accepted in Region 1 and the counties that border it. Pound or Pack donations, which allow hunters to give a portion of their harvest, will continue to be accepted in the rest of

In an abundance of caution, Hunters for the Hungry will discard all donations that test positive for CWD. There is no evidence CWD is transmitted to humans but the CDC still recommends against eating CWD-

ber 1, remains in effect.

Executive Order No. 63 includes provisions that:

Provide that persons with COVID-19 or COVID-19 symptoms are required to stay at home, and that employers may not require or allow employees with COVID-19 to work;

Urge persons to wear a cloth face covering in places where in close proximity to others, while facilitating local decision-making concerning face covering requirements;

Urge social distancing from those outside of your household, while eliminating caps on gathering size that have proven overly complex and arbitrary because they do not adequately account for critical considerations such as venue capacity and physical characteristics, type of activity involved, and location (indoors vs. outdoors), and thus undermine the more important focus on social distancing;

Providing a framework for safe visitation for nursing home and long-term-care facilities;

Allow for the reopening of senior centers, while providing that capacity must be limited to the extent necessary to accommodate adequate social distancing;

Provide that employers, businesses, and venues are expected to comply with the Tennessee Pledge for operating safely (the six counties with locally run county health departments continue to have existing statutory authority to issue additional directives on businesses/venues);

Continue access to take-out alcohol sales to encourage carryout and delivery orders;

Allow broad access to telehealth services;

Increase opportunities for people to easily join the healthcare workforce;

Facilitate increased testing and health care capacity;

Extend deadlines and suspend certain in-person continuing education, gathering, or inspection requirements to avoid unnecessary person-to-person contact; and

Increase opportunities to work remotely where appropriate.



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Avoid Financial Mistakes During Retirement

When you retire, you've learned a lot about all sorts of things, helping you avoid some of the mistakes you made earlier in life. However, you may still be susceptible to financial missteps specifically related to your retirement years. How can you dodge these errors?

Consider these suggestions:

Manage your withdrawal rate carefully. You will likely need to tap into your retirement accounts - your IRA and 401(k) or similar employer-sponsored plan. But you should establish an annual withdrawal rate that's appropriate for your situation. By withdrawing too much each year, especially in the early years of your retirement, you risk outliving your resources. (Keep in mind, though, that once you turn 72, you will be required to take out at least a certain amount each year - based on your age and account balance - from your traditional IRA and 401(k) or similar plan.)

Don't underestimate health care costs. Once you turn 65, you will be eligible for Medicare, but you may still need a Medicare supplement plan and will probably also incur other expenses. In fact, A healthy 65-year-old couple who retired in 2019 will need nearly \$390,000 over their remaining years just to pay for health care, according to HealthView Services, which produces health-care cost projection software. Other estimates show different amounts, but they all amount to hundreds of thousands of dollars. So, when calculating your expenses during your retirement years, reserve a big space for

Don't take Social Security too early. You can start receiving monthly Social Security checks when you reach age 62, but your payments will generally be significantly larger if you wait until your "full" retirement age, which will probably be between 66 and 67. (The size of your payments will "max out" at age 70.) Of course, if you need the money at 62, you may have to take it, but if you believe you have longevity working in your favor, and you can afford to wait, you may be better off by delaying Social Security as long as possible.)

Don't invest too conservatively. Once you're retired, you might think that you should take as few chances as possible with your investments - after all, you simply have less time for them to bounce back from a downturn than you did during your working years. Nonetheless, it's important to own a reasonable percentage of growth-oriented investments to help keep you ahead of inflation. Even at a low rate, which we've experience recently, inflation can erode your purchasing power over time.

Don't be more generous than you can afford. If you have grown hildren who need financial help, or grandchildren heading to col lege someday, you'd no doubt like to do whatever you can to provide assistance. However, the hard truth is they simply have more time than you do to find workable financial solutions, whereas if you deplete your funds through your generosity, you could put yourself in a precarious position. So, be as giving as you can afford - but don't go beyond that. By preserving your financial independence, you'll end up benefiting your family, as well.

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
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OUR COUNTY

Tales from the Yellow House by Lee McAlpin



In October at the Yellow House, after the first cold spell, us kids usually put back on our brogans shoes. Each summer added a new stubbed toe, two or three scars from cuts and nail punctures, not to mention the number of times our feet had accidently stepped into a pile of chicken, cow or horse droppings and squished (if that is a word) up between our toes during the summer months. I suppose that this might be the reason that my feet grew into a size twelve.


This time of the year usually found us cutting wood for the fireplace and cook stove for the coming winter. We would take trips into the surrounding woods to gather up pine knots for kindling, and to locate muscadine vines. Mom would make muscadine jelly and use the skins to make muscadine pies. We would scout out the hickory-nut or scaley-bark trees. We would spend a lot of time bursing the shells and picking out the goodies.

While on these trips we would scan every small cedar tree to see if we could find the perfect one to cut down for the coming Christmas season. We would also check out the holly trees with the red berries and the pines trees with the biggest pine cones. Dad would dig a pit in the ground out in the garden, line it with straw and fill it with sweet potatoes, turnips, bunches of collard greens, add more straw and then cover it with a mound of dirt, and lay some tin on top. This was a country vegetable cellar. It would keep the vegetables from freezing.

Nearly every fall, Dad would buy a hog to fatten up for the annual hog killing. Seems like more than often I got the job of slopping the hogs as we called it. Usually, there was a five gallon bucket placed outside the kitchen door into which all vegetable peelings, food leftovers, etc., were kept. This was mixed with water and poured into the hog trough for their meals along with a few ears of corn tossed into the pen for dessert. I would get a bath in the slop often when I would lift the can over the fence to pour the contents into the feeding trough. The old hog just couldn't wait and would take her nose and put it under the bucket and give me a dousing.

On a sunny day, Mom would pull the feather mattresses and pillows off the bed and lay them atop the tin roof on the storm house. She would give us kids a broom or stick and tell us to beat the tar out of them. I beat them the best I could but never did see any tar coming from them, but this beating fluffed up the feathers

inside and the sun did its job in freshening the things. Mom usually put up her quilting frames in the fall. The frame hung from the ceiling on wires. She would start quilting on one end, sew as far as she could reach, and then roll up the quilted part on one of the frames and start sewing again. Most times neighboring women would come over and help her quilt. This time of the year brings so many good memories of my family, friends and country ways. May we never be without country.


