Former State Representative Jamie Jenkins (94th District) of Somerville has written a letter to Royal Oak Charcoal promising "24-hour monitoring" if the company goes ahead with plans to build a plant in Hardeman County. Jenkins inserted his business card that identified himself as a State Representative with the letter, but he did not clarify he was a "former

Jenkins was appointed in 2015 to replace the

resigning Leigh Rosser Wilburn. He did not run for the 94th district spot in 2016.

State Representative Johnny Shaw says he is upset with the use of the title.

"It angers me that someone would lie about their position in politics," he said, promising to take the issue to the State of Tennessee House Ethics Committee. "It further angers me that someone from out of the county would try to hurt Hardeman County and cost us jobs. Before he makes judgements, we hope he would

When contacted, Jenkins, who owns property within two miles of the proposed site according to the Hardeman County Register of Deeds, refused to share a copy of the letter. But after he was told it was already in the hands of Hardeman County Mayor Jimmy Sain, he said, "anything in the letter can be used."

Jenkins' letter, dated October 7, included, "I am using all of my contacts in the House, Senate, and Governor's office to restrict your operation as much as I can. I am even working with continued on A11

State Releases Graduation Rates for 2018

All Students

Tennessee Education Commissioner Candice McQueen announced that the 2017-18 high school graduation rate held steady at 89.1% percent, the highest graduation rate on record for Tennessee. This year, more than 56 percent of districts with high schools, saw their graduation rates improve when compared to last year's rates.

"Our schools and districts should be proud that once again we have hit our state's highest graduation rate on record while still holding our students to high expectations," Commissioner McQueen said. "By continuing to raise the expectations, we are signaling that Tennessee students are leaving high school with the knowledge and skills to be successful in college and the workforce. This graduation rate is a

Under the Haslam administration, Tennessee has set high expectations for both students and educators, and students have made significant gains as a result. As part of this work, the state transitioned to a more rigorous calculation for graduation rates in 2011, and even under the new criteria, rates have continued to rise.

Additionally, the state raised the bar for graduation expectations when the State Board of Education included participation in the ACT or SAT as a graduation requirement for Tennessee students. This year's results are the first to reflect this change in accountability.

ACT Boot Camp at UTM Jackson Center

The University of Tennessee at Martin Jackson Center will host an ACT boot camp from 4:30-8:30 p.m., October 16. The registration fee is \$45 per student.

The test prep session will offer quick tips to improve student scores on each of the four test sections. It will also focus on time-saving strategies and study habits as well as provide guidance for answering questions more efficiently. Participants will need to bring a pencil and paper.

Alex Beene, UT Martin adjunct instructor and college and ACT adviser for Fayette County Schools, will teach the course. In five years, Beene has mentored more than 1,000 students who have received a combined total of \$4.2 million in scholarships and financial aid.

"Taking Alex's class will help you understand how to manage your time throughout each part of the test," said a former student. "After a session with him, you will feel more at ease about the ACT."

Jackson State Offers Homeschool Grads Help

"With a variety of programs available, families may not be aware of all the opportunities their students have to attend college. We will have staff on hand to help with admission applications, the federal FAFSA and state TSAC aid applications, and plenty of time to answer questions and visit campus."

Representatives from Tennessee Achieves and the Tennessee Student Assistance Corporation are expected to attend to offer more information about their programs and how homeschool students can take advantage of them.

The Editor's Inbox...Letters to the Editor

I am reminded of an inscription above the arched doorway of a hospital I once read--"The wealth of a nation lies in the health of its people." No one can argue with that. You can be the richest person on the planet; if you don't have your health, you have nothing. That makes accessible affordable healthcare the single most important issue we face as a nation.

Accessible affordable healthcare affects every other aspect of our society—education, jobs, the economy, safety. Simply put, healthy parents mean working parents who send their healthy children to school to prepare for the workforce of the future. Healthy workers take fewer sick days and are more productive. Industries are attracted to areas with a healthy workforce and easy access to affordable care ergo the Haywood Co. Megasite remains unoccupied.

To date, Tennessee has led the nation in rural hospital closures per capita—11 with several others currently in jeopardy. Six of the closures are in West Tennessee—Brownsville, Somerville, Selmer, Trenton, Humboldt, and McKenzie. Bolivar survives for now, only because it is a part of the West TN Healthcare system. When hospitals leave an area, so do many physicians and other medical professionals. All of these hospital closures were due in great measure to the inability of the hospital to absorb the cost of uncompensated care. The law requires emergency rooms to stabilize a patient even when that person does not have the ability to pay.

In the past, hospitals were reimbursed, at least in part, for uncompensated care through the "Disproportionate Share Fund" from the Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services. This kept especially, smaller hospitals afloat. The Affordable Care Act then channeled that same pool of reimbursement money at no cost to the states, to expand Medicaid providing lower income people with the ability to pay for their care. To date, 38 states have either expanded Medicaid or are in the process. Tennessee is not one of them. Our Republican led legislature turned down Governor Haslam's plan, Insure Tennessee, leaving to date almost 6 billion of our tax dollars on the table--sent to other states who expanded.

Let's make sure there are no more hospital closures. Vote for candidates who support the expansion of Medicaid. In this election, They are Phil Bredesen, Karl Dean, Justin Kanew, and Johnny Shaw. (Karl Dean has said he will expand Medicaid on Day 1). The fact is, no matter how much money you have, no matter how great your insurance is, whether you are black or white, rich or poor--if you are an hour away from the nearest hospital when you have an accident or a heart attack, you die. Vote like your lives depend on it, because they do.

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
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Can You Count on a Bountiful **Investment "Harvest"?**

We're officially in autumn – the season when we bring in what we planted in the spring. But the concept of planting and gathering isn't confined to agriculture. In fact, it can be used in many walks of life, including investing. So what can you do to help work toward a successful investment "harvest"?

Here is (not quite) a bushel of ideas:

Plant the right "seeds." When farmers plant specific crops, they know about what to expect - how long it will take for them to grow, how much yield they'll produce, and so on. When you invest, you too need to plant "seeds" by choosing investments that are designed to help meet your goals. For example, to accumulate enough money for a comfortable retirement, you will probably need to own a reasonable percentage of growth-oriented vehicles, such as stocks - you generally can't expect the type of growth you need by investing solely in fixed-income investments, such as bonds and certificates of deposit.

Nurture your "crops." Agricultural workers are diligent about cultivating their crops through proper irrigation, fertilization and weed control. And if you want to keep your investment portfolio healthy, you also must find ways to nurture it. First of all, you will need to keep adding new dollars regularly, because the larger your overall investment base, the more you can expand its growth potential. But you might also need to do some "weeding" of your own, because over the years, you may have purchased some investments that, for one reason or another, are now no longer suitable for your needs. If that's the case, you might be better off by selling these investments and using the proceeds for new ones that could fill gaps in your portfolio.

Diversify. Farmers may plant a mix of crops: corn, soybeans, flax, legumes, fruits, and so on. Consequently, if one crop fails, it won't sink the farmer's entire business. As an investor, you, too, need to diversify, because if you only own one type of asset class, and a financial downturn hits that asset, your portfolio can take a big hit. But spreading your dollars among stocks, bonds, cash and other investments can help reduce the impact of market volatility on your holdings. (However, diversification can't guarantee profits or protect against all losses.)

Thus far, we've looked at ideas on how you can create a healthy investment crop. But once it's time to actually start harvesting your portfolio - that is, once you begin liquidating parts of it to support yourself during your retirement years - you also need to act carefully. Specifically, you need to establish a withdrawal rate that's appropriate for your situation, based on your age, lifestyle, income sources and other factors. You could be retired for two or three decades, so it's essential you don't withdraw so much during your early years of retirement that you risk outliving your money. A financial professional can help you determine the rate that's right for you.

The agricultural harvest season only lasts a few weeks. But doing a good job of growing and managing your investment crop can help you reap the rewards far into the future.





Beef Empanadas

Ingredients

- 1 package of pre-made pie crust (2 rolls)
- 1 Tablespoon of oil 1 pound of lean ground beef - I use 90% lean, however 80% or less will work - just drain
- off the excess fat before continuing. 1/4 cup diced onions 1/2 medium diced bell pepper, any color
- 1 teaspoon cumin
- 1 teaspoon minced garlic 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1 teaspoon chili powder
- 1 cup Mexican blended cheese 1 egg

Directions

Preheat oven to 375* Combine bell pepper, onion, garlic and oil and sauté 3 minutes over medium heat. Add hamburger, cumin and chili pepper to the pan and cook until meat is cooked through. Set pan aside and let cool. While meat mixture is cooling, roll out pie



crust. Using a bowl or large circle cutter, cut out 6" round discs from pie crust. You should be able to get from each crust making 6 total with a 7th created out of the leftover dough rolled out. Place 2 - 3 Tablespoons of mixture in the center of each pie disc. Top with cheese. Fold over and seal edges with a fork. Place Empanadas on a cookie sheet. Scramble egg and brush on to tops of each Empanada. Bake in oven for 15 - 20 minutes. Yield: 7 Empanadas.



When asked, Hardeman County Zoning Compliance Officer Geneva Cossar said that no one had complained about the re-zoning issue except, "land owners from Fayette County."

On October 3, an informational meeting at the Whiteville Municipal Building was attended by approximately 70 people, including Hardeman County Commissioners Chandra Lake, Elvis White, and Viscen C. Morrow, who represent the Whiteville area but actually do not represent the area that is part of the re-zoning issue. The more than 300-acre tract of land is in District 1, represented by Jackie Sain, Mike Madden, and Chris Bell.

At the meeting, the zoning question that will come before the commission was pushed aside in favor of environmental concerns that Mayor Sain later said would have to be addressed by the State of Tennessee.

"The Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation

handles any environmental permits. This agency is a regulatory authority and absolutely will not issue a permit to operate a plant in Tennessee that does not meet all environmental regulations. The commission is scheduled to meet October 16 at 7:00 p.m. Included in the agenda is a public hearing regarding the re-zoning of the Royal Oaks site and a vote on the move.

In the meantime, Mayor Sain said he is happy industry is part of the county discourse.

"We are fortunate to have Royal Oak considering our county," added Sain.

Royal Oak has 10 facilities across the Southeast and is the #1 Hardwood Lump charcoal producer in the United States.

After Babel, did God intend for us to continue to be separated? Heavens no! Immediately after Babel (Genesis 11), God set apart a man-Abraham who was to be the patriarch of a new people (Genesis 11 & 12). God promised to bless all the different peoples/races through this one people and that's what He did. The story of the Old Testament is the story of God revealing Himself, through the people of Israel, to all the dispersed and diverse peoples of the world.

Not only did God promise to make Abraham's descendants a great nation and bless those who blessed them. He also promised to curse those who cursed them (Genesis 12:1-3). This is something that Pharaoh of Exodus chapter 1, should have considered. He enslaved the Israelites and oppressed them terribly. He did not consider God in his treatment of the Israelites. He learned, though, that God keeps his covenants and is serious about His plans for this great nation. After the warnings, the plagues, the Exodus, and the Red Sea miracle, Egypt was left a wasteland. It was plundered, picked over, pummeled, pounded, and left without an army. What Pharaoh had commanded to be done to the Israelite male babies was returned to his own house and every home in Egypt. Don't mess with God.

For many months, plagues decimated the Egyptians yet left the Israelites alone. The flies, livestock deaths, hail, darkness, and the deaths of the first born affected the Egyptians and their lands but the land of Goshen and the Israelites were untouched. Pharaoh's magicians acknowledged in Exodus 8:19, "This is the finger of God." The Egyptian officials lost their composure and their fear of Pharaoh exclaiming in Exodus 10:7, "Let the people go, so that they may worship the Lord their God. Do you not yet realize that Egypt is ruined?" Egypt was ruined and God's power and protection for the Israelites was undeniable.

If you were the head of a non-Israelite household who lived through those days, wouldn't you have led your family to seek shelter with those who were demonstrated to be God's chosen people? It is not difficult to envision Egyptians, Cushites, Putites, Midianites, and others placing their faith in God and yoking their own futures and fates with the Israelites. AND THEY DID!

Exodus 12:38 says, "Many other people went up with them..." People of the other nations joined in the Exodus and, according to the Passover restrictions and inclusions in Exodus 12:43-49 regarding foreign people, masses of them became proselytes to the Israelite nation and their God.

As we conclude this installment in our Bible and Race study, let me name just a few more of the individuals who came to God from other races in the Old Testament. Moses married a black African woman and their marriage was decisively affirmed by God (Numbers 12). Phinehas the High Priest and grandson of Aaron had a name that literally meant "the dark-skinned one." It is widely understood that this High Priest was of mixed Israelite and black African descent. Tamar, Rahab, and Ruth were all women of other races who not only inter-married into Israel, they were fore-mothers of both David and Jesus. David's mighty men included Gittites, Ammonites, Hittites, Zobahites, and one of his wives was a Geshurite. The father of the prophet Zephaniah was a black African. Ebed-Melech was a black African official, in the court of King Zedekiah, who saved the life of Jeremiah (Jeremiah 38). Prophets, priests, royals, and commoners were mixed racially but they were pure theologically. And, that's what mattered to God.

Think about the people of these other places and races. They forsook their idols and identity to be joined to God. It wasn't easy. They had to surrender all. God's arms were open to them and He was beckoning them to come. His arms are still open. Have you forsaken all and joined His people yet? He's making a brand-new people and we will see that in Him

we will have a new identity and beautiful new racial unity. See you next week when we turn to the New Testament.

Amos: A Prophet for Us - Part 5 by Jeff Capshaw

For Amos many covenantal violations were horizontal. They entailed mistreatment of poor people, the oppressed and the downtrodden. Thus, Amos was concerned about social injustices and righting them according to God's standard of justice.

Today we hear much about justice and injustice. We read on the Internet, in print and hear on the news about unethical behavior in the Department of Justice. Moreover, students on college campuses, special interest groups and those promoting identity politics are quick to demand justice for perceived injustices: injustices for which there is no agreed-upon standard. Why is this? It is because there is no absolute standard for justice in America today, and that is a tragedy with devastating consequences.

The Oxford English Dictionary

defines the "just" person as one who typically "does what is morally right" and is disposed to "giving everyone his or her due," offering the word "fair" as a synonym. What is of the utmost importance here-but is missing today--is the morally right. The existence of a moral force necessarily implies an absolute, moral standard: an agreed-up basis for determining what is just and unjust. Justice and injustice once were the equivalent of good and evil. Unfortunately, that is no longer the case; something has changed.

The most influential thinker in recent times on this topic is John Rawls (following Karl Marx and others). According to the Internet Encyclopedia of Philosophy, "Rawls burst into prominence in 1958 with the publication of his game-changing paper, 'Justice as Fairness'." The bar for justice was lowered and became totally

subjective and arbitrary: not anchored in any absolute standard. The definition for justice changed from "right" to "fair."

So then, what is fairness? What does it look like? Simply put, now days fairness is culturally or group determined. One says X is fair and another says Y is fair, while still others argue that P, Q, R or S is fair. Thus, the standard for justice is no longer a matter of right and wrong or good and evil; it is "fairness" void of any absolute standard to determine it. That is "relativism."

Much moral decline and cultural rot is owed to replacing absolutes with wobbly standards. But Amos says, "but let justice roll down like waters, and righteousness like an ever-flowing stream" (5:24). He invokes an absolute standard for justice; it is God's moral law. That is the only way to ensure real "equal justice for all."





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


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EON "LEO" BLAYLOCK JANUARY 9, 1943 - SEPTEMBER 21, 2018
