Full Time Mayor for Bolivar Approved

City Council Turns Down Raise for Themselves

With only six council members present, only four votes were required to create a full-time mayor's position for the City of Bolivar.

And that's what they got on October 12, opting to create a mayor's salary and position to replace Shelia Dellinger, who will retire in 2021. Voting for the measure were councilpeople Jonathan Joy,

Page Walley, Suzanne Rhea, and Carol Spinks, while Larry McKinnie passed the vote and Todd Lowe voted no. "I think the mayor is doing a great job," said city council-

man Todd Lowe. "But I promised when I ran that I would not vote for a full-time mayor. I kept my word." "I asked about this in other cities that had full-time mayors," said councilman Walley, who voted against it on the

first reading but for it on the final reading. "It affected me." Not present at the meeting were Larry Crawford and Mel-

vin Golden, but both passed it at the committee level.



With the completion of their new home in sight, the yard sale fundraiser by the Hardeman Adoptable Animals was deemed a success.

"Hardeman Adoptable Animals would like to thank all who donated to our fall yard sale. We rely solely on donations and fundraising to operate, so we are very thankful for our supporters," said Sara Vonderheide of HAA.

Vonderheide added that they will be moving into a new shelter very soon, noting that the administration building and kennel building are ready to occupy, and that they are in the planning stages of the move. All that remains is the perimeter fence to be completed by the county.

"We are so excited about our new home. It will be a healthier, safer, and more relaxing environment for the dogs in our care," she added.

The salary and position will not be put in place until after the 2021 Bolivar City Election.

During the public hearing that preceded the vote, four Bolivar business leaders, including former Hardeman County Chamber of Commerce Director Laura Hall Sparks, spoke in favor of the move.

"Bolivar is on an upward trend," she said. "And we need the commitment of a full-time position."

The city council then voted 3-2 with one abstention, to not

City Talks Trash Re: Landfill

"I'm going to try to explain this the best I can," began Bolivar Mayor Julian McTizic. "I've gotten a crash course in how the landfill works from (Hardeman County) Mayor (Jimmy) Sain."

McTizic's explanation came after a small uproar from citizens regarding an announcement that bulk item pickup by Bolivar waste management would not occur due to "closing of the Hardeman County landfill."

While the landfill is still taking trash from citizens, the county has asked the municipalities to deliver the collected trash directly to the landfill in Walnut, MS, which is serving as the temporary resting spot as repairs to the Hardeman County Landfill are completed.

"You cannot go in and drop trash," explained councilwoman Suzanne Rhea. "You leave it and they take it to

Mayor McTizic said the longer trip to drop off the trash is costing about \$3,200 a month in fuel and labor, but his biggest worry is wear and tear on the city equipment.

"The new truck is fine," he said, although adding the extra miles is outside of the buy-back agreement with the company they got the truck from. "But the dumpster truck is on its last legs and I'm worried about the brush truck as well."

"It's the fault of the county," said councilman Larry McKinnie to Mayor McTizic. "It's not fair we need to pay for it. Let mayor Sain know we have questions."

McTizic said discussions with the county would continue, but so far mayor Sain has declined a request to pay the added expenses, citing the danger of setting a precedent.

The county stopped taking trash from cities in late August, attempting to fix a flaw in the 2013-2014 construction of the final cell at the landfill, citing safety concerns.

The trial in the salary dispute case between Hardeman County Sheriff John Doolen and Mayor Jimmy Sain is set to resume October 27 and 29, according to Hardeman County Court Clerk Billy Davis.

The trial, set to be completed October 7, was continued due to vehicle trouble for Chancellor Tony Childress.

give raises to the city council members.

"One meeting a month doesn't deserve what we are getting now," said councilman Joy. "It's not justified at \$275 a month and no one can justify it on gas mileage."

"Some of us come here a lot more," answered councilwoman Rhea, noting committee work takes up more than just once a month.


Voting for the \$500 per month rate were Rhea and Spinks. Against were Joy, Lowe, and Walley with McKinnie passing the vote.

According to the city's charter, the council will need to set a rate, regardless if it is the same rate, by ordinance, before December 18, which is sixty days before the qualifying deadline for the 2021 elections.

"We have to set it at something," said McTizic.

Any change in the monthly rate would only effect the seats up for election in 2021, which are the seats of Rhea, Walley, Joy, and Golden.

Small Shack and Brian Lee Howell are one of the four acts that began Music on the Square in 2008, playing free concerts on the green space in the Bolivar town square.


Music on the Square in Bolivar is made possible by the Bolivar Downtown Development Corporation through the work of the Har-

deman County Music Commission. In case of inclement weath-


er, the event may be moved to the Bolivar Farmers Market Pavillion.


Screaming::::



Harvest Pork Roast

- **Ingredients** 3- to 3 1/2-lb boneless pork loin roast
- 1/2 cup orange marmalade 3 tablespoons orange juice
- 2 teaspoons fennel seed crushed
- 1 teaspoon dried thyme leaves
- 1 teaspoon dried sage leaves crushed 2 medium dark-orange sweet potatoes, peeled, cut into 1 1/2-inch pieces
- 1-lb. Brussels sprouts cut in half if large
- 2 teaspoons olive or vegetable oil
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper

Directions

- 1. Heat oven to 325°F. On rack in shallow roasting pan, place pork. In small bowl, mix marmalade, orange juice, fennel, thyme and sage. Brush half of the marmalade mixture
- 2. In large bowl, toss sweet potatoes and Brussels sprouts with oil, salt and pepper. Arrange vegetables around pork. Insert ovenproof meat thermometer so tip is in thickest part of pork.
- 3. Roast uncovered 1 hour. Brush pork with remaining marmalade mixture; gently stir vegetables to coat with pan juices. Roast about 15 minutes longer or until thermometer reads 155°F and vegetables are tender. Cover pork with foil and let stand 10 to 15 minutes until thermometer reads 160°F.

Wisdom and Fear of the Lord

by Jeff Capshaw

This series has centered upon Biblical Wisdom from the Old Testament book of Proverbs. To review, Proverbs is a book of short, pithy sayings and written Hebrew poetry. These texts are best understood, not as absolute and universal truths, but rather as truthful, general principles.

Furthermore, the writers of Hebrew poetry utilized meaning rhyme instead of sound rhyme. Simply put, Hebrew poetry communicates a similar meaning with different words. For example, writers will do so by negation: saying what something isn't as opposed to what it is.

In this week's lesson, the subject is Wisdom and the "fear of the Lord." So, what is meant by the "fear of the LORD"? The biblical idea isn't so much related to "terror," although there are moments in Scripture when one experienced that unpleasant emotion. Moses is a good example. "And he [God] said, "I am the God of your father, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob." And Moses hid his face, for he was afraid to look at

God" (Exodus 3:6).

But the notion of "fearing the LORD" in Proverbs is better understood as "having a sense of respect, awe, and submission to a deity" and not terror. One may think about fear from three different perspectives: Holy Fear, Healthy Fear, and Harmful Fear. Thus, fearing God might fall into the categories of both a Holy and Healthy Fear.

There are 3 Proverbs where the phrase "fear of the Lord" collocates with Wisdom. The first one says, "the fear of the LORD is the beginning of knowledge; fools despise wisdom and instruction (1:7). The first part of the Proverb says what it is, and the second part says what it is not. Additionally, the word "beginning" here is best understood as a "foundation," as a platform and not "beginning" as the first in order. So, according to Scripture, all knowledge ultimately is built upon having awareness and reverence for God. However, to despise wisdom is not to fear the LORD and to be a fool.

The next text is Proverbs 9:10. It repeats the statement of the

could be different if we as a society taught by way of precept and practice prepared our children to know and

understand what it means to experience loss. Perhaps we do not do this because we as physical adults are ill

equipped, unprepared to deal with it ourselves. We have learned many misconceptions throughout our lives that imbed a slightly skewered view of death and loss. No matter what type of loss we experience, whether

property, security, or physical death, much of the same symptoms are the same though the circumstances dif-

fer wildly. From these misconceptions come a level of unpreparedness to deal with adversity and loss. During these times of new experiences and adversity we are forced to learn new ways of living much as someone

prior verse about fearing God as foundational to true knowledge. It says, "the fear of the LORD is the beginning of wisdom, and the knowledge of the Holy One is insight." This is a good example of synonymous parallelism, where the second line says something similar to the first line. So, reverencing God is similar to having knowledge of and deep clarity about God.

The final text is Proverbs 15:33. It says, "the fear of the LORD is instruction in wisdom, and humility comes before honor. This verse closely relates wisdom to the fear of the LORD. If one truly fears the LORD, then that one is said truly to be wise.

Do we honestly have a sense of reverence for God? If so, then we are wise indeed. If we don't fear the Lord, then according to Scripture, we are ignorant, foolish, and proud.







Vote for a Solid Investment Strategy

Election Day is little more than a week away. As a citizen, you may feel the results will affect many aspects of life in this country. But as an investor, your situation probably won't change after the votes are





No participant got all seven right in week three of the SEC Football Pick'Em Contest, but a three-way tie remains at the top.

Mike Madden of Bolivar, Bryan Smith of Bolivar, and Virgil Nixon of Adamsville are all tied with 18 games each.

Twenty-seven players picked six games correctly. No one picked lissouri to beat LSU.

Team Bo (Mike Nuckolls, Jim Nuckolls, Bub Stevens, Thomas Stevens) jumped out to a three game lead in the team competition, with three teams tied for second.

Youth between the ages of 10-16, who are hunter safety certified and who have never harvested a deer, are eligible to win a spot in what has become an annual special hunt. The Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency will host the hunt in conjunction with the opening day of the 2020 Tennessee Young Sportsman Deer Hunt on Saturday, October 31.

Youth from various regions from across the state have participated in the event held at Buffalo Ridge Refuge in Humphreys County. Last year, 16 young hunters had their first deer harvests.

A total of 30 young hunters will be selected to participate. The area incorporates a variety of wildlife management practices and totals more than 2,000 acres of prime deer habitat. Treestands will be provided including three which are handicap accessible.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, guidelines will be followed. A Friday night cookout will be held. Sites will be available for those who wish to camp (participants must provide their own camping gear). Breakfast and lunch will also be provided Saturday.

TWRA will hold a drawing and the winners will be notified by October 21. Confirmation packets will be sent via email to the successful participants that will include directions and a list of items to bring as well as a list of area hotels. Winning hunters are responsible for providing the appropriate Tennessee hunting license and must be accompanied by a non-hunting adult at least 21 years of age or older.

Interested hunters may complete an application online on the TWRA website.


