Ballot Boxes Runneth Over

The reasons why and who benefits are a matter of opinion, but something has the voting public going to the polls.

The massive voter turnout reported in the State of Tennessee are reflected in Hardeman County as 38% more people have voted through six days of early voting at the Hardeman County Election Commission, in comparison to 2014, which was the last off-presidential election year with similar options. The local economy may even get a boost according to Administrator of Elections Amber Moore.

"We may have to put on more help," said Moore. "We have been much busier than the past few years."

In 2014, races for Governor, United States Congress, and United States Senate, drove 1,324 to early voting through six days with 5,151 voting overall. The 2018 total of 1,819 through six days projects to 6,912.

The turnout this year is even more remarkable when it is considered the 2014 election had a question on state funding for abortion included on the ballot. The abortion ballot question to ban state funding from

being used for abortions failed in Hardeman County by a 2,477 to 2,464 margin, but passed statewide.

As it was in 2014, both Johnny Shaw (80th District) and the representative from the 94th (then Leigh Rosser Wilburn now Ron Gant) are running unopposed in their respective races. Other races available to Hardeman County voters were the governor's race won by Bill Haslam, the Senate race won by Lamar Alexander and Marsha Blackburn won the 7th Congressional District race.

This year, voters have the same choices, as Dr. Mark Green and Justin Kanew are vying for the 7th district spot, Blackburn faces former governor Phil Bredesen for senate and the governor's race is also on the ballot.

On the ballot as well this year are races to choose a mayor and aldermen in both Hickory Valley and Grand Junction.

A total of 14,238 are registered to vote in Hardeman County. Early voting continues through November 1, with Election Day scheduled for November 6.

Veterans Salute Scheduled

The Hardeman County Veterans Ceremony will be held November 2 at the National Guard Armory in Bolivar from 9:30-11:30 a.m.

The keynote speaker will be Lieutenant-General John G. Castellaw USMC (Retired).

John "Glad" Castellaw is co-founder and Chief Executive Officer (CEO) of Farmspace Systems LLC., a provider of precision agricultural aerial (drone) services and equipment.

For 36 years, he led Marines around the world while flying more than two dozen different aircraft. Castellaw participated in humanitarian operations in Africa, the former Soviet Union, and the Philippines; served with the United Nations (UN) during the Siege of Sarajevo. He commanded the American forces in the multi-national security operation in East



Timor and was the chief of staff of the U.S. Central Command at the height of the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan. His last tours were in the Pentagon, where he oversaw Marine Aviation and then the Marine Corps budget.

Returning to Tennessee in 2008, he operates the family farm and sits as a director for the Bank of Crockett. In 2010 Castellaw co-founded and is the former president of the non-profit Crockett Policy Institute where he created the "SOLDIER 2 CIVILIAN" program to help veterans find jobs in precision agriculture.

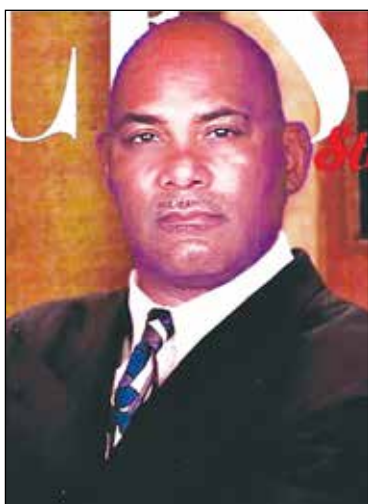

Gupton College in Nashville, TN and received an Associate Arts degree in Mortuary Science. He continued his

education when he was accepted to the Howard University School of Law in Washington, D.C. and received a Juris Doctorate degree.

After law school he was employed with Jim Sanderson's law office in Bolivar. He later moved to Waterloo, Iowa where he worked as a Contract Compliance Officer for the City of Waterloo Community Development Department.

He later relocated to Nashville, TN where he worked for the State of Tennessee's Department of Employment Security as an Appeals hearing officer. He was also working with Scales Funeral Home (Nashville) as a funeral director and embalmer. After several years in Nashville the opportunity came to relocate to the Memphis. Mike relocated to Bolivar and worked in Memphis until 2003 when he was hired by the Bolivar Housing Authority Board of Commissioners as Executive Director. During this time he was also working with his grandfather at Dixie Funeral Home. After the death of his grandfather Mike became president of Dixie Benefit Association and Funeral Home, Inc. /dba/ Dixie Funeral Home.

He is married to Lori Wells Peebles Miller of Nashville and

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How Should You Respond to Record-Breaking Bull Market?

The investment world recently observed a milestone: the longest bull market in history. But what does this mean to you, as an individual investor?

For one thing, it suggests that patience and perseverance can pay off. From October 2007 to March 2009 – just 17 months – the S&P 500 stock market index fell more than 56 percent. That's a big drop, of course, but what if you had told yourself that "enough is enough" and you decided to sell? Consider this: The S&P 500 has now risen about 320 percent since its low point on March 9, 2009. So, if you had stayed invested during these last 9-1/2 years, your portfolio might have achieved impressive results.

How long will this bull market last? No one can say for sure, and it's usually something we don't anticipate that ends a bull market. (In fact, there's no one agreed-upon definition of a "bull market," although many financial experts define it as a period of rising stock prices without a drop of at least 20 percent.) Right now, the investment environment still looks pretty good: U.S. economic growth is strong, corporate earnings are healthy and consumers are spending. As always, though, potential concerns lurk, including the effects of a looming trade war with China.

Regardless of the prospects for this bull market, here are some questions to ask yourself:

Am I still on track toward meeting my goals? Your investments' performance may not match that of the S&P 500 or the Dow Jones Industrial Average – and that's not a problem. These indices only track the returns of U.S. stocks, but to reach your goals, such as a comfortable retirement, you will likely need a diversified array of investments: U.S. stocks, international stocks, bonds, government securities and so on. Rather than compare your investment results to those of a single market index, you should measure your progress by your own "yardstick," based on a variety of factors, including your portfolio's performance but also taking into account your age, retirement goals, risk tolerance and family situation. A financial professional can help you create a personalized measurement tool.

Do I need to rebalance? Over time, your investment portfolio can become over-concentrated in some areas. For example, you might have wanted a certain percentage of your portfolio to be held in stocks, but during a long bull market, the value of U.S. stocks may have risen so much that they now take up more space than you had intended, possibly subjecting you to a higher level of risk. Consequently, you may need to "rebalance" your portfolio by adjusting your investment mix.

Am I maintaining a long-term perspective? The 9-1/2 years (and counting) run of the bull market should remind you that successful investing is not a "get-rich-quick" endeavor, but rather a gradual process requiring you to focus on the long term. Even during this lengthy run-up, we've seen "corrections" – short-term declines of 10 percent or more. But if you can stick with your long-term investment strategies, you will be less tempted to over-react to the inevitable bumps along the road.

The record bull market makes for some interesting headlines for a few days – but in the long run, it's what you do, year in and year out, that will help you write your own story.

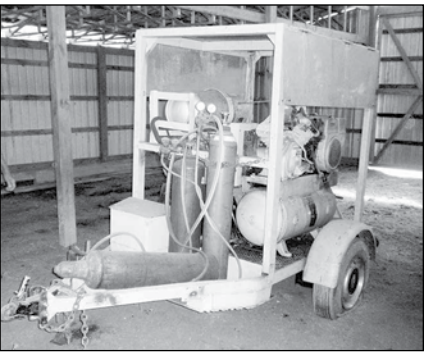

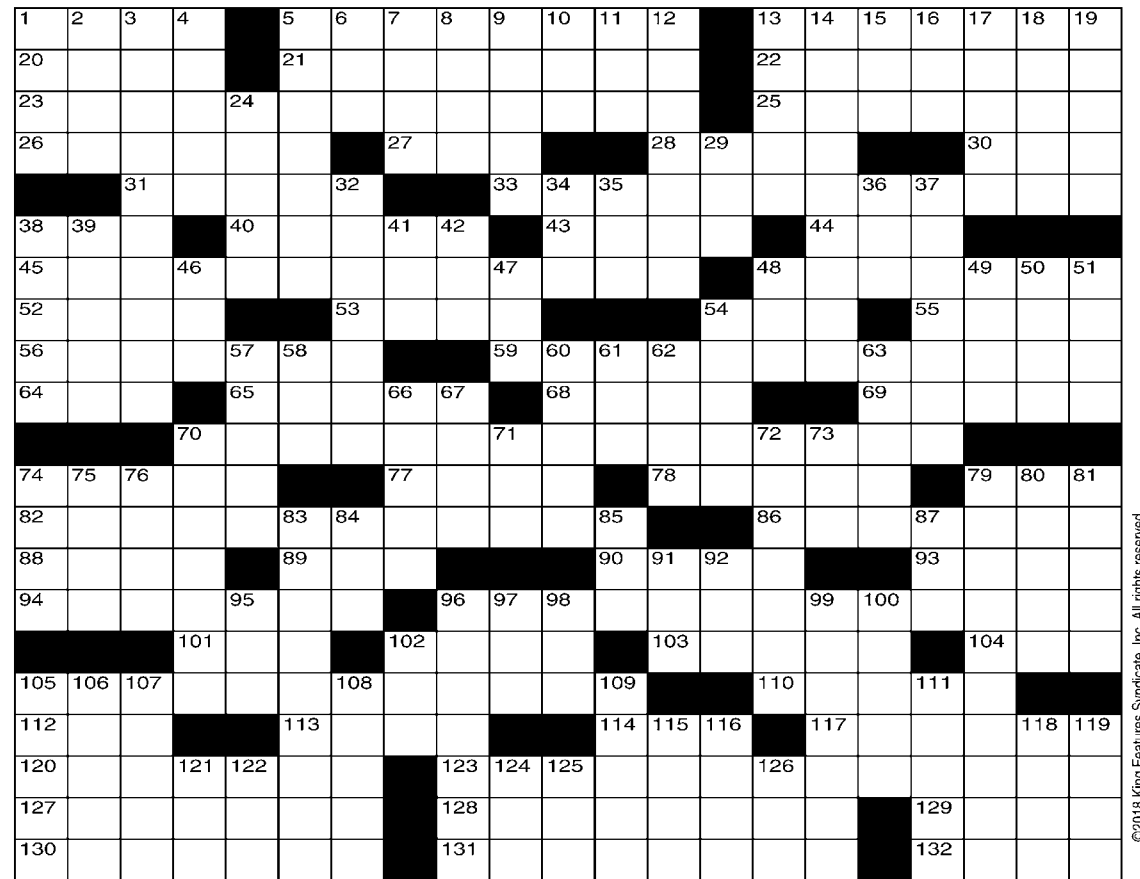

Pumpkin Brown Betty

Ingredients

- 1 2-to-3-pound sugar pumpkin
- 3 tablespoons unsalted butter
- 1 cup cubed bread (preferably from a baguette)
- 2 Gala apples, peeled and cut into 1/2-inch pieces
- 1/4 cup packed light brown sugar
- 1/4 cup golden raisins
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- Kosher salt
- Maple syrup, for drizzling

Directions

Preheat the oven to 375 degrees F. Slice off and reserve the top 1 1/2 inches of the pumpkin. Scoop out the seeds and stringy pulp.

Melt 2 tablespoons butter in a large skillet over medium heat. Add the bread and cook, stirring occasionally, until golden, about 4 minutes; transfer to a bowl. Add the remaining 1 tablespoon butter, the apples, brown sugar and raisins to the skillet and cook until the apples are crisp-tender, about 4 minutes. Stir in vanilla, cinnamon and a pinch of salt. Return the bread to the skillet.

Put the pumpkin in a small baking dish and fill the pumpkin with the apple mixture. Cover with the pumpkin top and add 1 inch of boiling water to the baking dish. Cover loosely with foil and bake until the pumpkin is tender, 2 hours to 2 hours, 30 minutes. Remove the foil and pumpkin top and return the stuffed pumpkin to the oven. Bake until the filling is lightly browned, about 10 more minutes. Transfer to a serving plate and drizzle with maple syrup. To serve, scrape the pumpkin flesh and stir into the apple mixture.

The Bible and Race (Part Four)

In both the Old and New Testaments, people who sought God embraced a new identity and found a new unity in His name. God has not changed His Word to accommodate our sinful feelings or to appease our ugly prejudices. In this final article, let me highlight some faulty beliefs that prevent us from accepting God's vision for our lives and His churches.

Faulty belief #1: The White Bible – The white Jesus you have seen in a picture was not a photograph. Charlton Heston was poorly cast as an authentic Moses. Those depictions are not legitimate. Jesus, Moses, and most of the people we read about in the Bible were of middle-eastern descent. They looked like Arabs with brown/olive skin, dark hair, and dark eyes. The white people in the Bible were the Hittites, Philistines, and Greeks.

The "White Bible" fallacy is actually destructive. It supports a white racial pride that is far from biblical. Europeans, Asians, Africans, Eskimos, Latinos, and others have been grafted into a salvation that was first revealed to Jews (*Romans 11:17-21*). We Gentiles should be VERY thankful for the privilege of being included. And, this gratitude should impact the way we treat foreigners since we have been given such a wonderful spiritual home under another race's tent.

Faulty belief #2: Mixed Marriages – Moses married a black African woman. His sister, Miriam, opposed it. For her judgment, God gave Miriam leprosy and kicked her out of the camp (*Numbers 12*). Ruth, Tamar, and Rahab were women of different races who married into Israel. The High Priest Phinehas and the prophet Zephaniah were of mixed racially ancestry. Mixed-race marriages in the Bible were blessed by God when the union was established in the common faith.

The only mixed marriage that is prohibited by God is the marriage between one of His followers and someone who is not. In *2 Corinthians 6:14* God says to Christians, "Do not be yoked together with unbelievers." Far more preferable is it to have a mixed-race marriage in the family than a marriage where the spouse is not deeply surrendered to the Lord Jesus. Amen? We often demonstrate that our primary identity is tied more closely to our race than our faith in Christ when we are upset by interracial marriages.

Faulty belief #3: Segregated Churches – If we had biblical racial beliefs, segregated church would not be our practice. We would be doing everything in our power to intentionally give the Lord the type of beautiful worship and unity that He desires. We would lift up our hearts to Him from a diverse congregation and He would look down on us with His joyful approval. And, the world would know we are Christians by our love for one another (*John 13:35*).

The Antioch church in Syria was the model church in this regard. They were a church with a racially diverse pastoral team (*Acts 13:1*). They were the first church to intentionally reach out with the gospel across racial lines (*Acts 11:20*). And, God laid His hand of blessing on them for doing so (*Acts 11:21*).

In conclusion, let me stress again the new identity we share as born-again disciples of Christ Jesus. The Holy Spirit makes this abundantly clear in *Ephesians 2:15&19* when He says that "His purpose was to create in himself one new humanity" and that "we are no longer foreigners and strangers, but fellow citizens with God's people and also members of his household." Our racial differences are superficial while our connection in Christ is deep and profound.

If you have been provoked or agitated by these thoughts, that's good. I have been too. We have changes that we need to make. We have unity to seek. We have a new identity to discover and celebrate. I end with the seminal passage.

So in Christ Jesus you are all children of God through faith, for all of you who were baptized into Christ have clothed yourselves with Christ. There is neither Jew nor Gentile, neither slave nor free, nor is there male and female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus. Galatians 3:26-28

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Amos: A Prophet for Us - Part 7

Over the last six weeks, I aimed to focus on the theme of justice, especially "social justice." As indicated, much public discourse centers upon it, and the near deranged social justice warriors have held these notions hostage for too long! I have also urged that no cultural consensus regarding justice and injustice exists. Instead, everyone understands justice and injustice in his or her own eyes. The reason for this is like the days of the Judges in the Hebrew Bible. Then, "everyone did that which was right in his own eyes."

There is no moral basis for sizing up what is just or unjust, because as I indicated, the subjective notion of "fairness" has replaced justice as righteousness. Therefore, the current public desire to ameliorate social injustices appears nearly hopeless. If we cannot agree on what is wrong, then it is impossible to agree upon what it right.

Finally, I interacted with the Hebrew Prophet, Amos, as an absolute standard for righting the wrongs of society. Unfortunately, this is an area where the Church of Jesus Christ has "dropped-the-ball." As Amos said, Israel . . . turn[ed] justice to wormwood and cast down righteousness to the earth (5:7). He later poses the solution; hate evil, and love good, and establish justice in the gate; . . . (5:15).

Amos takes up another theme related to justice. Instead of attacking the social ills with the truth of the LORD (in our case the Gospel), Israel was busy enjoying her own prosperity and time of relative peace and stability in the nation at the time. Sound familiar? There isn't a more prosperous nation or Church on the planet than America or her Churches. Listen to Amos; he says, *Woe to those who are at ease in Zion, and to those who feel secure on the mountain of Samaria . . . (6:1)*. There could hardly be a more accurate depiction of many Churches in America. A close friend refers to this attitude, indicative of some churches, as the "country club mentality."

That may seem a bit harsh, but it is time Christians took notice of the hijacking of social concerns by those with no answers. This problem, combined with the lackadaisical attitudes toward the numerous social pathologies afflicting our nation, are inexcusable. Jesus' entire ministry was among the poorest and societal outcasts. As often is quipped, "people don't care how much we know, until they know how much we care." May God give us the grace to increase our awareness of these social pathologies and to take more risky and sacrificial measures for the cause of Christ and His Gospel. The world needs the help, and we need the practice.

Bolivar also had some success in the air as freshman Kyle Lowe threw a pass in the flat to C.J. McMahan, who turned it into a 17-yard touchdown and then senior Jace McKenzie threw the longest pass of the year a 79-yard strike to McMahan to make it 45-17 with 1:08 left in the third.

Senior Ryan Crisp added a 40 yard run to finish the scoring for



the Tigers.

Bolivar managed a season-high 467 yards of offense to go along with their season-high point total.

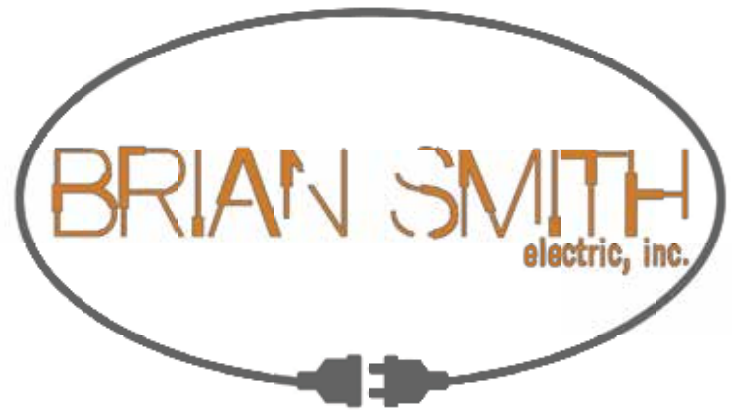
