Bolivar Man Dies by Gunshot

Officials from the Bolivar Police Department made an arrest the same day in the shooting death of Jacques Perry (see photo right) of Bolivar.

Perry died at 937 West Jefferson Street at approximately 12:35 a.m. on October 23. During the investigation, information was obtained that identified Bryquez Buggs, age 21, of Ashland, Mississippi, as responsible for the shooting. Buggs was arrested on October 23, at approximately 3:30 p.m., through a coordinated effort between the Bolivar Police Department, Tennessee Bureau of Investigation, Federal Bureau of Investigation, Tennessee Highway Patrol, U.S. Marshal's Service, and the Hardeman County Sheriff's Office.

Buggs was taken into custody without incident. Buggs will be facing charges of Unlawful Possession of a Weapon and Second Degree Murder in the death of Mr. Perry. He is being held at the Hardeman County Criminal Justice Complex pending court proceedings.

Perry will be laid to rest Friday, October 30, at 1:00 p.m. See dixiefuneralhome.com for details.



Record Numbers Vote Early in TN

Hardeman County has seen a non-ending stream of voters going early to the ballot box, and counties all over Tennessee are no different.

Through October 27, 6,136 have voted early in Hardeman County. As of the close of polls on October 26, the 11th day of early voting in Tennessee, a record-breaking 1,808,546 voters had cast their ballot for the November 3 presidential election.

With three more days of early voting, turnout has already surpassed the previous record set during the 2016 presidential election when 1,689,989 Tennesseans voted early or absentee by-mail.

"This election, Tennesseans are engaged and are taking advantage of the convenience of early voting," said Tennessee Secretary of State Tre Hargett. "In the final days of early voting as well as on Election Day, Tennesseans can cast their votes in a clean, safe, and secure environment."

Completed ballots may be mailed with a first-class stamp in the county you reside at the designated post office before 3 p.m. local time on Election Day, Nov. 3, 2020. A representative from the county election

County Salary Lawsuit Trudges On

Three witnesses took the stand as requested by the defense in the Hardeman County salary suit as the trial appeared to be winding down after 15 months of wrangling.

The attorney for the defense, Amber Griffin Shaw, began the day on October 27 with a motion to dismiss the suit, but Chancellor Tony Childress delayed his ruling on that motion in favor of letting witnesses testify. Childress is expected to rule on the motion to dismiss when the trial resumes on October 29.

Shaw called Hardeman County Mayor Jimmy Sain, McNairy County Sheriff Guy Buck, and Hardeman County Human Resources Director Linda Ervin in an attempt to prove the sheriff's request for \$1.4 million more for the 2019-2020 budget is unwarranted.

Sain was on the stand for over three hours. He testified that the sheriff turned his budget proposal in to his office and he presented it to the budget committee with the other officials proposed budgets. He testified that he and the sheriff never had a conversation about the budget and have never had a "cross word" about the budget. Sain said he arranged

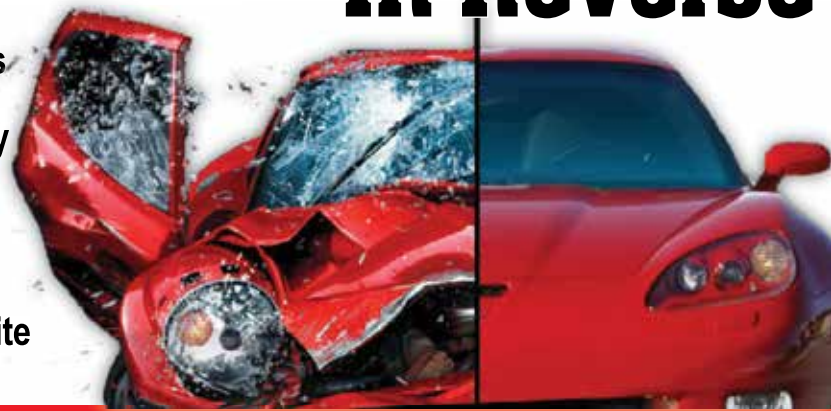

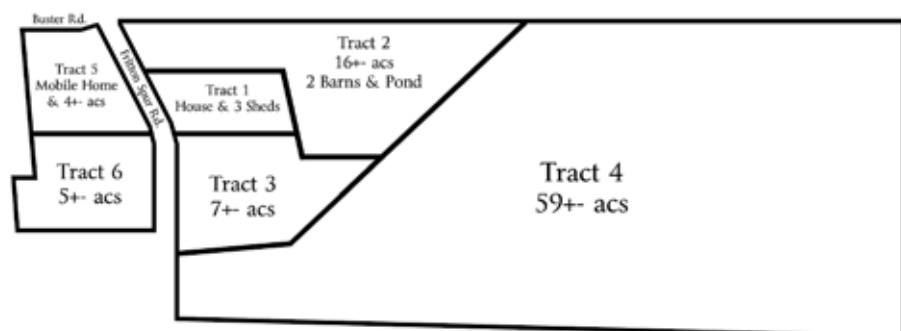

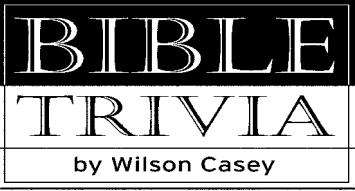

These Things, Part 2 by Jeff Capshaw

Last week's column began a series on Paul's letters to two young pastors (1-2 Timothy and Titus). The churches under the care of Paul's protégés were thrown into turmoil by false teachers. Although it isn't clear what group(s) the false teachers belonged to, Judaizers were fueling controversy.

For example, there are references to "teachers of the Law," the "circumcision group," "Jewish myths," and "arguments and quarrels about the law." Furthermore, there are warnings against "what is falsely called knowledge," and references to "myths and endless genealogies."

Paul also was specific about the false teachers' character. He said, "they made a shipwreck of the faith and had seared consciences." "They desired to be rich, were lovers of money," and motivated by money. Moreover, "they had wandered away from the faith and pierced themselves with many pangs." "They had swerved from the truth." "They had the appearance of godliness but denied its power." "They were always learning and never able to arrive at a knowledge of the truth." "They were men also who opposed the truth." "They had

devoted themselves to deceitful spirits and teachings of demons." According to Paul, these false teachers "were in the snare of the devil!"

Paul wrote to Timothy and Titus to provide remote assistance in a time of crisis. He confronted the problems head-on. Paul wanted to get confused and disoriented families recentered and refocused on living-out the Gospel amid the turmoil. Thus, these books provide principles for re-orienting and recentering the church toward its calling and mission during disorienting and troubling times.

In addition to instructions for these young Pastors/Elders (Timothy and Titus), Paul also provides instructions to the various sociological groups within the churches. He admonishes the regular members to think and to act in ways to get back on track.

The first group for consideration is men. Paul writes, "I desire then that in every place the men should pray, lifting holy hands without anger or quarreling . . ." (1 Timothy 2:8). No activity is more effective for re-centering and reorienting the people of God than prayer. Prayer is a God-focused activity that reminds the church of the object of her affection, the

author of her mission, and the source of her power.

Next, Paul urges that older men are to be "sober-minded, dignified, self-controlled, sound in faith, in love, and steadfastness." These spiritual traits are stabilizing influences upon other sociological groups in the Church. In God's economy, men must take a strong leadership role. However, to lead, men must be spiritually strong themselves.

Finally, Paul urged "the younger men to be self-controlled" (Titus 2:6). Self-control has to do with sober-mindedness or right thinking. Paul wanted the younger men to begin to grow because they are the future leaders of the church.

In summary, disorienting times require that older men pray and bring stability to the body. Young men are to practice mental discipline because these things are foundations for stability in the body.

They were attempting to escape the responsibility of their pain of loss they were experiencing. They are not alone. Many have attempted to do so by different means. Some have refused to accept the reality before them. I knew someone who lost a loved one and just could not accept the loss and thus never allowed themselves to heal from their pain. Losing something or someone of value is difficult to accept, but sometimes there is nothing we could have done to bring about a different outcome. As difficult as the loss is we have to accept it and rebuild our life to a healthy, balanced format. We are increasingly living in an environment, a culture where some are attempting to escape their individual responsibility and expect someone else to assume the responsibility that is rightfully their own. As a grief counselor / counselor it is my responsibility to support and when necessary counsel the bereaved, not take their pain or fear away, or to fix them, or to do for them what is their responsibility and ability to do for themselves.

Erich Fromm titled an examination of Nazism and authoritarianism, *Escape from Freedom*. Galatians chapter six and verse five says, For each person will (must) carry his own load. Yes, we are to bear the burden of others in sympathy while not abdicating our own burden. Aesop says a man carries two bags over his shoulder, the one with his own burden hanging behind and his neighbors in front. The difficulty lies in accepting our own responsibility because it is painful, so we seek for someone else to carry the pain instead. In so doing we give our power, our freedom to another. Mayors Sign WRAP Proclamation



Hardeman County Mayor Jimmy Sain and Bolivar Mayor Julian McTizic signed a proclamation on October 22 designating October as Domestic Violence Awareness Month.

As West Tennesseans struggle with the COVID-19 pandemic, most understand that staying at home when possible can help limit the spread of the virus and thus keep them safer. Unfortunately, for many in the community, while staying at home may keep them safer from contagion, it exposes them and their children to more abuse. The social isolation that keeps so many safer from the virus actually increases the risk of danger for those with abusive partners.

In the United States alone, one in four women will be the victim of domestic violence at some point in her lifetime, and, on average, three women are killed every day at the hands of a current or former intimate partner. In Tennessee, 85 victims were killed by an intimate partner in 2019, and we are again in the top five in the nation for domestic homicide; we have been in the top ten every single year since 2001. In West Tennessee, more than 50% of all crimes against persons are crimes of domestic violence, and of the almost 2,000 unique victims served by WRAP in 2019, more than half had at least one child. Tennessee's Sycamore Institute has indicated that Domestic Violence is in the top five adverse childhood experiences for children in Tennessee, adversity that could undermine the health and well-being of these children throughout their lives.

"Domestic abuse remains a hidden problem in our communities," Daryl Chansuthus, Executive Director of WRAP explained. "It is characterized by silence—silence from those who suffer, silence from those around them, and silence from those who perpetrate abuse. This silence is corrosive; it leaves women, children, and men carrying the burden of shame. It prevents them from speaking out about their abuse, and it prevents them from getting help. At its worst, it can be fatal. That's why National Domestic Violence Awareness Month is so important."

a meeting specifically for the sheriff to attend and explain his budget request. He stated that the budget Chairmen explained that the county could not afford a 1.4 million dollar increase and asked the sheriff to explain what he really needed in the budget in order for the committee to attempt to help him. The sheriff replied, a million dollars. Sain stated the committee told Doolen, it looked like they could not help him with that. It was noted with a timeline by Sain that Doolen had hired Attorney Herron prior to the budget meeting.

Sain also testified that he was proud of the budget committee for working hard to provide raises for the sheriff's department citing that everyone with the department had received 12% to 25% increase in salary his first four years in office.

Both the testimony offered and cross examinations were tedious, as each attorney, Shaw and Roy Herron, both had numerous objections heard by the court.

It is unknown how a ruling for either side would affect the second lawsuit filed by the sheriff in answer to the 2020-2021 county budget passed in July.

What Should Investors Know About the Election?

The upcoming election is, of course, big news. But there's more than one way to look at it. As a citizen and voter, you have your own preferences about the issues and the candidates. But as an investor, should you be rooting for any particular outcome?

You might be surprised at how a major event can have such a minor impact on your long-term investment success. To understand why, consider the following four factors:

Election results don't determine the market's success. A few different configurations can result from an election. One party could win the presidency, while the other could gain both chambers of Congress. Or one party could take the White House, but the two parties could split Congress, with one controlling the House of Representatives and the other gaining the Senate. Or one party could win it all. But here's the key point: In the past, under all these scenarios, the financial markets have done well at some times and not so well at others. In short, there's no one "right" political configuration that spells success or failure for investors.

Different policies won't change our basic investment landscape. Of course, each presidential administration will push for its own policies, and the same is true for every new Congress. And some legislation will indeed affect investors in some ways. For example, tax rates on capital gains and dividends have changed many times in the past, and they may well change again. If they do, adjustments to your investment strategy may be appropriate. But in the bigger picture, we live in a democratic system that mostly limits the power of one administration or political party to radically overhaul the economy, which is primarily made up of consumer spending and business investment. For investors, this means the rules of the game, so to speak, will probably remain consistent no matter who's in charge in Washington.

Market fundamentals are "non-partisan." Obviously, the pandemic has wreaked havoc on normalcy in many areas, including the economy. But, eventually, we will get past COVID-19, and when we do, the same fundamental factors that have always driven the economy and the markets – corporate profits, interest rates, consumer spending, innovation, productivity and so on – will do so again. And these fundamentals are non-partisan – they maintain their strength no matter what party controls the presidency or Congress.

You're in control of your own investment choices. We may well experience some volatility in the markets before and after the election. But, in the long run you, rather than any external forces or election results, control your investment success. And that means you need to follow proven investment principles, such as owning investments that reflect your goals and risk tolerance, staying invested no matter which direction the markets are moving, and avoiding bad habits such as chasing after "hot" stocks that may not be suitable for your needs.

A presidential election is important for a number of reasons – but it probably won't greatly affect your investment success. Ultimately, staying on track to achieve what's most important to you means being aware of the factors that affect the financial markets, putting them in perspective and then making appropriate decisions that are aligned with your longer-term goals.

Please contact your local SWHRA Community Service Center for information on how to apply at 731-658-9292.

Households must meet the following criteria in order to receive assistance: Must complete application and provide a current state issued identification, documentation of social security numbers for all household members and the last 30 days of gross household income; income must be within 200% of Federal Poverty Guidelines; must provide documentation of decreased income or job loss due to COVID-19 or another acceptable reason related to COVID-19;

Applications will be accepted in the SWHRA Community Service Centers starting on November 2, 2020, through November 12, 2020. Applications will be reviewed for eligibility and applicants will be notified of their status within five (5) days. Benefit is based on household size: 1 in HH - \$150; 2 in HH - \$200; or 3 or more in HH - \$300. SWHRA will have an agreement with local stores in each county in which the voucher is to be redeemed.

SWHRA will ensure that no person on the basis of handicap, race, color, religion, sex, age or national origin will be excluded from participation in, or be denied benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination in the operation of the Community Services Block Grant.

This project is funded under a grant contract with the State of Tennessee.

Chamber Offers Insurance Plan for Small Businesses

The Hardeman County Chamber of Commerce has collaborated with The Tennessee Chamber of Commerce and Industry and Aetna, a CVS Health company, and the Vanderbilt Health Affiliated Network (VHAN) to offer small businesses access to one of Aetna's self-funded health plans at a significant discount.

The plan, known as TN Chambers Health, offers businesses with two to 100 full-time eligible employees an average annual discount of \$144 per employee, according to Bradley Jackson, president of the Tennessee Chamber.

"We often hear what a challenge health coverage is for small businesses in Hardeman County and we wanted to do our part to help. Collaborating with the Tennessee Chamber of Commerce to offer our members access to the plan was the right thing to do." added Christine Korling-Torres, Executive Director of the Hardeman County Chamber of Commerce. "This plan is a great opportunity for chambers of commerce across our great state and their business members to obtain quality health care coverage and receive a sizable discount for being a chamber of commerce member." affirmed Jackson.

Association health plans such as what is being offered by the state Chamber allow smaller companies, as well as self-employed persons, to access health insurance associated with large group medical coverage by pooling together businesses to broaden the number of persons covered and spread the insurance risk.

The Aetna Funding Advantage plan also offers digital enrollment and a benefit administration platform, Attain by AetnaSM app, and free fitness classes through Peerfit to help limit costs. When a claim is lower than expected, Aetna said the business has the potential to get that money back.

The Tennessee Chamber last offered an insurance option more than a decade ago when it had a workers compensation insurance option, Jackson said. Qualifying Chamber members can obtain additional information by contacting the Hardeman County Chamber of Commerce.

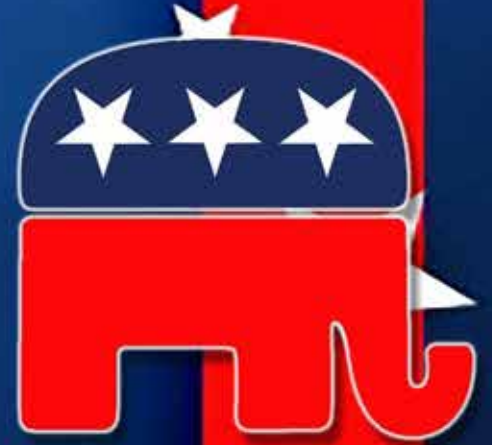
