Commission Gets Served

Hardeman County Commissioners were wanted men and women last week as deputies searched them out and served them with subpoenas to appear in regards to the John Doolen as Sheriff of Hardeman County Tennessee vs. Jimmy Sain as County Mayor.

The subpoenas also included three employees in the mayor's office and Sain himself, asking them to be deposed September 26 and 27. See inset right "Mayor to Face Contempt Allegations."

A Notice for Depositions was filed for the 20 persons on September 12, and was received by then attorney Charles M. Cary. See inset right "County Attorney Resigns Position."

According to Cary, he relayed the notice to the county mayor's office that same day.

The subpoenas asked the commissioners to appear at various times during the week of October 1-4. As of press time, no commissioner had appeared for a deposition.

The county, who according to Mayor Sain, has not officially hired a replacement attorney, has had a motion to quash the subpoenas filed by Bob Redding of Spraggins, Barnett, and Cobb in Jackson, citing "time needed for adequate representation."

The commissioners and employees of the mayor's office and the mayor were served to depose them in the lawsuit filed by Sheriff John Doolen and the Hardeman County Sheriff's Office on July 16 by attorney Roy Herron of Dresden asking for funds for "deputies, jailers, and staff, and to acquire essential crime fighting equipment."

Nineteen of the twenty subpoenas were served, the exception being Commissioner Charles Viscen Morrow, who was out of the country.

On September 27, Doolen's attorney filed a motion for a temporary injunction "prohibiting the mayor from hindering and harming crime fighting," saying Mayor Sain has refused to transfer drug funds to the Hardeman County Sheriff's account.

County Attorney Resigns Position

Hardeman County is in need of a new attorney as Charles M. "Chip" Cary announced his resignation from the post in mid-September. The move closely coincided with the announcement that the law firm of Denton and Cary will close their practice in Bolivar after 73 years.

"Attorney Cary has been a walking history book for the commission. His many years of experience as the county attorney and judge have been invaluable to us. I wish him the best with his retirement," said Hardeman County Mayor Jimmy Sain.

Harry Boyette Denton opened the law office after his licensure was approved March 12, 1946 and was joined by Harry Morris Denton. *continued on A7*

Mayor to Face Contempt Allegations

Hardeman County Mayor Jimmy Sain has been asked to appear in Selmer on October 7 to answer a possible contempt of court charge.

Sain, the complaint says, told his employees not to attend depositions and refused to appear personally but failed to notify the opposing attorney prior to their trip from Attorney Roy B. Herron's hometown of Dresden. The complaint seeks compensatory funds for the trip to Hardeman County.

The complaint asks that Mayor Sain personally be held liable for the costs incurred, instead of either the employees or the county for "willfully, intentionally, and lawlessly demanding that the county employees violate the law and rules of this Honorable Court" and that "it is unfair...to force the taxpayers of Hardeman County to incur thousands of dollars in expense."

It is unknown if the lack of an attorney for the county at the time (see above) will have any bearing on the motion.

Reynolds Recognized for Service to Bolivar Housing Authority

Mrs. Eva Reynolds, Chairperson of the Bolivar Housing Authority Board of Commissioners, was recently awarded the 2019 Commissioner of the Year award from the Tennessee Association of Housing and Redevelopment Authorities (TAHRA) at their annual meeting at the Park Vista Hotel in Gatlinburg, Tennessee. The Commissioner of the Year is a statewide award presented to a commissioner that has shown outstanding contribution for the support of the goals of public housing authorities and the residents which they serve.

In February 2010 she was appointed by the Honorable City of Bolivar Mayor Barrett Stevens to serve on the Bolivar Housing Authority Board of Commissioners and after the retirement of chairman Jerome Boyd, she was voted by her colleagues to replace him as board chairperson.

Since her association with Bolivar Housing Authority she has overseen several million dollars in capital fund improvements benefiting the residents. In order to stay informed about all the changes within the industry she attends annual meetings sponsored by TAHRA and SERC-NAHRO (Southeast Region Council of the National Association of Housing and Redevelopment Authorities) that many times include presenters from the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). She is a life long resident of Hardeman County and after her retirement from her position as secretary for the First Baptist Church-Bolivar, she continues to be involved in many volunteer projects throughout the county.

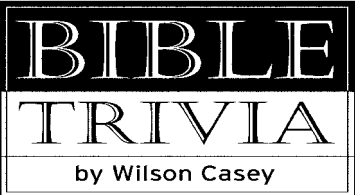

Pull Apart Pizza Sliders

Ingredients

For the sliders:

- 1 package (12) dinner rolls
- 3/4 cup pizza sauce
- 12 slices mozzarella cheese
- 45 slices pepperoni
- 1/2 cup cooked & crumbled sausage

For the herb butter topping:

- 1/2 cup butter, melted (1 stick)
- 1 tbsp grated parmesan cheese
- 1 tsp garlic salt
- 1 tsp onion powder
- 1 tbsp dried oregano
- 1/4 tsp crushed red pepper

Instructions: Preheat oven to 350f degrees. Spray the bottom of a 9x13 baking dish with nonstick cooking spray. Slice the rolls horizontally (while still attached) to make a top and bottom bun. Place bottom bun into prepared baking dish. Spread pizza sauce onto rolls.

Next, add 6 slices of cheese (covering all of the pizza sauce.) On top of the cheese layer, add all the slices of pepperoni. Sprinkle the top of the pepperoni with crumbled sausage. Add the remaining 6 slices of cheese on top. Then cover all of it with the top bun.

Now, make the seasoned buttery topping. Combine all the ingredients in a small bowl and stir well. Then, using a brush (or a spoon) spreading all over the sliders. Be sure to get the sides too! Cover with aluminum foil and bake for about 15 minutes.

FAITH

Grace, Part 10

I touched last week on themes Paul discusses in the book of Galatians. Evangelists for a “different gospel” had crept into the Galatian Church. They were teaching the necessity of ceremonial circumcision, but Paul said that people can’t be arbitrary about that.

Seeking justification in God’s sight by works requires keeping all the Law: an impossibility. As James puts it, “for whoever keeps the whole law but fails in one point has become guilty of all of it” (James 2:10).

Therefore, Paul saw law-keeping as a form of self-righteousness, as a “falling from grace,” and as returning to legalistic slavery from which the Church had been freed by the Gospel. Again, here is how Paul sums-up grace and justification. “We ourselves are Jews by birth and not Gentile sinners; yet we know that a person is not justified by works of the law but through faith in Jesus Christ, so we also have believed in Christ Jesus, in order to be justified by faith in Christ and not by works of the law,

because by works of the law no one will be justified” (Galatians 2:15-16).

That brings us to the final installment in this series. Many consider Ephesians 2 as Paul’s classic statement of the orthodox view of the Gospel. At the beginning of the chapter, he asserts that, before conversion, sinners were “dead in trespasses and sins.” Notice that he didn’t say just “sick,” or “alive but incapable,” and so on. He said that sinners were graveyard “dead” spiritually.

Then, he says a supernatural event took place: a resurrection of the dead like Christ’s being raised from the dead. How does that happen? Paul goes on to explain it as a gracious act, a gift of God. He says, “for by grace you have been saved through faith. And this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God, not a result of works, so that no one may boast (2:8-9).

As Martin Luther said, “the law works fear and wrath; grace works hope and mercy.” Jesus said, “Behold, I stand at the door and knock. If anyone hears my voice and opens the door, I will come in to him and eat with him, and he with me” (Revelation 3:20). In faith, ask the Lord for grace because the Gospel is all about grace.

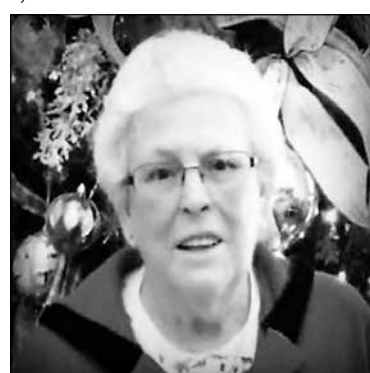

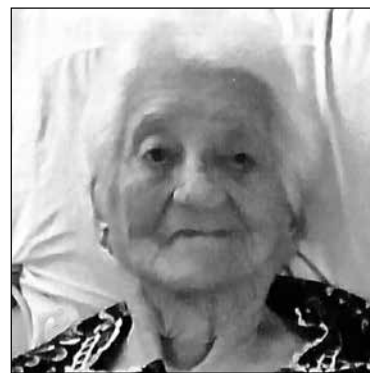

ton, licensed August 12, 1961. The firm was originally located above Bubber's Restaurant (which later became Joe's and burned in the 2007 fire on court square) before it moved to its present location in the former First Baptist Church Building.

The firm became known as Denton and Cary after Charles Cary joined in 1972, getting his license September 9, 1972. Boyette Denton graduated from Cumberland Law School and joined the firm in 1989. The other two Dentons also were graduates of Cumberland Law School, albeit in different locations.

"I got to practice law with my father," said Denton, who is currently the General Sessions Judge for the county. "That was special to me."

The partners were active in local government, with Harry Boyette Denton serving as County Clerk and Clerk and Master until 1972. Morris Denton served as a city councilman and was the city attorney for several years. Charles M. Cary served as county attorney from 1976 to present, save the years from 2003-2014 when he was the General Sessions Judge for the county.

"I grew up here and the people of the county have been very good to me. It was the perfect place for me to practice," said Cary.

Over the years, Denton and Cary employed attorneys Terry Abernathy, Mary Summers, Randi Rich, Steve Hornsby, and Blake Sain.

In closing their office, Denton and Cary posted notice that any personal files needed can be requested by calling 731-658-5170 and leaving a message with the details. The office will officially close, November 22.

According to Sain, no replacement has been named, but an informal meet and greet with attorney Lewis L. Cobb Bob Redding of Spragins, Barnett & Cobb, PLC was held October 2 in the Hardeman County Courthouse.

Approximately seven citizens and a representative of the press were asked to leave the room, citing attorney-client privilege between Mayor Sain, who said he had personally hired the firm, and the attorneys present.

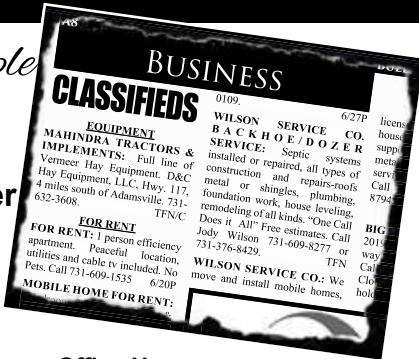

The Real ID is Coming Real Fast

Next year the REAL ID Act of 2005 will go into effect. Beginning October 1, 2020, all persons must have a REAL ID license for accessing certain Federal facilities, entering nuclear facilities, military bases, and boarding commercial flights within the United States.

The REAL ID Act of 2005 establishes minimum security standards for license issuance and production and prohibits Federal agencies from accepting for certain purposes driver licenses and identification cards from states not meeting the Act's minimum standards.

The Tennessee Department of Safety and Homeland Security (TDOSHS) began issuing REAL IDs July 1, 2019 and has issued more than 156,601 REAL ID credentials to date.

Who needs a REAL ID? Anyone who flies domestically within the United States, access a military base, or needs to enter a federal or nuclear facility after October 1, 2020 and plans to use a state-issued license or ID as a form of identification.

Is a REAL ID the only form of identification that will be accepted? A REAL ID is not the only form of identification that will be accepted. A passport or other acceptable alternative form of identification found here can be used in place of a REAL ID credential.

What documents are needed to apply for a REAL ID? To apply for a REAL ID, customers will need to bring one proof of citizenship or legal presence, one proof of full Social Security Number, and two proofs of Tennessee residency along with documentation to support any name change from your proof of citizenship document.

Where can you apply for a REAL ID? The first application for a REAL ID must be made in person at a Driver Services Center or participating County Clerk Partner. Participating locations can be found on www.tnrealid.gov.

Do you have to have a REAL ID by October 1, 2020? Tennesseans are strongly encouraged to apply for a REAL ID at least 20 days before needing to board a commercial flight within the United States, enter certain federal facilities, or enter nuclear facilities before the October 1, 2020 deadline. Your current state-issued license or ID will continue to be accepted until October 1, 2020 for these purposes.

How much is a REAL ID? A REAL ID costs the same as a standard credential. However, if you wish to obtain a REAL ID outside of your renewal period, there will be a duplicate charge of \$8-12.

What if you don't need a REAL ID? Those who do not wish to obtain a REAL ID will receive a standard credential indicated by "Not For Federal Identification" on the front of the credential. Your current or standard credential will continue to be accepted for general identification purposes such as driving, purchasing alcohol or tobacco products, applying for federal benefits, vote, and access hospitals, post offices and federal courts.



Homecoming Sweet for Tigers

Bolivar Central (1-5) got on the board for the first time this season and scored their first victory as well, beating Fayette Ware 28-18 on homecoming night at R.A. Butler Field.

"We got one," said Bolivar Head Coach Montrell Craft. "We've still got work to do, but we got one."

The Tigers scored with 5:46 left in the first quarter of play as Omar Jones ran it in from two yards out. Jones, who gained 107 yards in 12 carries and a touchdown, became the first 100-yard rusher in a Bolivar Central game since Jalen Crisp had 142 yards in week nine of the 2018 season.

Bolivar scored in each quarter, pulling away to lead 28-12 with 11:41 left in the game on a Tyler Rice to Adarius Clark 13 yard touchdown pass. Fayette Ware scored late, but did not threaten again. Rice was 6-12 for 72 yards with two touchdowns before leaving the game in the third quarter with an injury. Rayveon Gibbs ran for 77 yards and a touchdown, caught two passes for 22 yards, including another touchdown and intercepted a pass to earn the Vaughan Oil Player of the Game.

Consider Some Year-end Investment Tax Moves

It may be hard to believe, but we're getting close to wrapping up 2019. And if you have a year-end to-do list, here's one more item you might want to add: Lower your investment-related taxes. To help meet this goal, consider these moves you could make before year-end:

Increase your 401(k) contributions. If your employer allows it, add some money to your 401(k) before the year is out. (You can put up to \$19,000 in your 401(k) or similar plan for 2019, or \$25,000 if you're 50 or older.) If you fund your 401(k) with pre-tax dollars, the more you put in, the lower your taxable income. After-tax contributions, such as those for a Roth 401(k), won't result in tax savings for 2019 (but should reduce taxes in future years).

Add to your IRA. You've got until the April tax filing deadline to contribute to your IRA for 2019, but why wait until the last minute? You can put up to \$6,000 in your IRA for the year, or \$7,000 if you're 50 or older. With a traditional IRA, your contributions may be deductible, depending on your income; with a Roth IRA, contributions aren't deductible, but your earnings can grow tax-free, provided you meet certain conditions.

Donate some investments. Recent tax law changes have resulted in far fewer people itemizing their deductions. However, if itemizing still makes sense in your situation, you might want to consider donating an investment that has gained value since you purchased it to one of the charitable groups you support. You will generally be able to deduct the fair market value of the investment, and you can avoid paying capital gains taxes on the appreciation.

Consider selling investments to realize capital losses. You may have taxable capital gains, either from selling investments that have increased in value or simply from owning mutual funds (mutual fund managers constantly buy and sell individual investments within the funds). These capital gains could increase the amount of taxes you owe. If you own some investments that have lost value since you purchased them, selling them would generate capital losses that could be used to offset capital gains. Further, if you have more losses than gains, you can use up to \$3,000 of your losses to offset ordinary income.

Keep in mind that selling an investment may change the allocation and performance of your portfolio. Also, just because an investment is down in value is not necessarily a reason to sell. And once you sell an investment to generate a capital loss, you need to wait at least 31 days to repurchase it to avoid incurring what's known as a "wash sale." Your financial professional can help you determine if selling any investments makes sense for your situation.

Before making any of these moves, you'll also want to consult with your tax professional. And remember that while taxes are a consideration, they should not necessarily drive your investment decisions. When investing, you need to build a portfolio that's appropriate for your risk tolerance and time horizon and that can help you achieve your goals, such as a comfortable retirement.

Still, if you can make some tax-smart investment moves before the year is out, you may well reap the benefits next April.
