School Report Shows Progress Using TCAP testing data, including math, and performance. While we have more work to do, the recently released accountability ratings

English language arts, and science, the Hardeman County schools came out with a 2018 Satisfactory Rating by the Tennessee Department of Education. Ratings were given as Exemplary, Advancing, Satisfactory, or Need of Improvement.

For 2017, Hardeman County was listed as "progressing," which were for "Districts that are improving but not meeting the growth expectation for all students and historically underserved student groups, on average."

"With all the challenges and interruptions associated with last year's testing program, I am proud of our students and teachers for their effort published by the Tennessee Department of Education demonstrate that our students and staff didn't quit...they didn't give up and were determined to give a positive accounting for the work they had done all year long. That type of 'never quit' attitude is hard to measure by a standardized test, but I believe this attitude to be a key part of the success we did have this past year," said SuChester (Advancing), Haywood (Satisfactory), and Fayette (Advancing). Statewide, fourteen districts were exemplary, eighty were rated advancing, and twenty-six were in the need improvement category.

The 2015, 2014, and 2012 ratings showed Hardeman County as "In Need of Subgroup Improvement."

Hardeman County was not listed in the 2013 rankings and no statewide rankings were done in

The state ranking categories have changed each year since 2012, although most years have contained the terms "exemplary" and "need of improvement" as ratings.

perintendent of Schools, Warner Ross. 2016. Hardeman County was one of twenty-six schools listed as Satisfactory for 2018. School districts in surrounding counties were Madision (Satisfactory), McNairy (Need of Improvement),

Al Green and the Hard Times Band



Not to be confused with the world-famous Rev. Al Green, this homegrown talent is a Bolivar Central High Class of 88 graduate that grew up in Frogtown, right in the heart of Bolivar. Green left Bolivar for a short stint at Tennessee State University before deciding to travel abroad. He moved to Hawaii, then migrated to Australia discovering new people and cultures before making his way back to Nashville.

Green would soon discover a hidden talent and forge a musical partnership with a couple of other Music City transplants from Ohio and New Jersey. It was instant chemistry and soon two albums were written and recorded. Regular gigs throughout Nashville's lower Broadway scene and many other clubs across Tennessee cemented the fiery and improvisational nature of the band that is now Al Green and The Hard Times.

Green says he was influenced by all kinds of music and artist including Blues, Rock and Roll and County music by greats like James Brown, Bobby Blue Bland, Elvis, Johnny Cash, George Strait and may others. "I love it all" says Green who is extra excited about performing for the first time in his home town. Being the featured artist at the season finale of the inaugural Open Air on the Square series is a dream come true. And, this is his 30th Class Reunion year, that makes it extra special.



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

The Maxwell's Stay-at-Home Gourmet

Rustic Cabbage Soup

Ingredients

1 pinch salt

1 tablespoon extra virgin olive oil

1/2-pound potatoes (skin on, cut 1/4-inch pieces) 4 cloves garlic (chopped)

1/2 yellow onion (large, thinly sliced)

5 cups stock (see head notes)

1 1/2 cups white beans (precooked or canned, drained & rinsed well) 1/2 cabbage (medium, cored and sliced into 1/4-inch ribbons)

Extra virgin olive oil (more good-quality, for drizzling) 1/2 cup parmesan cheese (freshly grated)

Directions

Warm the olive oil in a large thick-bottomed pot over medium-high heat. Stir in the salt and potatoes. Cover and cook until they are a bit tender and starting to brown a bit, about 5 minutes - it's okay to uncover to stir a couple times.

Stir in the garlic and onion and cook for another minute or two. Add the stock and the beans and bring the pot to a simmer. Stir in the cabbage and cook for a couple more minutes, until the cabbage softens up a bit. Now adjust the seasoning - getting the seasoning right is important or your soup will taste flat and uninteresting. Taste and add more salt if needed, the amount of salt you will need to add will depend on how salty your stock is.

Serve drizzled with a bit of olive oil and a generous dusting of cheese.

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

A Danish philosopher and theologian, Soren Kierkegaard believed in an existential approach to Christianity and it revolved around God, grace, love and loving-kindness. This epitomizes the love of a parent toward their child.

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The Bible and Race (Part One)

There are a great many genuine Christians who sincerely love their Lord Jesus and treasure His Word, but they do not know what the Word says about race. Other less divine influences have formed their racial beliefs, opinions, and attitudes. Their racial beliefs have sprung from the wells of their upbringings, their experiences, the culture of their communities, their education, the media, their relationships, and possibly other influences. As important as these factors may be in the formation of one's personhood, as a Christian, it is the Bible that must form our core values and beliefs.

I want to share with you a burden that God laid on my heart a few years ago. God made it so heavy for me that I spent almost four years studying race and racism in the Bible and ended up writing my doctoral dissertation on this vitally important subject. For the next four weeks, I want to walk you through a biblical survey of what God says about race in His Word. Prayerfully, it will further open our eyes, touch our hearts, make the churches more of an authentic reflection of God's beautiful image, and please our Lord.

Let's start in Genesis. On the sixth day of creation God said, "Let us make man in our image, in our likeness..." (Genesis 1:26). Then He blessed them and said to them, "Be fruitful and increase in number; fill the earth and subdue it." (Genesis 1:28). Genesis 3:20 says that Eve was the mother of us all and Acts 17:26 says, "From one man God made every nation of men." They are our parents—our common ancestors. God's image in them contained every race and they reflected the awesome beauty of God.

But sin... The ancient enemy saw the unity that people shared with each other and the fellowship they had with God and he hated it. He tempted them, they fell, and the consequences of that sin was separation, death, and brokenness (Genesis 3). Mankind changed. Sin and death entered the world and became an ever- present and ever-increasing reality for humankind. Cain killed Abel (Genesis 4:8). Lamech killed a man who wounded him (Genesis 4:23). Sin and violence became so prevalent that "God said to Noah, 'I am going to put an end to all people, for the earth is filled with violence because of them." (Genesis 6:13). God did flood the earth. He spared only Noah, his wife, his three sons—Shem, Ham, and Japheth—and their wives (Genesis 7:13).

After the flood, the human population of the earth consisted of one large family. As that family grew, it migrated to a plain and settled there. They made a corporate decision to build a tower of mud bricks with tar used as mortar. Their reason for building this tower and that city was stated in Genesis 11:3, 4: "So that we may make a name for ourselves and not be scattered over the face of the whole earth." This was rebellion against God's command to Adam and Eve in Genesis 1:28. It was a command repeated again to Noah in Genesis 9:1, "Then God blessed Noah and his sons, saying to them, 'Be fruitful and increase in number and fill the earth." Because those people in the city that was eventually named Babel rebelled against the Lord, He confused their language so that they could not understand one

Why did He do this? The Lord's statement in Genesis 11:6 gives us the answer: "If as one people speaking the same language they have begun to do this, then nothing they plan to do will be impossible for them." God's image gave them limitless potential. That potential was tainted by sin. Having just flooded the earth, God did not wish to see an evil, badly corrupted populace rise up again. For our own sake, He separated us by languages, territories, and eventually racial distinctiveness.

Does this mean we should remain separate? Heavens no! Please turn to this page again next week where we will continue with the biblical story of what God has done and is doing to bring us back to Himself and one another.

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Amos: A Prophet for Us - Part 3 by Jeff Capshaw

In this series I have emphasized reading the Bible as a covenantal-religious book and the importance of the Old Testament as historically and necessarily part of the Church's authoritative Scripture.

I also highlighted important background issues related to Amos' prophecy. For example, he wasn't part of the religious-political establishment but a farmer and shepherd who preached to the common people during a relatively peaceful and prosperous time in Israel's history. He employs sophisticated literary techniques to enhance his message. Further, Amos is a covenant enforcer and preacher: not a fortune teller looking into a crystal ball. His concerns are the LORD's concerns: faithfulness to the covenant.

Amos begins with a series of judgements condemning the sins of surrounding pagan nations (1:2-2:3). However, when it appears that the covenantal communities will escape his rebuke, Amos abruptly shifts the focus to Judah and then Israel. Of Judah he says, . . . they have rejected the law of the Lord, and have not kept his statutes....(2:4). One can almost hear Israel saying, "let them have it, Amos"! But neither is Israel innocent; they too are guilty of covenant violations.

He reminds Israel of the LORD's covenantal faithfulness to promises made to Abraham centuries before, specifically expelling her enemies from the promised land and redemption from bondage in Egypt (2:9-11). He further reminds them of other blessings, and I raised up some of your sons for prophets, and some of your young men for Nazirites (2:11). Thus, Israel was never without covenantal messengers (prophets) or living examples of covenant-keepers (Nazirites). Therefore, covenant violations are inexcusable!

Instead of adherence to the prophetic call for justice, especially toward the poor and oppressed, Israel . . . sells the righteous for silver, and the needy for a pair of sandals. They trample the head of the poor into the dust of the earth and turn aside the way of the afflicted . . . (2:6b-7a). Instead of following the Nazarite example of covenantal faithfulness and holiness, Israel encouraged them to violate their vows. Finally, instead of encouragement of and compliance with the LORD's messengers, Israel commanded the prophets, saying, you shall not prophesy (2:12).

Although Israel knew the LORD's covenant stipulated blessings for obedience and harsh consequences for disobedience, they "heard" but chose not "to do." For the New Testament writer, James, this amounts to self-deception (James 1:22). What about us?



Understanding Risk Tolerance Is **Essential for Investment Success**

To succeed as an investor, you might think you need to know about the economy, interest rates and the fundamentals of companies in which you'd like to invest. And all these things are indeed important. But it's most essential to know yourself. Specifically, you need to know how much risk you are willing to tolerate to achieve your goals.

Of course, you've lived with yourself your entire life, so you probably have a pretty good idea of your likes and dislikes and what makes you comfortable or uncomfortable. But investing can be a dif-

Initially, you may believe you have a high tolerance for risk, but if the financial markets drop sharply, and you see that you've sustained some sizable losses (at least on paper - you haven't really "lost" anything until you sell investments for less than what you paid for them), how will you feel? If you find yourself constantly fretting over these losses, perhaps even losing sleep over them, you might realize your risk tolerance is not as high as you thought. In this case, you may need to scale back the part of your portfolio devoted to growth in favor of a more balanced approach.

On the other hand, if you believe yourself to have a low risk tolerance, and you start off investing in a conservative manner, you may indeed minimize short-term losses – but you also might find yourself frustrated over the slow growth of your portfolio. So you may decide that being highly risk-averse carries its own risk - the risk of not making enough progress to achieve your long-term financial goals. To reduce this risk, you may need to tilt your portfolio somewhat toward more growth opportunities.

In short, you may have to invest for a while before you truly understand your response to risk. But even then, don't get too locked in to one approach – because your risk tolerance may evolve over time.

When you are first starting out in your career, and for many years after, you are probably investing primarily to accumulate assets for retirement. Consequently, you may need to include a relatively high proportion of growth-oriented vehicles, such as stocks, in your portfolio. While stock prices will always fluctuate, you will have many years, perhaps decades, to overcome short-term losses, so you can possibly afford to take on a greater risk level in exchange for the potentially higher returns offered by stocks and stock-based invest-

However, things can change once you reach retirement. At this stage of your life, your overall investment focus may shift from accumulation to income. This means you will need to start selling some investments to boost your cash flow - and you won't want to sell when prices are down. (Remember the first rule of investing: "Buy low and sell high.") To help avoid these "fire sales," you may want to adjust your investment mix by adding more income-producing vehicles and reducing your holdings in growth-oriented ones. By doing so, you will be lowering your overall risk level. Keep in mind, though, that even in retirement, you will need some exposure to growth investments to help you stay ahead of inflation.

Become familiar with your own risk tolerance – it can play a big role in your investment decisions.

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

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ardeman County Schools Get Safety Gran

Hardeman County was designated to receive over \$150,000 as part of over \$1 million in state grants for school districts in Senator Dolores Gresham's District 26 to improve school safety and security. This year the General Assembly included \$35 million in the 2018/2019 state budget for school safety, following recommendations from Governor Haslam's School Safety Working Group in which Gresham was a member. Hardeman County is receiving \$44,020 in recurring funds and \$110,060 in non-recurring funds to address access control, visitor management and SRO as identified areas of need.

"Our students deserve to work and learn in an environment where they feel safe, and I am pleased to see this funding going to schools in my district," said Gresham. "Because different school districts have different needs to properly address school safety, in the School Safety Working Group we recommended districts receive funds after a security assessment identified their specific areas of need."

"Our district is fortunate to receive additional funding from Governor Haslam's FY 2019 budget. With the recurring portion of the funds, we will be increase our partnership with the Hardeman County Sheriff's department to add an additional School Resource Officer. We have conducted site security assessments across all campuses and have begun using those assessments in implementing additional security hardware, software and infrastructure measures to help continue to improve the overall security environment for our students and community."

In order to apply for grant funding, local school officials partnered with the Tennessee Department of Safety and Homeland Security, the Department of Education, and local law enforcement to complete safety assessments for school facilities and safety procedures. This was the first time the state led a comprehensive effort to determine the

following this assessment, all school districts were eligible to apply for two grants to receive funding for local safety and security needs.

Additionally, as a result of the working group recommendations, the Department of Safety and Homeland Security is working to secure a developer to complete a statewide school safety mobile application. The application will be designed for use by students, faculty and staff to anonymously report concerning or suspicious behavior to local law enforcement and school officials.

"I appreciate the work of local officials for securing these funds and promptly completing assessments with the Department of Safety and Homeland Security and the Department of Education. These grants will enhance the learning environment of all students and I look forward to continuing the conversation of how to best improve the safety and security of our schools," added Gresham.

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

BES Brings Constitution Week to Life



Bolivar Elementary School was recently, if briefly, the home of the Constitutional Convention. During Constitution Week, September 17-21, students watched in awe as history came to life. Third through fifth grades at BES were treated to a tour of an Independence Hall exhibit featuring third grade teachers as historical figures Betsy Ross, Benjamin Franklin, George Washington, Patrick Henry, and James Madison.

Nestled on the stage of the BES gymnasium was a scene straight out of 1787 Philadelphia. The students' tour guide gave a thorough breakdown of the events leading to the momentous day for the United States. While tour guide and third grade teacher, Mrs. Katie Rickman, helped students settle into the experience, the historical figures remained frozen in place until Mrs. Rickman activated each figure by stepping on a "button."

Students were mystified as each of these significant and famous individuals rose from their wax figure-like states and spoke in earnest of their lives, the Constitution, and its importance to the then young country. Betsy Ross, portrayed by Mrs. Cherie Bryant, explained her contribution to the first flag complete with a demonstration of how to cut from paper the five-pointed star now featured on Old Glory.

Benjamin Franklin, as depicted by Ms. Stacy Moore,

emphasized his role in the historical event while explaining he was the oldest member of the delegation. George Washington (Mrs. Shelby Wells) introduced students to the notion that he was actually a shy peacemaker despite achieving such notable status in the United States.

Patrick Henry (Mrs. April Pulliam) struck a chord with students as he vehemently announced his decision to not sign the document unless a bill of rights was included. James Madison, portrayed by Ms. Connie Neisler, stressed his role as the Father of the Constitution. Following each speech, the five members of the exhibit returned to their statue-like states to the amazement of the students watching.

Jackson State Gets Perfect Score

Students in Jackson State's Radiologic Technology Program achieved a 100 percent pass rate in the most recent semester, a testament to the program's longevity and success.

Each of the 21 students who finished the program in August passed the national certification exam on his or her first attempt. The program has produced a 100 percent pass rate on first attempt in six of the last eight years.

"We strive for 100 percent every year," said Kim Benson, Program Director and Associate Professor for Radiography. "It says to a prospective student that the program is doing what it is designed to do. It is teaching you the skills you need to become an entry-level radiographer."

Success can be attributed to the program's faculty, hospital affiliations, and the instructors and technologists who work beside students for more than 1,700 of their required clinical hours.

Students also work hard to pass the certification exam on the first attempt so they can begin their careers.

"The students realize this is their chosen profession, therefore they work diligently to succeed," Benson said.

When Jackson State's Radiologic Technology Program began in 1969, it was the first collegebased associate degree radiography program in Tennessee and the third in the United States. It was formed to meet a growing need of X-ray technologists to serve



West Tennessee. At the time, most people in the profession worked in larger cities.

The program has consistently produced competent graduates who remain in the area as part of the health care workforce. And last year, students moved into the new Jim and Janet Ayers Center for Health Sciences, which has new equipment with the latest technology that mirrors what students will use in the workplace.

The program received the most advanced X-ray equipment of any educational system in Tennessee, Benson said. Besides a first-generation digital X-ray unit that students had been using, the lab now has a second-generation digital X-ray unit, as well as two mobile X-ray units. The equipment is the same, if not more advanced, than what students will encounter in a

clinical setting. "It has made a world of dif-

ference," Benson said. "They're going to be well prepared in the workforce because of the equipment we have here."

The success of radiography students at Jackson State is not uncommon in other programs. In 2017, every student who graduated from the school's nursing program passed the National Council Licensure Examination on his or her first attempt. The achievement earned praise from the Tennessee Board of Nursing.

Jackson State Community College provides accessible learning opportunities that enhance the lives of individuals, strengthen the workforce and empower the diverse communities of West Tennessee. The institution offers traditional and contemporary associate degrees, certificates, continuing education and enrichment, and college-readiness programs.

ACT Prep Class Offered

"Taking Alex's class will help you understand how to manage your time throughout each part of the test," said a former student. "After a session with him, you will feel more at ease about the ACT."





