The Truck That Stopped The Trial

A conclusion to testimony in the more-than-a-year long salary dispute case by the Hardeman County Sheriff's Department seemed in sight, but vehicle trouble for Chancellor Tony Childress eventually resulted in the case being continued until a later date. At press time, no new dates had been released.

The day was to begin with attorney Amber Shaw beginning her defense, but with Chancellor Childress stuck in Jackson, no arguements were heard on October 7.

Attorney Roy Herron, representing Hardeman County Sheriff John Doolen, had called Hardeman County Sheriff's Department Administrative Captain Brian Vandiver, Chief Deputy Greg Moore, **If You've Tried to Ignore This for 15 Months...** Following the passing of the 2019-2020 budget, Hardeman County Sheriff John Doolen sued for more support in July of 2019.

The issue was seemingly settled in October 2019 after then Hardeman County Attorney Chip Cary and Attorney Roy Herron came to an agreement. Cary presented it to the county commission in a special called meeting as the sheriff's department, who originally sought and sued for approximately \$1.4 million dollars, settled for \$102,000.

At the October 8, 2019 meeting, the vote went 13-1 in favor of ending the lawsuit with the settlement. While both sides claimed lack of adherence to the settlement terms, Attorney Amber Griffin Shaw filed a Motion to Set Aside the Consent Order on behalf of Sain on February 10, citing numerous problems with the consent order. Herron eventually gave up on the settlement, setting up the September and October 2020 trial dates.

Vandiver, Moore, and Doolen were questioned as to the efficiency, needs, and requests of the department, while Overton's testimony was limited to his study on the salaries of employees of the sheriff's department.

Waiting for four days of trial to testify were eight persons held by Herron, including budget committee members Junior Jimmerson and chairman Jerry Watkins, commissioners Jackie Sain and Johnny Lanier, who are also on the budget committee; commissioners Justin Howell, Mark Gilliam, and mayor's office employees Carly Weems and Linda Ervin. None were called to testify prior to Herron resting his case.

Around this time of year at the Yellow House, spirits were running higher than normal, the reason being that the first bale (sometimes the only one) of cotton had been taken to the gin and the family had a "little extra" in the usually strained finance department. Mom would get the Sears and Roebuck catalog and prepare the annual fall ordering of our winter clothes. Even though my mind was set on some fancy jacket, pants or shirt, I had to settle for a couple of flannel shirts, a pair of overalls or jeans. We called these catalogs "wish books", and in our case that is definitely what they were. Us kids would gather around Mom and that catalog like it was Santa Claus. At times, I've seen Mom while flipping the pages, hesitate on a page of fancy womens dresses for a moment. I knew she was wishing too. When

I think about those times, it reminds me of a popular Merle Haggard song titled, "Mammas Hungry Eyes". Mom and Dad both did without, in order for us kids to have dire essentials that we needed. I remember Mom telling me that there had been times when her and Dad had not eaten a meal in order for us kids to have something to eat.

I stand amazed at the undying love and sacrifices of parents for their kids. Usually this time of the year, we would receive the Sears Christmas catalog. To us, this was the most beautiful book there was. It was chocked full of every kind of toy imagineable. We would sit for hours looking at this book, sometimes fussing over who would get it next. After about a week it's pages were worn thin, as we studied it more than our school books. We knew that we would never get any of those toys for Christmas, but just looking at them, was somehow in our dreams, like having them.

SHWRA Offers Rent and Mortgage Assistance

Southwest Human Resource Agency is now accepting applications for rent or mortgage assistance from income eligible persons who have experienced a qualifying circumstance related to COVID-19. Please contact your local SWHRA Community Service Center for information on how to apply at (731)658-9292.

Households must meet the following criteria in order to receive assistance: Must complete application and provide a current state issued identification, documentation of social security numbers for all household members and the last 30 days of gross household income; income must be within 200% of Federal Poverty Guidelines; must provide documentation of decreased income or job loss due to COVID-19 or another acceptable reason related to COVID-19.

Rental assistance requires an eviction notice from the landlord. Those applying for mortgage assistance must provide a

past due notice. Applicants will not be eligible if they have received assistance within the past 12 months through any SWHRA rental or mortgage program. Benefit includes one-month's rent or mortgage payment up to \$1,200.00

SWHRA will ensure that no person on the basis of handicap, race, color, religion, sex, age or national origin will be excluded from participation in, or be denied benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination in the operation of the LIHEAP program.

The Call of Wisdom, Part 2

by Jeff Capshaw

This and last week's lessons are from Proverbs 8, a familiar chapter in the Old Testament regarding Wisdom. Here Wisdom is personified as a woman crying out to be heard universally by all.

It opens with "does not Wisdom call? Does not understanding raise her voice"? The writer proceeds to elaborate on the nature and contents of Wisdom's call. He wants readers to hear Lady Wisdom's exposition of the need, value, and benefits of getting Wisdom. Last week's column covered the first 13 verses. This week's lesson takes in the balance of the chapter.

There is a half-dozen or so larger themes on Wisdom in verses 14-36. The first one pertains to political leaders and justice. "By me kings reign, and rulers decree what is just; by me princes rule, and nobles, all who govern justly" (vv. 15-16, 20). Thus, without Wisdom, there can be no objective justice for people. Instead, justice devolves into whatever a particular interest group or leader decides it to be.

The next theme pertains to

Begin by David Coy Whatever the circumstances we may come to a position in our life when we are overwhelmed. We might

a familiar refrain in Proverbs: Wisdom's value. "Riches and honor are with me, enduring wealth and righteousness. My fruit is better than gold, even fine gold, and my yield than choice silver" (vv. 18-19, 21). Again, Wisdom is juxtaposed to material wealth and is considered to be of more and lasting value.

The third and most voluminous theme in this chapter is the age or near eternality of Wisdom. According to the writer, "the LORD possessed me at the beginning of his work, the first of his acts of old. Ages ago I was set up, at the first, before the beginning of the earth" (vv. 22-23). Thus, Wisdom isn't a recent innovation; it has been around from eternity past because Wisdom is an early work of the Creator. Verses 24-31 in a highly poetic style go on to emphasize Wisdom's near co-existence with the eternal God himself.

The final part of the poem is the rhetorical payoff. It is the so-what of all the preceding verses. He writes, "and now, O sons, listen to me: blessed are those who keep my

livelihood because of anarchist violence in the streets of our sister cities. On top of this some have probably

lost loved ones as well. All this and we are worried about our elderly loved ones and those with co-morbidity

ways. Hear instruction and be wise, and do not neglect it. Blessed is the one who listens to me, watching daily at my gates, waiting beside my doors. For whoever finds me finds life and obtains favor from the LORD, but he who fails to find me injures himself; all who hate me love death" (vv. 32-36).

Therefore, if personal blessings are desired, then don't neglect understanding what Wisdom looks like, and work to acquire. If one desires a better quality of life, then consider the value of Wisdom. Material things can only do so much. True happiness happens inside a person, not because of the eternal.

Finally, if long life and freedom from self-harm are desirable, then the odds of achieving those are increased by listening to, understanding, loving, acquiring, and acting on godly Wisdom.



Rustic Cabbage Soup

Ingredients

1 tablespoon extra virgin olive oil 1 pinch salt 1/2-pound potatoes (skin on, cut 1/4-inch pieces) 4 cloves garlic (chopped) 1/2 yellow onion (large, thinly sliced) 5 cups stock (see head notes) 1 1/2 cups white beans (precooked or canned, drained & rinsed well) 1/2 cabbage (medium, cored and sliced into 1/4-inch ribbons) Extra virgin olive oil (more good-quality, for drizzling) 1/2 cup parmesan cheese (freshly grated)

Directions

Warm the olive oil in a large thick-bottomed pot over medium-high heat. Stir in the salt and potatoes. Cover and cook until they are a bit tender and starting to brown a bit, about 5 minutes - it's okay to uncover to stir a couple times.

Stir in the garlic and onion and cook for another minute or two. Add the stock and the beans and bring the pot to a simmer. Stir in the cabbage and cook for a couple more minutes, until the cabbage softens up a bit. Now adjust the seasoning - getting the seasoning right is important or your soup will taste flat and uninteresting. Taste and add more salt if needed, the amount of salt you will need to add will depend on how salty your stock is.

Serve drizzled with a bit of olive oil and a generous dusting of cheese.





Two area groups are working to provide food for those either unable to buy or at risk to go out and purchase needed supplies.

University of Tennessee Extension's Hardeman Healthy Outreach has again secured family food boxes for distribution at First Baptist Church in Middleton. This distribution is open to all residents of Hardeman County. Food boxes will include fresh fruits and vegetables, dairy products, and meat products. Five hundred (500) boxes will be available each day.

As part of the Coronavirus Food Assistance Program, the United States Department of Agriculture is again purchasing and distributing agricultural products to those in need through a network of regional distributors who package products into family-sized boxes. These foods were purchased through the USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service and have kept farmers and ranchers in business despite closure of restaurants and disruption to other routine dining venues.

The distributions will be held Tuesday, October 13 and Thursday, October 15 beginning at 9 a.m. Participants are asked to stay in their vehicles upon arrival and not to begin lining up until 8 a.m. No pre-registration is required. There is a three-box limit per vehicle.

"First Baptist Church in Middleton was a willing partner in our first distribution. We chose to work with them again because that area of the county is not served by a larger food pantry or distribution opportunity," said Stephanie Middleton, UT Extension program assistant, who organized the distribution.

Organizations, such as churches, may request a larger number of boxes that they are welcome to distribute to those unable to drive to the location. In this situation, boxes may be reserved by calling Stephanie Middleton at 731-658-2421 or 910-770-5248 before the distribution date.

This project is funded by the CDC's High Obesity Program (HOP) through The University of Tennessee Extension to improve access to food and physical activity opportunities throughout Hardeman County. For more information, go to @BeMoreHardeman on Facebook.

The purpose of this program is to assist individuals over 62 or adults with compromised immune systems get their groceries delivered to their designated location. 
