III-Time Mayor Plan Moves Alo

The committee appointed by Mayor Julian McTizic to consider changing the structure of the City of Bolivar government returned their recommendation at the regularly scheduled meeting of the city council on September 14.

With the projected June 30, 2021 announced retirement of long-time City Manager Shelia Dellinger, the city had the opportunity to consider options for the future, such as eliminating the position of city manager and instead having a full-time mayor do many of the duties.

The committee, consisting of Chairperson Suzanne Rhea, Melvin Golden, Larry Crawford, and Carole Spinks presented their findings to the city council, asking that the city make the mayor full-time starting in 2021, as well as doubling the salaries of the city council members. See inset When, Who, and How Much for details.

Currently, the city charter directs that the mayor be paid \$9,600 a year and city council members receive \$3,000 per anum, figures that have not changed for at least the last fifteen years.

The full-time mayor position and the council raises will require no new money, according to the committee, as Dellinger's salary, a not-filled clerk position, and a new employee

Whiteville Gets CDBG Grant

State Senator Dolores Gresham announced that a major Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) totaling \$630,000 has been awarded to Whiteville for sewer system improvements. Gresham made the announcement in conjunction with one by Governor Bill Lee and the Department of Economic and Community



Development regarding the award of CDBG grants statewide.

"I am pleased Whiteville will receive this grant and congratulate our local officials for submitting a successful application and our Department of Economic and Community Development for recognizing the need," said Senator Gresham. The vote went 7-0 on both ordinances. Councilman Larry Crawford was not in attendance at the meeting.

A second reading, public hearing, and second vote is required to put the proposed changes into effect. All three are scheduled for the next meeting of the council on October 12.

The ordinance, to be put into effect for the 2021 election, needs to be approved at least 60 days prior to the qualifying deadline for the election, which will be in February. The Bolivar City Elections are scheduled for May 18, 2021.



Ingredients

1 cup butter 6 ounces unsweetened chocolate, coarsely chopped 2 cups sugar 4 eggs 2 teaspoons vanilla 1 1/3 cups all-purpose flour 1/2 teaspoon baking soda 1 cup miniature chocolate pieces 1 cup vanilla frosting

Directions

In a medium saucepan combine butter and unsweetened chocolate. Cook and stir over low heat until melted; cool slightly. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Line a 15x10x1-inch baking pan with foil, extending the foil over edges of pan. Grease foil; set pan aside.

Stir sugar into chocolate mixture. Add eggs, one at a time, beating with a wooden spoon after each addition just until combined. Stir in vanilla. In a small bowl stir together flour and baking soda. Add flour mixture to chocolate mixture, stirring just until combined. Stir in semisweet chocolate pieces. Pour batter into the prepared baking pan, spreading evenly.

Bake for 18 minutes. Cool in pan on a wire rack. Using the edges of the foil, lift brownies out of pan. Using a 3- to 4-inch football-shape or other cookie cutter, cut out brownies. (Or cut brownies into rectangles.)

Spoon Creamy Vanilla Frosting into a decorating bag fitted with a small round tip. Pipe frosting onto brownies to decorate. Let stand until frosting is set.

In a storage container layer brownie between sheets of waxed paper. Cover tightly and let stand at room temperature overnight.





The Tennessee Department of Health is improving the format for sharing of data on COVID-19 to update how some metrics are calculated and reflect evolving knowledge of the pandemic. The new format began September 3, and reflect a change in how active cases are calculated and a correction in county of residence for some cases. In addition, TDH is adding new resources including data snapshots for each county and a Critical Indicators Report.

"We're pleased to be adding new reports to help support rapid public health actions in Tennes-



see communities," said Tennessee Health Commissioner Lisa Piercey, MD, MBA, FAAP. "We also want to promote data transparency and help Tennesseans understand the reason case counts for some counties will change as we correct information based on their addresses."

TDH case count reports will include figures for "Inactive/Recovered" cases and will no longer include data for "Recovered" cases. "Inactive/Recovered" cases will include people who are 14 days or more beyond their illness onset date (or, for asymptomatic cases, their specimen collection date). This will more closely align with what is now understood about the infectious period of COVID-19, as recent data from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention show most patients with COVID-19 are no longer infectious after 10 days. Previously, TDH considered a case recovered after a 21-day period.

TDH is also correcting discrepancies in county location for about 1,700 cases, as the county to which they were originally assigned does not correspond correctly to their street addresses. This can occur in laboratory reports because some lab systems automatically assign county location based on the patient's ZIP code, which may be incorrect if the ZIP code straddles county lines. These cases will be corrected all at once, which will result in case count changes for some counties. A solution is in place to automate this process in the future.

Open Enrollment Choices Can Have Big Financial Impact

It's that time of year again, where, if you work for a medium-to-large employer, you've got some decisions to make because it's open enrollment time. Of course, depending on your situation, you may have been working remotely for a while, but, even so, you will likely have the opportunity to review your benefits package and make changes. And you'll want to make the right moves, because your choices can have a big financial impact on your life.

So, take a close look at these key areas of your benefits program:

Health insurance - Think about your health care needs over the coming year - will you or someone in your family be coping with a chronic illness or facing a surgery? Will you need to at least consider testing and possible treatment for COVID-19? In any case, make sure you're choosing the right plan for your needs. And pay close attention to any changes in your health insurance, such as whether the plan's provider networks have changed – you may want to make sure your own doctor is still in-network. Also, check to see if you can reduce your health care premiums by taking part in a wellness program or health-risk assessment.

Life insurance - Your employer may offer a group life insurance policy for free, or for a small amount. It's probably worth your while to take this coverage, but it may not be enough for your needs. If you only had this group policy, but your family situation has recently changed through marriage or the addition of a new child, you may well need to add some private insurance.

Disability insurance - In addition to offering group life insurance, your employer may provide short-term disability insurance as an employee benefit. Like group insurance, this disability coverage may not cost you anything, but it may not be adequate - typically, shortterm disability only replaces part of your income for three to six months. And while you may never need to miss work for an extended period of time, you never can tell - after all, more than one in four 20-year-olds will become disabled before they retire, according to the U.S. Social Security Administration. You may want to consider purchasing your own long-term disability policy on top of the coverage offered by your employer.

Retirement plan - You can probably make changes to your 401(k) or similar employersponsored retirement plan at any time, but why not look at it now, when you're reviewing all your benefits? If you can afford to increase your contributions, you probably should, because a 401(k), with its tax advantages and ease of contribution through paycheck deductions, is a great way to save for retirement. At a minimum, put in enough to earn your employer's match. You'll also want to review your 401(k)'s investment mix. Is it still providing you with significant growth potential within the context of your individual risk tolerance? Over time, you may need to make some adjustments, either because an investment is underperforming or because you're getting close to retirement and you need to reduce your risk exposure. In any case, it's a good idea to check up on your 401(k)'s investments at least once a year.

Your employee benefits are an important part of your overall financial picture - so do what you can to get the most from them.

The third flight went to Austin, McGee, and Rig-


