Zoning Board Approves Royal Oak Site

The Hardeman County Regional Planning Commission approved the rezoning of 317.03 acres to provide property for Royal Oak Enterprises, LLC, to build a plant near Whiteville to manufacture lump charcoal.

The recommendation will be passed to the Hardeman County Commission, who will consider the change during their next meeting on October 16. A public hearing will be held to allow anyone with concerns to be heard prior to the vote on the rezoning.

Originally zoned at FAR (Forestry, Agriculture, Residential) the request changed the area east of Highway 179 and north of Mt. Tabor Road to I-2 (Restricted Industrial). The Tennessee Department of Transportation has committed to a \$3.1 million price tag to build an industrial access road on Richland



Road, which is currently gravel-covered.

County Improves Jobless Numbers

Hardeman County unemployment numbers dropped 0.2 from June to July, one of 57 Tennessee counties that improved in July.

The statistics were released by the Tennessee Department of Labor and Workforce Development (TDLWD).

Hardeman County is one of 33 counties that has a rate of 5.0% or greater and ranks 67th in the state. Hardeman County is better than two surrounding counties, McNairy at 6.4% and Haywood at 5.9%; but ranks behind Madison at 4.3%, Chester at 4.3%, and Fayette at 4.1%.

Eight of the top ten Tennessee counties with the lowest unemployment surround Davidson County, while Knox and Sevier Counties round out the list. Seven of the state's counties with the highest unemployment rates are located in West Tennessee, with the remaining three in East Tennessee.

Tennessee had a seasonally adjusted statewide unemployment rate of 3.5 percent in July, which mirrored the rate from the past two months. Nationally, the seasonally adjusted unemployment rate experienced a slight decrease, down 0.1 of a percentage point to 3.9 percent.

The unemployment numbers for August 2018 are scheduled to be released this week.

Begins with the Showtime Band


The Showtime Band will be the featured group at Music on the Square in Bolivar on Friday, September 21.

Usher and Anderson Announce Engagement


Tony and Dena Usher of Spring Hill, TN announce the engagement of their daughter, Samantha, to Myles Anderson of Franklin, TN.




Mr. Harris is survived by his brother, Zane Harris of Bolivar; and several cousins. He was preceded in death by his wife, parents, and an infant twin brother.







Amos: A Prophet for Us - Part 1 by Jeff Capshaw

Last week I began a series on the book of Amos. I also stressed reading the Bible as Holy Scripture and not as an encyclopedia or ancient textbook, because the Bible is a religious-covenantal book.

The Old Testament was the Bible for Ancient Israel and for Jesus, the Apostles and the Early Church. Furthermore, it was the only Scripture the Church had until the formation and completion of the New Testament (circa 40-90/100 AD).

Although Peter mentions Paul's writings (2 Peter 3:16), all New Testament references to Scripture refer to the Old Testament. The Church historically takes seriously the Old Testament as the Word of God too. Only relatively recently have some Christians de-emphasized the legitimacy and relevance of the Old Testament for the Church today. This is a serious mistake, because the two testaments of our Bible are remarkably related. As Saint Augustine said, "the new is in the old concealed; the old is in the new revealed."

Additionally, I urged reading the Scripture as a story with a distinctive beginning-middle-end. It is a story structured around the themes of Creation, Fall and Redemption with the overarching message that God is building a kingdom of redeemed people for his glory.

Modern readers should also be aware of the Bible's 3 constituent parts: literature, history and theology. For example, the Prophet Amos utilized an array of Ancient Near Eastern literary devices. Much of his book is comprised of Hebrew poetry. He also employs irony, metaphor, puns, hyperbole, groupings into seven things, repetition and other rhetorical devices.

Historically, Amos was written at time in Israel's history (circa 750 BCE) when there was national peace and great prosperity. Yet the people had become lazy and spiritually apathetic. So, instead of taking his message to kings and spiritual leaders like the prophets Nathan, Elijah and others before him, Amos aims his message directly at common people.

Theologically, Amos reminds the people of the Covenant God made with Israel centuries before and the consequences of failing to keep it. He insisted that obedience brings Yahweh's blessing, but disobedience brings God's disfavor and often terrible consequences.

Thus, instead of reading Amos as a fortune teller looking into a crystal ball to predict the distance future, readers should understand him as a covenant prosecutor. Amos was called by God from his shepherd/famer vocation as a spokesman for Yahweh, and he preached a relevant message to the people of Ancient Israel living during his own time.

For a variety of reasons the gospel of Jesus Christ contains good news for all of mankind! In fact, the Greek word euangelion, from which the word gospel comes from, literally means "good news" or "good message." The message of the gospel contains not only the divine love of God demonstrated,



but also provides the answers to man's greatest needs! The gospel has: (1) Facts to be believed (1 Cor. 15:1-4), (2) Commands to obey (Rom. 6:17-18; 2 Thess. 1:7-9), and (3) Promises to be enjoyed (Acts 2:38; Col. 1:5).

(2) The Gospel Settles Our Sinful Past.

When we look at our past misconduct in sin, it is very often with regret and shame for the deeds we have done. We would love to change things and would do anything to go back in time to undo the mistakes and sins of our past, but we can't. And there are many who have a hard time with the deeds of the past and letting go. But the good news of the gospel is that we can have a sense of closure to our past and move forward! God offers us a new beginning, God offers us a chance to start over with a fresh slate in the gospel. And that is awesome news to hurting hearts troubled by past consequences of sin! We all have sinned and need the forgiveness that only God can give to us (Romans 3:23; 6:22-23). Notice the words of great comfort those receive— who come to God for release & forgiveness:

In Isiah 1:18, God was offering the Israelites forgiveness, as He said, "Come now, and let us reason together," Says the Lord, "Though your sins are as scarlet, they will be as white as snow; Though they are red like crimson, they will be like wool." Twice God offers them a chance to start over, as God would not remember their sins against them any longer in Isiah 34:25, "I, even I, am the one who wipes out your transgressions for My own sake, and I will not remember your sins." (see also Jeremiah 31:34) God expresses His willingness to forgive in Micah 7:18-19 "Who is a God like You, who pardons iniquity and passes over the rebellious act of the remnant of His possession? He does not retain His anger forever, because He delights in unchanging love. He will again have compassion on us; He will tread our iniquities under foot. Yes, You will cast all their sins into the depths of the sea." What beautiful pictures of God's love and forgiveness expressed in words and concepts that we can appreciate what God does with our sins! And only with God's provision can we truly "walk in newness of life." (Romans 6:4; 2 Corinthians 5:17)







Tales from the Yellow House by Lee McAlpin



The cotton patch at the Yellow House only covered about two acres, but to us youngsters, pulling our six and nine foot tar-bottom cotton sacks up and down the rows of the fluffy white snow-bank landscape, it seemed like it was one thousand acres at the least. I remember that Mom put a strap on a flour sack when we were real young and we would pick along side them in the cotton patch.

Sooner than I would have wanted, we graduated to the six and nine foot sacks. Pain was ever present in the cotton fields. What with the dreaded stinging worms, and the pain from sticking a sharp cotton boll burr in a finger that had chaffed and cracked open. Then there was the threat of being hit up side of the head with a green cotton boll catapulted by my brother Don or another picker across the patch. Us kids were firm believers in the American Indians custom of rain dancing. At the appeareance of the tiniest cloud in the sky, my sister Joyce would immediately go into a raindance frenzy, slinging cotton bolls, dust and chanting some unknown language not even known to herself. We were hoping that a rain would drive us from the cotton patch. Sometimes it would come up a shower, but I don't give sister Joyce's dance any credit for the shower.

Sometimes we would swap out cotton picking with a neighboring farmer. At the time, I thought that it just wasnt fair to go and pick cotton somewhere and not get paid. We had to save the money we made from picking cotton to order clothes from one of the mail order businesses, such as Sears & Roebuck, Aldens or Spiegals. This usually consisted of two pair of jeans, two flannel shirts and sometimes a pair of shoes for us boys, and yes, usually a pair or two of long handle underwear.

The cold winter walk down the railroad tracks to school called for the long handles. A pair of shoes would not last more than one season walking on railroad rocks and crossties. One highlight of cotton picking was when we occasionally found a ripe watermelon that had somehow reached maturity under the cotton stalks. The cool, red, sweet melon was quickly devoured

by a hungry bunch of cotton pickers. Sometimes we ate the ripened fruit of the apricot vines which grew in the cotton fields. Some people called them may-pops. Whatever they were, we ate them.

I can remember walking home from the field in the late afternoon iust before sundown. The coolness of the fall evenings and knowing that supper was in store and another night's rest, helped ease the aching backs. I did not make too much money when I hired out to pick cotton. I wanted at least a four course lunch. That being one can of potted meat, one can of vienna sausage, some crackers and a sweet of some kind. By the time I paid for all that coupled with my inability to pick a lot of cotton left my finicial situation in the red most times.

September is Suicide Prevention Month

In Tennessee, an estimated 950 men, women, and children die by suicide each year. More people die by suicide each year than from homicide, AIDS, or motor vehicle accidents. Suicide is the leading cause of violent deaths in our state, nationally, and worldwide, far above homicide and death due to natural disasters. Suicide is the second-leading cause of death among youth and young adults ages 15-24 in Tennessee and for the United States at large. According to the Tennessee Department of Health, there were 1,065 recorded suicide deaths in our state in 2015, at a rate of 16.1 per 1000,000 population.

In a lot of cases, suicide can be traced to unrecognized, untreated, or poorly treated mental illness. It can happen to people of either sex, any race or ethnicity, and any economic status. The average suicide death leaves behind six survivors—family and friends of the deceased-all of who are at increased risk for a suicide attempt themselves. As if the emotional and psychological toll were not enough, suicide and suicide attempts cost the state of Tennessee \$1 million a year in medical treatment, lost wages, and lost productivity.

The Tennessee Suicide Prevention Network (TSPN) and its allies in the public health, mental health, and social service fields are joining forces to recognize the month



of September as Suicide Prevention Awareness Month. During this annual observance, TSPN and its allies arrange several educational and memorial events across Tennessee. These projects help teach the public about the problem of suicide and how it can be prevented. They also give us an opportunity to remember those lost to suicide; to encourage survivors of suicide, survivors of suicide attempts, and people who have triumphed over mental illness; and to recognize individuals who have made notable contributions to suicide prevention efforts in our state. Severe Storm Program Scheduled for October 11

The fall severe storm season is approaching. Are you ready for whatever is in store? Do you have a severe weather plan at your home and your workplace? Can you recognize the clues that suggest large hail, flash flooding, or a tornado is possible? Do you want to become part of the severe weather warning system in your county?

As part of its area-wide weather preparedness campaign, the National Weather Service in Memphis will answer these and many other questions at the Skywarn storm spotter training program on Thursday, October 11, from 6:00 to 8:00 p.m. The program will be in Bolivar at the Bolivar Municipal Center, 211 N. Washington St., and is held in partnership with Hardeman County Emergency Management.

The program will discuss thunderstorm formation, severe weather production, and features associated with severe storms. The presentation will also review tornado formation and behavior, non-threatening clues which may be mistaken for significant features, and safety tips to keep in mind when thunderstorms

Storm Spotters threaten. The program will discuss spotter operations and recommended reporting procedures. The two-hour presentation will be in multimedia format, featuring numerous pictures of storms and nearly 25 minutes of storm video clips.

The network of trained storm spotters plays an important role in Hardeman County. "Real-time reports from storm spotters play a huge role in our warnings", said Gary Woodall, Warning Coordination Meteorologist at the Memphis NWS Office. "Radar and satellite are great tools, but they only tell us part of a storm's story. The combination of spotter reports and electronic data gives us the best

this program is for you," Woodall said. "Even if you don't become an active storm spotter, you will learn about how storms work and the visual clues you can identify when storms are in your area. The Hardeman County severe weather program is one of 12 that the Memphis NWS Office will conduct between late September and early November. The National Weather Service in Memphis provides forecasts, warnings, and weather services for 57 counties across the mid-South. 





While it was originally known as "The Gardens," it is not listed on the National Historic Registry. It is located on the City of Bolivar Historical Zoning Area.

The Gardens was designed and built by noted architect and builder, Fletcher Sloan. Fletcher Sloan and half brother Samuel Sloan (also a famous Philadelphia architect) came to Bolivar before the Civil War. They both had designed The McNeal Place in Bolivar. Fletcher Sloan then designed St. James Episcopal Church, and after the war, designed many of the buildings and houses in this area including this Swiss Chalet style home, The Gardens in 1871. The home was considered to be several years ahead of its time in design. Fletcher Sloan also designed many southern churches and courthouses including the ones in Bolivar, Tennessee, Holly Springs and Oxford, Mississippi.

The Gardens was originally built for noted Bolivar attorney, Frank Fentress and his family. Woodson J. Savage, Sr., Bolivar merchant, was the second owner of the home in 1914. In 1924, Mr. Savage purchased the old iron fence that was erected around the Hardeman Courthouse in 1870. He installed the fence around the large park like grounds that surrounds the home. Susan Bradley Young and her family became the third owners of this home and property in 1971. Then in about 1976, Patricia Vincent bought the home and lived there until her recent passing.


