Hardeman Healthy Outreach Installs Marked Paths

Getting more physical activity is important for good health. People know it, but can find doing so hard to fit into their day. Hardeman Healthy Outreach has installed signage in two locations to encourage local residents to take a walk break. More locations throughout Hardeman County are planned.

According to a recent study shared by Dr. Gene Fitzhugh, University of Tennessee professor of kinesiology, recreation and sports studies, 4,400 to 7,500 steps per day is the perfect zone to shoot for in order to have good health for women. "The goal of 10,000 steps might be useful for weight loss, but that is hard for many people to do and not based in scientific research. The lesser goal is more attainable so I think that could be motivating in itself," he continued. Newer science has also helped dispel the idea that activity has to be in 10-minute sessions to be effective. Less length and more often can be just as valuable.

Just knowing the number of laps to make a mile has encouraged staff of two local health care facilities to walk on a few of the cooler days. "Staff can come out and walk early in the morning before their shift or during lunchtime and make a few laps. They can get their miles in a safe environment," said Sara Skinner, administrative assistant, Bolivar General Hospital.

"It's also beneficial to visitors. Sometimes patient families can come out and walk to relieve stress. We can watch while they are out here so that's a good thing," added Ruby Kirby, the hospital's chief executive officer. "A lady who lives in the apartments next to us came over and walked," said Robert Davis, Jr., Hardeman County Community Health Center programs and facility director.

In addition to the distance, signs also include motivational messages like "making excuses burns zero calories per hour" and "strive for progress, not perfection".

Signs like these will be going up in Bolivar's new Sand Beach Lake Park and parks in Middleton, Toone and Whiteville. When the rails-to-trails project is implemented in Hickory Valley, the signs will be there. Plans for marking distances in other locations in Hardeman County are underway.

This project is funded by the CDC's High Obesity Program (HOP) and is working with The University of Tennessee Extension to improve access to food and physical activity opportunities throughout Hardeman County. Burn Permits Required Earlier This Year

With hot and dry weather leading into our fall fire season, Tennessee's State Forester is requiring a burn permit for all open-air outdoor fires beginning September 23.

Typically, burn permits are required statewide October 15-May 15. While Tennessee has not seen an increase in the number of wildfires, and indices right now don't suggest a high fire danger, the Tennessee Department of Agriculture Division of Forestry is putting burn permits in place early as a precaution. If current weather conditions continue as leaf fall begins, fire danger may escalate.

"This precautionary measure will be beneficial as we continue to monitor fire risk," State Forester David Arnold said. "The burn permit system focuses attention on safety, and it's important for citizens to know when, where, and how to safely burn debris. Caution and conservative judgment should always be used when working with fire."

Obtaining a burn permit is free, fast, and simple. If you are burning a leaf or brush pile that is smaller



than eight feet by eight feet in size, our online system provides a quick and efficient way to apply. For a larger burn, call your local Division of Forestry burn permit phone number Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. - 4:30 p.m. The online system and phone numbers can be found at www.BurnSafeTN.org.

More than 300,000 permits are issued each year, and they are only issued when conditions are conducive to safe burning. If you live inside city limits, there may be additional restrictions. Check with your municipality before you burn.

Burning without a permit is a Class C Misdemeanor punishable by up to 30 days in jail and/ or a fine. Wildfires caused by arson are a class C felony punishable by three to 15 years in prison and up to \$10,000 in fines. Anyone with information about suspected arson activity should call the state Fire Marshal's Arson Hotline at 1-800-762-3017. The hotline is answered 24 hours a day, and you may remain anonymous when providing information. Cash awards are offered for information leading to an arrest or conviction. To report illegal burning, please call 1-888-891-TDEC.







Fall Harvest Pasta Salad

Ingredients 2 medium sweet potatoes, peeled and cut into 1/2-inch pieces

1 tablespoon olive oil Salt and black pepper, to taste

1 pound multi-colored pasta 3 cups broccoli, chopped (about 1-inch pieces)

1 cup dried cranberries

1/2 cup pine nuts, toasted 1/4 cup red onion, thinly sliced

1 1/2 cup poppy seed dressing 4 ounces goat cheese, crumbled

Directions Preheat oven to 400 degrees F. Place the sweet potato pieces on a large baking sheet. Drizzle them with olive oil, season with salt and pepper, and then toss. Roast in the oven for 25-30 minutes, stirring occasionally. Remove from the oven and set aside to cool.

Meanwhile, bring a large pot of water to a boil and cook the pasta according to the package directions. You'll want the pasta to be al dente. Drain the pasta, allow it to cool, and place it in a large bowl. To the bowl of pasta, add the roasted sweet potatoes, broccoli, dried cranberries, pine nuts, and red onions.

Toss with the poppy seed dressing until evenly coated. Crumble in the goat cheese and gently stir again until combined. Cover and refrigerate for at least an hour.

Stir before serving, adding more dressing if needed.





KILGORE FLARES COMPANY, LLC ISSUED A HAZARDOUS WASTE TREATMENT PERMIT

The Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation (TDEC) Division of Solid Waste Management (DSWM) has issued a hazardous waste treatment permit to Kilgore Flares Company, LLC. The Kilgore facility (EPA ID TND981026594) is located in Hardeman County on Keller Road in Toone, TN 38381. This decision follows a 45-day public comment period on the draft permit that ended on September 3, 2019. The opportunity for comment included a public hearing held on August 20, 2019 at the Toone Elementary School. A Response to Comments has been issued to address comments received during the comment period as well as to explain any changes made to finalize the permit.

The permit allows Kilgore to replace its current twenty-one (21) 1,500-pound capacity open burn pans with ten (10) redesigned 3,300-pound capacity open burn pans. Each of the redesigned carbon steel burn pans will be situated aboveground over curbed concrete pads and on elevated stands. The removal and the construction of the burn pans will be done in two phases so that treatment of waste will not be interrupted. The construction will be finished within a year of the permit issuance.

Corrective action conditions for the Solid Waste Management Units (SWMUs) and Areas of Concern (AOCs) are also included as part of the permit. Kilgore shall be required to investigate any releases of hazardous waste or hazardous constituents pursuant to this permit at the facility regardless of the time at which waste was placed in a unit and to take appropriate corrective action for any such releases. The permit also requires Kilgore to comply with all land disposal restrictions and air emission standards applicable to this facility and to certify annually that on-site generation of hazardous waste is minimized to the extent practicable.

The permit identifies 12 SWMUs and 2 AOCs. SWMUs 2, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, and AOC-1 were approved for No Further Action. The permit includes final remedies for SWMU 1, 3, 4, and 5 and AOC-2, requiring institutional controls consisting of warning signs, a no digging policy, site security, inspections, and financial assurance. Legacy groundwater contamination at SWMU 1 is being addressed as part of AOC-2. Once Kilgore closes or discontinues operation of SWMU 1, all investigations and final remedies will be addressed under the corrective action program. For AOC-2, the permit requires the monitoring of 10 wells across the site for volatile organic compounds.

The permit is issued under the authority of the Tennessee Hazardous Waste Management Act of 1977, as amended, Tennessee Code Annotated, Section 68-212-101 et seq., and Rule Chapter 0400-12-01, Hazardous Waste Management. The permit is effective as of September 10, 2019, and shall remain in effect until September 10, 2029, unless continued, revoked and reissued, or terminated under applicable regulations.

Grace, Part 9 by Jeff Capshaw

Last week I reflected on Galatians 2:15-21. Paul argues that sinners are saved by grace alone and not by observing religious laws, rules, or ceremonies. If such actions were necessary for salvation, then that would be rebuilding a legalistic system and cancelling-out the grace of God.

What creates confusion today, especially for outsiders, is the question of what church's traditions or whose list should be observed. The Gospel of God's grace is simple but not always easy to accept. There is something inherent in humanity that finds it unbelievable or unreal simply to rest on the finished work of another on their behalf.

As Paul wrote in Galatians 1:6-7, "I am astonished that you are so quickly deserting the one who called you to live in the grace of Christ and are turning to a different gospel— 7 which is really no gospel at all. Evidently some people are throwing you into confusion and are trying to pervert the gospel of Christ" (NIV). Let that sink in; he said that is "no gospel at all." If the Gospel isn't all of Christ and his grace alone, then it is "another

gospel," a false message that Paul wished to bring about a curse from God upon the messenger (1:9).

That brings us to Galatians 5. Paul writes, "For freedom Christ has set us free; stand firm therefore, and do not submit again to a yoke of slavery" (v.1). Imagine some slave having been redeemed and freed from the constraints of his or her old life of slavery. It would be irrational to return to that way of life. That is Paul's point for those desiring spiritual freedom from sin apart from the Gospel. Seeking justification and forgiveness from God by any other means than God's grace is like a former slave returning to slavery.

Apparently, some believers in Galatia were being seduced back into thinking that religious rituals (in their case, circumcision) were necessary to be put into a right standing with God. Paul nipped that in the bud. "Look: I, Paul, say to you that if you accept circumcision, Christ will be of no advantage to you" (5:2). How much clearer could it be? Put any of today's rituals or personal behaviors in place

of circumcision: church attendance, works, dress codes, denominations or even baptism. The list goes on. All of these are important, but they are not essential to the Gospel message. Salvation is by grace alone: plus-orminus nothing else.

That is why he continues in vv. 3-4, "I testify again to every man who accepts circumcision that he is obligated to keep the whole law. You are severed from Christ, you who would be justified by the law; you have fallen away from grace." Paul did not have nice things to say about those who preached another gospel of legalism or "do-ism." He wished they would "emasculate themselves" (v.12).

Therefore, by grace, become a believer in the "doings" of Christ for you. That is the Good News!

As we the human race struggle from time to time in our journey with grief we wonder in bewilderment why things happen the way they do. We are only partially in control of our life. One person put it this way, "the works of men are subject in their results to another will than that of the doer. Yet when we are sorrowing our thoughts routinely flow in that direction because our creator placed eternity in our heart (Ecclesiastes 3:11). "He desires that we enjoy good in all our labor as his gift and there is nothing better for us than to rejoice, and do good as long as we live." Yes, we can understand the world of nature and its natural order 'everything beautiful in its time', but the deeper subjects of life, death and why require us to seek answers in His Word, and this takes a willing heart and time. 




