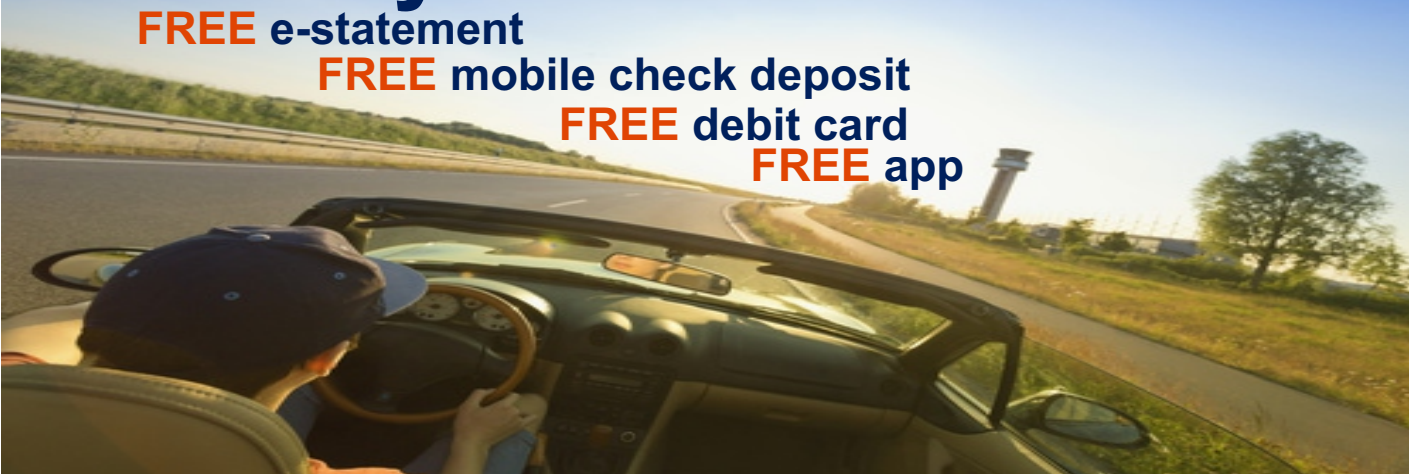

Fudgy Football Brownies

Ingredients

- 1 cup butter
- 6 ounces unsweetened chocolate, coarsely chopped
- 2 cups sugar
- 4 eggs
- 2 teaspoons vanilla
- 1 1/3 cups all-purpose flour
- 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 cup miniature chocolate pieces
- 1 cup vanilla frosting

Directions

In a medium saucepan combine butter and unsweetened chocolate. Cook and stir over low heat until melted; cool slightly. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Line a 15x10x1-inch baking pan with foil, extending the foil over edges of pan. Grease foil; set pan aside.

Stir sugar into chocolate mixture. Add eggs, one at a time, beating with a wooden spoon after each addition just until combined. Stir in vanilla. In a small bowl stir together flour and baking soda. Add flour mixture to chocolate mixture, stirring just until combined. Stir in semisweet chocolate pieces. Pour batter into the prepared baking pan, spreading evenly.

Bake for 18 minutes. Cool in pan on a wire rack. Using the edges of the foil, lift brownies out of pan. Using a 3- to 4-inch football-shape or other cookie cutter, cut out brownies. (Or cut brownies into rectangles.) Spoon Creamy Vanilla Frosting into a decorating bag fitted with a small round tip. Pipe frosting onto brownies to decorate. Let stand until frosting is set.

In a storage container layer brownie between sheets of waxed paper. Cover tightly and let stand at room temperature overnight.

Women Business Owners: Don't Forget About Your Retirement Plan

American Business Women's Day is celebrated on Sept. 22. And there is indeed cause for celebration, because, in recent decades, the number of women business owners has risen sharply, to the point where nearly 40 percent of all businesses are now women-owned, according to the U.S. Census Bureau. If you are one of these owners, or thinking about becoming one, you'll always have a lot to think about when running your business, but there's also an area you can't ignore – your retirement.

Specifically, you need to consider establishing your own retirement plan.

Most plans available to you are fairly easy to establish and maintain, and are not terribly costly to administer. Here are some popular options:

Owner-only 401(k) – This plan, also known as an individual or solo 401(k), is available to self-employed individuals and business owners with no full-time employees other than themselves or a spouse. For 2018, you can put in up to 25 percent of your annual income as an "employer" contribution, and you can defer up to \$18,500 (or \$24,500 if you're 50 or older). The sum of your employer contribution and your salary deferrals cannot exceed \$55,000, or \$61,000 if you're 50 or older. You can make elective contributions on a pre- or post-tax (Roth) basis. Pre-tax contributions reduce your taxable income for the current year. Roth contributions don't offer any immediate tax benefit, but any qualified withdrawals will be 100% tax-free.

SEP IRA – If you have just a few employees or are self-employed with no employees, you may want to consider a SEP IRA. You'll fund the plan with tax-deductible contributions, and you must cover all eligible employees. As an employer, you can contribute the lesser of 25% of your compensation (if you're also an employee of your own business) or \$55,000.

Solo defined benefit plan – Pension plans, also known as defined benefit plans, are less common than in previous years, but you can still set one up for yourself if you're self-employed or own your own business. This plan has high contribution limits, which are determined by an actuarial calculation, and your contributions are typically tax-deductible.

SIMPLE IRA – A SIMPLE IRA, as its name suggests, is easy to set up and maintain, and it can be a good plan if your business has fewer than 10 employees.

However, while a SIMPLE IRA may be advantageous for your employees, it's less generous to you, as far as allowable contributions go, than an owner-only 401(k), a SEP IRA or a defined benefit plan. For 2018, your annual contributions are generally limited to \$12,500, or \$15,500 if you're 50 or older by the end of the year. You can also make a matching contribution of up to 3% of your compensation. As an employer, your contributions are fully deductible as a business expense up to certain limits; as an employee, your pretax contributions reduce the amount of your taxable income for the same tax year.

Before opening any of these plans, you'll want to consult with your tax advisor on the tax issues and a financial professional on the investment aspects. But don't wait too long. You will need to work hard to keep your business thriving – so choose a retirement plan that works just as hard for you.

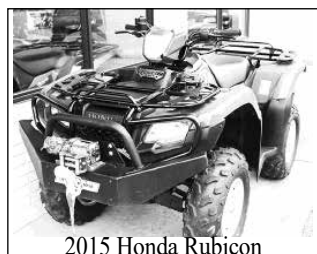

Sunrise: Sorrow & Sleep by David Coy

I have spoken much in private communication with individuals as to the anticipatory grief that some have experienced as they serve a loved one in their impending death. I do not know what it is like to be in that position. While I have no doubt that it is agonizing beyond my understanding, a new testament example gives me greater appreciation for those individuals that have been through that with a loved one. In the garden of Gethsemane as Jesus prayed in the valley of Kedron, when drops of sweat fell as it were great drops of blood, he asked the Father if he were willing, take that cup away from him, yet not his will but the Father's be done. The text says

in agony he prayed and when he got up from prayer, he discovered his disciples sleeping from grief (sadness: heaviness, sorrow), contrary to Jesus previous instruction to remain awake and alert. (Luke 22:44)

When we consider what had taken place previously with Jesus and his disciples, it is understandable why they would be overwhelmed with sorrow that would result in them sleeping, probably in utter exhaustion. It is clear that during one's journey with grief appetite and sleep changes are common. No one on the outside can know what a person struggles with on the inside when they are seeing someone they care about suffering.

Why The Gospel is Good News #3

For a variety of reasons the gospel of Jesus Christ contains good news for all of mankind! In fact, the Greek word euangelion, from which the word gospel comes from, literally means "good news" or "good message." The message of the gospel contains not only the divine love of God demonstrated, but also provides the answers to man's greatest needs! The gospel has: **(1) Facts to be believed** (1 Cor. 15:1-4), **(2) Commands to obey** (Rom. 6:17-18; 2 Thess. 1:7-9), and **(3) Promises to be enjoyed** (Acts 2:38; Col. 1:5). **(3) The Gospel Reconciles Us To God.**



One of man's greatest needs, is to be reconciled to His Creator. Ever since the fall in the Garden of Eden, man lost that close intimate relationship that Adam and Eve enjoyed prior to sin being introduced to their lives. Sin has always been a dividing line of fellowship between God and man. Notice the words Isaiah gives the Israelites concerning their prayers to God, "Behold, the Lord's hand is not so short that it cannot save; nor is His ear so dull that it cannot hear. But your iniquities have made a separation between you and your God, and your sins have hidden His face from you so that He does not hear." (Isaiah 59:1-2) But the power of the gospel makes us free from our past sins and restores our fellowship with God (2 Corinthians 6:17-18; 1 John 1:7-9). Notice what Paul says about the effects of preaching the gospel in the world then, "Now all these things are from God, who reconciled us to Himself through Christ and gave us the ministry of reconciliation, namely, that God was in Christ reconciling the world to Himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and He has committed to us the word of reconciliation." (2 Corinthians 5:18-19). The "word of reconciliation" or "the ministry of reconciliation" is none other than the gospel we preach today. It still reconciles man to God by obedience.

(4) The Gospel Gives Us The Hope Of Heaven. When someone believes and obeys the gospel, they now have a hope that they previously did not have— heaven! Paul spoke of this hope of heaven in Colossians 1:3-6, "We give thanks to God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, praying always for you, since we heard of your faith in Christ Jesus and the love which you have for all the saints; because of the hope laid up for you in heaven, of which you previously heard in the word of truth, the gospel which has come to you, just as in all the world also it is constantly bearing fruit and increasing, even as it has been doing in you also since the day you heard of it and understood the grace of God in truth." The great motivation of obeying the gospel is not only escaping the punishment of hell— but receiving the reward of God in heaven! As we know from the scriptures, there are only two destinies that man can possibly have in eternity—heaven or hell. (Matthew 25:46; Revelation 22:14; Revelation 20:12-15) Our desire needs to be with God and serving Him in the Gospel of His Son, Jesus Christ. Jesus will lead us to heaven, if we follow Him (John 10:27-28; 14:1-6).

Amos: A Prophet for Us - Part 3 by Jeff Capshaw

Last week I reminded readers of the authority and relevance of the Old Testament for the Church. I also urged thinking about Amos as covenant prosecutor: not as a fortune teller with a crystal ball. He reminded his hears of the covenant Yahweh made with Ancient Israel and the consequences for ignoring it. Like other prophets, he did predict some future events but mostly relative to his own time-period. Therefore, his primary objective was proclamation of the truth of God's Word.

Amos was a farmer and shepherd. He was not part of the religious and political establishment. He said, *I was no prophet, nor a prophet's son, but I was a herdsman and a dresser of sycamore figs. But the LORD took me from following the flock, and the LORD said to me, 'Go, prophesy to my people Israel'* (7:14-15). Thus, Amos had "outsider" credibility, but his

ultimate authority came from the LORD.

The book begins with a rhetorical hook that draws in Amos' contemporary hearers and proclaimed judgment for six of Israel's neighbors. He then employs the image of a "Lion roaring from Zion," referring to the Word of the LORD. It is a scorched-earth message that "causes pastures to morn" and the mountain top of Carmel to "wither." Beginning with six of Israel's pagan neighbors, Amos uses the formula, "thus says the LORD, for three transgressions of (cities x, y, z) and for four," I (the LORD) will do thus and so. This is a literary device indicating that Israel's neighbors had committed lots of atrocities and must be held accountable.

Amos makes it appear that the LORD is displeased only with Israel's pagan neighbors, but

suddenly he aims his seventh, formulaic message towards the LORD's people in the south: Judah's covenantal violations. But he isn't done with God's people yet; Israel is next and will need closer analysis in future articles.

Unlike calls for social justice today, Amos' message is objective. It measures injustice and justice against absolute truth: "the law of the Lord" and his "statutes." Today's cries for justice are rooted in things like "public reason," self-interest, selective self-identities, political affiliations, unbelieving thought and other arbitrary and non-absolute standards.

Therefore, there is no consensus today about what injustices look like, let alone what justice ought to be. In the coming weeks, we will explore what Amos has to say about both, because the Church should know and care about biblical injustice and justice.

Tales from the Yellow House by Lee McAlpin

The cotton picking season at the Yellow House being such a part of our country life, I decided that it deserved two weeks of ramblings. All true of course. When we bought a new pick sack, the first thing we did was to get a green cotton boll and insert it into one corner of the bottom of the sack and wrap a loop of bailing wire on the outside. This was to be used to hang the sack on the scales for weighing. The next thing that we did was to gather a bunch of poke berries, mash them up into a thin paste and write our names in bright purple on our cotton sacks. Weigh up time at the scales was watched closely to make sure that the scale pea was moved to the very last notch and the scale arm was exactly level. The pea is the counterweight used in the type of balancing scales used to weigh cotton. I cannot find the word pea as used in conjunction with scales in Websters dictionary, but it was in our country dictionary. Each person usually carried a pencil and paper to record their weights for the day. I could have used a piece of paper the size of a postage stamp and still not have filled it up with poundage weights. I knew that I was picking as fast and hard as the person beside me, but when weigh-up time came around, I fell short on my weights. Sometimes two persons would pick three rows at a time, the middle row, picked by both parties was called the grab

row. Some pickers would straddle the row if the cotton stalks weren't too tall. I was usually the back picker in the field just trying to pick one row. James Kirk related to me recently about three ladies that he knew that could pick a bale of cotton a day. Some people, like my Dad, just had the knack to pick a lot of cotton in a days time, but his talent of cotton picking didn't rub off on me.

We usually went to the field early in the morning. The weather would be cool and sometimes cold. I would wear a flannel shirt to the field and up in the morning, I would have to pull it off when the sun came out, and we would stay in the field until the sun was going down, and I would have to put my shirt back on to cope with the evening chill. Kids will be kids as the old adage goes, and so it was with us. Most of the cotton fields were surrounded by a scope of woods, and port-a-potties were not on the scene at that time, and people used the surrounding woods for their privacy breaks. When someone would go into the woods, if no adults were looking, they were bombarded with a barrage of green cotton bolls. They emerged from the woods with a scowl on their faces.

A cotton trailer full of cotton was the perfect place to play. We were allowed to play in the cotton, but first we had to empty our pock-



ets of every last item. A nail, bolt or anything metal could cause a fire in the cotton when it went through the ginning process. A trip to the gin riding in the cotton trailer or truck was a big treat for us kids, and we usually got a bar of candy on that day. I now live up the street from Shelley's old gin which is no longer in operation. This time of the year I can almost hear it humming and hear the seed rushing through the pipe which went over the street into the cotton-seed bin. It would be fun to pick a sack of cotton now that my winter clothes don't depend on the picking. I may just get me a can of vienna sausage, some crackers, and a pick sack and go out to a field and pull a handfull or two of the fluffy white gold and reminiscence.

Tigers Ran, But They Couldn't Hide

Bolivar Central took a 12-10 lead midway through the third quarter against Jackson South Side, but the Hawks (6-0) responded with a pair of scores to give Bolivar (1-5) their fourth loss in a row.

"We are having trouble doing the little things that helps us finish games," said Coach Woodrow Lowe. "We're trying to clean things up."

Against South Side, it was a familiar story of having a late lead, but giving it back. On the year, the Tigers have led four of six games at the half, but have been outscored in the second half in all but two games: the 9-8 win over MAHS and the 33-20 loss to Harding Academy.
