County Answers Sheriff's Lawsuit

Hardeman County has given both questions and answers to the July 16 lawsuit filed by the Hardeman County Sheriff's Department versus the county.

Some of the questions asked were: 1.) Reports on how many vehicle accidents they have investigated in the past two years. 2.) Reports on how they have assisted the TWRA. 3.) Reports on how many motor vehicle citations, warrants, or tickets they have written in the past two years. 4.) A report on the attorneys hired to represent them, as the county is responsible for their fees and 5.) Asked for a list of witnesses they might call, and any experts they might use.

Comments made in the answer included that "The defendant admits that the Sheriff's Department investigates some vehicle accidents within

the county, but the responsibility is shared with the TN Highway Patrol. The sheriff has declined to enforce various motor vehicle offenses, such as speeding, even though the sheriff has radar to check speed which the sheriff only uses for probably cause vehicle stops."

In answer to the statement that the population requires a minimum of seven more deputies, citing a deputy to population rate close to half of the national average (1.12 vs. 2.0 officers for each one thousand citizens) and less than the average in Tennessee (1.12 vs. 1.4), the county countered with totals that considers inmates at the Hardeman County Correctional Facility and Whiteville Correctional Facility and adds in full time officers serving the city of Bolivar, the county says there is one commissioned officer for every 518 citizens resid-

ing outside of Bolivar and outside of the above mentioned prisons.

The remaining answers included responses to allegations that have been made public in the last year, such as car maintenance, gasoline funds, overtime pay for employees, and budget amounts for supplies, salaries, and equipment.

The sheriff's complaint says they regret bringing this action, but the county has refused to provide "necessary funding so that the petitioner can effectively carry out the requirements of the office."

The county responded to the line stating, "The defendant denies the allegations in paragraph 31 of the complaint. The sheriff has refused to follow the recommendations of the Comptroller, the Hardeman County Commis-

BEA Announces Reduction of Rates

The Bolivar Energy Authority announced the approval of a long-term contract extension with the Tennessee Valley Authority which will reduce BEA's non-fuel related wholesale power costs (approximately 75% of wholesale costs). The yearly saving will be approximately \$450,000, depending on weather.

BEA will pass the entire savings on to its customers as soon as all contracts are signed, and TVA approves the change in retail rates, target is for October meter readings.

"We are glad we are in financial shape to pass this along to our customers," said BEA CEO Johnny Fortune.

nessee. "This race allows us to bring resources to the rural areas of West Tennessee." Festivities will begin at 5 p.m. and will include a silent auction, a chip-timed 5K race, along with a small awareness walk around the courthouse. Participants are encouraged to register in advance for the 5K and to create teams to support the \$10,000 fundraising goal.

Awards will be given to the 5K runners in each age group, with an award being given to the overall female and male winner. Age groups include: 12 and under, 13-19, 20-29, 30-39, 40-49, 50-59, and age 60 and up.

"With the money raised from last year's races in Bolivar and Jackson, we were able to touch over 4,800 people in West Tennessee," Holcomb said. "We reached these individuals through trainings, seminars, wellness fairs, community nights, support groups, and our #YouAreLoved campaign. These races really fuel our ability as a volunteer-run organization to provide these services for free to the entire West Tennessee community."

sion, the offers of assistance from the County Mayor, and continues to run and manage the Sheriff's Department in an inefficient and wasteful manner. "

The suit was filed, asking for "deputies, jailers, and staff, and to acquire essential crime fighting equipment." on behalf of Doolen by attorney Roy Herron, former Chairman of the Tennessee Democratic Party, a Tennessee State Senator for the 24th district for 16 years and for 10 years before that he was the State Representative for the 76th District.

Herron's press release noted that the lawsuit does not seek a raise for Doolen, as his salary is set by state law.

Doolen's request of \$1.4 million for salaries during the 2019-2020 budget talks was answered this June with \$952,477 from the Hardeman County Budget Committee, down from a 2018-2019 budget amount of \$957,364 that was passed (in the corresponding line items) in June of 2018.

When consulted, a representative of the Tennessee County Technical Assistance Service (CTAS) said that petitioning the court for "number of employees and the salaries of those employees," was allowed, but asking for "maintenance of vehicles or equipment" was not included as actionable in the statute.

By statute, Doolen was required to name Hardeman County Mayor Jimmy Sain as the defendant, in his official capacity as mayor.

This past year's budget talks were dominated by the discussion of funding the Hardeman County Schools, which ended with the county commission passing the schools budget at the same rate as the previous year, overruling the budget committee's recommendation in the process.

It is scheduled to be taken up in court September 5, with preliminary motions on both sides scheduled, with Judge Weber McCraw presiding.

 - 1/8 tsp. each salt and black pepper, or more to taste
 - 12 oz. albacore tuna packed in water (1 large can or about 2 large pouches), drained and flaked
 - 1/4 cup finely chopped red bell peppers
 - 1/4 cup finely chopped red onion
 - 8 small cucumbers (about 5 oz. each)

Directions

In a medium bowl, combine mayo, relish, mustard, dill, salt, and black pepper. Mix until uniform. Add tuna, bell pepper, and onion, and stir to coat.

Slice off and discard cucumber stem ends. Halve cucumbers lengthwise. Gently scoop out and discard the cucumber flesh, leaving about 1/4 inch inside each half. Thoroughly pat dry. Evenly top 8 cucumber halves with tuna mixture. Top with remaining 8 cucumber halves, and secure with toothpicks, if needed.

FAITH

Grace, Part 6 by Jeff Capshaw

Last week I considered the umbrella-like statement Paul makes in Romans 5:1. "Therefore, since we have been justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ." I went on to cite the verse following: "through him we have also obtained access by faith into this grace in which we stand . . ." (5:2).

Believers' justification, in God's eyes, is "just-as-thought-they-never-sinned." Or, to put it in Martin Luther's famous Latin slogan, believers are *simul justus et peccator*. It roughly translates as sinners are "simultaneously sinful but justified."

So, does that mean that justified believers with a complete standing in grace before God can live any way they want to? According to Paul, the answer is an emphatic "no"! He says, "what shall we say then? Are we to continue in sin that grace may abound? By no means! How can we who died to sin still live in it? Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? We were buried therefore with him by baptism into death, in

order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might walk in newness of life" (Romans 6:1-4).

A brief unpacking of these verses renders at least the following observations. First, justification by grace does not give believers a license to sin. It is quite the opposite. Instead, God's gracious justifying of sinners gives them the power to "walk (live) in newness of life" free from sin (v.4).

Second, Paul uses the imagery of water baptism to illustrate what a believer's union with Christ looks like. Notice he does not say "baptism into the water," although the New Testament does demand water baptism as an act of obedience following justification by grace. As Luke says in Acts 2:41 regarding Peter's Pentecost sermon, "those who accepted (believed) his message were baptized, and about three thousand were added to their number that day."

In the Romans 6 context, however, Paul says twice that this baptism is a "baptism into death."

Although a difficult image, it means something like the

following. In the same way, a believer is covered with water or completely identifies with water in the sacramental ordinance of baptism, so believers baptized in Christ's death are mystically united or completely identify (relate to him) in his death. One of my former teachers once said, "I cannot explain the believer's mystical union with Christ in Romans 6; I can only believe it."

Therefore, one cannot consistently believe the truths of Romans 6:1-4 and "trample on the Grace of God" (Hebrews 10:29). Rather, in the same way that Christ was raised to a new life with a newly glorified body, after his death and burial, so ought believers also live by the power of the Gospel in newness or differentness of life. But until believers receive their glorified bodies someday, the struggle is real (see Romans 7).

Common Sorrow by David Coy

The benefit of expressing our sorrow, mourning, is universally seen as helpful in one's journey with grief. Even more important is those who are supporting them that mourn in allowing them to express their grief in a manner that is comfortable and natural for them. There is a second benefit that is worth mentioning. The illustration is correctly made concerning the Sun that it will harden or soften the recipient of its heat depending upon the substance. It is often used to emphasize the same source, in this case grief, may strengthen or weaken the recipient. Grief is a painful tutor, but we can learn a great deal and become a stronger individual for the experience. It will require our willingness to learn from our experience and be changed as a result.

Sometimes we may express weeping, or disappointment, perhaps anger or disbelief. We may feel loneliness or hopeless in our current circumstances. It often helps our journey with grief to show compassion and empathy toward others who are just beginning their journey and are in need of direction and support. This is when we would attempt to place ourselves in the shoes and frame of reference of those whom we are attempting to support and console. Active listening is one of the most important traits a person may display who is desiring to help another as they journey with grief. People need to feel comfortable that they may share their experiences that they are now dealing with in their life. That is equally true with each of us. We need support from others. We need to receive empathy and able to give empathy in return. This is why I say there is no time limit when grieving. Take what time you need to resolve your sorrow and give it in return for others. State Teachers Survey Released

The Tennessee Department of Education and Tennessee Education Research Alliance at Vanderbilt University (TERA) released the results from the 2019 Tennessee Educator Survey. Over 45,000 Tennessee educators completed this year's survey, representing 62 percent of the state's teachers – an all-time high response rate. Survey results point to progress made and maintained in a number of areas, alongside several areas where our state's educators continue to see a need for improvement.

This is the ninth year that the department, in partnership with TERA, has surveyed all educators in the state to gather feedback and include teachers' voices in department strategy, policy decisions, and goal setting. The Tennessee Educator Survey aims to measure and evaluate teacher perceptions, and monitor school climates and culture across the state.

Commissioner Schwinn said "I've personally reviewed the comments that were submitted, and we are already using this feedback to drive decisions at the department. The increase in response rate from educators on the front lines is critical to helping the department develop and deliver better products and services for educators and students across the state."

Some of the main takeaways from the 2019 survey include:

- Seven in 10 teachers with more than three hours of weekly individual planning time agree that this time is sufficient. Fewer than five in 10 teachers with less than three hours of time agree this time is sufficient.

- Tennessee teachers feel positively about many aspects of their curricular materials, but still spend substantial time creating or sourcing their own.

- Seventy percent of teachers report spending more than four hours per week creating or sourcing instructional materials.

- Seven in 10 first-year teachers report having a mentor, but one in three report that their mentors frequently engage with them in high-leverage coaching activities.

- The percentage of educators who feel that evaluation is improving student learning has doubled since the annual evaluation began in 2012.

- Overall employee satisfaction remains high among teachers in Tennessee, with nine in 10 teachers reporting that they are generally satisfied working as a teacher in their school.

The survey also pointed to different perceptions and areas of need between teachers in urban and rural areas of the state. Teachers in urban districts report that they have less

individual planning time each week and are also less likely to report that amount of time as sufficient. Urban teachers are also more likely to spend more than 10 hours per week sourcing materials.

These findings continue to show that state, district, and school leaders must work together to support educators, which will align resources and maximize teachers' effectiveness in the classroom. The department shares school and district survey results directly with local leaders to inform their decision-making, and the department also uses the state-level information to guide the department's work. Additionally, the department's regional offices use the survey results to provide districts with the support to create regional collaborative relationships, differentiated professional development, and evidence-based best practice sharing.

Southern Express Pharmacy Hosts Narcan Expert



Presenter Mark Mason at Southern Express Pharmacy gave a Narcan Training talk on September 3. Regional Overdose Prevention Specialists (ROPS) are located throughout the state of Tennessee as a point of contact for training and education on opioid overdose and for overdose prevention through the distribution of naloxone. From October 2017 to February 2019, the ROPS distributed more than 35,000 units of naloxone with more than 14,000 of those units distributed to law enforcement. TDMHSAS has documented at least 2,000 lives saved because of naloxone distributed during that time. Because of stigma and other factors, the department believes the actual number of lives saved is much higher.

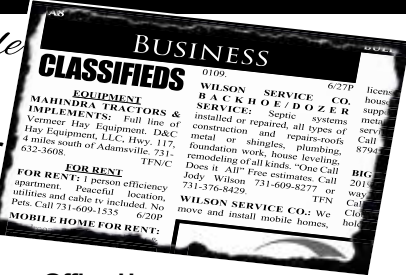

Department of Health Cautions Against Vaping

The Tennessee Department of Health is asking health care providers across the state to report any cases of suspected serious respiratory illness they treat among patients who use electronic cigarettes or other vaping devices. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention is investigating a cluster of severe pulmonary disease among people who use e-cigarettes or vape, with more than 150 cases reported to date in 16 states.



"We are alerting Tennessee health care providers to be on the lookout for patients with severe respiratory symptoms who report vaping in the weeks before they got sick," said TDH State Epidemiologist Tim Jones, MD.

"We expect to find cases of this illness in Tennessee," Jones continued. "We'll investigate any cases reported here to look for common factors and collect information on specific components or brands of vaping products that may be the source of the illness."

Patients have had symptoms including cough, shortness of breath and fatigue, with symptoms growing worse over a period of days or weeks before admission to the hospital. Other symptoms may include fever, chest pain, nausea, abdominal pain and diarrhea. Most of the cases are among adolescents and young adults.

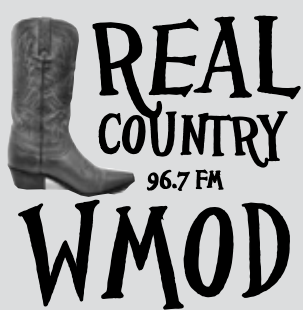
