Music on the Square Presents Tumbleweed




Opening the night will be Jimmy Anderson at 7:00 p.m.


Concessions will be available. Music on the Square is due to the efforts of the Hardeman County Music Commission, an outreach of the Bolivar Downtown Development Corporation.

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Consider Financial Gifts for Your Grandchildren

National Grandparents Day is observed on Sept. 9. If you're a grandparent, you may get some gifts or cards - or maybe even a phone call! But you might feel that it's better to give than to receive, especially when it comes to your grandchildren. And you can make a real difference in their lives by making a financial gift for their future.

For starters, think about your grandchildren's education. If college or some type of vocational school is in their future, you may want to help them meet some of the costs, which can be considerable. One common education-savings vehicle is a 529 savings plan. With this plan, earnings on withdrawals are tax free, provided they are used for qualified education expenses. (Keep in mind that 529 savings plan distributions not used for qualified expenses may be subject to ordinary income tax and a 10% IRS penalty on the earnings.) You also may be eligible for a state income tax incentive for contributing to a 529 savings plan. Check with your tax advisor about these incentives, as well as all tax-related issues pertaining to 529 savings plans.

A 529 savings plan's contribution limits are quite generous. And, as the owner of a 529 plan, you have flexibility in choosing where the money goes – if your grandchild decides against college or another type of advanced education, you can transfer the plan to another beneficiary. And due to recent tax law changes, the scope of 529 plans has been expanded to include qualified withdrawals of up to \$10,000 for tuition expenses per year per beneficiary at public, private or religious elementary or secondary schools. Be aware, though, that a 529 savings plan could affect any financial assistance your grandchild might receive. Although a 529 plan owned by a grandparent won't be reported as an asset on the Free Application For Federal Student Aid (FAFSA), withdrawals from the plan are treated as untaxed income to the beneficiary (i.e., your grandchild) — and that has a big impact on financial aid. So, you may want to contact a financial aid professional about the potential effects of any gifts you're considering.

A 529 savings plan isn't the only financial gift you could give to your grandchildren. You also might consider giving them shares of stock, possibly held in a custodial account, usually known as an UTMA or UGMA account. However, you only control a custodial account until your grandchildren reach the age of majority as defined by state law, at which time they take it over. They then can use the money for whatever they want - and their plans may not have anything to do with books or classes.

Still, your grandchildren might be particularly interested in owning the stocks contained in the custodial account – many young people enjoy owning shares of companies that make familiar products. And your gift may even get your grandchildren interested in long-term investing.

No matter what type of financial gifts you give to your grandchildren, make sure your keep enough money to pay for your own needs. It's important to balance your personal savings needs with your desire to be generous.

Giving financial gifts can be rewarding – to you and your grand-

children. Consider exploring some possibilities soon.

(3) The Social Gospel Makes the Wrong Appeal.

When the focus is on what can this church provide for my kids, and in supplying all our recreational and entertainment needs— it begins to make an appeal that is not found in the scriptures! Our appeal to the lost is not providing secular things like classes on cake decorat-



ing, how to lose weight, money management, or even dating clubs for single members. These are not wrong in and of themselves, but to tie up the church to function as a day care, match-making site, or to help you learn other secular things, like how to yoga or zumba, is NOT our work or our appeal. These things bog down and detour altogether the rightful mission of the church. What appeals to many people is the church providing these things from the treasury with little or no cost to anyone. Church of Christ baseball, basketball, and softball leagues may seem like a good idea to draw people into the church by providing the means and appealing to those who like those things—but at the end of the day, you have people there for the secular activities, and not there for Jesus. The pragmatic view some have: is to just get as many people to the church building as possible, by any means necessary. The end justifies the means in this appeal to congregate. Just get people involved in plays and dramatics and the parents will come as well. But this appeal aims too low— for the appetites of the belly, and not the heart. Our appeal is spiritual and not carnal. If people do not want to come for the "unsearchable riches of Christ," we cannot truly convert them to Jesus with ice cream socials and hamburgers. As someone once said, "If you offer hot dogs as your appeal, the church down the road will offer a footlong hot dog and you lose them to the bigger offer." Larger churches with more resources will always outdo the little churches, but is that God's way?

Defending the Faith: Part 10 by Jeff Capshaw

In previous articles, I introduced the following methods. (1) *Classical Apologetics* began in the early Christian centuries and drew on human reason to defend against external attacks from unorthodox teachings, especially so-called "Gnosticism."

(2) Evidentialism uses historical evidences (e.g. the Resurrection of Christ), while (3) the Cumulative Case approach draws simultaneously on several lines of reasoning and attempts to show the internal coherence, consistency and explanatory power of the Christian worldview.

(4) The *Reformed Epistemology* (REM) method argues that belief in God is a "properly basic belief." Therefore, no prior premises are needed to infer belief in God. Thus, believers have proper warrant for such belief. Christians are, therefore, not irrational for holding such belief.

The final method is *Presuppositional Apologetics*. This method begins with two non-negotiable "presuppositions" or starting points: (1) the existence of the Triune God of Scripture and (2) the inspiration and authority of the 66 books of the Old and New Testaments. Presuppositional Apologists are not opposed to evidences or reasons for why this is the case, but they do not start there. This method takes both negative and positive stances. It capably shows the inconsistency of unbelieving worldivews and the consistency of the Christian worldview.

Presuppositionalism has a rich history in the Dutch Reformed Church. However, much of its notoriety, formulation and influence in America originated with the Westminster Seminary professor, the late Cornelius Van Til, and his students: the late Greg Bahnsen, John Frame, Scott Oliphant and others. Francis Schaeffer creatively applied it in all areas of life. This is especially evident in his work at the L'Abri Institute in Switzerland and popular book, *How Then Shall We Live*?

Besides its fundamental and non-negotiable starting points, *Presuppositional Apologetics* takes seriously the Lordship of Christ in every area of life, especially his Lordship over ALL knowledge. Since the Triune God of the Bible exists, and since the Bible is true, a Christian cannot appeal to a higher authority nor other weightier, external evidences or arguments to substantiate Christianity's truth claims. In other words, both God and Scripture are ultimate evidences for the Christian.

Admittedly, this reasoning is somewhat circular. However, as John Frame notes, it is not "viciously circular." Rather, the circularity is not unlike other worldviews invoke, because every other worldview assumes the truths of its own premises to draw its conclusions. According to Presuppositionalism, the Christian worldview simply is no different!





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

September is Attendance Awareness Month

Hardeman County Schools has joined a nationwide effort to celebrate Attendance Awareness Month in September and has pledged to raise awareness about the value of regular school attendance and focus on reducing chronic absenteeism in the new school year.



School leaders recognize that good attendance is essential to academic success. But far too many students are at risk academically because they are chronically absent. Chronic absence is described as missing 10 percent of the school year—or about 18 days – for any reason, excused or unexcused. That's the point at which absenteeism begins to affect student performance, research shows.

Nationally, 5 million to 7.5 million miss nearly a month of school in excused and unexcused absences every year. Hardeman County Schools has reviewed data and pledges to get ahead of this issue before it becomes a part of the disturbing national trend. Starting as early as kindergarten or even preschool, chronic absence predicts lower 3rd grade reading scores. By middle school it's a warning sign that students will fail key classes and drop out of high school.

Chronic absence disproportionately affects children from low-income families and communities of color, creating attendance gaps that exacerbate achievement gaps in local schools. This is not just a matter of truancy. Many children, especially in the early grades, miss too much school because of chronic health problems, unreliable transportation or housing moves—barriers that city agencies and community partners can help families ad-

Director of Schools, Warner Ross noted that, "This matters to all of us, not just those with school-age children," said. "When our schools graduate more students, on time, our communities and our economy are stronger. We have more people who are prepared for the workplace and more engaged in our community's civic life."

Attendance Officer Donald McTizic stated that, "We know that we will never narrow he achievement gap or reduce our dropout rate until we bring this problem under control, and that means starting early," Board Chairman Bobby Henderson said. "All our efforts to improve curriculum and instruction won't matter much if kids aren't in school."

In September, schools, city agencies, community nonprofits, faith-based groups, businesses and others around the nation are committing time and resources to raise public awareness, map local attendance gaps and work with community partners to improve school attendance starting as soon as children enter school.

"September is a particularly good time to focus on attendance," said Hedy Chang, director of Attendance Works, a national nonprofit dedicated to improve school attendance "Research shows that students who miss two to four days in the first month of school are more likely to become chronically absent during the school year. By paying attention to absences early in the school year and early in a child's academic career, we can turn around attendance and achievement."

During Attendance Awareness Month, we are asking school leaders, community advocates, parents and students to act upon these critical first steps to help stem chronic absenteeism:

- Build a habit and a culture of regular attendance
- Use data to determine when and with whom chronic absence is a problem, and
- Identify and address barriers to getting children to school.

Study after study shows that chronic absence is an early warning indicator that a student will drop out of a high school. A recent study from Utah found that a student who was chronically absent in any year between eighth and 12th grade was 7.4 times more likely to drop out than students with better attendance. In addition, the Tennessee State Board of Education has deemed that Chronic Absenteeism be included as an accountability metric for all of Tennessee's public schools.



September is Suicide Prevention Month

In Tennessee, an estimated 950 men, women, and children die by suicide each year. More people die by suicide each year than from homicide, AIDS, or motor vehicle accidents. Suicide is the leading cause of violent deaths in our state, nationally, and worldwide, far above homicide and death due to natural disasters. Suicide is the second-leading cause of death among youth and young adults ages 15-24 in Tennessee and for the United States at large. According to the Tennessee Department of Health, there were 1,065 recorded suicide deaths in our state in 2015, at a rate of 16.1 per 1000,000 population.

In a lot of cases, suicide can be traced to unrecognized, untreated, or poorly treated mental illness. It can happen to people of either sex, any race or ethnicity, and any economic status. The average suicide death leaves behind six survivors—family and friends of the deceased-all of who are at increased risk for a suicide attempt themselves. As if the emotional and psychological toll were not enough, suicide and suicide attempts cost the state of Tennessee \$1 million a year in medical treatment, lost wages, and lost productivity.



tion Network (TSPN) and its allies in the public health, mental health, and social service fields are joining forces to recognize the month of September as Suicide Prevention Awareness Month. During this annual observance, TSPN and its allies arrange several educational and memorial events across Tennessee. These projects help teach the public about the problem of suicide and how it can be prevented. They also give us an opportunity to remember those lost to suicide; to encourage survivors of suicide, survivors of suicide

attempts, and people who have triumphed over mental illness; and to recognize individuals who have made notable contributions to suicide prevention efforts in our state. *Source: tspn.org*
